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00002 1 PROCEEDINGS 2 (NOTE: All City Personnel Were Sworn Under Oath Prior to These Proceedings.) 4 CHAIRMAN BOHL: The last item on the after-5 noon agenda is for John Bohan, agent for Thumpers, 6 Incorporated, Class B Tavern and Tavern Dance renewal 7 applications for Thumpers at 7155 North 43rd Street. 8 Mr. Bohan? 9 MR. BOHAN: Good afternoon. 10 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Good afternoon to you. 11 Mr. Bohan, if you could raise your right hand here, 12 and anyone else who wishes to testify here. 13 (Whereupon all witnesses were sworn under 14 oath.) 15 CHAIRMAN BOHL: And Mr. Bohan, do you 16 acknowledge receiving notice of today's meeting with 17 the possibility that your license could be denied due 18 to items in the police report as well as neighborhood 19 objections to loitering, littering, traffic, parking 20 problems, loud patrons, drinking after hours, 21 speeding, cruising, loud music and noise, patrons 22 after hours, vandalism and damage to private property, trespassing, public urination, illegal drug activity, 23 2.4 increase of crime, devaluation of residential 25 property, and conduct detrimental to the health,

00003 1 safety and welfare of the neighborhood? MR. BOHAN: Yes. 3 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you. Health 4 Department? 5 MR. BOND: No objection. 6 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Neighborhood Services? 7 MS. BENDER: No objection. 8 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sergeant Hogan? SERGEANT HOGAN: Three incidents were 9 10 reported in the last licensing period. The first 11 one occurred on August 17th of last year. An officer 12 conducted a tavern check and found that the bartender 13 on duty did not have a bartender's license and issued 14 that person a citation. 15 On January the 1st of this year, about 16 three in the morning, officers got sent to a 17 shots-fired fight inside the tavern. Upon their 18 arrival, the officers observed numerous patrons 19 running from inside the tavern. One person was 20 lying in the middle of 43rd Street. All vehicular 21 traffic was stopped because of the patrons running 22 from the tavern yelling and screaming and fighting. 23 Additional squads were summoned to control 2.4 the scene. Officers determined that no one was shot 25 in the bar but noticed that inside the tavern, the

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tables were turned over, bottles were broken, bar stools had been thrown about.

The bartender stated that no one was shooting inside the tavern, but he thinks that a shot had been fired outside. He added that a fight had broken inside which caused patrons to throw bottles and chairs. A patron was found in the basement with injuries that he stated that he received when he fell on the stairs. Another person that was found lying in the street was uncooperative with officers, and he was conveyed to the hospital for treatment.

The officers also noted in the report that when they arrived, entrance to the tavern was not immediate because the tavern had a magnetic door lock which could only be deactivated from the inside, which prevented a quick entry to check for injured persons. Officers also found that the tavern was operating under the name of the X Sports Bar, but the license still had the previous name to it.

Several citations were issued to the licensee. There was a conviction for immediate entry to Fire and Police. The rest of the citations were dismissed.

On March the 3rd of this year at about 9:45

00005 1 p.m., officers conducted a license premise check and found that the bartender on duty did not have a bartender's license. A citation was issued to both 4 the licensee and the bartender. The citation to the 5 licensee was dismissed. 6 MR. COPELAND: Excuse me, Mr. Chair. 7 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yes, Mr. Copeland. 8 MR. COPELAND: Before the committee hears testimony on this case, I need to inform the committee 9 10 that the License Division was given a letter from 11 Badger Distributing concerning the licensee and unpaid 12 retail liquor bills, which under state law requires 13 that the License Division hold the license until this 14 is settled. 15 MR. BOHAN: Who's that from? I'm sorry, I 16 didn't catch that. 17 MR. COPELAND: Badger Distributing. 18 MR. BOHAN: Badger. Okay. 19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, --20 MR. COPELAND: I'm just putting that out. CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I appreciate that. This 21 22 is new -- In terms of  $my\ three\ and\ a\ half\ years\ on$ 23 this committee, I have not had any previous experience 24 with this. MR. COPELAND: Well, normally we don't 25

