00002 1 PROCEEDINGS (NOTE: All City Personnel Were Sworn Under Oath Prior to These Proceedings.) 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: James Milner, agent 5 for Grandview Windows and Siding, Incorporated, Home 6 Improvement Contractor application for Grandview 7 Windows and Siding at 614 West Oakwood Road. Good 8 afternoon. 9 If we could have everyone who's going to 10 testify raise their right hand to be sworn, in, 11 please. 12 (Whereupon all witnesses were sworn under 13 oath.) 14 MR. AARON: I'm Gordon Aaron, and I 15 represent the corporation, and this has been before 16 the committee before, and at that point the police 17 report focused on the record of one of the 18 corporation's employees, Joe Milner. 19 I have reviewed the corporate record book, 20 and he has never been a stockholder or director. He 21 is not an owner. He is a construction manager and an $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right)$ 22 employee. He does have prior problems which are more 23 than five years old. I'm merely speaking about a

valued employer's corporation. He's not the applicant

for licensure. It is the corporation.

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I've submitted some materials for your consideration, and this reflects on 16 hundred jobs that were done by this corporation since 2001 when it was incorporated, 715 in the last fiscal year.

What's most significant in the materials that are provided for you is a report of the Better Business Bureau which indicates the company has a satisfactory record with the bureau and has been responsive, and appropriately resolved any complaints to the satisfaction of the bureau.

The certificate of membership is for the National Association of Remodelers, which the contracts of this corporation reflect in this way: There is an arbitration provision in that contract before the American Arbitration Association, and any filed claims in court are the proper subject of a motion for dismissal because of nonjurisdiction because of arbitration.

Any matters that are pending in court involve people represented by counsel, and counsel other than myself represents the corporation.

They now have 20 employees, and in the fiscal year that was concluded in April, they did \$2,250,000 worth of business on 715 jobs. Their operations are principally conducted in Waukesha, and

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the corporate office is in New Berlin. I'm sorry, that's Oak Creek.

The significance of the materials, which are voluminous, but the first few items would show they have \$2 million in liability insurance, the imprimatur of the Better Business Bureau on their business practices, and membership in a prestigious organization for their trade organization.

They also have a contractor's bond in effect, and any disputes that arose have to be considered in the light of the vast amount of business they do, and I think those disputes that are now already resolved to the customers' satisfactions are subject to litigation, and there are three of them. Circuit court is the proper body to examine those disputes on who's right and who's wrong. That shouldn't properly be before this committee.

If the corporation is licensed, the pending problems that they do have before the municipal court, a violation of the municipal ordinance requiring a contractor's license, will be resolved. According to Judge Gramling's determination, that upon issuance of a license, they will be dismissed, or the matter that is not dismissed will be held open until a license is obtained.

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The jobs that were performed which prompted the tickets for nonperformance under a contractor's license have been satisfactorily completed. And any other disputes will be appropriately resolved as demonstrated by the history with the Better Business Bureau.

Any questions that you have of Mr. James Milner, who is 100 percent stockholder and the sole director of the corporation?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. At this time Alderman Bohl moves to make the documents provided as part of the permanent record in this case, and hearing no objection to that, so ordered.

MR. AARON: I might add there's a voluminous amount of material, but there are many endorsements from satisfied customers of this business that are provided there, and I may say that when you do this volume of business, you're occasionally going to have a dissatisfied customer. The key point that should be of concern is those disputes have been resolved or are being resolved in the court system which is the appropriate place to do it when people can't agree.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Who's Joe Milner?

MR. MILNER: My son.

MR. AARON: He's present, ladies and

KRUZIAK: No, I'm not. MR. EHRLICH: You are a customer of this 7 8 business; is that correct? MR. KRUZIAK: Yes. 9 10 MR. EHRLICH: And you've been asked to come 11 here today by the company to offer testimony 12 concerning your experience with them as a contractor? 13 MR. KRUZIAK: I was told by the Licensing 14 Bureau of Milwaukee to actually come and give my input 15 to the committee today. 16 MR. AARON: May I ask a question of the 17 witness? 18 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Let him speak first. 19 Go ahead and tell us --20 MR. KRUZIAK: Well, basically I've had 21 several problems with Grandview Windows. I'm not the 22 only one in my neighborhood who has had windows put 23 in. I'm basically here to testify that they have done 24 work at my house, the job which was quoted to take 25 about two weeks to complete took about three months.

