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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: The next in the 2nd
3	District, Mohammed Amir, Agent for "Siddique,
4	Incorporated," 24 hour establishment application
5	for Citgo Express Pantry at 5656 North 76th
6	Street.
7	Good morning.
8	MR. GIMBEL: Again, good morning, Mr.
9	Chairman, members of the committee. Franklin
10	Gimbel appearing with and for Mr. Amir in
11	connection with his application. There are also
12	a number of people who are here to give testimony
13	in support of this application.
14	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And for Mr. Amir, we'll
15	swear you in, if you could raise your right hand.
16	Can I just see a show of hands of individuals who
17	are here to testify on this matter. I was
18	wondering where everyone was coming from. We'll
19	have We'll swear you all in at one point. Is
20	anybody who is here to potentially testify, just
21	raise your right hand at this point, we'll swear
22	you all in at once.
23	MS. ELMER: Do you solemnly swear to
24	tell the truth, the whole truth, nothing but the
25	truth, so help you God?

00003 THOSE PRESENT: I do. 1 2 CHAIRMAN BOHL: And for Mr. Amir, 3 specifically, do you acknowledge receiving notice 4 of today's meeting with the possibility that this 5 application can be denied? There are an 6 assortment of - - of objections in addition to an 7 attach - - attachment, which is a e-mail from the 8 police department regarding cruising. 9 MR. GIMBEL: I would acknowledge 10 receipt of the applica - - the notification, Mr. 11 Chairman. I would, however, feel obligated to 12 object to the general, unspecific allegations 13 that are asserted in this notice as - - as 14 ostensible reasons for the potential denial of 15 this license, and in particular, I object to the 16 language that reads as follows: "That 24 hour 17 establishment will be the source of excess 18 traffic, loitering, littering, disorderly 19 behavior and noise generated by such traffic." I 20 believe that that is not notice that permits my 21 client to prepare to protect his property right 22 in this business to stay open 24 hours. And it's 23 merely general prose unsupported by specific 24 facts. 25 CHAIRMAN BOHL: One second here, Mr.

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1	Gimbel. Mr. Gimbel, the notice is what it is,
2	and if there is testimony to substantiate that,
3	that's that's one thing. If it If it's
4	not substantiated, you know as well as I, it's a
5	it's a moot point. And anytime we have a
6	neighborhood objection, there aren't neighbors to
7	testify, the objection is a moot point. So we'll
8	see where it goes.
9	MR. GIMBEL: At this point in time. I
10	hope you
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Your Your objection
12	
13	MR. GIMBEL: I hope you You and or
14	your colleague, this is a lawyer making an
15	observation about what I believe to be an
16	insufficient notice.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Your objection is duly
18	noted here. Okay. All right. There is no
19	police report. Before we get to you here Mr.
20	Gimbel, we will go to Alderman Davis first on
21	this matter.
22	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Mr.
23	Chairman. I had also circulated and visited
24	constituents in this area, specifically an area
25	maybe about a hundred feet on 75th Street

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1	directly to the north, which has a very active
2	block club in this area, along Thurston Avenue,
3	which is the street that is the gas station
4	is on, from Thurston Avenue all the way to Silver
5	Spring, and I've got a consensus that they are
6	concerned about the establishment. They made it
7	very well They made me
8	MR. GIMBEL: I have to Excuse me.
9	I have to object to It's no
10	disrespect to Alderman Davis, but I think that -
11	- that his statement that something is a
12	consensus is not only hearsay, but it's it's
13	a statement of his, unsubstantiated. It's a
14	conclusion that he's reached.
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I would concur, and I
16	We'll allow Alderman Davis to move on,
17	but
18	ALDERMAN DAVIS: As an elected official
19	I'd like to represent the constituents who have
20	do put me in office, and part of that, Mr.
21	Chairman, is to attend and to knock on doors to
22	find out what concerns my constituents have.
23	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Davis, let me
24	just – – let me ask you one question. When – –
25	When you're expounding here, are you referring to