00006 inform the committee, but because the person who wrote 1 this letter was objecting to the renewal, -- and as we were telling them, this is not a reason for objection 4 of a renewal. 5 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, this does 6 not prohibit the committee from considering this 7 application and making an appropriate recommendation, 8 or the council from granting the license. What it's 9 making clear and a record of is that even if approved, 10 and even if granted by the council, this licensee does 11 not get his license until, unless and if that liquor 12 hold and bill is paid. And occasionally I have to go 13 to court to explain this, and I want the licensee to 14 know this right upfront. 15 MR. BOHAN: I'm aware of that. It can be 16 handled. 17 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. 18 CHAIRMAN BOHL: But it's irrelevant, of 19 course, to what we have before us here. 20 ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chair? 21 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yes, Alderman Davis. 22 ALDERMAN DAVIS: Is this the same establish-23 ment that came before us that was supposed to be 2.4 leased as -- I think it was Conversations on Good Hope

Road. Is this the same establishment where we had

00007 1 neighborhood objections as far as parking and other violations that occurred before? MR. BOHAN: Yes, yes. 3 4 ALDERMAN DAVIS: Okay. 5 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Alderman Davis. 6 I appreciate that. Mr. Bohan, you've heard the police 7 report read into the record. Is there any response, 8 questions, that you would like to raise at this point 9 to those items? 10 MR. BOHAN: The only thing I can say with 11 regards to the police report is -- Well, maybe I 12 should go back to the beginning. I've been there for 13 three years. The very first year, at the end of the 14 year, there was a shooting out in the yard, out in the 15 driveway. So we came in to this committee, and I 16 believe you were on it, and I thought it was some 17 people from the carnival, -- I don't know how to say 18

that, -- but carnival people from our Lady of Good Hope. Well, anyway, it wasn't. A license citation was issued to the guy that lived next door. Him and a neighbor were in a fight together. It had nothing to do with me. We met with the neighbors. I said, what do you want me to do? They said, would you put up a fence, which I did put up a fence, okay?

The second year, they simply -- I didn't

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00008 1 have no objections and it was ordered. I was given my license. The third year, I got caught up into a stand. Two gentlemen walked into my bar one day, --4 not my bar, but over at Broadway Baby where I was 5 helping out at the time. They threw \$10,000 on the 6 table and said they wanted to buy the bar. I said 7 okay. I put together a contract for them, and I have 8 a copy of it all right here if you want it. 9 And they were there for a couple months, and 10 all those citations that you're talking about after 11 the 1st of this year were citations that were issued 12 to them. Like the report said, I was issued -- As a 13 matter of fact, I was issued nine tickets in one day, 14 and half of them were retroactive back over 30 days. 15 Of those nine, only two of them was I found guilty of, 16 and that was for having a lock to the door on the 17 premise which, in some sections of town, there's a lot 18 of those. And I think it's coming up for --19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: When did this occur? 20 MR. BOHAN: Did what occur? 21 CHAIRMAN BOHL: This period that you're 22 talking about with these other gentlemen. 23 MR. BOHAN: It started in -- I have

a contract here which I wrote up with them on, I

believe it was November, and --

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00009 CHAIRMAN BOHL: November of 2002? 1 2 MR. BOHAN: Of 2002, right. And they were there until, I believe it was April or May, at which 4 point I had -- I was getting complaints -- I wasn't 5 getting complaints from the neighbors because I never 6 heard from any of the neighbors, but I did -- Don did 7 call me in. I did talk with Don. He showed me a tape 8 of some problems that were hanging around over there, 9 so I volunteered to close the bar down. 10 I was not told by anyone -- The last time 11 that committee -- that we had that committee that you 12 were referring to, it stated that I didn't have a 13 license. I've had a license there from the beginning 14 until right -- until the middle of October, okay? 15 When she came in and applied for that 16 license in July, I think it was July 1st, -- somebody 17

