Proceedings had and testimony given in the above-entitled matter, before the UTILITIES & LICENSING COMMITTEE OF THE CITY OF MILWAUKEE, on the 21st day of January, 2005, reported by Donna Gulczynski of Milwaukee Reporters Associated, Inc.



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PROCEEDINGS

(NOTE: All City Personnel Were Sworn Under Oath Prior to These Proceedings.)

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Moving on to the 10:00 agenda, we have Ice Thomas, Class B Tavern application for Grown Folks at 7200 West Fond du Lac Avenue in the 2nd District. Good morning to you.

MR. THOMAS: Good morning.

MR. SCHIRO: Good morning.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Thomas, I presume?

MR. THOMAS: Yes.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. And you're here represented by?

MR. SCHIRO: John Schiro, S-c-h-i-r-o.

There are two other people who could possibly give testimony, and I have them near the front.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: We'll get to them in one moment. What I'll do is is ask Alderman Davis, the applicant, and any others who intend to testify in this matter, -- Can I see a show of hands? So we do have a number of individuals. This is cited for neighborhood objections. We'll ask anybody who wishes to testify in this matter, raise your right hand please, and we'll swear you all in en masse.

(Whereupon all witnesses were sworn under

oath.)

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And for Mr. Thomas, I need to ask you if you acknowledge receiving notice of today's meeting with the possibility that your application could be denied.

It is cited for a matter contained in the police report, as well as a neighborhood objection to loitering, littering, noisy patrons, traffic and parking problems, devaluation of the property in the area, concentration of alcohol beverage outlets in the area, and conduct detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the neighborhood.

MR. THOMAS: Yes.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Going around the horn, Health Department?

MR. BOND: Health Department needs entry for inspection.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Neighborhood Services?

MS. BENDER: Hold for occupancy and orders.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: You'll have to rectify those issues if you are approved, Mr. Thomas.

Sergeant Hogan?

SERGEANT HOGAN: Just one item. On January the 12th, officers went to the location regarding some information received that stripper parties were being

held there. The officers found no indication that that had been taking place, found no indication that the premises had been open for business recently, but the concern was that the individual that they did talk to made some statements indicating that perhaps this is a partnership rather than a sole proprietorship, and I'll let the counselor take it from there.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Counsel, do you have any comments or questions related to the police report? Anything that you can clarify for the committee at this point?

MR. SCHIRO: Your Honor, Mr. Vice Chair.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: I prefer Mr. Chair when I'm sitting in this seat, but --

MR. SCHIRO: The business will actually be run by Mr. Thomas as well as Cornell Stallworth, who is referenced in the police report. Mr. Stallworth is here. He's seated in the front. They have -- Quite frankly, they signed the lease. Did you both sign the lease?

MR. STALLWORTH: Yes.

MR. SCHIRO: Yeah, they both signed the lease. I was not involved in the application, so I wasn't aware they had one name.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Is this an application

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as a sole proprietorship? Because if it's a partnership, it should be coming before us as a partnership.

MS. BARRON: We have it as an individual sole proprietorship.

MR. SCHIRO: Well, because I came on board late, it is not clear to me -- You know, they're kind of working on this informally. Other than the fact that they're both on the lease, okay, the business is going to be in Mr. Thomas's name. But quite frankly, that's a little bit separate from the fact that they are both financially obligated on the lease. So, I'm not certain how they have structured it because they didn't see me until there became some concerns.

I think that the business is going to be owned by Mr. Thomas, but I think there's some financial obligations, and they have not worked out any kind of a partnership agreement or have nothing in writing, quite frankly, on how they're doing that. That's something I'll need to explore at some point.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, one of the other reasons why that may be of a concern here before us is that if there is indeed some type of partnership in terms of the ownership structure of this facility, both gentlemen would have to come forward in terms of providing fingerprints to the police department, would

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have to have a background check, and if that indeed was not done, we have an incomplete police report.

SERGEANT HOGAN: I, in fact, did look into Mr. Stallworth's background, and it's rather benign. I doubt that it would prevent the committee from approving the license. However, it sounds to me like it's a partnership in that Mr. Stallworth may have some financial interest in the operation. To that effect, I think the application is not correct, and that it does need to be filed as a partnership.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And there may be a problem with us hearing an application where it's not a proper application. We cannot take -- or bring this forward and render a decision on an application that may be problematic in terms of what is indeed before us.

