PROCEEDINGS

(NOTE: All City Personnel Were Sworn Under Oath Prior to These Proceedings.)

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: In the 12th District,
Alfredo Garcia, agent for Almar Enterprises,
Incorporated, Class B Tavern and Tavern Dance renewal
applications for "Club Galaxia" at 2239 South 13th
Street. Let the record show that no one has come
forth.

Mr. Garcia is not in the room at this time, but we did -- We surveyed the neighborhood. We have some people here from the neighborhood, and I would like to hear their testimony and just enter it on the record, please.

MR. MATA: Mr. Chair?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Mata.

MR. MATA: I do know that on this one we actually had about 250 cards that went out. I have never seen so many cards come back. I mean it's just phenomenal. I have 42 cards that came back. Of those 42 cards, 38 are opposed. It was just a phenomenal turnout. I've never received anything more than probably 15 on any other place. I've got over 40 on this one.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Could the

three of you please come -- You can have a seat here 1 at the table. 2 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman? 3 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 5 ALDERMAN BOHL: Just before we do that, I would like to make the police report a part of our record, and so I would so move. 7 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And Alderman Bohl moves to make the entire police report in this matter part 9 10 of the record, and hearing no objection, so ordered. 11 Mr. Schrimpf, do we have to have that read into the record? 12 MR. SCHRIMPF: No, you don't have to do 13 14 that, following the Sergeant's lead. However, we 15 should put in the usual sort of thing because this 16 is a renewal. 17 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okav. Go ahead. MR. SCHRIMPF: Was notice sent to -- let me 18 19 just pull it up here, -- Alfredo Garcia, as agent for 20 Almar Enterprises, Inc., to 5471 South Honey Creek Drive, Greenfield, 53221, by United States 1st Class 21 22 prepaid mail on November 3rd, 2004, in an envelope bearing the return address of the License Division? 23 24 MS. BARRON: Yes, it was. 25 MR. SCHRIMPF: And did the notice also

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include a copy of the police report as well as notification as to the neighborhood objections? MS. BARRON: Yes.

MR. SCHRIMPF: And was Almar Enterprises, Inc., 5471 South Honey Creek Drive, Greenfield, 53221, the address as given by the applicant on their application?

MS. BARRON: Yes.

MR. SCHRIMPF: And was the envelope bearing the notice and the police report returned to the License Division by the United States Postal Service? MS. BARRON: No, it was not.

MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have, Mr. Chairman, on that issue.

> CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Health Department? MR. BOND: No objection.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Neighborhood Services?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And you are both Thank you for your service today. Sergeant Hogan, also, thank you very much for your services today.

Could the three of you raise your right hands and be sworn in, please?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. One at a time.

Ma'am, we'll start with you. Name and address for the record, please.

MS. BYRD: My name is Monica Byrd, 2242 South 12th Street.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And your testimony?

MS. BYRD: I've witnessed numerous things.

This was just a couple weeks ago on a Tuesday. I was sitting in my living room, and I heard a real weird sound. It didn't sound like a gunshot, but I looked out the window, and it was -- A gunman shot through the glass door. I seen a police car come around because he was in the vicinity. He parked there, went over there. About five minutes, later numerous cop cars came.

The police were on foot with handguns at their side looking for the suspects, because I seen the three guys run down 13th Street, and then I told the police I seen them run down there. The guys were headed back into my neighborhood. A couple weeks -- This was on a Tuesday.

And then four days later, the bar -- It's always at closing time. At 2:30, the bar closed,

and -- I mean there's three big parking lots there.

They're filled, they're packed with cars. You're afraid to park in front of your house because you don't know if your car is going to get smashed. The people came out of the bar, they opened up their truck doors, music blasting, and they started dancing in the

Every Saturday at closing the staff comes out with their garbage cans, cleans up all the bottles that the people are taking out of the bar. They seen the people dancing, they just ignored it, and went back in. After that then they dump their bottles into the big dumpsters, you hear a big crash, and then everything's in the dumpsters. This is every Saturday night.

I seen a car -- you know, because I live across the street. I seen in the one -- There's a little Tyme machine, there's a little driveway, and then there's a little island. There's two little poles there, metal poles that have reflector signs. A guy backed up right into it, ran it over and took off.

After the bar closes, they go from one parking lot to another. They're squealing their tires from one parking lot to another, and keep on

circulating with music blasting. It's thumping. It mean it shakes your house windows, that's how loud their music is. And this is every Saturday night.

I'm trying to think. I've seen it already when there was a gang fight. There were about 15 guys. You know, you could see it right through the parking lots. They were all just chasing after each other fist fighting. I've already seen a guy --

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And they came from that tavern?