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license in July, I think it was July 1st, -- somebody can correct me if I'm wrong. When she came in to apply for that license and she didn't get it, I still had, and to this day still have, a license for that premise. I could have reopened it in July, but I didn't because of the problems with the neighbors, et cetera, et cetera. So I have kept that building closed now for five to six months. It's not two anymore. And it's getting rather expensive. Now what was your question? I'm sorry, I got to rambling.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: I asked if you had any response to the police report, and you were saying -MR. BOHAN: Yeah. The response to the police report is anything that happened after the 1st of January was due to those gentlemen that I have had under a contract to do it. It's also for that liquor, which I'm not concerned about because that liquor that they didn't pay for, that was in their name and not in mine. And they're after me as the licensee, and I understand. I have the license. I'm liable for it. I understand that.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: The obvious question that strikes me at this point is if gentlemen who walk into your establishment slap \$10,000 on the table, and you put together a contract, who was actually running the place?

MR. BOHAN: Who was running the place at which point? At that point I was still running the place. When they came in, I was still running the place.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: I will tell you that it sounds to me as if this was some illegal collusive agreement. If you're saying that they're responsible for the items on the police report, and they didn't themselves apply for the license application there,

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        and there's a contract involving money, it sounds like
        it's an illegal agreement when they themselves were
        not approved for a license and were operating it.
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                  MR. BOHAN: That is a possibility. See, I'm
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        not a lawyer, but I would say this. When those two
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        gentlemen came in to do that, I made them two managers
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        in my establishment. One was a -- There were two -- I
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        made them managers in my establishment, and they were
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        working as my managers.
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                  CHAIRMAN BOHL: Did they have managers'
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        licenses?
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                  MR. BOHAN: Pardon?
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                   CHAIRMAN BOHL: Did they have managers'
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         licenses?
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                  MR. BOHAN: Yes, they did. I believe that
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         everybody did. I got --
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                  MR. COPELAND: Excuse me. One gentleman
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        that I can remember had been granted a manager's
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        license, but he never picked it up, so it wasn't
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        issued to him. I believe he hadn't paid for it.
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                  MR. BOHAN: Yeah, that was Cornell.
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                  MR. COPELAND: Yes.
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                  MR. BOHAN: That was the gay hairdresser.
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                  CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, that's besides the
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        point.
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MR. BOHAN: I had two people that came -There were two people that came in there that looked
like a respectable couple, one was a hairdresser, and
one was -- the other one was a football player from
the University of Wisconsin called Darrell Carter.
Some of you may know him. Those were the two that
came in. I didn't just say, okay, give me the 10,000
and write up the contract. No. I did some research
into them and found out a little about them, and I
went to an attorney and had him write up a contract.
I made them managers for a while. I wanted to program
them, watch them for a couple months to see what they
did, and unfortunately they didn't do what they should
have been doing.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Bohan, if you made them managers of the club, --  $\,$ 

MR. BOHAN: Uh-hmm.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: They provided you \$10,000\$ to be made managers?

MR. BOHAN: I had put up a contract with an option to buy with a down payment. I don't know legally where I'm going here.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yeah, and I know you may be digging yourself a quick grave with regard to your own testimony here. I can't speak of that, either, but --

00013 1 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, --2 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Go ahead, Mr. Schrimpf. MR. SCHRIMPF: I just have one quick 3 question here. The name of this individual was 4 5 Cornell Stallworth, --6 MR. BOHAN: Correct. 7 MR. SCHRIMPF: -- who was one of the people 8 who had plunked down the 10,000? 9 MR. BOHAN: Yes. 10 MR. SCHRIMPF: All right. And I would 11 remind the committee that Item No. 9, I believe, read 12 by the police sergeant, dealt with Cornell Stallworth 13 on the date of January 1st, 2003. And that among the 14 items cited was Class B manager's license required. 15 It was dismissed without prejudice. I suspect that 16 was so that Mr. Stallworth could obtain the Class B 17 manager's license? 18 MR. BOHAN: I believe so. 19 MR. SCHRIMPF: Which, of course, he never 20 did. 21 MR. BOHAN: Well, he did. He just didn't 22 pick it up. 23 MR. COPELAND: It was granted, but it was 2.4 never issued to him. 25 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions?