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1	a consensus of those residents that you,
2	vourself, were able to make contact with?
3	ALDERMAN DAVIS: That's correct.
4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And you don't purport
5	that if you did talk with others, that it was a
6	consensus of the entire neighborhood.
7	ALDERMAN DAVIS: That is correct.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Why don't you proceed.
9	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And that is the
10	the That is the whole basis of my comments is
11	that I spent time, as all of us do in the
12	district that we represent, talking to our
13	constituents, particularly when there is an issue
14	of quality of life. It is my responsibility, it
15	is my duty, and I take that role very seriously
16	as the representative of the 2nd Aldermanic
17	District. There are what we consider concerned
18	spots that has called that has called, not
19	only as I observed on early morning nights or
20	early mornings, but also, with residents standing
21	in their driveways and walking with them through
22	the neighborhood to identify where these concerns
23	come from. And this particular location, 5656
24	North 76th Street, is one of those locations.
25	I have two residents who stay not more

00007 1 than a thousand feet away from this establishment 2 who are willing to testify. Other residents who 3 could not make it here rely on me to make the 4 argument for them. I will not speak for them, 5 but I will make the argument for them on why this 6 particular 24 hour establishment needs to be 7 denied. 8 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Of the individuals who 9 - - who were sworn in are there any who are here 10 to testify in opposition? Two - - Two of you. I just want to get a show. We'll - - We'll get to 11 12 you one moment here. Mr. Gimbel. I'll let you 13 go first. 14 MR. GIMBEL: First and foremost, I 15 would, with your - - with your leave, that the 16 chairman offer to the committee, photographs of 17 this location within which what I ask you to look 18 for is the openness of the station in front of 19 its location, and the site - - and the site, 20 which is occupied. Also, I would like you to 21 observe that on two sides of the front of the 22 building my client has caused very discernible 23 signs to be posted that advise patrons or 24 potential patrons of the fact that should they

not abide by proper behavior standards, that is,

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1	loitering, loud music and noise, they will not be
2	provided the service.
3	I also want you to see, as a committee,
4	within within the interior of this location,
5	a great number of consumer items which it is my
6	belief, those people who are here in support of
7	this application will testify are of significant
8	interest to them to have access to in this
9	neighborhood on an around the clock basis. I
10	will give this first to Mr. Davis, and then ask
11	him to circulate it to the rest of the
12	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, I would
13	simply ask that the committee clerk individually
14	mark the photographs.
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: We will do so. Mr.
16	Gimbel, you may proceed.
17	MR. GIMBEL: Yes, and then if I might,
18	I would like to call some of the witnesses that
19	have
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: What we Normal
21	protocol is to hear from objectors first, so I
22	just wanted to allow you to have an opening
23	statement. Do you just want to provide that as
24	evidence at this point and then continue later.
25	MR. GIMBEL: We'll work from there.

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1	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. What we're going
2	to do at at this point, we will call the
3	the two ladies who are here to testify in
4	opposition to this item. We can have you take
5	the two seats here. For anyone who is here to
6	testify in this matter we're going to need to
7	bring you forward. We'll have to swear you in.
8	You'll have to provide your name and your address
9	for the record. Would ask if you have a very
10	difficult spelling of your name, if you could
11	please, for the record, spell that out for us,
12	and then any testimony pertinent to how you
13	either support or oppose the application before
14	us, and we'll start from my left to right, and
15	then we'll we'll start with you first here.
16	THE WITNESS: My name is Judith Tobolt.
17	I am the property manager for Tobolt Properties.
18	MR. GIMBEL: I didn't get the last
19	name. I'm sorry.
20	THE WITNESS: Tobolt, T-O-B-O-L-T.
21	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you.
22	THE WITNESS: And I am the property
23	manager for Tobolt Properties. Mr. Bohl, you and
24	I have met before. Our company is very pro-
25	active for our tenants. We have 15 units that

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1	are adjacent to this particular establishment.
2	Within the past two and a half months I have had
3	a tenant who was held up at gunpoint.
4	MR. GIMBEL: I'm going to object.
5	Unless Ms. Tobolt was present at the time of
6	these incidents that she's talking about, if
7	she's talking about it because somebody told her
8	about that, I'm going to object to the testimony.
9	THE WITNESS: I'm talking about it
10	MR. GIMBEL: Just a moment, ma'am.
11	THE WITNESS: All right.
12	MR. GIMBEL: I'm going to object to
13	anything that she testifies to that came to her
14	by someone else making the statement who is not
15	under oath and is not subject to cross-
16	examination.
17	THE WITNESS: It pertains to
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mrs. Tobolt. Yeah, I
19	THE WITNESS: It pertains to a
20	police report that can be obtained.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: No. It would have to
22	be a police report that would have to be cited in
23	this, like cited here. It would have to be
24	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, it could
25	be a newspaper article.

