Responses to Finance and Personnel Committee Inquiries

Dear Alderman Murphy:

Per the October 16, 2006, hearing on the Milwaukee Fire Department's (MFD) 2007 Proposed Budget, the following are answers to the questions raised by Committee members.

#### 1) Provide examples of the fire cause/arson investigation teams utilized in other communities.

A collaborative report by the United States Fire Administration and the National Fire Protection Association found that 94% of fire departments in cities of similar size to Milwaukee are currently involved in determining if a fire was deliberately set.

The most comprehensive review of other communities and their support of fire investigation units are found in a summary report from the United States Fire Administration (2004). During a period from 1989 to 2004, 143 state and local agencies were provided technical assistance with the goal to improve coordination between fire, police, and other agencies to build stronger fire cause investigation units for their communities. Over 80 cities, including Orlando, Florida, Buffalo, New York, Omaha, Nebraska, Louisville, Kentucky, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, San Francisco, California, Charlotte, North Carolina, Portland, Oregon, Cleveland, Ohio, Toledo, Ohio, Atlanta, Georgia, and Denver, Colorado participated in this effort.

### 2) What are the differences between Milwaukee's fire cause statistics and national statistics?

A recent U.S. Fire Administration report disclosed the leading cause of all fire incidents in the United States as "arson" at 28% (U.S. Fire Administration-National Fire Data Center: Fire in the United States 1992-2001; October 2004).

In comparison, the leading cause of all fire incidents in Milwaukee to 2006 year-to-date is "undetermined" at 39%, followed by "under investigation" at 29%.

#### 3) For each of the MFD's nineteen fire education programs, list the number of staff and hours dedicated to each.

In 2005, the Milwaukee Fire Department dedicated approximately 14,691 staff hours to conducting the department's nineteen fire education programs. Attachment A details the program activity, the number of times each program was delivered, the number of contacts made, and the total hours dedicated to that program by delivery type.

For the committee's information, "staff delivery" indicates the program was conducted by the MFD's Fire Education staff, while "field delivery" indicates the program was conducted by a fire suppression company assigned to that program for a period of time. Finally, an "out of service" designation indicates that the company providing the program was not available for emergency response, while an "in service" designation indicates that the company was available for dispatch.

All of the department's fire education programs are conducted by on-duty personnel, with the exception of the Explorer Post program, which is conducted by off-duty members on a voluntary basis.

### 4) Provide the MFD's penetrating trauma statistics for the prior three-year period.

Coding Note: Gunshot Wounds and Stabbing/Cuttings are specifically identified in the Cause of Injury section of the patient care record. All patients with a traumatic Primary Working Assessment require a specific Cause of Injury code.

Includes traumatic PNBs who died in field following resuscitation attempts.

Excludes traumatic DOAs (trauma patients who did not have resuscitation attempted).

## 5) Estimate the special duty (overtime) costs related to the Incident Safety Officer positions.

The estimated special duty costs related to the creation of three Incident Safety Officer positions in 2007 totals \$42,328.00 (estimate assumes 22 "hired" days per Officer @ 2006 rates). These costs will be funded through the department's special duty appropriation.

## 6) Of the structure fires experienced in 2005, how many were of a major/minor nature?

In 2005, the department responded to 647 structure fires. Using the amount of property loss as a determining factor, the City experienced 278 incidents of a minor nature (property loss < \$5,000) and 369 incidents of a major nature (property loss > \$5,000).

The following table details the property use and severity of these incidents.