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1	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chair?
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Davis.
3	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Bohan.
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5	MR. BOHAN: Yes, sir.
6	ALDERMAN DAVIS: When these two potential
7	buyers came into your establishment, did they issue
	you a \$10,000 check, or was it \$10,000 cash?
8	MR. BOHAN: It was a cashier's check, I
9	believe.
10	ALDERMAN DAVIS: It was a cashier's check?
11	MR. BOHAN: I believe so.
12	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Was it made out to you?
13	MR. BOHAN: Yes, it was. I am listed as the
14	owner of the building.
15	VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. Any other
16	questions or comments by committee members? Where
17	are we at right now? Did we just Okay. Now
18	Alderman Richards. Alderman Richards?
19	ALDERMAN RICHARDS: Mr. Chair, I'm going
20	to pass up two letters that go together. I would ask
21	for a little I need to explain why I didn't do
22	another survey of the people of this latest license
23	application.
24	Mr. Bohan sent a letter, ultimately to me,
25	but he wrote it first on July 30th, requesting a copy

 of the survey cards that I had used when I came to the U & L to not support -- support not having the license renewed after Mr. Stallworth came in and asked for it.

The citizens of the neighborhood, as you heard by Mr. Bohan's testimony, were upset because they were disturbed, and there was rioting going on in the street, literally, and I can bring up the tape. You've seen it before. But there was riotous and lewd behavior on the street, and that's all it was, and it was associated with that tavern.

So I asked -- What happened was, Mr. Bohan wrote and said he wanted to see the survey cards, it was open records. These are the cards that we send out to get opinions from our constituents. So I objected and said, look, if we can't let the citizens anonymously give their opinion, and then we count it up and say 29 for and 10 against, then where are we going to get our evidence? Are we going to go out and -- Well, anyway, I asked for the City Attorney's opinion, and -- Excuse me, Mr. Bohan, this came just this afternoon, so I'm giving it to you, too. That's your copy.

But the letter is from myself to Mr. Bohan, and I said, "We're in receipt of your public records request dated September 2nd for survey results regard-

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ing this address. This letter is to inform you that we will comply with our statutory obligations and provide a response to your public records request as soon as practical and without delay. We have requested assistance from the City Attorney's Office and are awaiting a response."

The City Attorney told us to write that letter. In other words, it's up in the air whether or not we have to give those postcards to him. But if I send out another survey to the same people and say, do you want to have this license renewed now, six months later, I know what the response is going to be. But they don't know that -- If he's consistent with his past behavior, he's going to want those letters. And what if the ruling is that he can have those postcard responses? And then we're all going to find out something, that we don't have any confidentiality. I want to find that out, whether Circuit Court is going to decide that or the County or not, before I send out another postcard survey.

So I'm going and saying to you, and to Mr. Bohan, with all due respect, -- And I'm not telling anybody any secret when I say that this is my last -- I'm going to be out of office in April of next year. I don't want anybody, particularly those

00017 1 good people that live in that area, to say, oh, yeah Richards didn't care about it, he's going out of office, he don't give a damn, so let it go through. 4 No. I'm going to be as vigilant as I can to have 5 their wishes taken into account. 6 So for all those reasons, that nothing has 7 changed, that the -- Particularly the parking on 44th 8 Street. Most of his parking is behind the building, 9 and if he has any kind of a late night event, it's 10 going to be a disturbance to the neighborhood. So 11 if he has a tavern without, you know, any dance or 12 anything like that, maybe that could be considered, 13 but this is a tavern and dance application, and a 14 renewal with a new license or a new occupancy --15 whatever it is, the new -- whatever the term is, the 16 new person running the bar, then if he gets that, and 17 then we have the same problems, I cannot support going 18 into that. I just cannot support that. 19 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Alderman 20 Richards. Any questions for Alderman --21 MR. BOHAN: Could I ask a question of 22 Alderman Richards? 23 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Excuse me, excuse me.