MS. BYRD: Yes, it's always from this bar.

I've already seen in the parking lot directly across

from my house, -- They must have got into a

confrontation. A guy went to his car, took out a gun,

and shot the guy right in the window of his car.

There was another incident where there was a bunch of guys with bats chasing an SUV, which was stolen from some lady; came running out, and it's coming towards the neighbor's house right next to me. They're beating this van, this SUV, with the bats, and the guy crashed into the car that was parked there, and it went right up to the neighbor's steps to their porch. I'm trying to think what else.

MR. BYRD: I'll help.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You'll get a chance in

a minute.

MR. BYRD: Okay.

MS. BYRD: There was another incident when there was a shooting. This was about 1:00 in the morning when I'm sitting in my living room watching TV, and I fall asleep there, and -- Well, you get woken up from all this.

I've already seen a guy come out, and it was like 1:00, and this was in the parking lot right across from the bar. He went and shot the guy and -- This parking lot goes around the laundromat, and then there's the drive-through for the bank. His car was parked there, and he took off. I seen that incident. And you call the police, but by the time they get there, it's too late.

I've seen them come with their bottles of beer, and they throw it and smash it on the street, and we find them on our front lawns, so you know alcohol is coming out of that establishment.

And I do fear for my safety and for my children. You know, I'm afraid bullets are going to come through my window.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you. Any questions?

ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade.

ALDERMAN WADE:. Thank you. You personally witnessed a number of shootings.

MS. BYRD: Yes, I did.

ALDERMAN WADE: Would you just like to put a number on that? You mentioned maybe two or three, I thought. How many shootings have you personally witnessed associated with this establishment?

MS. BYRD: Three.

MR. KURLINSKI: At least three, possibly four.

MS. BYRD: I live right there. I see everything directly through my window. You get woken up from all this noise. It's very scary living there. I have kids. When my kids come home, I say don't come home when it's bar time. I have a 20-year-old. I say don't come home, I don't want nothing to happen to you. You know, when you pull up in front of the house, they're all coming out of the bar, and I don't want nothing to happen to my kids.

ALDERMAN WADE: That's amazing to see three shootings personally.

MS. BYRD: Yes. And then when you call the police, it takes forever. And even when Mr. Angel Sanchez was the alderman, he said there was no police

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MR. BYRD: We had a community meeting with Alderman Sanchez at the --

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Could you identify yourself for the record, please?

MR. BYRD: James Byrd, 2242 South 12th Street. This is my wife.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Okay. Go ahead.

MR. BYRD: We had a meeting with Alderman Sanchez a few years ago, three years ago, --

MS. BYRD: Yeah. It was right after they got their last license.

MR. BYRD: It was a big meeting to --

MS. BYRD: He said that --

MR. SCHRIMPF: One at a time.

MR. BYRD: We had a big meeting to discuss this whole situation because this is an ongoing thing, okay? And one of the problems with it was tying the police reports into the bar, okay, with the people coming out of the establishment, which is kind of hard to do, but it's pretty obvious if you put two and two together with what's taking place. But we met with him, and there had to have been 30 or 40 of us there. Apparently, we got nowhere.

The one thing I want to point out real quick is that if you don't see a lot of people back here is because, first of all, they're scared. Second of all, when we call the police department, we like to leave our names out of it, okay? There's a lot of gang things going on in that neighborhood, a lot of gang confrontations going on. That's why the shootings are taking place. It's a big establishment. You've got the bank lot, and -- It's just like you've got so much land, and it becomes a big gang war for these people.

The one shooting that we had in front of the house, the guy was shot dead 50 feet from my doorstep, okay? Shot dead. I attempted to go outside if I had to give mouth-to-mouth or whatever. He wasn't moving. My wife told me to get back in the house.

At the time my daughter was two doors down sleeping by my neighbor. Two bullet holes went through the house, okay? The one was lodged into the ceiling about six, seven feet from her and her girl friend who were sleeping on the couch, okay? So I'm just saying that's how close the bullets were from my daughter and my neighbor's daughter's heads.

So like I said, we met with Sanchez. We've got public urination, we've got bottles, we've got fights. It's unbelievable.

I mean it's quite obvious why he's not here, but a lot of people are just afraid to come forward and let people know what's going on around the neighborhood because it's a pretty rough neighborhood. It's gotten pretty bad.

We've gotten a lot of support from the 2nd District lately, though, as far as patrolling the neighborhood, which we do appreciate, but like she said, by the time the altercation takes place to when the police get there, -- and especially on a Saturday night with so much going on in the City of Milwaukee, especially on the south side, -- there's a time frame there.