Alderman Davis, do you have any thoughts on this? I'm assuming that -- Of any of the individuals who are here to testify in this matter, are there residents who are here in objection to this license? One, two, three, four.

Alderman Davis, let me just ask Mr. Schiro, if you want to take a brief moment, we can take the next matter on our license agenda. If you want to talk with your client and just see what his intentions

may be in terms of wanting to change this and bring this back forward as a partnership application. It sounds like that may be more appropriate. And otherwise there may be some real obstacles.

What I would like to do if nothing else, though, is hear from the residents who are present. We could take their testimony, and you could cross-examine them, because -- I don't know if they're objecting to this application, or -- If nothing else is potentially going to change, other than it being a partnership application, I would hate to have them already waited and have to bring them back. We could take their testimony, you could cross-examine them, we could hold the matter, have the transcripts, and then revisit it when you do have the proper partnership application. I mean does that sound acceptable here at this point?

MR. SCHIRO: Yeah, I agree. The neighbors that are here should be allowed to be heard now. They shouldn't have to come back because of a snafu in the application.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Do you want to take a moment and talk with your client?

MR. SCHIRO: Sure.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman, is it

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appropriate that we just hold this until we get through the next item, just allow a brief moment?

And I promise you we will hear from your constituents as soon as we get done with the next item.

ALDERMAN DAVIS: Well, you know, they've been sitting here for some time, Mr. Chair, and I know that some of them -- We had a community meeting last night, and they indicated to me how important this issue was, and I know that some of them have taken off of work, and they're -- they've come down here with a financial hardship, so I mean it -- I will, you know, adhere to what the committee will rule.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: What we'll do is -ALDERMAN DAVIS: Please take into
consideration the constituents who have made sure
that they came down here to testify on behalf of
their community.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: What I'd like to do, then, rather than take the next item up, we're just going to take a couple minute recess, and I'll allow you to speak. We'll take your matter up immediately afterwards, and that way we can hear from the neighbors. So we're going to take a brief five-minute recess.

(Recess held.)

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: We are back in session.

It is five minutes to 11:00. We have the single tavern application of Ice Thomas here before us.

Mr. Schiro, did you have an opportunity to talk with Mr. Thomas and how you want to proceed here?

MR. SCHIRO: I did, Mr. Chairman. It does appear that this is going to be a partnership. It would be my hope that we could have the committee consider the application, and in the event the committee would determine that an approval would be appropriate, they could go down and amend the application right afterwards.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, unfortunately we can't do that because it wasn't properly licensed as that, too, and it has to go through the proper notification as a new application. All applications must be on hand because -- For what period of time?

MS. BARRON: Well, for 14 days with no lease objection.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And that would be a new application, because we can't summarily just change it midstream here. So that's the problem.

What we'll still do is still proceed ahead. We'll allow Mr. Thomas and Mr. Stallworth then to go in afterwards, and they can immediately, after we're

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done here, provide the application. I think you have no objection here at this time to hearing from the neighbors, and then you can also provide the cross testimony if that's sufficient.

MR. SCHIRO: I have no objection. That's okay.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. At this point, Mr. Schiro, what I think would be more appropriate is, -- unless you deem otherwise, because we will have the applicant or applicants back at another time, -they can address the concerns over -- or you can respond to the concerns over the police report item at that time, if that's okay.

MR. SCHIRO: I agree.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: At this point, Alderman Davis, before we hear from the residents, is there anything you want to add at this time?

ALDERMAN DAVIS: Yes, sir. Mr. Chairman and committee members, a little data. We had two community meetings on this particular location. One meeting was on November 24th, the day before Thanksgiving, with 23 people showing up at that meeting. And the other meeting was last night, January 20th, and 17 members of the community showed up. We also did a postcard survey. With that

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postcard survey, with the addresses, we had four residents who approved, 31 residents who opposed. There were letters in opposition to -- The number of addresses that did not have any addresses, there were one to approve and four to oppose. And at this time, if I may, I'd like to submit this to the committee, if in fact for verification.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman, why don't we hold on to that, and I don't feel comfortable because of the fact that those individuals aren't here. Alderman Witkowiak wants to take a different ruling, we're going to rehear that matter. We've got your testimony for what it is, and certainly no one is going to question the credibility of your meetings nor the veracity of individuals that you represent.

