When neighbors came to me about him working on his bike and starting it at 2:00 a.m. because he works 2<sup>nd</sup> shift in Chicago, I told him that it was unacceptable and it had to stop and it did. He has moved to a new neighborhood.



I would like to respond to noise complaints that were filed against the Plainfield Pub located at 3<sup>rd</sup> and Plainfield Avenue

My name is Chris Fuhrman. I previously lived at 4151 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> St. I own a Harley Davidson motorcycle with straight pipes. I work for United Airlines in Chicago, Illinois on second shift. I carpool with other employees to and from work on a daily basis. I don't arrive home until 1:00 a.m. When I arrive home, I am still awake from work, I tend to sleep on the way home when it is not my turn to drive. Some nights I will go out to the garage and work on my motorcycle. I will drive up and down the alley to test the motorcycle. One night the motorcycle even broke down in the center of Plainfield Ave. I had to call a friend up to help remove it from the middle of the road. My roommate did mention to me I shouldn't be working on my motorcycle, or driving it in the alley that early in the morning. I have since moved away from the neighborhood. I apologize for any complaints received from the neighbors.

I ask that you please reconsider your decision to suspend the license on the Plainfield Pub for 10 days. The owners of the tavern or their patrons were not responsible for the noise complaints regarding my motorcycle.

Dear James A. Bohl Jr. & Members of the Milwaukee Common Council,

I am writing in response to the **10 day suspension of Class "B" Tavern License of Debra A. Seibel as agent of the Plainfield Pub**. I am deeply disturbed by the complaints that have been made about the customers on Motorcycles & customers on Packer Sundays.

- 1.) First of all I'd like to address the loud noise at bar closing from motorcycle patrons. I take offense to the complaint of loud revving of the engine noise from the cycle riding patrons. My husband who drives a 2003 anniversary edition Harley Davidson touring bike with stock pipes; is one of 5 patrons who own a motorcycle. We are all professionals in our 40's and 50's who are responsible, decent, and hardworking citizens. We like to go out and ride as a group together. We also obey all drinking & driving laws with a designated driver on each bike. Upon leaving we are very aware of the time and we exhibit common courtesy for the residents in all neighborhoods at all times. I have seen and observed a neighborhood resident with a very loud bike who flies through out the community late at night without regard for anyone including his own safety. We have set high standards for ourselves and also the children we have raised in all social settings and we resent the accusations that were made against us. The reason the Milwaukee Police could report no findings were because they didn't take place at the Plainfield Pub, the offender had already pulled into his driveway.
- 2) This next clarification is for the Packer Game on Sunday with an unknown male. My husband and I were once again in attendance at this packer game. You are in fact correct when you state that a gentleman left the bar and vomited outside. Let me give you the **unedited** version. The gentleman entered the bar very intoxicated with a group of his friends and was refused service. After sitting and stewing about it, he said he would walk home. My husband followed him outside because he wanted to make sure he didn't get behind the wheel of a car. Upon his exit the man vomited and kept walking, my husband came back inside and reported it to the owners Deb & John. John being the consummate professional quietly walked in the back & got a bucket of hot water to wash down the side walk not once but 4 times. After the outside was cleaned up he walked over to the group the intoxicated man had come in with and calmly asked them never to bring him in there again. All of this took place & was completed within 20 min. of the unfortunate incident.

3) As far as the patrons throwing beer bottles, and cans into neighbors yards this is untrue. At the Plainfield Pub everyone is told there are **no carry outs allowed from this establishment under any circumstances.** My sister has lived for 10 years within 3 blocks of the bar & has found bottles and cans in her yard on occasion. Long before the Plainfield Pub was opened. I have taken my children to the nearby grade school to play on the playground over the last 10 years during some of our visits and have seen empty alcohol containers, soda cans, cigarette packs etc. on the playground on many different occasions. I as an educated mature woman look around and see the graffiti, litter and think what a shame the teenagers have done this to such a nice neighborhood. I teach at a middle school and work with "At Risk" teenagers who have emotional problems so I am well aware that not all teenagers are unruly or perfect. I am also the mother of 3 teenagers who are very responsible, caring and well behaved.