And basically I just want to say that they have done work on my house. I'm not sure if they are licensed in Milwaukee, and I'm basically here to find that out. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Has the job, although late, has the job been completed satisfactorily though? MR. KRUZIAK: Depends on how you define satisfactory. The job has been completed. Satisfactory, I would say no. They offer a Gold Standard Service, which I don't believe the company lives up to, which is basically any part of their installation or service should be 100 percent satisfactory, and I have not found it to be. MR. AARON: Okay. I might just comment ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chair? CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. Sir, you mentioned that you know of others that have used this company? MR. KRUZIAK: Yes. ALDERMAN BOHL: Others who live on your	00008

I heard 4 them on the radio and decided to go with them based on 5 the fact that they could come up with the best price 6 and satisfaction quarantee. 7 ALDERMAN BOHL: And how is it you came to 8 know others -- If you sort of randomly chose them, how 9 is it you came to know others? 10 MR. KRUZIAK: The advertising signs. If 11 you've ever seen work done by a window company, they 12 usually put a sign out in front of the yard that says, 13 "Done by Grandview Windows" or other companies. 14 ALDERMAN BOHL: So you've seen their signs 15 through your neighborhood? 16 MR. KRUZIAK: At least three different 17 houses, yes. 18 ALDERMAN BOHL: And what time frame would 19 you attribute to seeing these signs? 20 MR. KRUZIAK: Prior to -- Oh, let's see. 21 That would be probably summer of last year to fall. 22 ALDERMAN BOHL: So in the general neighbor-23 hood you saw three additional signs that you would 2.4 attribute to Grandview? 25 MR. KRUZIAK: Yes.

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1	ALDERMAN BOHL: Within the period
2	six-month period between or thereabouts, summer
3	through fall?
4	MR. KRUZIAK: Yes.
5	ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you.
6	MR. AARON: May I be permitted to ask a
7	question of the witness?
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead.
9	MR. AARON: Your dispute involved whether or
10	not you were to receive two free doors; is that not
11	correct?
12	MR. KRUZIAK: Yes.
13	MR. AARON: And you were also concerned that
14	they offered provisions whereby they would match or
15	beat any offer of a competitor; is that correct?
16	MR. KRUZIAK: Yes.
17	MR. AARON: And they did recognize that and
18	gave you a reduced price; is that right?
19	MR. KRUZIAK: Yes.
20	MR. AARON: Okay.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any other
22	questions of this witness? Okay. Thank you. Ma'am,
23	your name and address for the record, please?
24	MS. LEPIANKA: Christina Lepianka. I live
25	at 6532 West Euclid, Milwaukee, 53209.

00011 1 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your testimony, 2 Christina? MS. LEPIANKA: I watched the committee back 3 4 in March, and their lawyer stated that they had done 5 no work in the City of Milwaukee since April of 2004. 6 Alderman Bohl was asking many questions on that. I 7 have a contract signed 8/26 of '04. 8 And the same with his stuff; work didn't 9 start on time, work took -- I think they were there a 10 total of three work weeks, and in fact they even took 11 their tools and went and left, and I didn't see them 12 for three days. Called the company. Many, many 13 excuses. 14 I have refused a payment to them. I am not 15 satisfied at all, so they did start a suit against me. 16 We do have a suit in court right now. 17 And I found more people that had work in the 18 19 20 Bay View. Bay View still is the City of Milwaukee. 21

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City of Milwaukee by going on like CCAP and putting in their name, and they just filed suit against people in I live right off of 68th and Oklahoma.