Since then, we've gotten Alderman Sanchez out, and of course we voted you in, got our way. I voted for -- I didn't get my way with the president of the United States, but at least I got one thing, you know. But really it's a big community issue, and it's something we're really, really concerned about because we've been scared for many years and years. And people just -- You know, when nothing happens, people just say, you know, why bother. Why bother. Why go forward, why continue, why proceed. Well, we're proceeding.

And I think that the police reports -- well,

Sergeant John Hogan has apparently left, but I would like to think that's there's got to be plenty of reports that are related right within a half a block of the vicinity of that location that ties into that place. And not only that, if you look at like the concentration or the bars that are in that area, it's just unbelievable. But the place is just unreal.

MS. BYRD: Yeah. I've witnessed them urinating by the cars in front of our house, because they're parked there behind the dumpster that's behind that laundromat there.

And I do remember when we met with Angel Sanchez at that bar down there when we had that meeting, he said that if we would show up for a meeting, they would retaliate, so --

MR. BYRD: Well, we'll deal with that.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. We appreciate you coming. Mr. Schrimpf?

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mrs. Byrd, I just want to make sure, -- because it kind of slipped through in your testimony here, -- all the incidents that you've recounted, these either involve patrons of the tavern as victims or as assaulters; is that correct?

MS. BYRD: Exactly.

MR. SCHRIMPF: You saw these people exit the bar, and then you saw the things happen that you testified to.

MS. BYRD: Yes, I did.

MR. BYRD: We don't sleep when the bar closes. We're up when the bar closes, believe me.

MS. BYRD: Yup.

MR. BYRD: It's nuts. It's bizarre.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Sir, your name and address and your testimony, please?

MR. KURLINSKI: My name is Dave Kurlinski,
2231 South 12th. Besides living in the neighborhood,
I also work at the laundromat which is directly across
the street.

Among everything else that they've said, there's -- I mean we never gave them permission to use our parking lot, which is quite large, which is where a lot of these cars park. There's underage drinking. You name it. I mean like they have told you, too, we've had fatal shootings and underage drinking.

We've had -- You name it. We've had it there.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you. Have we made the police report a part of the record?

Any

MR. SCHRIMPF: Yes. 1 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We have. Okay. 2 questions by members of the committee? 3 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. 5 ALDERMAN WADE: Thank you. To the last 6 7 gentlemen, you've witnessed people from the bar 8 actually shooting someone? MR. KURLINSKI: Oh, yes. 9 Yes. 10 ALDERMAN WADE: And how many times have you witnessed this? 11 MR. KURLINSKI: It has to be at least three, 12 13 possibly four. ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. Thank you, sir. 14 15 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other questions by 16 members of the committee? I want to say I really appreciate you coming down and your testimony today. 17 18 That's extremely important. I know that a lot of 19 times people don't understand that we can't accept 20 things called hearsay. It's where one person comes down and says, this guy told me this about it and 21 that, or whatever, and we can't accept that. 22 actually need personal testimony. 23 24 And I want to hear from anybody who thinks

that there's going to be retaliation against them.

It's our job to -- That just makes me sick to hear something like that. It's our job to make sure that that doesn't happen. When people come down and exercise their right to speak at a hearing such as this, they should be commended, and anytime that that ever happens in anything relative to this committee, any licensing matters, if anyone's retaliated against, I want to know about it. So I really just appreciate you coming down here today. So anything further from members of the committee?

> ALDERMAN WADE: I would just like to echo the sentiments of the Chair. It does take a certain amount of courage. A lot of times when -- I had a bar earlier today where the constituents were actually telling me that they were afraid to come down here, and I've had people come down here and had some threats of retaliation and some retaliation actually happened, which just sickened me. So I would like to commend you also for showing responsibility and courage for your area and your neighborhood.

> CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. This matter is in committee.

> > ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl.

ALDERMAN BOHL: I would move for denial of

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the application due to nonappearance, matters contained within the police report, and neighborhood objections as testified to here today.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Motion by Alderman Bohl is to recommend nonrenewal of this license based on nonappearance, matters contained in the police report, and neighborhood objections. Are there any objections to that motion? Hearing none, so ordered. Thank you again for appearing.

MS. BYRD: Thank you very much.

MR. BYRD: And seeing as he did not appear, what will happen next?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Schrimpf?

MR. SCHRIMPF: In case anyone from the bar is listening in on TV, the committee is going to be doing Findings of Facts and Conclusions of Law recommending nonrenewal of this license.

The agent of the corporation, Mr. Alfredo Garcia, either in person or by an attorney, may file objections to that recommendation, as well as appear before the Milwaukee Common Council when it meets on this matter at approximately 9 a.m. on November 23rd, 2004.
