Attention Claims,

I, Denise Waheed, the owner of property address, 3110 N 35<sup>th</sup> Street – 3428 W. Burleigh Street – 3432 W. Burleigh Street, is requesting the City of Milwaukee to pay for 2 entry doors that were damaged by the Milwaukee Police Department on August 11, 2025.

The address of the building is 3110 N 35<sup>th</sup> Street, 3428 W. Burleigh Street and 3432 W. Burleigh Street. The building is located on the northeast corner of N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street and W. Burleigh Street. There are six residential apartments and one commercial unit. Apartments 1, 2, 3, 4, and 6 are located on the second floor of the building. Apartment 5 and the commercial unit are on the first floor. The windows to apartments 2, 3, and 4 are on N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street. Apartment 1 has windows on N 35<sup>th</sup> Street and W. Burleigh Street. This apartment is on the corner of N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street and W. Burleigh Street. The windows to apartment 6 are on W. Burleigh Street. Apartments 1, 2, and 6 are addressed as 3428 W. Burleigh Street. These apartments share the entry door on W. Burleigh Street. Apartments 3, 4, and 5 has the address 3110 N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street and share the entry door on N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street. The commercial unit address is 3432 W. Burleigh Street and has its own entry door. All of the second floor apartments have access to the rear balcony. The tenants in apartments 2, 3, and 4 are my nephews. The tenant in apartment 6 is my cousin, and the tenant in apartment 1 is not related.

On Monday, August 11, 2025, at approximately 8:30 pm, I received a call from the tenant in apartment 3, stating that the Milwaukee Police were planning to raid

somewhere in the area. I immediately checked my surveillance cameras to see if I could get a view of what was happening in the surrounding area. I saw three police officers with guns and a shield in the hallway of 3110 N 35<sup>th</sup> Street. The same building where the tenant was calling to inform me of a police raid in the neighborhood. The tenant did not know that the police were breaking into the building where he resides. I told the tenant not to move and stay away from the door. I called the 7<sup>th</sup> District Police Department and spoke to Officer Grayson. Officer Grayson connected me to the sergeant in charge of the investigation, Sergeant Jullian Goggins. Sergeant Goggins refused to provide any information as to why they were breaking into my building. The only information Sergeant Goggins provided was that this is an investigation. Sergeant Goggins asked me the names of the tenants and appeared to be focusing on the tenant that lives in the apartment on the corner of N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street and W. Burleigh Street (Apartment 1). I gave Sergeant Goggins the information that he requested and offered to bring my keys to avoid destroying the other entry door located on W. Burleigh Street, not knowing that the police had already broken into the hallway of the W. Burleigh Street entrance. The police did not go into any of the apartments to apprehend or interview the potential suspect. The police did not break into any of the tenant's apartments, knock on any tenant's door, or talked to any of the tenants. The police did not have a search warrant during this investigation.

I asked the tenant in apartment 3 to get the damage report notice that Sergeant Goggins prepared for me to use if I wanted to file a claim against the City of Milwaukee. Sergeant Goggins gave the tenant in apartment 3 the damage report notice indicating that the Milwaukee Police Department damaged 2 entry doors. Officer Goggins asked if I wanted the City of Milwaukee to be responsible for securing both doors. I indicated that I would have both doors secured.

Meanwhile, a nephew that does not live in the building, sent me a text from a scanner indicating that on N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street and W. Burleigh Street, an adult female jumped out of a second story window after being held at gunpoint and that the police were looking for a suspect. There are tactical vehicles on the scene. A copy of the text message is attached. I informed my nephew that the police had broken into both entry doors but did not go into any of the apartments. I did not know if the tenant in apartment 1 was involved with holding a woman at gunpoint, or if a woman had jumped from the window of apartment 1 to escape. I told my nephew that we will check the surveillance cameras tomorrow to see what happened.

On Tuesday, August 12, 2025, my nephew, the one that does not live in the building on N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street and W. Burleigh Street, and I reviewed the surveillance cameras to find out if a woman jumped from the second story window, leading to the police damaging 2 entry doors to my property. The surveillance cameras show the following events that occurred on August 11, 2025. The times are according to the surveillance cameras.

At 6:43 p.m. - The tenant in apartment 1 arrives with an unknown female. Both went into the building through the balcony entrance.

At 7:49 p.m. - The camera facing south on N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street shows unknown female climbed out the window of apartment 1, stood on the ledge, adjusted her purse, sits down on the ledge, slides down the building, lands on her feet and fell to the ground. The unknown female appears to be hurt and unable to stand up.

