## **MPL BINDERY REPORT 2007**

- 1. The Milwaukee Public Library opened its doors in 1899. The Bindery opened shop in approximately 1903. The Bindery has been a working, functioning and necessary part of Library services for in-house needs as well as the general public.
  - a. 100 years of service
  - b. All Library departments use bindery services for various needs
  - c. Repair services are used by all 12 Branch Libraries
- d. Patrons use our bound periodicals for research and new books for many various reasons, including repaired material that was broken and now, thanks to the Bindery, is back in circulation.
- e. The Bindery hit its peak in the 1960's with over 20 employee's on staff. In 1982, when I joined the staff, there were only 9 people left. Now we have 3 Bindery employees, and we are fighting to keep our staff in tact at this level.
- 2. The Bindery Mission is two-fold:
- a. The preparation of new material for distribution within the Library to also be used by the public and
  - b. Bookbinding (see attached information B)
- 3. The flexibility required and given by the Bindery staff to please management and cope with the changes, demands and expectations over time, has been extensive. We have been through TQI, overhauled, and streamlined the Bindery. We have gone through many changes. Some imposed upon us and many by our own initiative. We, in the Bindery, can say, with pride, that we have accomplished our best for MPL.

# 4. (Please see color equipment pages)

Bookbinders at MPL Bindery have taken the initiative to upgrade-our skills in operating and maintaining the departments equipment. In the past, the Bindery manager and lead bookbinder were designated to maintain certain machinery. Now, all bookbinders clean, repair and maintain all of the Bindery equipment. In addition, over the last five years, the Library has purchased expensive new equipment for the Bindery enabling us to upgrade our ability to produce a quality product. The Library, by doing this, has shown interest in keeping the Bindery healthy and productive well in to the future.

## MPL BINDERY REPORT 2007 (cont.)

5. The Bindery has the complete support of MPL's Librarian Staff. They realize that an in-house Bindery provides many arcane and varied services beyond binding a book.

### (See attached Info B.)

MPL Bindery currently binds approximately <u>five thousand</u> titles per year. If Jim's position is eliminated, we will be held to binding <u>under one hundred</u> titles per year. Bookbinding at MPL will, in any practical assessment, come to an end. All of the unbound material will be packed in boxes and stored in the Library's basement.

6. Quality comes at a cost beyond dollard and cents. For a public institution, as is the Library, it is essential to keep all of it's departments in tact so that the Library can maintain an ongoing level of quality service mandated by our city's founding fathers who had the vision and foresight to make this institution **public not private** and to endow the Library with departments, like the Bindery, so that it can operate in a self-sufficient manner whenever possible.



- One-day turn around service (including new or rebound materials)
- 4. In-house binding provides the ability to retrieve material a patron may have an immediate need for.
- 5. Special projects: our bindery provides custom-built boxes, wing binders, portfolios, pam binders, etc.
- 6. The bindery supplies cut paper stock for the MPL print shop.
- 7. The bindery maintains the library's huge collection not only through the binding process but also through the use of preservation techniques such as acid-free binder-board and other binding materials.
- 8. We bind newspapers at no additional cost.
- 9. MPL bindery has initiated a book repair program that has saved the city the cost of rebinding thousands of books that would have in the past been rebound.
- 10. MPL bindery initiated TQI concepts through streamlining the department years before the current push for TQI throughout the city.
- 11. MPL bindery stands ready now as it did in the past to provide bindery services for other city departments as well as county departments, MPS, etc.
- 12. MPL bindery costs are competitive with commercial binding, also keeping city monies spent here in the Milwaukee community.







As a librarian at Milwaukee Public Library for twenty-three years, I'm writing in support of retaining the library's bookbinder position that has been slated for elimination.

Aside from the money saved from having an in-house bindery, we librarians have been consistently impressed by the speed, workmanship and accessibility of our bindery.

We often have materials in need of quick repair, e.g., a one-of-a-kind print reference source at Ready Reference, and sending the material out of house for rebinding is not a good option. The turn around time for these outside binderies would impinge on us being able to offer the kind of speedy reference work Ready Reference is noted for. Our bindery has been especially helpful in returning these important reference sources to us in a most timely fashion.

The bindery has also been very accommodating in helping preserve our local history resources. Old Milwaukee city directories and phone books, which are used on a very frequent basis by our patrons, have been kept in good condition because of our bindery's excellent work. Local newspapers have also been preserved in unique, tried-and-tested bindings that would be hard to replicate by an outside firm – and certainly not at the low cost our bindery provides.

While we may be one of the last large public libraries to have an in-house bindery, I've had occasion through my dealings with other librarians around the state to hear comments about how fortunate we are to have an in-house bindery, and how inadequate and frustrating outsourcing bindery material can be.

The bindery staff has gone from nine to three over the last fifteen years. The work that they continue to do is of great value to the city. Savings predicted by eliminating one of the bindery positions will surely be a phantom. We'll end up paying more and getting less. Please save this position.

#### Cuts in Bindery Staff

The Humanities Department relies on the MPL Bindery to repair its rare and fragile books. The Milwaukee City Directories, family histories, and one-of-a-kind books of historical significance are irreplaceable. We have also depended upon the Bindery to preserve the historical and genealogical magazines by binding the issues together so that individual issues are not lost or stolen. Only a few of these titles will be bound if the staff is cut. And I am concerned that staff cuts will also make it more difficult to have our books repaired and quickly returned the way they are now. I hope that the City of Milwaukee will find a way to preserve all of the few remaining Bindery jobs, which have been reduced so much already during the years I have worked at the Milwaukee Public Library.

Having an in-house bindery has provided multiple benefits to the library system. Every day the library acquires the best of print materials, provides free access to them and preserves them for the citizens of Milwaukee now and for the future. Binding books and periodicals that have lasting value maintains our commitment to our patrons. Binding periodicals helps to safeguard them against theft and also increases patron access to these materials. Allowing the most popular back issues to be available in a self-serve arrangement enables browsing and increases usage. The articles alone are not always what people want to read; it's the ads, letters to the editor, charts, and tables that are not available via electronic access. PDF format does provide full access to the articles, but many periodicals have only HTML text.

Some of the most important materials to be preserved are those with local information. The format of local documents, newsletters, and other print sources are vulnerable to physical harm if not bound. Many of these types of materials are not available electronically.

On-site binding has saved the City tens of thousands of dollars over the years and has enabled the library to create a treasury of materials represent now over 100 years of mankind's knowledge, discovery, adventure and imagination.

### October 5, 2007

To whom it may concern:

Regarding the transfer of a skilled trades employee.

The proposed transfer of a skilled trades employee in the bindery to a circulation position seems a waste of talent. I realize that the budget and the library must change with the times, but it would be more logical and efficient to transfer a person who is already doing work that is similar to the work in the new assignment.

As the entire bindery department consists of only three seasoned staff, wouldn't it make more sense to let attrition reduce the staff there? All the employees in this department are skilled workers with many years of service.

I know that government sometimes believes outsourcing is more cost effective, but many times they find quality suffers and costs are raised by having to do over tasks that a staff member would have done right the first time. In addition, when work is outsourced without government oversight abuses can occur. Just a few weeks ago an article in a Madison newspaper emphasized this point. The caption read "The CDA has been spending an unconscionable amount of money on things that union personnel should be doing." CDA is Madison's Community Development Authority.

If changes must be made it would be wise to study the types of tasks performed so that the library and the public receive the best service for the money spent. We should be using each staff member's strengths and skills, rather than underutilizing them.
