# \$6.32 million

Total proposed budget for 2019, an increase of 8.7% from the 2018

Budget of \$5.81 million.

-36.5%

Decrease in withdrawal from RACM General Reserves for 2019 (from \$443,297 in 2018 to \$281,500 in 2019).

\$265,000

Change in grant funding as a RACM revenue source, 2018 to 2019, an increase of 9.0%.

50.7%

Percentage of RACM's budget to be funded by grant proceeds in 2019, similar to the 50.5% in 2018.

### **Relationship of RACM to City**

The Redevelopment Authority of the City of Milwaukee (RACM) is an independent corporation created by State Statue in 1958. Its mission is to:

- Eliminate blighting conditions that inhibit neighborhood reinvestment.
- Foster and promote business expansion and job creation.
- Facilitate new business and housing development.

RACM has an annual cooperation agreement with the City for the City to provide:

- Management of financial affairs.
- Land use planning and urban design guidance.
- Real estate acquisition and disposition.
- Relocation assistance for displaced families and businesses.

### **RACM Board**

- 7 Board members.
- All members appointed by the Mayor and approved by the Common Council.
- Board members receive no compensation.
- The Board held 12 regular meetings in 2015 and 11 regular meetings each in 2016 and 2017.
- Board meetings receive City staff support from DCD and the City Attorney's Office.

### **Staffing Update**

- All RACM positions moved to City (DCD) budget in 2018.
- 12 City positions supported by RACM reimbursement in 2019, one less than in 2018 (no actual positions eliminated – just an accounting correction).

### **Staffing Costs**

- 2019 salary reimbursement to City will total \$1.2 million.
- 2019 reimbursement is \$90,000 (8.1%) more than 2018.

\$200,000

Projected increase in revenue from property sales (+20% from 2018), a reflection of more *in rem* properties being sold.

200.0%

Increase in RACM's Utilities line item, from \$20,000 in 2018 to \$60,000 for 2019 (mainly to cover storm water management fees for former Northridge Boston Store bldg.).

\$28,000

CDBG funding remaining, to be expended for environmental purposes.

-20.0%

Anticipated decrease in dwelling rent revenues, 2018-2019, as the City's inventory of *in rem* properties is gradually reduced through increased property sales.