I just have a question for you, Alderman Was the applicant present at either at one of Davis. those meetings?

ALDERMAN DAVIS: The applicant was present at the November 24th meeting, and part of my testimony will be based upon what he indicated to the community on November 24th, when there were 23 residents from the Wellington Park Neighborhood Association who were in attendance. There was some specific questions that was asked of the applicants at that time.

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indicated to the residents that Mr. Thomas was going to be the sole proprietor of this establishment, and Mr. Stallworth was in attendance and indicated that he would just be helping out at the location. After finding out that --

MR. SCHIRO: Excuse me, Mr. Chair.

ALDERMAN DAVIS: And public testimony will -- Or the residents will testify on that meeting, also, and I was present at that meeting.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schiro?

MR. SCHIRO: I think the question was fairly simple, and the answer is we were not notified. Despite my call to the alderman about the meeting, and despite the fact that the owners and my clients have asked to meet with the alderman, we were specifically not told about the meeting last night. That's the answer to your question, and I guess I would object to the alderman continuously providing what he wants to be testimony, which we really should hold till the next hearing.

I don't have an objection to accommodating the citizens, but I do object to the alderman advocating whatever agenda he has today and then doing it again next time, particularly since some of the information that he has, he has refused, and told me

he would refuse to give to me until he testified today.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I appreciate that, and it will be duly noted, Mr. Schiro. What I will say is I just wanted to see if the alderman had any groundwork to lay before hearing the testimony, and I think that we gathered he had a couple meetings, and that's how the residents were made aware of that.

MR. SCHIRO: Thank you.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Alderman Davis, is that sufficient before we go to the residential testimony here at this time?

ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chair, may I just give you some more information on that particular meeting?

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sure.

ALDERMAN DAVIS: There was some concerns about parking in this area. There have been residents in that area who have lived in that immediate area for over 30 years prior to the establishment. There were concerns with parking transitioning into the residential community.

On the maps that we have submitted, there is a layout of the establishment and also the adjacent liquor establishment next to it, and what that is going to depict is how close the residential community

is to this particular establishment. And you'll hear public testimony on how there have been problems with parking and also traffic patterns within this area.

I'm glad that the counsel revealed that he did approach me, and he approached me in a very hostile manner before this particular meeting, and I told him that I was a public official representing my community, and I was going to give public testimony to the committee. As you know, Mr. Chairman, and all of my colleagues, I try to operate above board, and I'm not going to pressured, and I'm not going to be --

MR. SCHIRO: Mr. Chair.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: One second.

ALDERMAN DAVIS: I'm not going to be pressured, and I'm not going to be intimidated to give a statement when I'm coming before a committee, which is a quasi-judicial body. If, in fact, he wants me to give a statement, then I want a city attorney present so we do not skew the information that he may try to deem to use against my constituents.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay.

MR. SCHIRO: I would just ask --

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schiro.

MR. SCHIRO: If we're going to continue on this line, then I'm going object to even listening to

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the citizens today. I really am trying to accommodate them, but I don't think this is fair to my clients.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: I will concur here that what we'll do is we'll move on to the citizen testimony and leave it there.

ALDERMAN DAVIS: That's fine.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Davis, if it's reasonable to you, I would prefer not to visit the concentration map at this time and allow you the opportunity to submit that when we have the partnership application before us, and then Mr. Schiro or the applicants can provide any questions they have related to that material at that time. So what we'll do is give it back to you. We won't have it entered in the record. We'll allow you to have an opportunity to do that. Mr. Schiro, it's a public document. You can request a copy of that.

What we can do at this time here, -- unless it is not accommodating, and you have a difficulty and would like to be seated, -- if you are okay with standing and providing your testimony, what we'd like to do is get the neighbors to come forward one by one. You can take the microphone that's here standing. We need to hear from you your name and your address for the record. You've all indicated objections. If you

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could, then, provide your reason or rationale to your objecting to the license at this location. So one by one, if you could have each of the residents come forward here. Good morning to you. Ma'am, if you could give us your name and address for the record, please.

MS. BOULTON: My name is Cassandra Boulton.