There's a sign between -- I believe it's Oklahoma and Morgan, one of their signs. You know, I questioned why they didn't have a work truck with their name on it. None of their people had work shirts with their

00012 1 names on them. I asked for the license. They told me they would fax it, never got it faxed. Now they're saying that I refused them. No. They had no license 4 to send me. They had no city license. 5 I asked about permits. I was told windows 6 didn't need permits, which I understand, but they did 7 open up two windows. Windows had been put in -- I have bigger windows. Standard windows were put in, so 8 9 they had to build around. They unbuilt, they took 10 those two-by-fours down, so they did make the opening 11 bigger. And I had siding on my house, on the garage, 12 gutters, trim, soffit, fascia, and I'm completely 13 unsatisfied with the work. I'm embarrassed at my 14 house. 15 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman? 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 17 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. Ma'am, how is it 18 that you first found out about this company? 19 20

MS. LEPIANKA: My sister lives in Oak Creek. She lives right off of Judith Place, which is right off Oakwood.

ALDERMAN BOHL: And she had work done by them?

MS. LEPIANKA: No. She said like, well, there's this company right down the block from me,

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why don't you give them a call.

MS. LEPIANKA: She's very sorry, she said. She's very sorry. Because, in fact, I was going to go with WASCO for the windows, and I only solicited Grandview for the siding. Their salesman solicited me back for the windows, and then I decided it won't take as long, you won't have two contractors to deal with, so I did go -- Then I went with them for everything.

ALDERMAN BOHL: So you inquired with the individual who came out to do the work whether or not permits were required?

MS. LEPIANKA: I asked the salesman, the salesman I talked to who signed my contract. He stated to me no permit was needed for windows and siding because it was an existing structure, and that I should be happy because the city won't reassess me, they won't up my assessment.

ALDERMAN BOHL: And you indicated that the individuals who came out didn't have any company logo or anything else?

MS. LEPIANKA: On their cars, on their T-shirts, no, not that I saw. And I even questioned why their work van -- Because my neighbor had work

00014 1 done by another company, you know. They had a sign in the front yard, all their trucks had the company name on them with their phone number. Their people all had 4 polo shirts with their names on. 5 And I was also informed that Mr. Joe Milner 6 was the president at first, and then when his father 7 came to my house, I was told that his father was 8 semi-retired, and he was the vice president and 9 co-owner. That's what he told me back in November. 10 ALDERMAN BOHL: Some companies subcontract 11 work out. That's probably not uncommon. 12 MS. LEPIANKA: I asked for the licensing 13 because they -- I still yet to this day have figured 14 out if they're subcontractors or not. See, because I 15 asked for their names: Well, we can give you one guy, 16 but we can't give you the other guy because Steve 17 works for us, but George works under Steve; Steve 18 hired his dad George, and this and that, and I've 19 never gotten a straight answer. 20

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 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ AARON: May I direct a question to the witness?

ALDERMAN BOHL: And I don't know that the attorney knows the protocol because I have the floor,

00015 1 Mr. Chair, and I'm not completed. Mr. Chairman, I have no other questions of this witness other than to say that I've seen 4 advertising or heard advertising from this company. 5 I've seen their signs about. That's why I have some 6 severe reservations and questions, when it came to the 7 last time they were here, about the attorney claiming that there were only five instances in which work was 8 9 done in the City of Milwaukee. 10 I've seen their signs in my district, and 11 unless my district represents the entirety of the City 12 of Milwaukee, I just didn't believe it, and I don't 13 today. 14 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Would you 15 like to ask questions? 16 MR. AARON: Yes, thank you. I have just a 17 few questions, Mr. Chairman. 18 MS. LEPIANKA: I have an attorney present. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Pardon? 20 MS. LEPIANKA: I have an attorney present. 21 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Oh. Please identify 22 yourself for the record. 23 MR. MAGNER: I'm Attorney Neil Magner from Magner, Hueneke & Smith. I represent Christina 2.4