At 7:50 p.m. - A good Samaritan stopped to see if the unknown female, that jumped from the window, needed help.

At 7:52 p.m. - The police arrived and provided medical assistance to the unknown female. I assume the police took the unknown female identification and statement as to why she jumped from the second story window. The unknown female was taken away by the paramedics. Police secured the area by blocking off the streets surrounding the building.

I never saw on the surveillance cameras the tenant in apartment 1 leaving the building.

This is where I questioned why the police damaged my 2 entry doors. The media is reporting that a person was held at gunpoint and had to escape by jumping from the window of a building on 35<sup>th</sup> Street and Burleigh Street (CBS 58 Newsroom article is attached). The surveillance camera shows a female leaving apartment 1 from a second story window. **If the police received a complaint from a person stating that a tenant in the building, held someone at gunpoint, why didn't the police investigate the allege complaint by going into the apartment where the allege complaint took place? Why didn't the police investigate by interviewing the tenant in apartment 1? Why did the police damage and forcibly enter 2 first floor common doors but never attempt to enter a specific tenant apartment door?**

These questions raised a lot of concerns. The tenant in apartment 1 did not secure his vehicle for overnight parking. The window to apartment 1 was still

open from the night before. It rained early that morning. This is out of character for the tenant in apartment 1. He would not leave the window open or leave his car unsecured overnight. I did not know what to think at this point.

At approximately 2:00 pm on August 12, my nephew, the one that does not live in the building on N. 35<sup>th</sup> and W. Burleigh Street, and I went to the 7<sup>th</sup> District Police Station to request a welfare check for the tenant in apartment 1. I asked to speak with Sargeant Goggins. I was told that Sargeant Goggins shift starts later this evening. The assistant at the front desk instructed me to use the district phone to request an officer to do a welfare check. I spoke to 2 different operators on the phone. The first operator refused to send an officer to the property. The second operator agree to have an officer contact me but the operator could not guarantee the officer would come to the property. We left the police station and returned back to the property on N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street and W. Burleigh Street.

Around 2:30 pm, I received a call from Officer Lofland stating that he was at the building on N. 35<sup>th</sup> Street and W. Burleigh Street. Officer Lofland appeared to be uncomfortable with the surroundings. He parked at the rear of the building but did not get out of the car until he saw me. I explained that I had not heard from the tenant in apartment 1, and that the police were here the night before breaking my doors. All of my tenants were accounted for except the tenant in apartment 1. The surveillance cameras show a woman exiting the building from the second story window, of apartment 1, and the tenant never leaving apartment 1. The window is open with the wind blowing the drapes in and out of the apartment. It rained earlier that day and no one closed the window. Officer Lofland went back to his car, checked his computer system to see if there were any warrants out for the tenant in apartment 1. Officer Lofland found a picture of a person with the same name as the tenant in apartment 1, and asked me to confirm if this is the person that lives in apartment 1. I verified the photo as being a picture of the tenant from apartment 1. Officer Lofland informed me that there were no warrants out for his arrest. I explained to Officer Lofland that something is wrong. The surveillance cameras do not show the tenant in apartment 1 leaving the building. I called the tenant in apartment 1 and he has not returned my call, his window is open, and he did not put the club on his car. I told Officer Lofland that the unknown woman that exited the building from the window, probably did something to the tenant in apartment 1. I asked Officer Lofland if he could check to see if the tenant is alright? Officer Lofland started explaining tenant's rights and said, "the tenant might open the door and start blasting", and

refused to conduct a welfare check. I told Officer Lofland that I would contact Sargeant Goggins to see if he can go into the apartment and do the welfare check. Officer Lofland declined to do the welfare check and left the scene.

At 5:16 pm, I called the sister of the tenant in apartment 1 to see if she had heard from her brother. I did not want to alarm her of my thoughts being that I did not know how she and her family would react. I asked the sister if she would go to the apartment and check on her brother. The sister said that she wanted to check with her siblings and get back to me.

At approximately 7:00 pm. I called Sargeant Goggins and left a message asking Sargeant Goggins to return my call.

Around 8:30 pm, Sargeant Goggins returned my call. I offered my surveillance cameras to assist Sargeant Goggins in his investigation and explained that the tenant in apartment 1 never left the building after the unknown female exit through the window. Sargeant Goggins, politely told me that the Police Department is not searching for the tenant in apartment 1. I asked Sargeant Goggins again, do you want to look at my surveillance cameras. Once again, Sargeant Goggins told me NO. I stated to Sargeant Goggins that I though the first 48 hours were important. Sargeant Goggins told me that I watch too much TV.

