

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


Back porch area c. 1991. Repairs are to porch at extreme right of photo. New skiriting will be similar to panels on rear bumpout.




Porch Skirting Designs




Rectangular Lattice, All Styles, 1855-1935

Sawn Skirting Boards, All Styles, 1865-1900




Craftsman, 1905-1935
