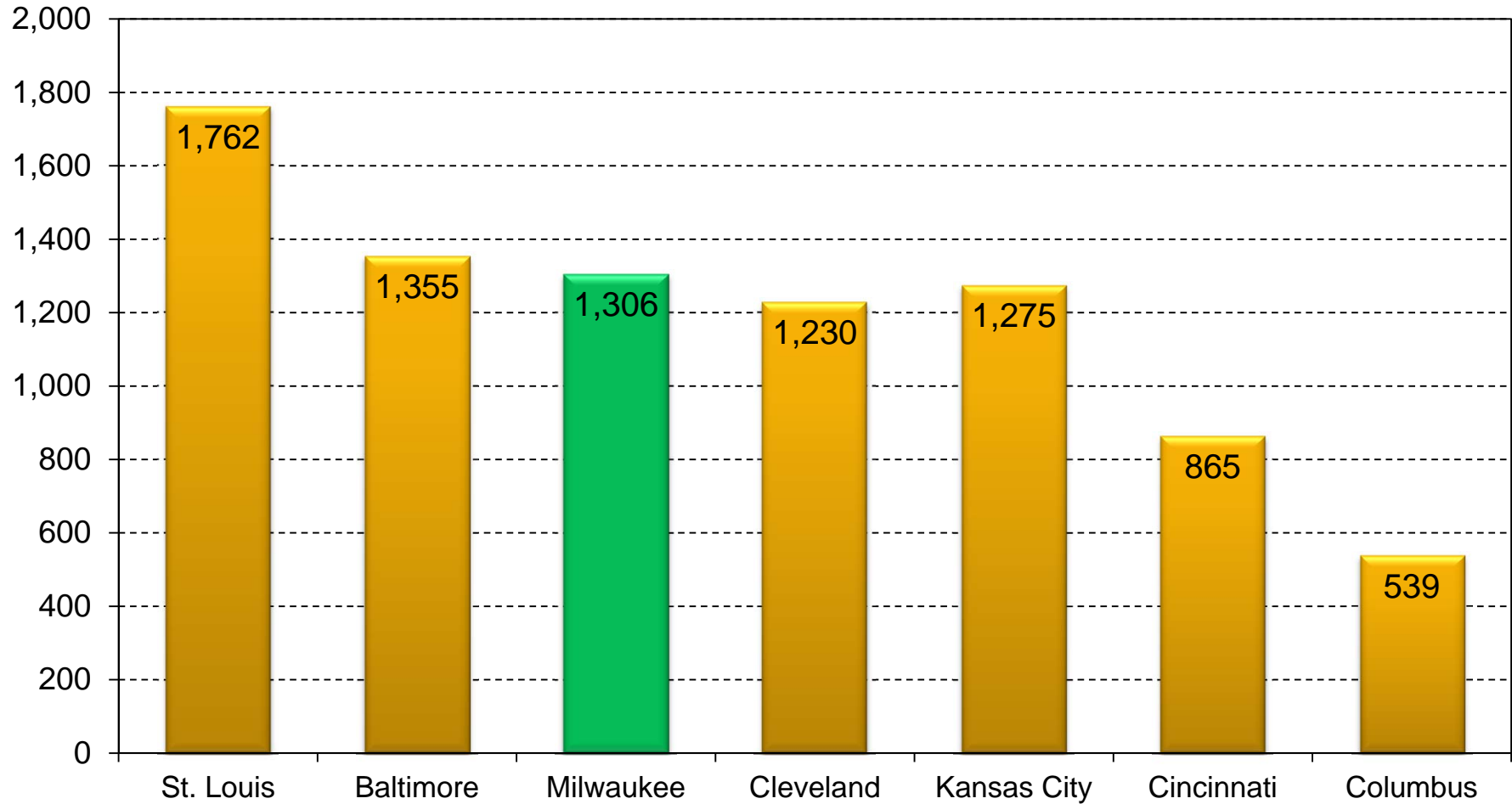

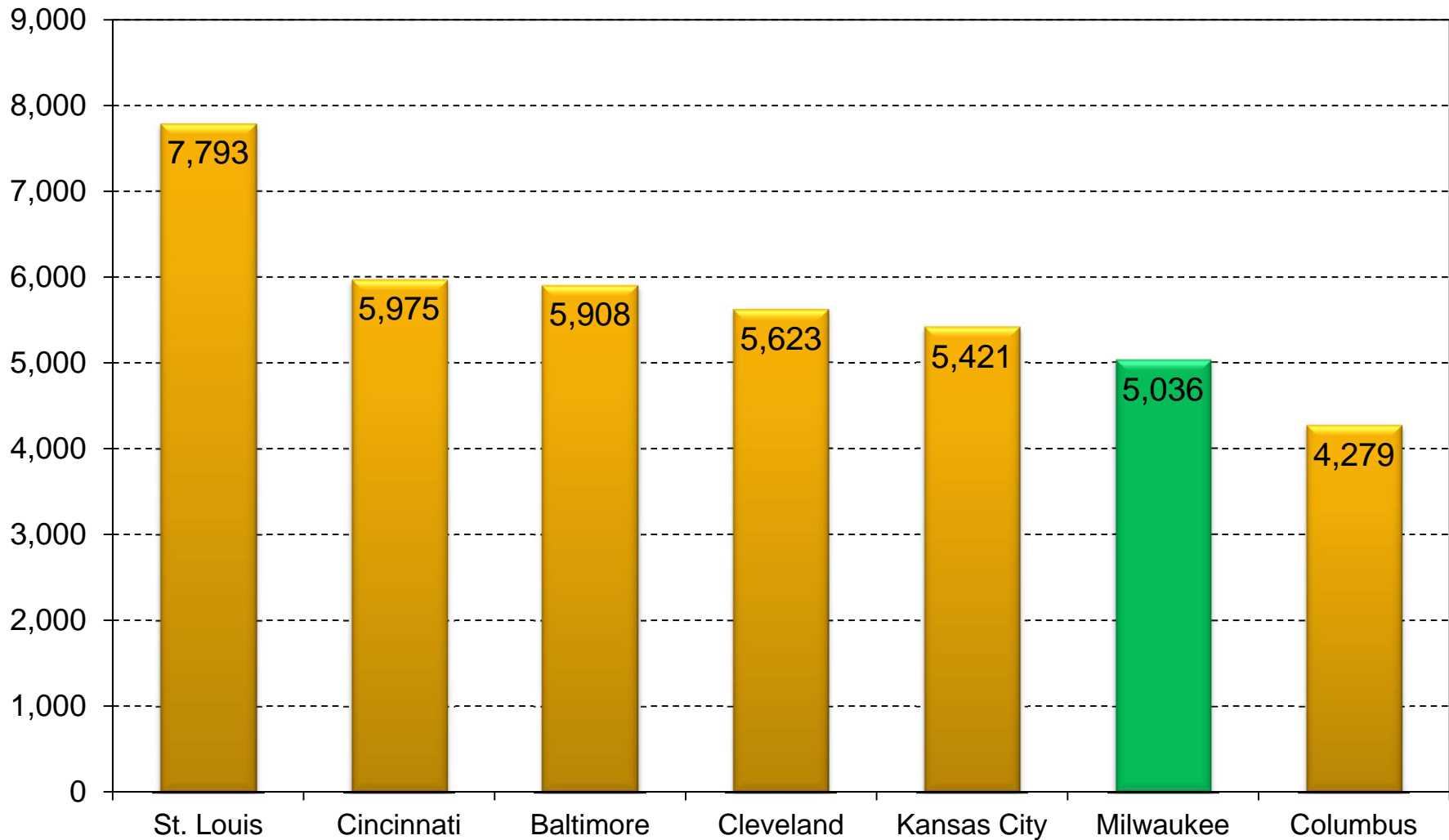
1. Milwaukee shares challenges of crime with most comparable cities

3. Victimization from violent crime is hugely disproportionate among ethnic minority groups and people with low incomes
4. 30% of 2015 homicides involved significant “anger-driven” factors
5. Communities are testing public health approaches as a crime prevention supplement to conventional policing work

