#### **AMENDMENT INTENT**

To eliminate \$36,000 for the Mentoring Program Special Purpose Account and increase funding proportionately for the Economic Development Committee SPA

# **OVERVIEW**

This amendment eliminates the proposed funding of \$36,000 for the Mentoring Program Special Purpose Account and transfers this funding to the Economic Development Committee SPA.

The Mentoring Program SPA was created in 2005 in order to provide a property tax credit incentive for city of Milwaukee residents who mentor high-risk high school students in Milwaukee. This program will screen, train and match Milwaukee residents with students in order to provide students with resources and guidance to keep them in school and on course for graduation.

The Economic Development Committee SPA supports costs related to advertising and marketing the City for industrial and commercial development, business attraction and retention, and tourism. Actual costs include items such as mailings, publications, travel and displays. In recent years, more emphasis has been placed on neighborhood events and marketing, tourism promotion, and special event production, industrial retention efforts, and studies of economic development opportunities.

This amendment will increase the Economic Development Committee SPA in the 2006 budget to \$66,000 (\$30,000 in the 2006 proposed budget) from \$20,000 in 2005 and eliminate funding for the Mentoring Program SPA. 2005 Mentoring Program funds, \$36,000, are unspent to date.

The City Clerk manages the Economic Development Committee SPA.

The budget effect of this amendment is \$0.00.

The tax levy effect of this amendment is \$0.00.

# OTHER INFORMATION

No Mentoring Program information is available to date as the 2005 funding has not yet been expended. This account operates relative to the school year that begins in September. In this case, 2006 funding is for the 2006-2007 school year.

The 2006 proposed budget for the Mentoring Program SPA provides funding for approximately 100 mentors.

## **AMENDMENT INTENT**

To establish a "Community Service Staffing" Special Purpose Account for public safety related purposes utilizing police overtime funds. A footnote is included that no funds for public safety or overtime may be expended from this account without Common Council approval

# **OVERVIEW**

This amendment will establish a "Community Service Staffing" Special Purpose Account for public safety related purposes or police overtime, including costs associated with community service staff and services within the police department. This new SPA will utilize 2006 police department overtime funds and will be footnoted that no funds may be expended without Common Council approval.

This amendment seeks to fund an initiative that will develop alternatives to traditional sworn policing as a response to all calls for service customarily conducted by a sworn officer. In various parts of the United States, some communities are rethinking traditional police efforts and shifting uniformed resources as needed.

The funds in this SPA would initiate a process, through the creation of a task force, to investigate means and methods, appropriate for the city of Milwaukee, that would lead to community service staffing as well as to provide funds for the eventual implementation of new staffing models for responding to Milwaukee residents' calls for service. The initial work of this investigation could include, but not be limited to the following examples:

- Development of civilian alternatives to policing, including expanding the role of civilians in traditional police work.
- Communication and contact with neighborhoods, identifying needs based upon a changing demographic population, and developing initiatives to respond to those needs, including partnering with established community-based and social service groups.
- Investigating how non-sworn police department employees in other communities in the United States provide response to non-emergency, non-enforcement calls for service in order to allow sworn officers more time for enforcement, problem solving and crime prevention activities. Time saving alternatives that these positions provide in other communities include the authorization to perform traffic accident

investigations, traffic control and post incident reports such as burglaries and stolen vehicles.

# **OTHER INFORMATION**

This amendment will fund this SPA by drawing \$1.5 million in the 2006 police department overtime budget, funded for \$11.21 million in 2006.

This account shall be footnoted in the budget to state that funds are only to be expended for public safety related purposes or police overtime with Common Council approval.

As footnotes alone do not have the force of budgetary law, their intent must be implemented by an accompanying Council resolution.

<u>AMENDMENT INTENT</u> – This amendment adds \$682,900 in appropriation authority for special assessment expenditures in the 2006 Proposed Budget for the Street Reconstruction-City Contribution to State and Federally Aided Projects capital paving program.