I really think the neighbors need to get together and establish a neighborhood watch along with the Pub to ensure safety, well-being, and protection of all. This would help insure the end of "*blaming existing problems*" (which I've witnessed for the last 10 years), on a new family owned and operated establishment that is only one year old.

4) I, my husband, & friends travel from Muskego, to the Plainfield Pub which is approximately 25 minutes from our home to socialize in an adult, and even more importantly, family atmosphere. None of us are looking to pick up dates, purchase illegal substances, or cause any problems to the locals or the community. We're regular customers who come in to watch a game on the weekend or dance to the music in the Jukebox on Friday or Saturday evening. I was at the Plainfield Pub last Saturday Jan. 24th dancing to the music of Alan Jackson, Helen Reddy and Nancy Sinatra when a young group of 22-26yr. old people came in, had a beer, and left. Upon their exit they were commenting on how boring this bar is. **At my age boring is good.** Plainfield Pub owners Deb & John are caring, considerate people who deserve a chance and shouldn't be punished because of complaints that are unfounded & untrue. They have 3 beautiful grandchildren who have come by to celebrate a birthday or to trick-or-treat. I'm sure if this was such a crude, rowdy environment we wouldn't have had the pleasure of seeing all of the neighborhood kids on Halloween coming into the Plainfield Pub for a treat with their parents.

Plainfield Pub is a family environment with regular customers ranging in age from mid 30's to late 70's. The exterior is an asset to the neighborhood with it's neat well kept appearance, shoveled walks, trimmed grass and flowers in the summer. It's the kind of place to hold a retirement party, baby and/or wedding shower, or a welcome home party. Between my house and the Plainfield Pub there are plenty of bars we could frequent. However my husband and I aren't big drinkers nor do we care for the setting of a young, loud crowd in a tavern that is smoke filled and flooded with obnoxious people. Here we have found new friends, people that reside in your community who work hard each and every day to build upon what they have and to give you a better district to represent. I hope you take into consideration all I have shared with you and will help Deb Seibel to appeal her suspension. Thank you for your consideration and I look forward to hearing from you soon.

Dear Members of Utilities and Licenses Comm,

My name is Jeff Edgar. I reside at 407 W. Bottsford Ave. I am a home owner and have resided in the neighborhood for 3 1/2 years.

This letter is in response to a hearing held on January 27, 2004 for renewal of the license for the Plainfield Pub. I would like to use this letter to dispute comments from the neighbors that were made at this hearing, and to address your findings from this hearing in a letter dated January 29, 2004 and mailed to the licensee of the Plainfield Pub. I will number my responses to coincide with your letter.

5a. One of the neighbors states he has lived in the neighborhood for 34 years. He mentioned he did not have problems with the former

5a. owners. However, when he was asked if he had approached the new owners of the tavern regarding his concern with noise, he stated, "No, I was afraid to." He stated he had a confrontation with the previous owner, and the previous owner was going to sue that this neighbor move. At this point, one of the members of the board should of asked the neighbor what led to the confrontation and what were the circumstances. It seems this neighbor had issues with the previous owner, but never said what they were.

When Debbie and John knew the purchase of the tavern was approved, they walked around the neighborhood within a two block area of the tavern and distributed approximately 175 fliers. These fliers stated they were the new owners of the tavern, and let the neighbors know if they had any issues or concerns to contact them personally. They were trying to be approachable and to address concerns in the neighborhood.

5 b, c a neighbor complained there



5 b, c is noise from motorcycles leaving the tavern. The police are called, but by the time the police arrive, the motorcycle is gone. Debbie Seibel, owner of the Plainfield Pub stated there is a neighbor who lives up the alley from the neighbor and the tavern. This neighbor works on motorcycles in his garage and drives them up and down the alley to be tested. The neighbor who complained about the noise never disputed this fact.

