


NIDC RESOURCES

- Common Council allocated funds to NIDC for implementation of Healthy Neighborhoods CIPs and Citywide CIPs:
- 45 projects were approved in 2016 for over \$96,000 leveraging more than \$130,000*
- Funding is available to operate the program at the same level in 2017



 - Financial & technical support (GMF & NIDC)
 - \$10,000 matching grant (NIDC CIP)
 - Target Investment Neighborhood resources (NIDC)
 - Professional development & Training (GMF)
- In 2017 GMF will continue to operate the Healthy Neighborhood Program