Lepianka. I currently have a case against Grandview

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00017 MR. MAGNER: No, because your organization 1 2 submitted your client to the courts of Wisconsin. 3 MR. AARON: Okay. Well, --4 MR. MAGNER: And that was your voluntary 5 choice to sue in the State of Wisconsin. 6 MR. AARON: Well, what we have is a dispute 7 that's firmly and properly before the Circuit Court of 8 Milwaukee County. If we're correct, we're going to 9 recover some substantial damages and contract 10 proceeds. If there's dissatisfaction and improper 11 work that can be proven to the satisfaction of a court 12 of law, perhaps --13 MR. EHRLICH: Counselor, I think you're 14 getting a little far afield. This is getting beyond 15 the question. I believe you were going to ask some questions at this time. $\bar{\text{I}}$ think you're up to 16 17 summation at this point. Why don't you ask some 18 questions. 19 MR. AARON: I think he's answered the 20 questions as to the nature of the dispute, and that 21 there's a complaint by our firm and a counterclaim 22 pending before the circuit court. 23 MR. EHRLICH: I don't think this committee 2.4 is in confusion. I think they understand that. Are 25 there any other questions?

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1	MR. AARON: None.
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Is there
3	anyone else here to testify to this matter? Okay.
4	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair?
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade.
6	ALDERMAN WADE: I'd just like to ask the
7	young lady a question. You say that presently you're
8	embarrassed by the work that they did at your house.
9	Is the work complete or incomplete?
10	MS. LEPIANKA: They came and did Mr. Joe
11	Milner came and did a final inspection, and he claimed
12	the job was complete. I never thought the job was
13	complete. They say it's complete and are demanding
14	the money, and I'm saying it's incomplete. Now
15	they're saying it's only 80 percent done, I threw them
16	off my property.
17	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. The incomplete, is it
18	something that can look and see; you can walk up and
19	tell that this is not correct and that's not correct?
20	MS. LEPIANKA: Yes.
21	ALDERMAN WADE: So it's obviously incomplete
22	work?
23	MS. LEPIANKA: Yes. I have about five
24	pieces of siding that are falling down. The trim
25	around the I have pictures.

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1	ALDERMAN WADE: Oh, you have pictures?
2	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Color pictures?
3	MS. LEPIANKA: Color pictures.
4	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: We love color pictures.
5	ALDERMAN WADE: Can I see those, please?
6	MS. LEPIANKA: This is the trim and the
7	caulk job around
8	MR. MAGNER: I need them back, actually. I
9	can submit copies.
10	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. I just need to see
11	I mean one person is saying it's complete, and one
12	person is saying it ain't complete. I'm not a
13	contractor, but I think I can come to a conclusion.
14	Oh, yeah, it's incomplete.
15	MS. LEPIANKA: That is why I have not paid.
16	I want it fixed, but they can't fix it because they're
17	not licensed in the City of Milwaukee.
18	MR. MAGNER: They actually threw the
19	contract in her face and said that the contract
20	provides for attorney's fees, and that she would have
21	to pay for Grandview's attorney's fees, and that
22	provision has been determined to be illegal.
23	And their attorney, the last time in the
24	meeting on the 22nd, actually admitted that the
25	provision was removed from the contract because they

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1	are admitting that it's an illegal provision.
2	MR. AARON: May I follow up with one
3	question?
4	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Just one question.
5	MR. AARON: Do you deny that there's an
6	arbitration clause in this contract?
7	MS. LEPIANKA: They started suing me. I
8	have the paper from when they first
9	MR. AARON: Do you want to produce it?
10	MS. LEPIANKA: Yes, I do.
11	MR. AARON: Look at the back.
12	MS. LEPIANKA: Oh, I have that, but you
13	started suing me first. This contract should be null
14	and void because of the statement that I pay their
15	attorney fees.
16	MR. EHRLICH: Ma'am, you're going too far
17	afield. That's sort of a legal conclusion. If you
18	have the contract and Mr. Aaron wants to look at it
19	briefly, that's probably appropriate, but I think this
20	whole issue is getting a little far afield.
21	MS. LEPIANKA: This is when they started
22	their court case against me, no arbitration.
23	MR. COPELAND: Mr. Chair, if I may,
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Copeland.
25	MR. COPELAND: I think the question here,

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and it came up at the last meeting, is did this company operate illegally in Milwaukee, were they in violation of some of the requirements of the statute, and one of them was citations by the Department of Ag, which in your folder you have proof from the Department of Ag. I think, like the city attorney said, we're going far afield on this other subject.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yeah, we don't want to settle this other case now. That's up to you.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chair?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl.