2015 Jan – June Violent Crime Rate



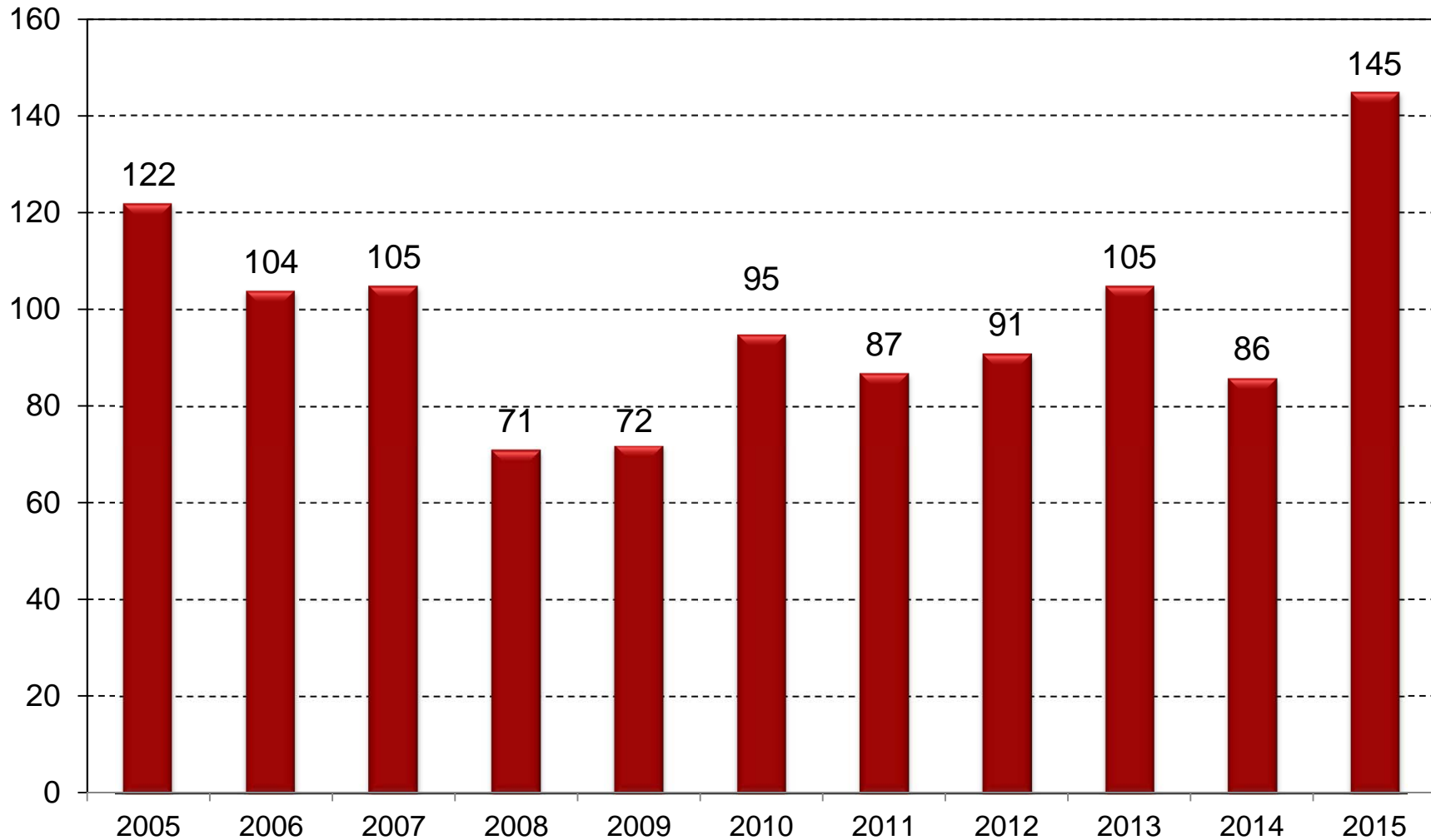

2015 Jan – June Total Crime Rate



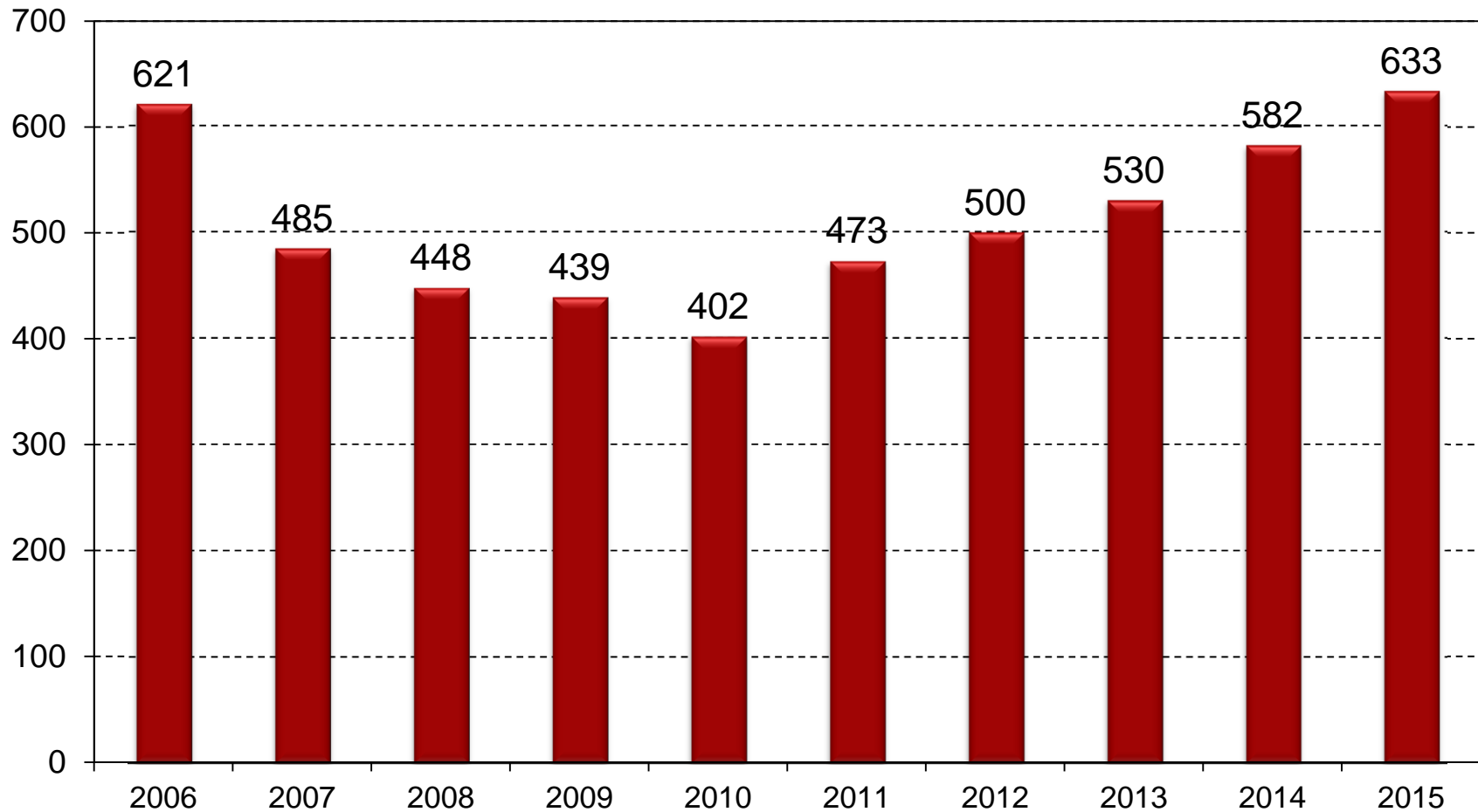

Homicides in Milwaukee: 2005-2015



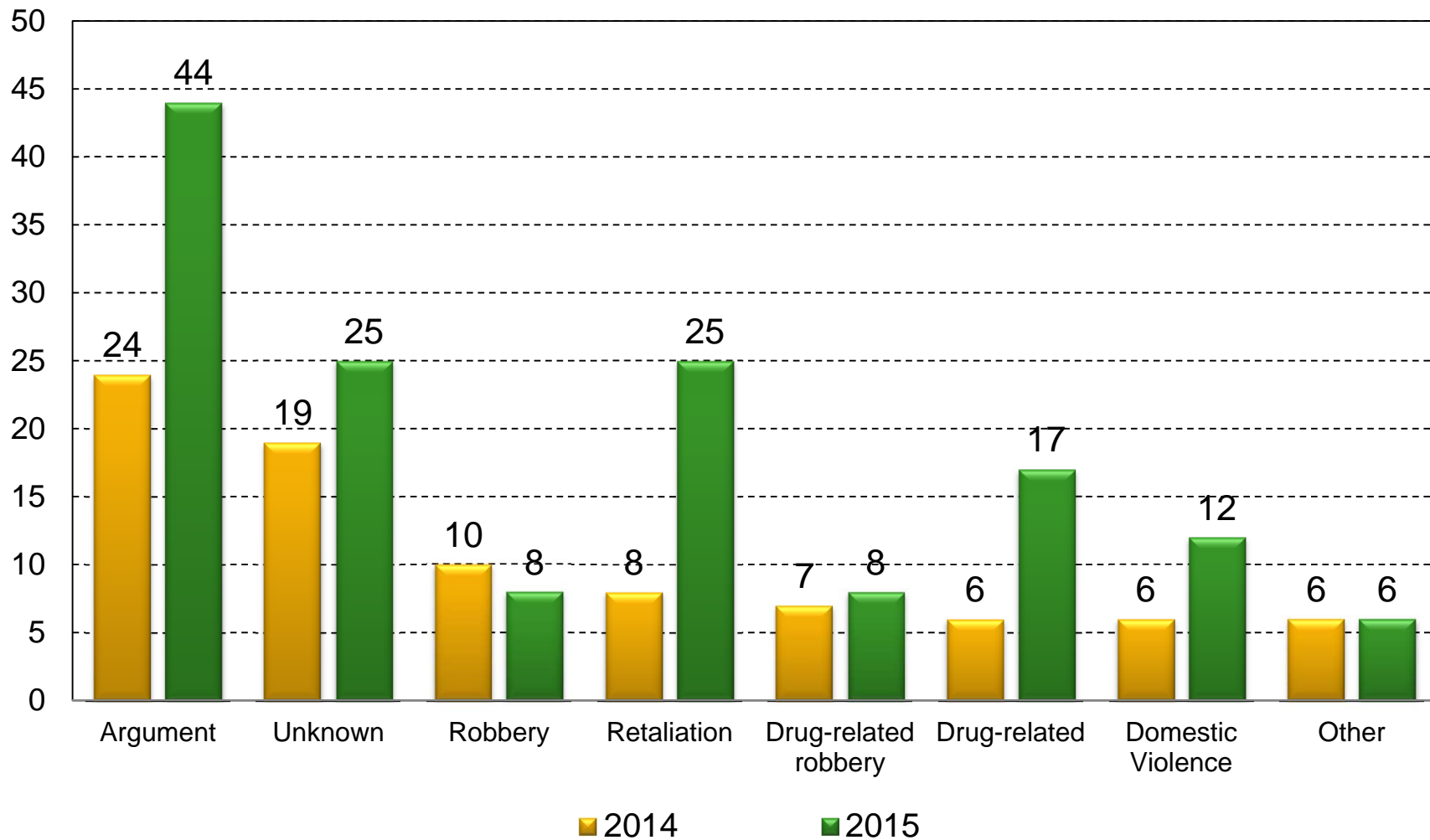

