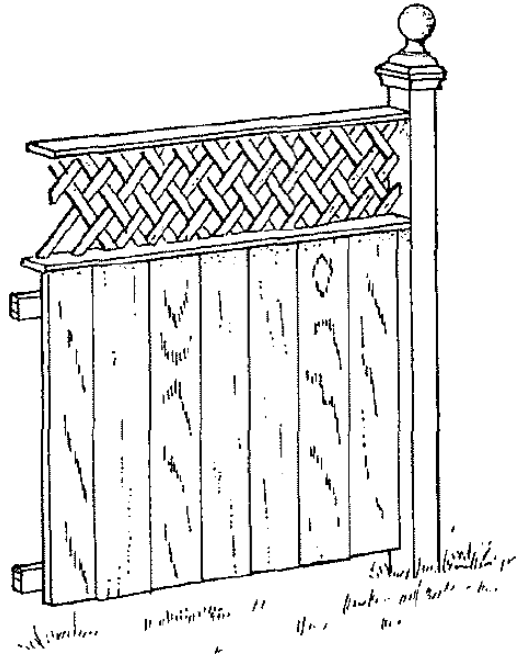
All work is to be done in compliance with building codes and with a formal permit for construction from the Development Center. Recommend use of decay-resistant wood such as cedar, white oak, cypress, redwood, etc.

All work must be done in a craftsman-like manner, and must be completed within one year of the date this certificate was issued. Staff must approve any changes or additions to this certificate before work begins. Work that is not completed in accordance with this certificate may be subject to correction orders or citations.