# **OVERVIEW**

- 1. The 2006 Capital Improvements Budget provides funding for Street Reconstruction City Contribution to State and Federally Aided Projects. Funding includes \$6,467,072 for this program, an increase of \$5,028,265, 649.5%, from the \$1,438,807 provided in the 2005 Budget. The city funding of \$6,467,072 is in new borrowing, anticipating \$23,460,229 in Grant & Aid for state and federally aided projects, without any funding financed under TID borrowing authority for 2006.
- This program is designed to improve the city's surface public ways, reflecting the city's portion to aided projects. Funding for this program is project driven and timing for projects are based on receipt of funding. The 2006 Proposed Budget provides \$6,467,072 for this program, an increase of \$5,028,265, 649.5%, from the \$1,438,807 provided in the 2005 Budget. The city funding of \$6,467,072 is in new borrowing, anticipating \$23,460,229 in Grant & Aid for state and federally aided projects, without any funding financed under TID borrowing authority for 2006.
- 3. This is a technical amendment. The department also requested \$682,900 in funding for assessable projects. The amount was omitted from the 2006 Requested and Proposed Budget. The 2006 assessable amount of \$682,900 will increase city's portion of aided projects to \$7,149,972.
- 4. There is a shortage of 2005 funds resulting in higher bids received by the State due to the added demand on labor and materials caused by the construction work on the Marquette Interchange. Some of the 2005 projects will have to be funded with 2006 funds. Projects will be prioritized to meet funding allocations.

# **IMPACT**

- 1. This technical amendment adds \$682,900 in appropriation authority for special assessment expenditures in the 2006 Proposed Budget for the Street Reconstruction-City Contribution to State and Federally Aided Projects capital paving program.
- 2. The budget increases by \$682,900, and the tax levy is \$0. The tax rate is \$0.000 per \$1,000.

<u>AMENDMENT INTENT</u> – This amendment provides position authority, funding, FTE's, and operating expenditures for one Mini-Concrete Crew, which includes one Street Repair Crew Leader, one Cement Finisher Helper and one City Laborer.

# **OVERVIEW**

- 1. In the 2006 Proposed Budget for Infrastructure Services Division, the number of authorized positions is 697, a decrease of 14, -2.0% from the 711 authorized in the 2005 Budget.
- 2. The Infrastructure Services Division is responsible for the design, construction, and maintenance of streets and alleys, bridges, sidewalks, traffic control devices and streetlights. It coordinates transportation improvements with other governmental agencies and railroad companies, undertakes engineering studies and investigates various permits, plans, and easements.
- 3. In the 2005 Budget, a Mini-Concrete crew was eliminated. The seasonal positions in the crew include one Street Repair Crew Leader, one Cement Finisher Helper and one City Laborer. The department stated the crew works from April through November.
- 4. The Mini-Concrete crew handles the repairs of small concrete projects and street light cuts, and performs repairs on sidewalks.

#### **IMPACT**

- 1. This amendment adds position authority, funding, FTE's, and operating expenditures for one Mini-Concrete Crew within the Infrastructure Services Division.
- 2. The budget and tax levy will increase by \$52,016. The tax rate will increase by \$0.002 per \$1,000.

This amendment will reduce the proposed expenditure for major capital equipment by \$200,000.

This program is specified for equipment that exceeds \$50,000 and has a life expectancy of at least 10 years. This money is proposed to focus upon equipment replacement funding including garbage and recycling collection, snow and ice control and pick-up and dump trucks for use as pool equipment.

The average of all current equipment is comprised of fairly new equipment plus pieces that far exceed 10 years. At this time, the average age of all equipment comprising the city fleet is 9.9 years. The optimal maximum average age of municipal fleet equipment is 8.5 years.

Amendment #83, which was approved, proposed limiting the salary adjustment in total (any combination of "cost of living" adjustment and any other salary steps) for all management employees earning more than \$90,000 annually in 2005 to 3.1% in 2006. The budget and tax levy would decrease by \$100,000 and the tax rate would decrease by \$0.004 per \$1,000.
- 5. In this amendment for 2006, there would be no step increases for managers with annual salaries more than \$90,000. The step increments are eliminated. Managers with an annual salary over \$90,000 are limited to the "cost of living adjustment", added to their pay structure.

#### **DEPARTMENT PROFILE**

MFD has 37 engine and 16 ladder companies, along with 11 paramedic units, all staffed with sworn members. There are 6 Battalions. A Captain or Lieutenant, a Heavy Equipment Operator, and 2 Firefighters man each 4-staff apparatus. Another Firefighter/Paramedic is added to 5-staff teams. The Fire Captain commands fire alarms before the Battalion Chief arrives.

"Fire" alarms include any dangerous situation, which is not classified as medical, such as gas leaks, oil spills, water leaks, electrical problems, malfunctioning appliances, and extrication from vehicles involved in accidents. For a fire or hazard alarm, the minimum MFD response is an engine and a ladder but a typical response would include 3 engines, 2 ladders, a fire squad, and 2 Battalion chiefs.

#### **OVERVIEW**

#### Deputy Chiefs

- The Matrix Consulting Group was hired to evaluate the operations and efficiencies of the Milwaukee Fire Department.
- The study recommends reducing staffing including eliminating 2 Deputy Chief positions and merging the Bureaus of (1) Administration, (2) Construction and Maintenance, and (3) Technical Services into a new Bureau of Support Services.
- The incumbent(s) may bump back into Battalion Chief rank; however, the department anticipates a retirement in the Deputy Chief rank before December 31, 2005.