MR. BOHAN: Okay.

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Any questions by

00018 1 committee members of Alderman Richards? At this time, Mr. Bohan, if you please conduct your questioning towards the committee chair. 4 MR. BOHAN: Okay. I will continue on with 5 that conversation about the open records. Correct me 6 if I'm wrong. I don't know, but I thought whenever 7 you present anything in front of this committee, it 8 becomes an open record, and that we would have access 9 to it. Now, the reason I wanted the cards was because 10 he told -- On that day, --11 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Mr. Bohan, do you have 12 a question for Alderman Richards? 13 MR. BOHAN: I'm getting to it, yes. 14 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. Because you 15 will have an opportunity at the end, after we hear 16 public testimony, to surmise what your opinion is. 17 So if you have specifically a question on Alderman 18 Richards's testimony, now you have an opportunity to 19 bring that up, on what Alderman Richards has testified 20 to. 21 MR. BOHAN: Okay. 22 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Now, do you have a 23 specific question for Alderman Richards? 2.4 MR. BOHAN: Yes.

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. Can you ask

00019 1 that question specifically? MR. BOHAN: Okay, I'll do that. On that survey that you took from the neighborhood, you said 4 that there were 22 -- 23 supporting it, and 21 5 opposed; is that correct, Alderman Richards? 6 ALDERMAN RICHARDS: I would have to check 7 my record on that. I do not know what the vote was. 8 MR. BOHAN: I did get a copy of the tape 9 from that day, which was open records, and that's what 10 it said on there, that you said 23 in support and 21 11 opposed, but that the 23 who supported the record were 12 not living in the neighborhood. Is that correct? 13 ALDERMAN RICHARDS: As I recall, some of 14 them did not live in the neighborhood. 15 MR. BOHAN: Okay. I happen to have with me 16 today a copy of the people that Alderman Richards --17 and I've got one for everybody if you want it, -- a 18 copy of the people that he contacted. He contacted 19 102 people for these cards. Of the 102 people, 39 of 20 them lived on 43rd Street, 36 lived on 44th Street, 21 only two on 45th Street, only four on 42nd Street, and 22 one on 41st Street. 23 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Mr. Bohan? 2.4 MR. BOHAN: My question to you, Don, is 25 this.

00020 1 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Mr. Bohan. 2 MR. BOHAN: Yes. 3 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: This item is about the 4 renewal of your liquor license. 5 MR. BOHAN: Right. 6 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: It is not about 7 someone to lease an establishment on a previous item 8 that had came before this committee which Alderman 9 Richards has sent out the cards on. 10 MR. BOHAN: Okay. 11 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: So with that being 12 said, I want to keep testimony on the renewal of the 13 liquor license itself. 14 MR. BOHAN: Okay. All I'm going to say, 15 then, to just that one statement, and I'll stop on 16 that, -- The statement I was going to make is that -and I believe you brought it up,  $\operatorname{--}$  about is this the 17 18 place that was here before, on the July 1st, so I was 19 commenting on that in relation to Donald Richards' 20 comments about the cards. That's the only reason I 21 brought it up. 22 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Mr. Bohan. 23 Do we have anyone here who will object to the license 24 renewal?

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Then I will take into consideration that

the residents or people who are here now would be willing to testify in favor, and at this particular time I will take you in order as far as your testimony on this particular matter. Please state your name and address for the record.

MR. WADSKA: My name is Allen Wadska (phonetic). I live at 5810 West Juniper Street. I've lived in the district for about 12 years, and I don't have any complaints.

I've been in his establishment before it became The X. Once it became The X, I didn't go in because they didn't have no control, and the two managers -- I wouldn't go in it. And I agree that there was a lot of problems, but not when he ran it himself, and that's what I'm testifying to.

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, sir. Any questions for this gentleman? Thank you very much for your testimony. Sir?

MR. PETERKE: Duane Robert Peterke, 7118
North 46th Street. I live approximately three blocks
behind this property. When it was Thumpers, me and my
wife, Alice, went there. It was a nice place. I
never had a problem there. We've never seen a fight
there when Mr. Bohan ran it.