ALDERMAN BOHL: I would move at this time to provide all the accompanying documents that are in our book and make them part of the record. I know there's a substantial number of documents from the Department of Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Motion by Alderman Bohl is to make the entire -- all of the pages of documents in our book on this matter as part of the permanent record in this case, and hearing no objections to that, so ordered. Yeah, let's get to the crux of the case here.

MR. AARON: Could I make a brief remark or two, and I'll try to be brief.

00022 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Why don't we do this in 1 2 closing, okay? Does anybody else have any other questions here? 4 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, I do. 5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 6 ALDERMAN BOHL: And either for Mr. Milner or 7 for counsel here, I'm just wondering if the statement 8 made from the last hearing still holds that in the 9 last how many years, there's only been five properties 10 in the City of Milwaukee that you've done work at. Or 11 if you want to amend that here now. 12 MR. AARON: Would you please respond to 13 that? 14 MR. MILNER: That's why we're here. We're 15 trying to get licensed to make it right. Originally 16 we didn't know. The secretary or whoever screwed up a 17 little bit. When it came to my attention, I came down 18 here to get a license. Let's get it right, let's get 19 it straight, get everything we need right down the 20 line so we have no problems. 21 Like I said before, -- it's probably not 22 important; you don't care, I know, -- but there's 23 hundreds of contractors without licenses, and we're 24 trying to do what's right here.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, if I may as a

00023 1 follow-up. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 3 ALDERMAN BOHL: It was indicated here 715 or 4 705 jobs in the past year. 5 MR. AARON: Yes. 6 ALDERMAN BOHL: How many of them were in the 7 City of Milwaukee or roughly how many of them? 8 MR. MILNER: I don't have any idea. I'm 9 president of the company. I can't watch everything, 10 sir. I have my secretaries, and I have other people 11 doing it. I really can't tell you right off the top 12 of my head. 13 MR. AARON: And I would say the majority of 14 their operations are done by subcontractors, and the 15 license that was referred to in the discussion with 16 witnesses is a state license, which they do have in 17 good standing. 18 They are also in good standing as a 19 corporation with the Secretary of the State. Their 20 annual reports are all on file. It indicates who 21 their stockholders and directors and officers are as 22 a matter of record. I've examined that corporate 23 record book, and the witness is the sole stockholder. 2.4 ALDERMAN BOHL: You have witnessed their 25 corporate record book?

00024 1 MR. AARON: I have personally examined it, and I state to this committee that the person who became the subject of the police examination is not a stockholder and is not a director. He's an employee. 5 ALDERMAN BOHL: I still want to get at a 6 rough estimate or rough percentage of the business 7 that has been done in the City of Milwaukee in the 8 last two years. 9 MR. MILNER: I don't know offhand. 10 ALDERMAN BOHL: I'm going to guess if you 11 had 715 jobs in the last year, would it be fair to say 12 that more than five of those were in the City of 13 Milwaukee? 14 MR. MILNER: Yes, it would. 15 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you. 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other questions by 17 members of the committee? 18 MR. MILNER: And that's what we're here to 19 correct. 20 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chairman? 21 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik. 22 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Christina, I'm the 23 alderman for your area, and I want to be clear about 24 that I took time to go past your house a couple days 25 ago, and I was actually pretty impressed by the way it