Non-Fatal Shootings in Milwaukee: 2006-2015



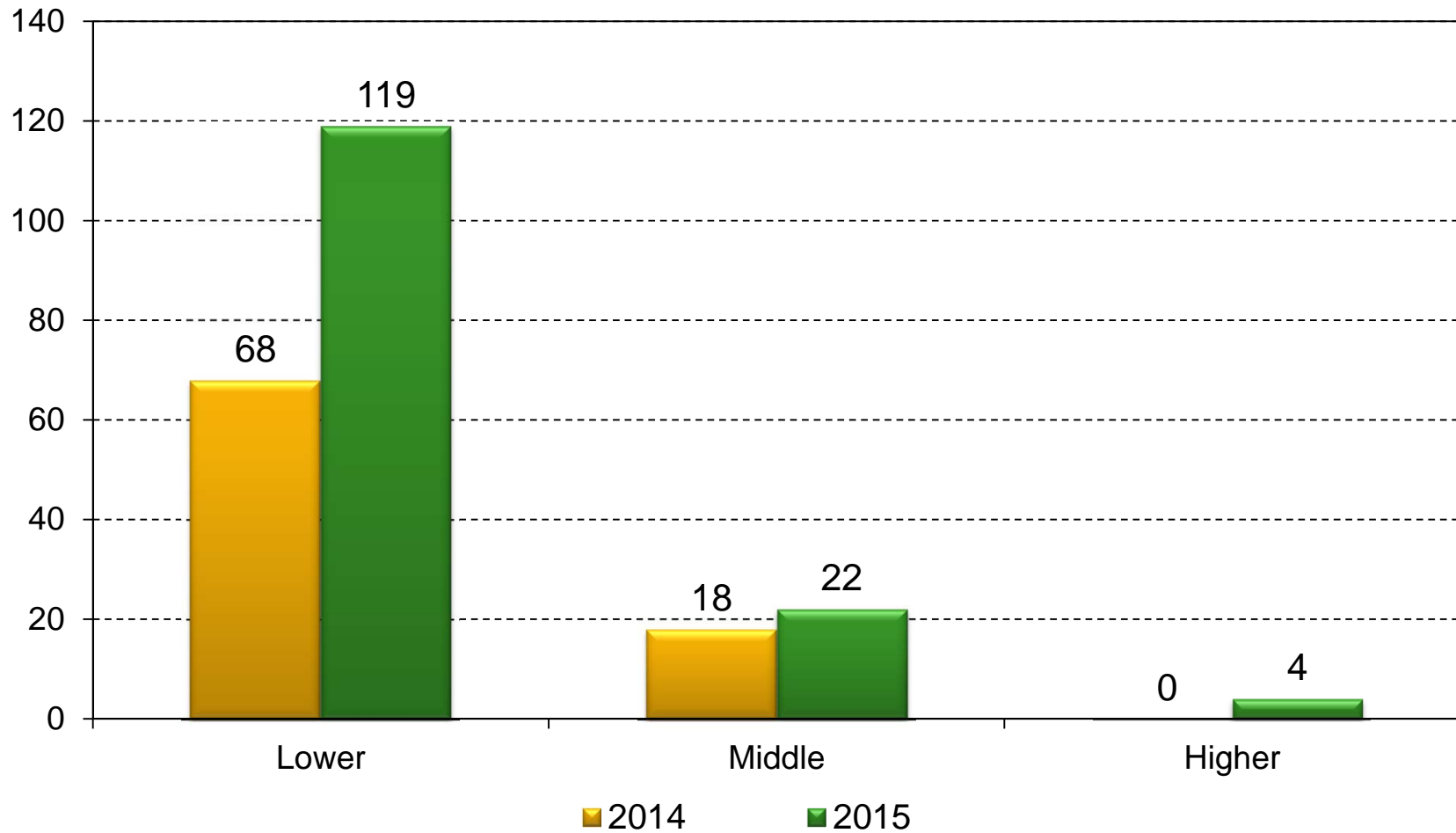

Homicide Primary Factors: 2014 - 2015



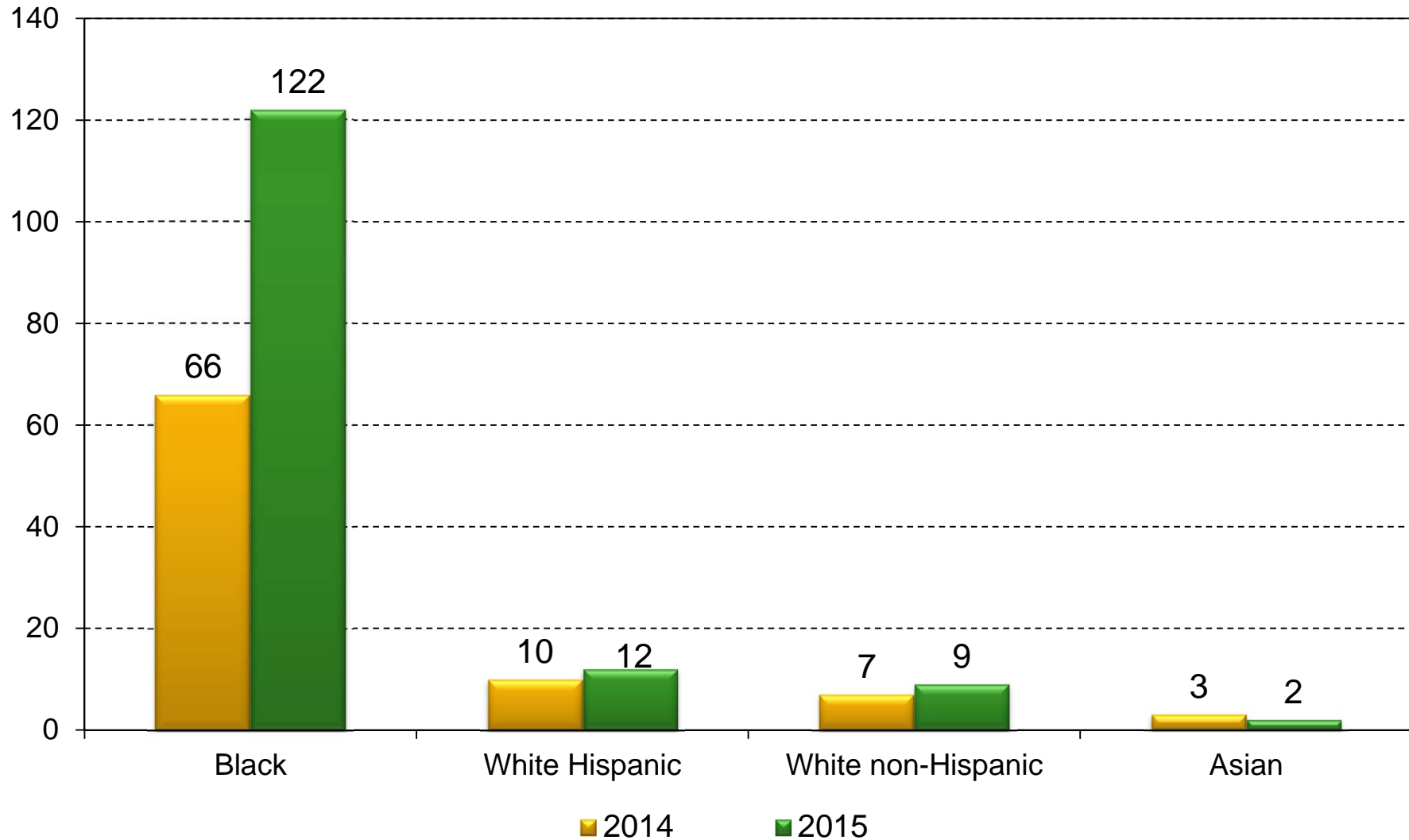

Homicide Victims by Socioeconomic Status: 2014 - 2015