#### Battalion Chiefs

- As of July 2003, the Fire Chief appoints Battalion Chiefs without benefit of a Fire and Police Commission eligibility listing. Of the 23 Battalion Chiefs authorized, 3 are grant funded and 3 are reserve positions.
- Each Battalion Chief is responsible for incident safety management, providing public information at incident scenes, and ensuring minimum staffing requirements per battalions during the 3 shifts.
- Eliminating Battalion Chief positions may result in incumbents bumping back into Fire Captain positions, who could bump back into Fire Lieutenant positions, who could bump back into Heavy Equipment Operator positions, who could bump back into Firefighter positions, should no

vacancies exist within an affected job classification.

Ladder Company Staff Reductions

• The 2006 Proposed Budget also provided for reducing daily staffing on 4 engine and 8 ladder companies from 5 to 4 personnel at a \$1,813,782 budget and tax levy savings (salaries calculated at 2003 pay rates). To reduce staffing among these companies would each lose 3-firefighter positions per 24-hour day.

2006 Proposed Operating and Equipment Purchases Expenditure Totals

- The 2006 Total Operating Expenditures increased \$134,500 over 2005 levels to \$3,993,751. Of this increase, \$100,000 is related to moving firehouse-painting costs from the "reimburse other departments" account. In the past, DPW provided the services on a reimbursable basis until 2005 when these projects began going out on competitive bids a process that will continue in 2006. Telephone, water and sewer costs are also charged to this line item.
- The 2006 Proposed Budget provides \$501,725 for various Additional and Replacement Equipment Purchases, including \$30,000 for 2 staff response vehicles and \$56,000 for 2 trucks/vans for the Fire Fighting decision unit.

## Amendment

This amendment does the following:

- Eliminates position authority, funding and FTEs for 2 Battalion Chiefs (reserve) at a \$153,316 salary savings but maintains 6 battalions
- Eliminates position authority, funding and FTEs for 1 Deputy Chief at a \$86,110 salary savings without resulting in a lay-off pending an anticipated retirement
- Transfers position authority from auxiliary to regular status for 24 firefighter positions and also creates FTEs and funding for those positions to restore staffing on 8 ladder companies at a \$1,170,637 total personnel cost (\$952,200 salaries plus \$218,437 overtime)

This amendment also does the following:

- Reduces Total Operating Expenditures by \$125,000 by eliminating funding for painting firehouses allocation in the Property Services budget line
- Reduces Total Equipment Purchases by \$86,000 by eliminating Vehicles (\$30,000) and Trucks/Vans (\$56,000) budget lines
- Increases the Fire Department budget by only the amount necessary that provides no impact to the tax levy assuming that the Comptroller recognizes the \$750,000 transportation aid revenue and that all budget amendments would not increase the tax rate beyond the proposed \$8.76 per \$1000.

#### **IMPACT**

This amendment increases both the budget and tax levy by \$720,211 and the tax rate by \$0.030 per \$1000. Full discretion over staffing on all apparatus types remains with the Fire Chief.

#### OVERVIEW

Fire Department

Positions in the Auxiliary Resource Program allow departments flexibility in filling a position in advance of an actual vacancy. The positions are not funded but the departments utilizing these positions reimburse DER for the employee's salary and benefits. The positions are utilized for transition purposes in training the replacement of a key employee.

The Fire Department's Management Accounting Officer (MAO) incumbent has been on extended family medical leave since December 2004. The position is not vacant. In May 2005, the Fire Department utilized an Auxiliary Resource position from the DER Auxiliary Resource Program to create a temporary Accounting Assistant III (PR 460) position and moved a current staff person into it (conditional promotion) to handle the MAO accounts payable responsibilities (other staff took on the other responsibilities).

In an email to LRB, the Fire Department reports that the MAO extended her leave through April 2006, and instead of continuing to reimburse DER under the Auxiliary Resource Program, the department prefers to create an unfunded Auxiliary Accounting Assistant III (PR 460) position. Upon the MAO's return to work, the person underfilling the position will revert to her former Office Assistant III (PR 425) position.

This amendment creates no impact since the department will absorb personnel costs within the adopted salary budget.

# **IMPACT**

This amendment create position authority and FTEs for an Auxiliary Accounting Assistant III (PR 460) position in the Fire Department Supporting Services decision unit resulting in no savings to salaries and fringe benefit, the budget, tax levy or tax rate.