00025 looked from the street. 1 MS. LEPIANKA: I am, too. 3 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: I recently had my house --4 everything done that you had, done to my house, and 5 after viewing the pictures that you showed me today, 6 I'm going to call up my contractor and apologize for 7 ever doubting his workmanship because what I see 8 there, I would be as livid if not more livid than you 9 are. And throwing -- I'm sure you didn't physically 10 pick up their salesman and throw him off your 11 property, but if that was my house, there's a distinct 12 possibility that would have happened if he'd been 13 talking to me. 14 At this point in time, Mr. Chair, I would 15 move to hold this matter until we have a satisfactory 16 indication that the adjudication is against this 17 company. That would be an appropriate motion. 18 MR. AARON: Are you speaking of an 19 adjudication of a pending case before the circuit 20 court of Milwaukee? 21 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Her case. 22 MR. AARON: How would this committee be 23 interested in resolving a dispute that's in litigation 2.4 before the circuit court? That could take years.

ALDERMAN DUDZIK: As a member of this

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committee, --

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You know, the problem is that that's not relevant to what we're deciding on today. Could we get some advice from the city attorney?

MR. EHRLICH: Right. Whatever the dispute is between the parties is going to have to be decided and adjudicated in the circuit court. Now you're focusing your inquiry as to those issues that would give you pause and give you reason to vote against granting this license, and at this point, because of the fact that this matter is in litigation, I don't know that you can really rely upon -- I know that you have personally observed it and made a decision, but really you have to take into account evidence that comes before you, not your own personal observation in this instance, I would say, because of the fact that there is a dispute that is being litigated in circuit court. So you have to try to -- My advice would be to try to limit your inquiry here today as to those issues that gave you pause previously in granting a license.

MR. AARON: I have a very brief comment. I totally agree with the city attorney, but I would call to the committee's attention that the focus last time

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was on the prior criminal record of Mr. Joe Milner, and it's five years old. He has completed a substance abuse plan, he's taken an anger management plan, and he, as well as two other persons who have been on probation and parole, are valued employees of this company. And I think the fact is what the last meeting focused on was his record, and I think the company should be complimented for hiring persons who are making a sincere effort to be productive citizens, and they have to have employment, and this company is providing it.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would you like to give us a closing statement? Alderman Dudzik, do you have something?

ALDERMAN DUDZIK: No.

MR. AARON: With the volume of business done by this company principally performed by subcontractors, -- and the business records seem to indicate that there were 715 jobs in the last fiscal year, and \$2,250,000 worth of gross sales, -- this is work that's generated by salespersons and performed by subcontractors.

We are now trying to clear the air before

00028 1 your Municipal Judge Gramling who has determined that if a license is issued, the pending tickets and offenses that are before him for a violation of the 4 ordinance -- so in other words, operating on certain 5 jobs without a contractor's license, -- will be 6 dismissed or vacated. We're trying to accomplish 7 that. We can't undo work that has been done, but 8 9 I call your attention to the report of the Better 10 Business Bureau. If you have the time, there's 11 glowing endorsements and appreciation of satisfactory 12 work by many customers. You can't take two 13 dissatisfied customers out of 700 and judge the 14 performance of a business on that sampling. 15 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. 16 MR. EHRLICH: Mr. Chairman, I have a 17 question. I'm sorry I didn't ask it before. You 18 mentioned that there were some cases pending before 19 Judge Gramling in Milwaukee Municipal Court? 20 MR. AARON: Yes, they're on the police 21 report that was submitted to the committee at the last 22 meeting. 23 MR. EHRLICH: How many of those are pending

MR. AARON: I believe there are two that are

before Judge Gramling?

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00029 1 held open pending the application of the license, there is one that has resulted in a money judgment, but is suspended pending the availability of a 4 license, and one other which has been handled in the 5 same way. 6 MR. EHRLICH: Has Judge Gramling made a 7 finding of guilt? 8 MR. AARON: No. 9 MR. EHRLICH: Has your client entered any 10 plea to these other than not guilty? 11 MR. AARON: I think the only plea that was 12 entered was in one case in which there was assessment 13 of a fine, which is to be abated or vacated when a 14 license is employed. 15 MR. EHRLICH: But Judge Gramling has already 16 assessed a fine? 17 MR. AARON: I did not represent the 18 corporation on that matter, but looking at your police 19 report, it would appear that's the case. But he is 20 going to set it aside or vacate it if a license is 21 obtained. 22 MR. EHRLICH: You were not present. You 23 have no personal knowledge of how Judge Gramling may 2.4 have assessed the fine without finding guilt? 25 MR. AARON: That is correct.