00011 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, that may be, but 1 2 we don't have it before us, first off. MR. SCHRIMPF: Well, but we can ask 3 4 her. 5 THE WITNESS: Okay. I can obtain - -CHAIRMAN BOHL: Secondly, Mr. Gimbel 6 7 was not provided that in advance, unless it's 8 provided here, and thirdly, we could be - - the 9 inability to surmise on what specifically it 10 listed the address. At this point only we are 11 not allowed to - - It's a quasi-body. There's 12 property rights vested in - - in any license. We 13 are not allowed to take hearsay evidence. So I -14 - If you could substantiate that from your own 15 personal knowledge as to what happened - -16 THE WITNESS: Then - - Then actually 17 then we can take the testimony from me, 18 personally. I was a resident at 7457 West 19 Thurston for three years. 20 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. 21 THE WITNESS: I approached the gas 22 station because of the litter, because of the 23 excess traffic. I approached - - approached the 24 alderman at the time. Please help me to do - -25 stop the traffic that was coming from that gas

00012 1 station. I pleaded because of the problems with 2 people dealing drugs from that back fence. There was a fence. We now own the property of 7510 3 4 West Thurston, and for three years I watched 5 people walking from the rear of that gas station 6 to around the side of the wooden fence at the - -7 at the south side of 7510 West Thurston to make 8 their drug deals and then the guys would walk 9 back down around the field. Personally, I 10 watched this for three years. Three years. 11 I have seen many people who have 12 disrespected our property at any given time. I 13 have asked that there be a fence put down there. 14 I have - - The garbage is ridiculous. And, yes, 15 they have no control what these people put on the 16 property after they leave the store. But I asked 17 for a fence to be put down there. I asked for a 18 lot of things that would have helped us. There 19 was no - - There was no issue made, no reference 20 made to me getting any help of any kind at all. 21 But I do know that when I walk - - When I go past 22 that station now, this past winter, there was a 23 car up on the lawn. I patrol these areas. I am 24 constantly on our properties. I have seen cars 25 there for years that stood in the lot, storage or

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1	otherwise. In the night I will I will go
2	out into the neighborhood, as many of the
3	neighbors over there do now. I I personally
4	can tell you that that service bay that was open
5	there was a a stronghold for young men who
6	were dealing drugs. A young man that killed a
7	tenant on the 7700 block stayed over there and
8	hawked CDs. He used to work for me. This is not
9	hearsay. This is nothing. Clarence was his
10	name. He shot a woman. He shot a woman in the
11	neighborhood, and he was allowed to be over there
12	and to sell CDs outside of the service bay.
13	The service bay was now closed down.
14	That's fine. It hasn't stopped the cruising. It
15	hasn't stopped anything else. Nothing at all.
16	Nothing at all. And personally when, hearsay I
17	know, someone can rob a tenant of mine and jump
18	over the back fence into the lot of the gas
19	station, I think something needs to be done.
20	Because they go into a public area and no one can
21	touch them.
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Is this a last
23	comments?
24	THE WITNESS: Well, I'm sorry. You can
25	feel that way. But we are talking about

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1	years and years of my personally seeing all of
2	these things going on. I do not live there
3	anymore. I do spend a lot of time in the
4	neighborhood, and I do listen to what my
5	constituents I have 55 units there 55.
6	And believe me, I am not going to stop just at
7	this right now, because there has to be
8	regulation. I don't want anyone to I don't
9	want to take anyone's livelihood away from them,
10	but you have to have regard for the neighbors.
11	There are many elderly people there, homeowners.
12	They can't all come down here. And it's It's
13	too bad they can't we can't represent them,
14	because I know Alderman You know, Alderman
15	Davis, he has talked to every one of these people
16	personally, and I have, also. But someone has to
17	regulate and someone has to look out for the
18	people in that neighborhood. We are doing
19	everything in our power to keep those properties
20	up, to keep the property value up. That station
21	is chasing away many of elderly tenants, not only
22	tenants, but elderly homeowners.
23	MR. GIMBEL: This is a speech, not
24	testimony.
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yeah, we we need to