At 9:10 pm, I received a text from the sister of the tenant in apartment 1, asking to meet her at the apartment to check on her brother.

Approximately 9:50 pm, I entered apartment 1 with the sister of the tenant in apartment 1, and a male companion of the sister of the tenant in apartment 1, found the tenant in apartment 1, lying on the floor in a pool of blood, apparently deceased. I immediately dialed 911.

The police arrived less than 10 minutes.

I cannot see how the actions of the police, during this investigation, be justified. Before the police forcibly entered the building, the police should have known that this is a building with multiple units. This can be determined by looking at the building from the outside. The police should have been able to identify which apartment the unknown female jumped from. The police should have went into that apartment and determine why this woman jumped out of the second story window.

If the police were looking at the building from the outside, the police should have noticed all of the surveillance cameras. I believe the surveillance cameras are vital to an investigation. After I looked at the surveillance cameras, it obvious that the police had no intentions of investigating why the unknown female jumped from the second story window. The police did not attempt to apprehend any suspects, or solve any crime. Why did the police forcibly enter and damage 2 of the common area entry doors and not enter the apartment where the allege crime occurred. If the police kicked in the first door, why didn't the police kick the apartment door where the unknown female jumped from the second story window after being held by gunpoint? My doors were damaged and the streets were blocked to make it look like the officers were doing a full investigation. The police were talking to the media. See the attached CBS 58 Newsroom article. Here I am, the owner of the building, willing to give the police access to my building, access to my surveillance cameras, answer any questions they ask, and available while they were out there breaking my doors. The police were not cooperative with me. The police could have entered the apartment and possibly saved the tenant in apartment 1, or found his body sooner, avoid shutting down the streets again the next day.

I want to be reimbursed in the amount of \$6,611.13 for the damage to my doors. The receipts are attached. If you need more information, please feel free to contact me. My contact information is below. The date of this document is Monday, October 27, 2025.

- 2.) Filing a claim against the City does not automatically guarantee reimbursement from the City. However, the City examines each claim on an individual basis in determining if reimbursement is legally required.
- 3.) In order to obtain reimbursement for a claim made against the City, **you must prove that the City or its employees acted unlawfully or negligently.**
- 4.) Before you can file a lawsuit against the City for reimbursement, State law requires that you first follow the claim procedures established by the Milwaukee City Clerk (286-2221).

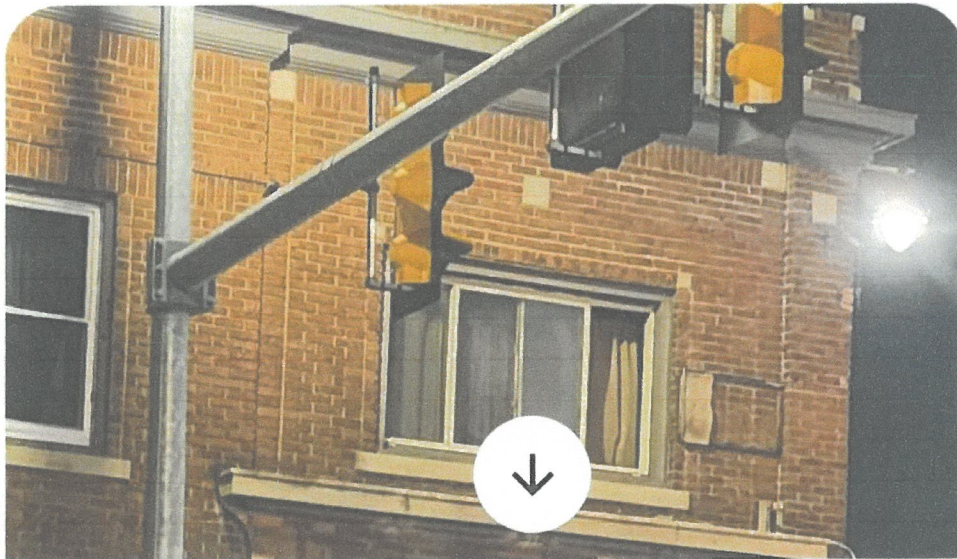

MILWAUKEE (CBS 58) - A 43-year-old escaped an armed suspect after being confined in a residence in the area of 35th and Burleigh on Monday, Aug. 11, according to Milwaukee police.

Officers responded at about 7 p.m. to a call about a person with a weapon and found that the armed suspect intentionally confined a victim in the home.

Police said the victim was able to jump out of a window to get away and was taken to a hospital for treatment of non-fatal injuries.

A tactical situation was established, but the suspect has not yet been found. The investigation is ongoing.