When these gentlemen came in and made it

The X, there was nothing but problems. We never went in there again. I thought the biggest decision and the best decision for my neighborhood, which is where I live and where this tavern is, was that he shut it down, and I thought that was the best decision he could have made. At this point in time he's realized his mistake, and it sounds like he wants to continue to do something right, and I support him.

When he was in charge of that property, he did a very good job. And like I said, I live -- The way the orientation of the property and the neighborhood is, I can go through one house -- back of one house, and I'm in his backyard, and so like I say, I'm in favor of it. And I live right behind him.

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Peterke, for your testimony. Any questions for Mr. Peterke from committee members?

ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Alderman Bohl.
ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. Mr. Peterke, you indicated that when this place had reverted to the X Sports Bar, there were a fair amount of problems with that particular establishment; is that correct?

MR. PETERKE: The clientele changed when the management changed.

00023 1 ALDERMAN BOHL: Would you say that there were problems with it about noise, less safe? MR. PETERKE: I wouldn't say that the noise 4 was any more of a difference. I mean, again, I can --5 From my back window I can hear everything that happens 6 over there. There's one house separating me and the 7 road. I wouldn't say that there was more noise, and I 8 was never privy to any incidents except for when I 9 came here and heard of it. 10 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. I thought you had 11 indicated in your testimony that --12 MR. PETERKE: It was the clientele, the 13 management, the way that -- The people changed when 14 the management changed. It was a different type of 15 people, so we just stopped going. 16 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. All right. That's 17 all. 18 19

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VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Alderman Bohl. Thank you, Mr. Peterke for your testimony. Sir?

MR. KITCHEN: My name is Adell C. Kitchen (phonetic). I live at 6477 North 53rd Street. I worked with John, I believe, back in 2001. I was a cook there. Weren't no problems. Everything was smoking. I'm all in his favor.

00024 1 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: And your name again for the record? MR. KITCHEN: Adell C. Kitchen, 4 K-i-t-c-h-e-n. 5 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Any questions for 6 Mr. Kitchen from committee members? Okay. At this 7 particular time -- Oh. Sir? Please step up to the 8 mike. 9 MR. WEBER: My name is Mark Weber. I live 10 at 3902 West Rochelle, and I've been going to Thumpers 11 for two, three years. I used to walk home at night 12 and never had a problem. 13 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: And is that the end of 14 your testimony? 15 MR. WEBER: Uh-hmm. 16 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Weber. 17 Any questions from committee members? Thank you, 18 Mr. Weber, for your testimony. 19 We will go to Mr. Bohan. Here's an 20 opportunity for you to address the committee on 21 why we should grant the renewal of your license. 22 MR. BOHAN: Okay. Three years ago, when 23 I bought this building, it was closed. There was 24 graffiti all over the building, there was trash, 25 condoms in the back room, there were two abandoned

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cars in the back, there were broken windows. I took over this building because -- for whatever reasons. A building like that, to me, is more detrimental to the neighborhood than having one that's opened as a bar.

I know the lady in the liquor store next to me is real uptight, because she says if it stays boarded up like I have it right now, who knows what's going to happen to her. And I said, what do you mean by that, and she said, well, a robbery. There's nobody here. The laundromat is classed across the street, the bar is closed. There's nobody to see what would happen to me.

But, anyway, so the first year I was in the building, there was that shooting which I mentioned earlier, but the neighbor that was involved in the shooting got a ticket for it, and as a matter of fact, he's going to jail, I think, next month or so, and the person that he was fighting with across the street is gone.

Second year I had no problems. I got no objections, and the license was granted. The third year, which is right now, is because of this scam that I got involved with, that I closed them out myself. Nobody closed it out. I locked up that building for

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five months, okay? I even withdrew his name. He -- At that point, he put in an application to become the agent for the bar, and after I talked with Don, I renewed his name as the agent, and that's when I got rid of him.