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1	MR. EHRLICH: Okay. Would you agree that					
2	it's probable that Judge Gramling would have made a					
3	finding of guilt prior to assessing a forfeiture?					
4	MR. AARON: I would assume so.					
5	MR. EHRLICH: Okay. I don't have anything

7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. This					
8	matter's in committee.					
9	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair?

AARON: Those matters are being 7 resolved, and if they're not covered by the written 8 statements of customers that they have been cured to 9 the customers' satisfaction, they're open, and 10 resolution will be performed. 11 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. This matter's in 12 committee. 13 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman. 14 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. ALDERMAN BOHL: I would move to deny the application. I, for one, am extremely miffed that 15 16 17 there was misrepresentation before this committee for 18 the last public hearing which we were told only five 19 properties in the City of Milwaukee have been done. I 20 for one do not believe this company was unaware when 21 and where permits were needed. I think this company 22 has shirked its duty before the City of Milwaukee to many individuals. 23 2.4 I will not state that they don't find

satisfied customers, or that there may be times where

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individuals that they subcontract out to don't do reasonable work. My decision is not based on what this gentleman or this woman here have in terms of their own complaints.

I just don't believe that because you got caught with your pants down, you are now trying to garner up and plead in municipal court that the City of Milwaukee ought to reward you for continued problems and lying before this body when I think you knowingly knew better; that you're a gigantic company, and that you are looking to save face at this time.

Frankly, the fact that you would come here before this committee and say there were five instances where you did work in the City of Milwaukee, that it was a minor amount of times and that we didn't know there weren't permits, that is the biggest baloney I've seen before this body in my five-year time period.

I don't believe that this committee nor this Common Council should reward a company like yours that knowingly lies; that not only doesn't abide by the law, but I think you knew better. And, secondly, that you would come here and insult us by lying about that openly in our faces and that we ought to reward, and that is why I make a motion to deny.

00033 1 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair? 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: On the motion? ALDERMAN WADE: On the motion. Furthermore, 4 it was stated by the young lady at the table that 5 people that represented your company expressed to her 6 that they wanted to do an end-around on the taxpayers 7 of the City of Milwaukee by doing this work and not 8 pulling permits because that way her property wouldn't 9 be assessed, and she wouldn't have to pay higher 10 taxes. I think that's kind of disingenuous, and I 11 have some problems with companies of your caliber 12 operating in that manner, trying to do end-arounds on 13 City of Milwaukee taxpayers. And for that reason, 14 along with some other reasons, I'm in support of this 15 motion. 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any further discussion 17 on the motion? 18 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chairman. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente. 20 ALDERMAN PUENTE: I concur with my 21 colleagues here. Also, if we would not deny the 22 license, what message are we sending as a committee; 23 that these contractors can come into our city and do 2.4 the contract workup until the point they get caught. 25 And now they get caught, they go into municipal court,

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and now a judge is saying, well, if you get your license, we're going to dismiss these citations or hold them to whatever. I think that's sending the wrong message.

People who come into this city, and the people of this city expect good work. They're contractors, they need to be licensed, so I am in support of the motion.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. The motion by Alderman Bohl is to recommend denial of this license for items contained on the police report, and neighborhood objections to a violation of required and prohibited practices as set forth in Chapter 95-14 of the Milwaukee Code of Ordinances and 95-14-7-C-1-F, which states whether the applicant has been issued a warning letter or had the imposition of administrative sanctions by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

ALDERMAN BOHL: And Mr. Chairman, if I may, I just want to be very clear that I would like to amend the motion to reflect the language that you just stated there as the reasons for denial.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And it is so amended. Are there any objections to that motion? Hearing none, so ordered. Thank you.