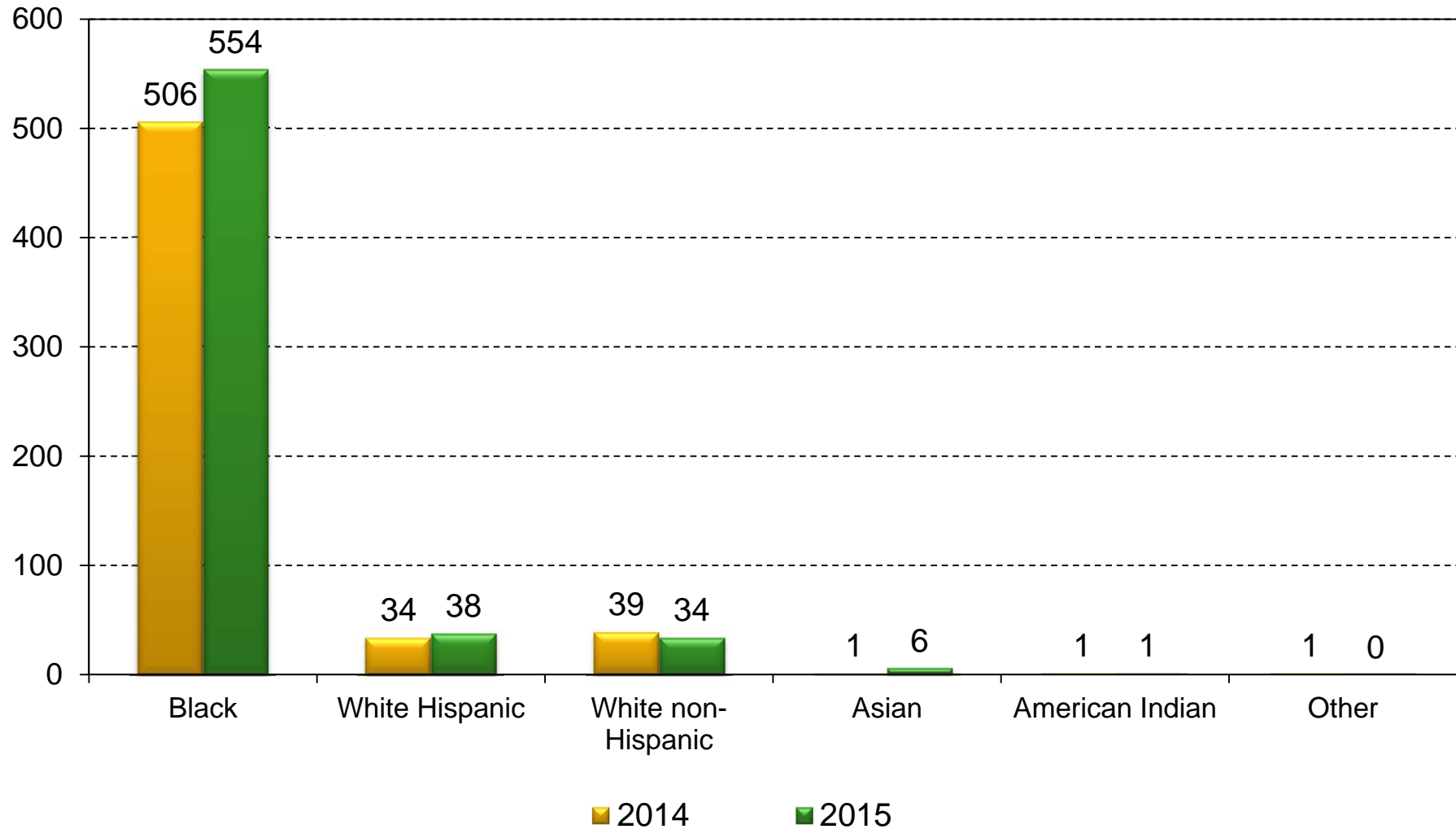

Homicide Victims by Ethnicity: 2014 - 2015



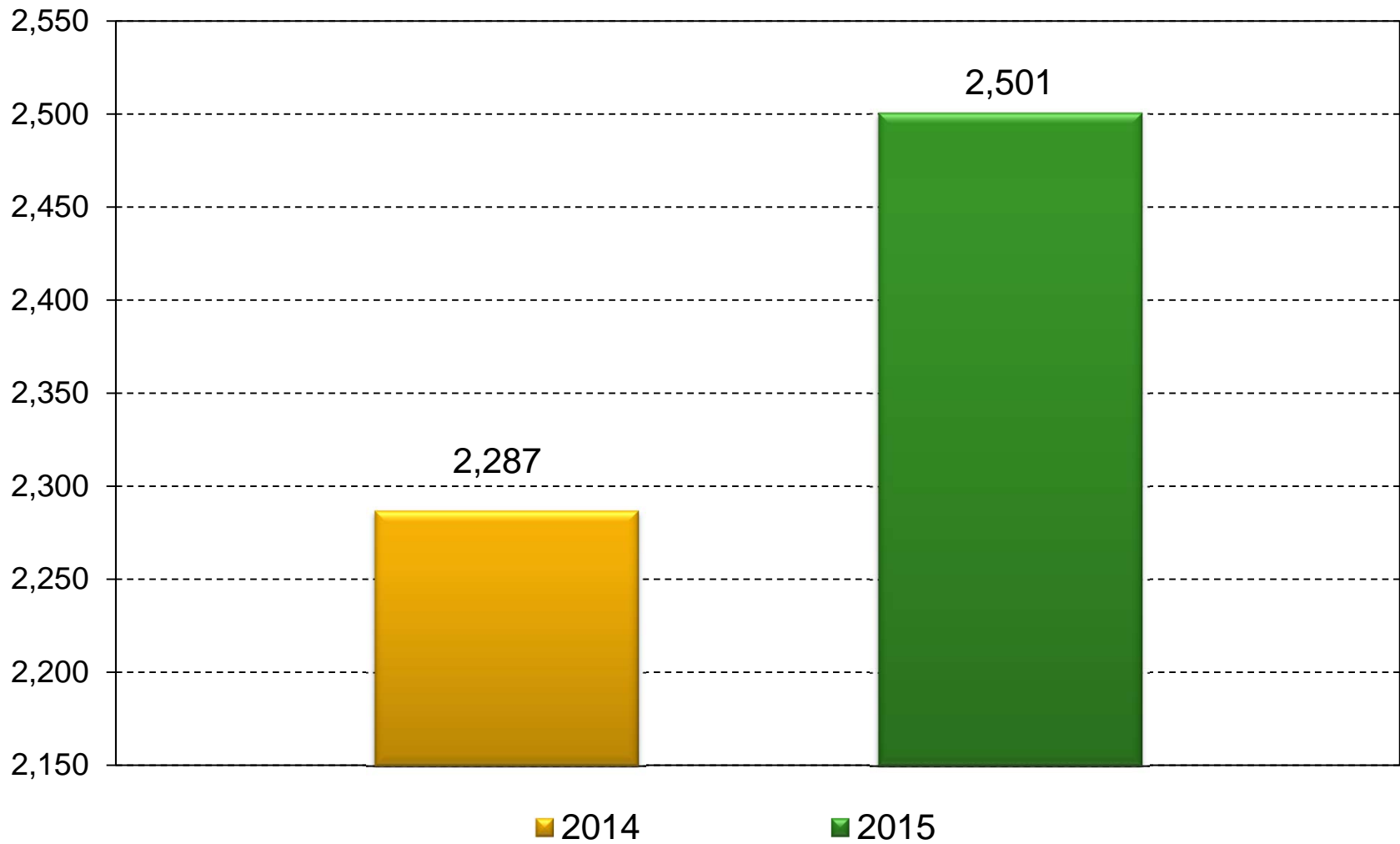

Guns Seized by MPD: 2014 - 2015

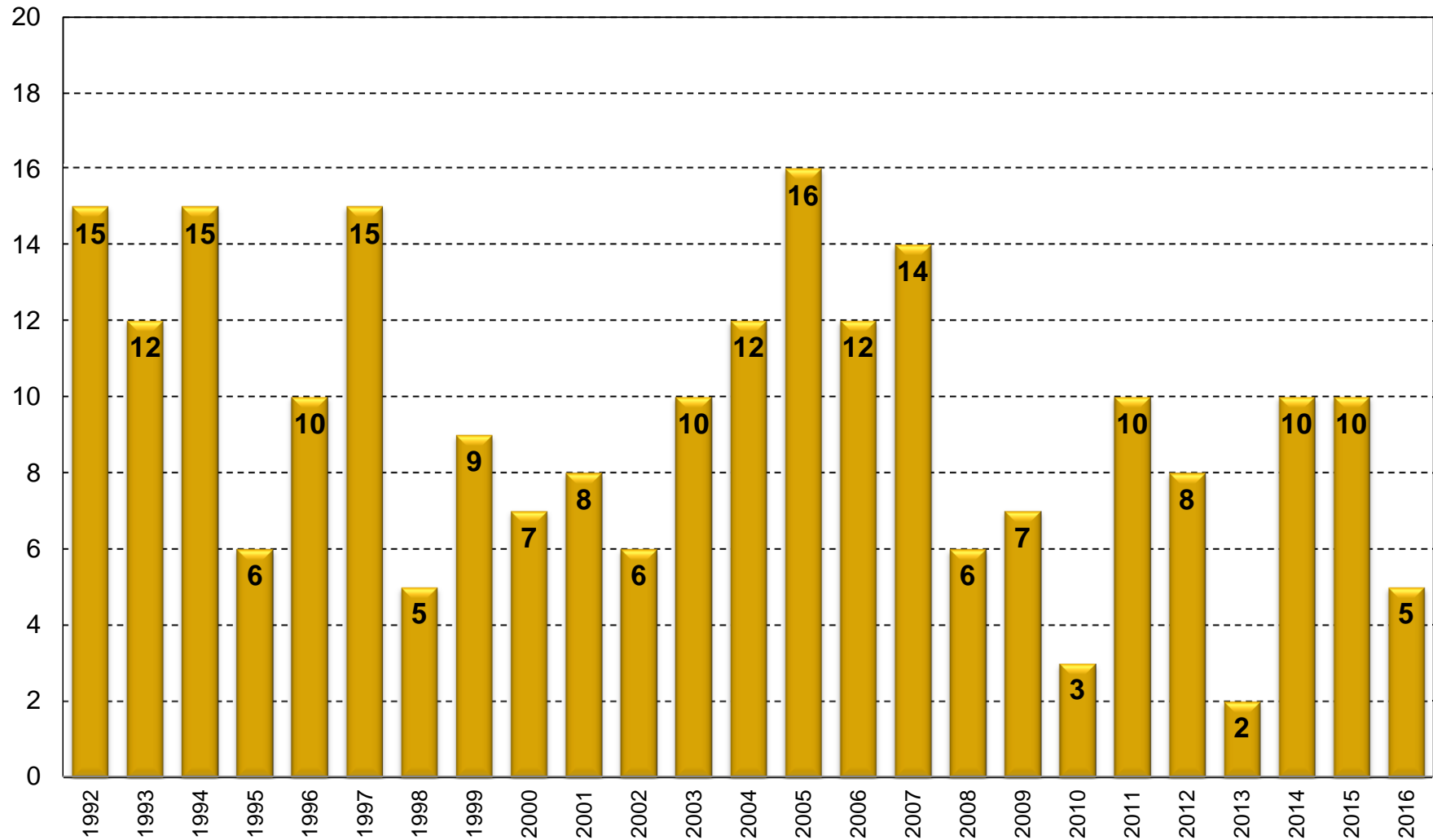


Strategies

The Department's primary strategy is to focus deployment and prevention on the basis of its current understanding of crime and other relevant data. Some current examples include:

- Koper Curve
 - Proactive hot spot foot patrol and other types of high visibility visits
 - District Captains assign extra patrols to specific areas daily
- Violence Reduction Network
 - 16th to 51st Street, Burleigh Street to North Avenue
 - Partnering with DOJ, ATF, FBI, DEA, and other Federal and Local offices
- Data Driven Approaches to Crime and Traffic Safety (DDACTS)
 - Integrates location based traffic crash and crime data to establish effective/efficient deployment methods
 - Employs highly visible, targeted traffic enforcement to specific areas