I live at 5111 North 58th Street.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I'm sorry. Your last name was Boulton?

MS. BOULTON: Boulton.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: B-o-l-t-o-n?

MS. BOULTON: B-o-u-l-t-o-n.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you.

Miss Boulton, you were previously sworn?

MS. BOULTON: Yes.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Please proceed.

establishment coming into the community as it is now because I think the community has been very lenient in allowing establishments to come in as it is, but right now we have too many taverns, liquor stores, and that sort. Due to the uprise of violence and traffic and nuisance within the area, and noise, we do not want another tavern side by side. We just do not want it.

We think that we have enough within the community, and 1 2 we just don't want. VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Miss Boulton, how far 3 do you live from the proposed location? MS. BOULTON: Five blocks. VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Five blocks. Are there other questions by committee of Miss Boulton at this Mr. Schiro, is there anything? time? 9 MR. SCHIRO: No. Thank you, ma'am. Thank you for your 10 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: 11 time. Next, please. Good morning, sir. MR. RAUCH: I'm not a speaker. 12 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Your name? 13 14 MR. RAUCH: Ronald Rauch, R-a-u-c-h. 15 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And Mr. Rauch, your address, please? 16 MR. RAUCH: 4938 North 74th Street. 17 18 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Please proceed. 19 MR. RAUCH: Okay. I object to this because 20 the previous bars they had in there, they brought cars into the neighborhood, and we've had problems with 21 them, so we actually don't need another tavern in our 22 23 area. We've had too many problems in the past, and we don't like that. 24 25 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Rauch, how long

have you lived at your address here?

MR. RAUCH: Over 30 years.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And how far would you say it is from the license location?

MR. RAUCH: It's probably about five, six blocks. Depends on how you want to count it, because some of the blocks are angle streets.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Angle streets.

MR. RAUCH: Yeah.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Now, what type of establishments were at this license location in the past?

MR. RAUCH: They had trouble with -- I don't know what the name was. I'm a block captain. In fact, my wife and I are in charge of the Block Watch Association, so I get a lot of information from the block captains, from the neighbors that are on that street, and I wish most of them were going to show up, or they said they were going to, but in the past we've had too many problems.

Cars are parked on Medford, and they block other cars from parking. Even the residents can't even park in front of their house. And when they quit the bar at night, they come down and throw bottles around and cans and other debris. So we don't need

1	another bar. Since that one's been closed down now or
2	shut down, we've had less problems.
3	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Now, there's more than
4	one tavern in this immediate vicinity; is that
5	correct?
6	MR. RAUCH: There's one right next door, I
7	believe it is. Or two doors down.
8	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: In terms of the
9	problems, do you have certainty that the problems
10	originated from this location, or is it a compilation
11	of the taverns?
12	MR. RAUCH: It could be, but since this
13	one's been gone, we've got less problems.
14	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Questions?
15	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
16	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Puente.
17	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Again, what was in this
18	location before it closed? Was it another tavern?
19	MR. RAUCH: It was another bar, yes.
20	ALDERMAN PUENTE: And how long was that bar
21	there?
22	MR. RAUCH: I couldn't tell you.
23	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Approximately more than a
24	year, less than a year?
25	MR. RAUCH: Yeah.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Maybe two?

MR. RAUCH: Two, three years, and a bar before that, so it's been a bar most of the time. And we've always had problems since we've had it there. There's no bar there, and now they want to open up another bar, so we want to see if we can eliminate -- We don't want any more problems.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you, sir.

ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair?

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Wade.

ALDERMAN WADE: Sir, I just want to be clear on this. You have an objection to any bar being in that location, or this particular bar?

MR. RAUCH: Any bar. We don't need any more bars in there, in our area. We have enough.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Rauch, just a follow-up. How long has it been in your estimation since the most recent bar has been closed?

MR. RAUCH: I couldn't tell you truthfully. We have another member here that lives closer, and they kind of watch.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: I mean has it been months, or do you think it's been over a year, or can you even give us a ballpark?

MR. RAUCH: I couldn't tell you, but a

couple months, I believe.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Miss Barron, do you have an indication?

MS. BARRON: The last license that was issued expired December 15th, 2003.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: So it's been a little over a year is what you're saying.

ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Wade.