The first time that this license committee heard about this bar on July 1st, they were misinformed about a lot of different things. The first one was that  $\mbox{--}$  I was the one, I still had the license. I didn't give it up, okay? Number two was for parking. They say that the seating capacity is 264 people. Well, that is for upstairs and downstairs. The building inspector came -- I think it's the building inspector or assessor's office, I don't know what's what anymore, -- and took the basement off of part of the building. I've got papers on that here someplace. So the building is assessed at 263 --\$363,000. It's now assessed at 262 -- whatever. He took off 99,000 because the basement is not being used. Now the seating capacity of 264 is for the entire building, I believe. So right now, if I'm correct on that, the building -- the seating capacity should only be about 130 or so like that. Also, on that meeting back then, they had mentioned the back parking lot that only has so many places. Well, --

00027 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Mr. Bohan, this is 1 about the renewal of your license. MR. BOHAN: Yes. 4 CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I think that you're 5 taking us to an occupancy and capacity, which is, you 6 know, -7 MR. BOHAN: Isn't that all part of it? 8 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: No, no. We're 9 discussing why you should be granted the renewal of 10 your license. 11 MR. BOHAN: Well, he said why I wouldn't be 12 renewed is because of parking. 13 CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm not going to go back and 14 forth about what he said and what you said. If you 15 would -- Can you surmise the reason why the committee 16 should take into consideration the granting of the 17 renewal of your licenses for this establishment? 18 MR. BOHAN: All I want to say is there's 19 adequate parking there. I had a professional come in 20 and talk about the number of places you could park 21 there. There's room for 55 to 58 in the back. I've 22 also got the laundromat across the street that's going 23 to give me 25. Now, I'll just tie this up real quick. 2.4 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, the notice does 25 say parking problems.

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VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay.

MR. BOHAN: Thank you. That's what he said. Anyway, I boarded up the building, and I -- I have my life invested in this building right now, okay? I personally plan on running it with my new managers when I do get some, and I also have people ready to run the kitchen.

All I want to do is -- There's a bar that's been opened for 50 years, 50 years that bar has been in existence in that neighborhood. Yes, I made a mistake. I brought somebody in there wrong for a half of a year. But for two and a half years, I ran that as a respectable business. When I got this scam in here for that half year, now my whole life is in jeopardy.

Contrary to what Don thinks, I am not involved with Broadway Baby except on a voluntary basis. I do not get a salary there, I don't do anything else. I'm going to devote my life back to what I did with this establishment. That's all I can say.

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Mr. Bohan. And please let the record reflect that Alderman Bohl moves to make part of the record the public records request from Mr. Bohan, and also a letter sent by

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Alderman Richards in response to that.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, if it hasn't been done already, I would also ask that the entire police report be received. It may have been done already.

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Alderman Bohl moves to make that part of the police record. If there's no objection, so moved. Alderman Richards.

ALDERMAN RICHARDS: Thank you. First of all, I'm certainly not clear till just now that Mr. Bohan doesn't have anything to do with Broadway Baby. The reason that I had cut him as much slack as I have in terms of trusting him and his new enterprise is the good job that he did at Broadway Baby, and I have to talk to him about who is running Broadway Baby, but I hope that it continues to be a good offering of variety of entertainment in terms of an alternative to going to the movie or something like that. They've got a great place and great food and entertainment.

Secondly, I want to say that if Mr. Bohan is willing to promise me that he's not going to seek to

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get any more survey cards, and he's going to allow those surveys to be what they are supposed to be, and that's anonymous -- not anonymous, but a guarded rendering of opinion by constituents who live in the affected area, I will be glad to send out another survey if you hold this, and by the next meeting we can -- I can come back with that survey material.

I really felt handcuffed because I was under -- he made a request, as you see, for the old survey cards, and I couldn't in conscious send out another request for opinion, if that opinion was going to be shared with the applicant for the tavern license. The other possibility, -- So if he's willing to do that, he can speak to that.

But the other possibility would be that you could renew it without a Tavern Dance license and just see if he can run a tavern there, and -- Because I think that -- I think that I could explain that to the constituents and say, look, they're not going to have dance events and so on, and see how it goes, and then maybe he can come back and get the dance license later on.