5d Another neighbor complained of noise coming from the tavern. Debbie and John Seibel have replaced the windows in the tavern. The windows that are in the back of the tavern and face the neighbors with the complaint do not open. The two side windows that face Plainfield are only open downward and not out. This was to allow for the windows to be open on a rainy day and not have water come in the tavern. I have never parked my car and heard noise from the tavern. The back door of the tavern is closed and is only used as an emergency exit and to take out garbage. The back

5d door is never used as a entrance or exit by the patrons. The front door of the tavern faces 3RD Street, away from the neighbors who complained of noise. There is a vacant lot in front of the door. This lot extends about 30 yards to 3RD Street. There are no homes directly facing the front door of the the tavern.

A neighbor also complained of motorcycles revving their engines for 10-15 before departing. I found it hard to believe that there were not more complaints from the neighbors if patrons were revving engines for this period of time. Debbie did state on one occasion she did hear one of her patrons leaving the tavern and revving his motorcycle engine.

[REDACTED]. He told Debbie not to worry about it when she spoke to this patron about the noise. As far as I know, there has not been another incident with this patron.

The Harley-Davidson festival

5d. brought 1,000's of bikers into Milwaukee. I live three blocks from Beer Bellies on 5th and Hayton. This was a major hang out during the festival for the bikers. They had a beer garden outside and live music. I heard motorcycles coming and going all day from Beer Bellies. However, I knew this was a temporary problem and wasn't overly concerned. I know neighborhoods all over Milwaukee had noise complaints during the Harley-Davidson festival last summer.

5e I frequent the Plainfield Pub about two times per week. I have never known her patrons to be rowdy or loud. I have never seen a fight in the tavern, let alone an argument. All of the patrons of the Plainfield Pub are relatives, friends or people who live in the neighborhood. Most of the patrons who live in the neighborhood are retirees. They come to the Plainfield Pub because it is quiet and everyone knows you. These patrons would never do anything to jeopardize

5e the license of this establishment.

Debbie stated they never allow anyone leaving their tavern to have a beer in their hand. One of the neighbors complained of beer bottles and cans in her yard. Debbie stated she only has three customers who drink can beer. These customers are elderly. I know they're not responsible for the beer cans. I don't doubt this neighbor has found beer bottles or cans in her yard, but to say they are coming from patrons of the Plainfield Pub is wrong.

This neighbor also complained of patrons urinating behind her garage. Has she personally observed this? There is a bathroom right by the exit to the tavern. I can't imagine someone leaving the tavern, walk down to this neighbor and decide they are going to urinate behind her garage. This is a residential area. People are coming and going all hours of the day in this neighborhood. I would think someone else had witnessed this public urinating and file a complaint.

5 F I was at the tavern watching the Packer game when this complaint happened. The person in question walked into the tavern with another male. The person who got sick outside was never in the tavern. According to Debbie, the male he was with only comes into the tavern once a month. Debbie did not serve the gentleman who later got sick because he appeared he had already had too much to drink. I know this for a fact because I was sitting next to both of these people. Debbie did tell them both to go have something to eat. She usually puts out food during Packer games. About 10 minutes later, another customer came in and said someone was throwing up outside. Debbie's husband John immediately went outside. The person who was throwing up was already gone. John proceeded to dump 5-6 pails of water on the vomit to clean the sidewalk as good as he could under the circumstances. He also spread out some salt on the sidewalk so the water wouldn't freeze.

5 j The alderman states he has observed the front door being open after 10:00 pm. He states on a second occasion he called the police even though there were no complaints from the neighbors on this particular night. I thought the alderman was to work for the residents and business owners? I found it disturbing the alderman would take it upon himself to contact the police. I would hope in the future he would warn the establishment and let them know they will be issued a citation if this persists.