ALDERMAN WADE: Just one more question for you, sir. During your 25, 30 years in this area, have you experienced more problems from certain establishments and less from others, or have you always had a consistent problem with establishments in that area?

MR. RAUCH: We've had mostly problems in that area because they come from Fond du Lac. There's hardly any places to park on Fond du Lac, and if they do, they block traffic. So they come over on Medford and Ludington, and the neighbors can't even park in front of their houses.

And then when they come out of the bar, then they leave bottles laying all over on other people's yards, and they came through the yards, -- this is previous, -- and they have even urinated in some of

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the yards or on trees right there.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: So this has been consistent throughout the whole time, regardless of what establishment was in this location.

MR. RAUCH: Yeah.

ALDERMAN WADE: So no peak, no valley. This is consistently just what happened.

MR. RAUCH: Yeah. Mostly we rely on -Mostly we want to eliminate the traffic, the parking,
and the noise at the end. And I mean we, as a block
watch, we kind of watch that.

We had a beer depot there that was up for grabs -- well, somebody else bought it, and we went through the whole neighborhood to see if any of the neighbors would object. We had a couple objections, but it was mostly because of who they were, all right? And we just told them we have to give them a chance, and they're doing good. He got the pornography books off the shelves, and he's doing good. And we got block captains and other neighbors watching, and if he starts dealing with drugs or anything, he's out of there.

ALDERMAN WADE: Well, I appreciate you coming down here and providing testimony and doing your job as the block captain.

MR. RAUCH: Okay. 1 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Hold on one second. 2 Miss Bender, do you have any indication as to what 3 the most recent capacity was at that location? MS. BENDER: 150. VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm sorry, 150? 6 MS. BENDER: 150. VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And other questions of 8 Mr. Rauch? 9 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chair. 10 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Dudzik. 11 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Sir, did your block watch 12 group hold a meeting on this topic? 13 14 MR. RAUCH: Yes. Alderman Davis brought it up because he brought stuff around, and we've had 15 cards that we're doing to really find out about this 16 17 place for a license, and we when we found that out, --ALDERMAN DUDZIK: I understand that. 18 I'm trying to get at is whether you are authorized by 19 your block watch association to speak on their behalf 20 21 against this particular location. 22 MR. RAUCH: No, I'm just down here just because of that. 23 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Thank you. 24

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by

committee? Mr. Schiro, any questions?

MR. SCHIRO: Just a couple quick ones.

Sir, there's apparently a strip club next door to this location; is that right?

MR. RAUCH: There used to be a strip club, yeah, it got through.

MR. SCHIRO: I mean there is --

MR. RAUCH: I think so, yeah.

MR. SCHIRO: And there's a parking lot attached to this location; is that right? Are you aware of that?

MR. RAUCH: I don't go over that way because there's always big problems over that way. I'm six blocks away, so it doesn't bother me that much, but since we're the head of the block watch, we hear all these other people complaining. That's why we got other people down here that are closer.

MR. SCHIRO: So your concerns are what people told you, not what you know.

MR. RAUCH: Well, when you go gown there at night, there are cars parked there on Medford and Ludington.

MR. SCHIRO: But you don't know whether those people are going to the strip club or someplace else, correct?

1	MR. RAUCH: We don't know, no.
2	MR. SCHIRO: Thank you. Appreciate you
3	coming down.
4	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chairman?
5	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Davis.
6	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Stargazer's is not a strip
7	club, and I think the Licensing Division will make
8	sure that they do hold a cabaret license, but we went
9	through this before when they got their license
10	renewed, so counsel needs to make sure that he doesn't
11	mislead other constituents who may be watching the
12	Utilities and Licenses Committee. We do not have a
13	strip club in the 2nd Aldermanic District in that
14	location.
15	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: I think there may have
16	been one in the past that went through a new licensing
17	and holds a cabaret and tavern dance, but may not be a
18	formal gentleman's club or strip club.
19	MR. SCHIRO: I just looked at the sign.
20	I've never been in there.
21	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
22	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Puente.
23	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Real quick. This
24	location, is this abutting the freeway?
25	MR. RAUCH: Yeah.

MR. RAUCH: It's right across the residents are from an area that runs between residents four or five blocks. VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: It abuts Fond of there. ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. Thank you. ALDERMAN BOHL: No other quest: committee? Thank you.
