1. Description of Grant Project/Program (Include Target Locations and Populations):

The City of Milwaukee Health Department's Office of Violence Prevention is proud to be awarded a continuation grant for year 4 of a five-year federal grant through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for the funding opportunity **Resiliency in Communities After Stress and Trauma (ReCAST)**. Municipalities with high rates of gun violence along with incidents of systemic violence resulting in civil unrest were eligible to apply for funding. The purpose of the grant is to promote individual and community resilience through the implementation of evidence-based violence prevention and community youth engagement programs. An additional area of focus are linkages to trauma-informed behavioral health services. This grant opportunity/application preceded the events in Sherman Park. **The goal of ReCAST MKE** is for community entities to work together in ways that lead to improved behavioral health, empowered community residents, and reductions in trauma and sustained community change. Additionally, ReCAST MKE aims to provide Milwaukee with equitable access to culturally responsive resources and services to ensure that high-risk youth and their families benefit from evidence-informed violence prevention and community systems to address the needs of high-risk youth and families and to build the extent to which Milwaukee is resilient and trauma-informed.

2. Relationship to City-Wide Strategic Goals and Departmental Objectives:

This grant supports the city of Milwaukee's commitment to advance a safe and healthy city.

Need for Grant Funds and Impact on Other Departmental Operations (Applies only to Programs):

The grant defined **civil unrest** as demonstrations of mass protest and mobilization, community harm, and disruption through violence often connected with law enforcement issues, noting that communities that have experienced civil unrest share similar characteristics:

- Barriers to access and lack of social services, health care, legal and political representation, housing, employment, and education;
- Current and historic strains in community and public sector relationships, e.g., law enforcement, school, health, and/or housing and community relationships;
- Racial/ethnic minority and marginalized populations with experiences of poverty and inequality; and
- Increased risk of mental illness for individuals who experience trauma and do not receive support.

The project aims to raise awareness, increase understanding and address some of the long-standing, root causes of structural and community 4. violence in Milwaukee while advancing interventions that reach youth and families in greatest needs of opportunities and supports.

Results Measurement/Progress Report (Applies only to Programs):

SAMHSA required that year one of the grant was used to build the infrastructure of ReCAST MKE. Infrastructure activities that were completed during year one were hiring of key project staff, establishing initial partnerships, completing a Community Needs & Resource Assessment as well as developing and/ or revising strategies for implementation. During the second year of the grant, the strategic plan was completed and full program implementation began. During years three and four our core partners completed the approved programming and a Request for Proposals was issued and awarded for Safe Summer Healing Projects that serve youth within the targeted neighborhoods. The annual data submitted to SAMHSA has consistently exceeded the required number of program participants, community members trained, and other