I have known Debbie and John Seibel for one year. I find them to be honest and concerned for the well-being of their patrons and neighbors.

Debbie and John are a part of this neighborhood. They are currently trying to sell their home on Hayton Ave. in the city of Cudahy. They have taken on a large financial burden to make this business adventure work.

Debbie and John don't go home at night to a home in the suburbs. The Plainfield Rub is their home. They have living quarters above the tavern. They have made substantial improvements to the tavern.

Debbie has planted flowers and John keeps the lot east of the tavern mowed and tidy. Even one of the neighbors who complained stated she sees John picking up trash and cigarette butts even though this trash comes from other sources in the neighborhood.

I know Debbie and John don't have as much time in their neighborhood as others, but I do know they have as much invested.

I ask that you reconsider your decision for a 10 day suspension of their license. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me at 489-7626.



We met John and Deb through my sister and brother-in-law who live in the neighborhood and frequent the Pub. Being big Packer fans, they have a lot in common. My family typically doesn't frequent a lot of bars for the following reasons:

- Safety issues – I've been in well known establishments where I've hidden my jewelry because of some of the customers or the atmosphere of the bar. The customers that I've met at the Plainfield Pub are nice local neighborly types. Nice people, telling other nice people of a nice place to meet at.
- Cleanliness – I've been in bars where you don't even want to venture into the restroom no matter how bad you have to go. The bathroom at John and Deb's place is amazingly clean. The fixtures sparkle, supplies are plentiful and the corners are clean. There's even hand lotion!
- Parking – There have been times at other bars, on the south side, that I was hesitant to walk out alone. At the Pub, parking is readily available in a well-lit and safe neighborhood.

We are homeowners in Greenfield, very close to a relatively new bar, Fat Boy's. This is an establishment clearly on the other end of the spectrum from the Plainfield Pub. Fat Boy's has no regard for late night noise, trash is never picked up, there isn't a friendly attitude and they don't seem to care about the neighborhood they make their money in. We prefer to travel to enjoy the Plainfield Pub.

In today's society, the Plainfield Pub is a hidden treasure. In the year that they have been open, both John and Deb have worked hard to establish their business and make their home right above it. If they didn't care, they'd live somewhere else and just come to the Pub to make money. That's not the case, they want to live with their business and socialize with those that stop by. 

Re: Alderman of the 13<sup>th</sup> District's recommendation of license suspension for "Plainfield Pub" and the acceptance of that recommendation by the Utilities and Licenses Committee.

In defense of Debra Seibel owner/operator of the "Plainfield Pub", I feel is getting a raw deal with the alderman of the 13<sup>th</sup> district. I can't see the justification of a 10 day suspension for hearsay, false accusations and lies by said accusers. The Committee itself said were no findings in the police report that could form a basis for nonrenewal or suspension.





I am writing regarding the proposed license renewal for Deb and Johns Plainfield Pub, located at 312 West Plainfield, Milwaukee, WI 53207.

My husband and I have been residents in this neighborhood since 1987. Prior to purchasing our home, my husband rented an apartment on South 5<sup>th</sup> Place for 16 years. As you can see we are long time residents. I am very upset over the possibility that the license to operate this business may not be renewed. We have been patrons of this business for many years. When the current owners took over the business we were immediately impressed with the steps they took to improve the premises, both on the outside and on the inside. This has always been a small neighborhood tavern. It's the kind of place where people gather and talk about the events of the day or just exchange a friendly hello. If you stop by in the evening more than likely The Wheel of Fortune will be on T.V and a number of patrons will be trying to be the first to solve the puzzle. Customers vary in age from early 30's to late 60's. There are a few active and retired law enforcement folks who stop in regularly. This is not the type of customer base that produces a nuisance environment for the neighborhood. I have never witnessed a fight at this establishment nor have I ever been treated rudely by anyone. This is not something I can say about some other establishments in the area. I have never seen broken bottles or trash left on the sidewalks or streets.