Again, I'm in a tight place because I want to -- I want to be fair to the applicant, and I also want to certainly be fair to my constituents, and I'm

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not going to be the alderman in the spring, so I don't want to have a situation going on there for a problem for the next alderman -- or for the people, rather, that live in the area, and consequently for the alderman.

So I'm opposed to this license as its before you, -- or this renewal application, as its before you, for the reasons that the police cited and the issues of parking, and what happens when you have a Tavern/Tavern Dance at that address, at least in the last number of years. And so that's my position, unless he wants to make some other -- If there's another motion to do without it, without a Tavern Dance.

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Alderman Richards. Since you offered that, I will go to Mr. Bohan and get a comment from him before he go back into committee.

MR. BOHAN: Well, he said -- I sort of assumed that what he was saying is that if I drop the dance and just have a Class B tavern, he would be willing to go with that. I thought that's what he said. Am I correct, Don?

ALDERMAN RICHARDS: Yes.

MR. BOHAN: Yeah, I would be more than

00032 1 willing to do that. Because I got -- I guess I've got to go back and prove myself, again, you know, and if that's what it takes, I'll do it. You know, 4 I would be more than willing to do that. 5 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. Now, we'll go 6 back into committee now, and is there a motion on the 7 floor? 8 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman? 9 VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Alderman Bohl. 10 ALDERMAN BOHL: Assuming that what Mr. Bohan 11 has indicated, that he's withdrawing a portion of his 12 application for the Tavern Dance, at this point I 13 would move approval of the Class B Tavern application. 14 I would say that what particularly concerns 15 me, that even if these other gentlemen apparently were 16 in a personal agreement, I still think that there may 17 be some illegalities that took place there. 18 You, nevertheless, have indicated that you 19 were the owner or proprietor of the establishment, 20 which means that this police record from the last year 21 is ultimately your responsibility, and I -- You know, 22 whether or not you indicate you made an error in 23 judgment on that part, ultimately you were the

licensed applicant, and so I think that, as Alderman

Richards indicated, there have been -- as you have

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been a reasonable owner of another establishment in the past, I think this is a reasonable compromise to have you move forward.

Certainly within Alderman Richards' purview, there's the possibility for you to apply for 20 separate -- now 20 separate permits, to have some type of dance or other type of entertainment along those lines, and Alderman Richards can choose however he wishes to either provide them or not provide them. But, typically, when we have problems in establishments, more generally, not -- not always, but more generally not, they tend to evolve around establishments that have entertainment, music, dance, that tends to be a big draw, and that oftentimes tends to lead to potential problems.

Hopefully we'll see a situation where we will continue to move forward without having the additional problems in the neighborhood, and as such, I would move at this point for approval of the Class B Tavern license.

ALDERMAN RICHARDS: Mr. Chair, are you in committee?

VICE CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Yes. Alderman Bohl moves approval of the Class B Tavern license. Is there any discussion? On the motion. Is there any

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1	objection? Hearing no objection, so ordered.					
2	Mr. Schrimpf?					
3	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, just so					
4	that Thank you very much. Just so that Mr. Bohan					
5	understands it, you're going to have to go back to the					
6	wholesaler or the distributor, whoever threw that hold					
7	on it,					
8	MR. COPELAND: Yes, they have it in your					
9	name, sir.					
10	MR. BOHAN: I'm sure they would.					
11	MR. SCHRIMPF: Because you're the licensee.					
12	MR. BOHAN: I'm the agent. I do have that					
13	person under contract that he owes for it, so I will					
14	get it. Probably not, but					
15	MR. SCHRIMPF: That's between you and the					
16	distributor.					
17	MR. BOHAN: Yes.					
18	MR. SCHRIMPF: You've got to get the					
19	distributor to notify Mr. Copeland that they're					
20	lifting it. It's not a city problem, it's your					
21	problem.					
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any other comments?					
23	Good luck, Mr. Bohan.					
24	MR. BOHAN: Thank you.