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1	restrict this to testimony, Mrs. Tobolt.
2	THE WITNESS: That's fine.
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are you finished at
4	this point?
5	THE WITNESS: I I believe so,
6	except to say that I don't believe that there
7	should be overnight hours at all.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay.
9	THE WITNESS: For that station.
10	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Question by committee
11	of Ms. Tobolt?
12	ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman.
13	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon?
14	ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you. Ms.
15	Tobolt, I just wanted to ask you a couple
16	questions about your observations of drug
17	transactions over the three year period that you
18	testified to. In that three year period would
19	you break it down in terms of an average
20	observation of this kind of transacting going on
21	that you personally observed?
22	THE WITNESS: Alderman Gordon, they
23	were so blatant, they would do this in the
24	daytime and then walk back down to the station.
25	ALDERMAN GORDON: Okay.

00016 1 2 3	THE WITNESS: This could happen any day of the week. It did not make any difference. I
4	used to call the police, and the police would
4 5	come, and they'd always miss them. I gave them license plate numbers and whatever, but we can't
6	trace what's going on behind the building.
7	ALDERMAN GORDON: What I wanted to ask
8	you is that did you personally observe on a daily
9	basis what number of transactions taking place?
10	THE WITNESS: Two to three.
11	ALDERMAN GORDON: Per day?
12	THE WITNESS: Per day, oh, yeah.
13	ALDERMAN GORDON: Five days a week?
14	Six days a week?
15	THE WITNESS: Seven.
16	ALDERMAN GORDON: And they were during
17	all hours of the day?
18	THE WITNESS: All hours of the day and
19	night.
20	ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any other questions by
22	committee? Before we we just proceed. I
23	I want to have Alderman Gordon make the
24	photographs provided for us by Mr. Gimbel part of
25	our record. Hearing no objections then, so

00017 ordered. Mr. Gimbel? 1 2 MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. Ms. Tobolt, 3 when was it that you resided at 7457 West 4 Thurston Avenue? 5 THE WITNESS: I resided there from '90 6 - - '96 until '99. 7 MR. GIMBEL: So you have not been a 8 resident of the area within six blocks of this 9 station for the past five years. Is that 10 accurate? 11 THE WITNESS: No. I am the property 12 manager. 13 MR. GIMBEL: Just answer the questions, 14 if you would, please, ma'am. 15 THE WITNESS: No, I have not been a 16 resident. 17 MR. GIMBEL: Thank you very much. Now, 18 you answered Alderman Gordon's question about 19 this observation that you claim to have made 20 about drug transactions occurring on or about the 21 premises of my client at all times of the day. 22 How many of those transactions did you personally 23 observe between the hours of 12 midnight on any 24 given day and five a.m. in the morning? THE WITNESS: On two occasions when 25

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1	coming home late on on a weekend night, can't
2	say whether it was a Friday or Saturday night, I
3	did call the police in regard to young men
4	congregating at that same spot. Two cars that I
5	was that I knew personally were used by
6	people who were picking up or doing whatever, and
7	the police knew them too, were in this circle.
8	So at least two occasions after 12 o'clock at
9	night, I did observe these cars in that area, and
10	the police were aware.
11	MR. GIMBEL: Would you tell the
12	committee, please, what days those two occasions,
13	those two observations occurred? What date?
14	THE WITNESS: I do not know what date?
15	MR. GIMBEL: What year?
16	THE WITNESS: That would have been in
17	'98 right before I moved.
18	MR. GIMBEL: So since 1998 you have not
19	observed what you claim to have otherwise
20	observed, drug transactions after midnight and
21	before five a.m. in the morning for the last six
22	years. Is that accurate?
23	THE WITNESS: Not me personally, no.
24	MR. GIMBEL: That is accurate. Is that
25	correct?

00019 1 THE WITNESS: That's accurate. 2 MR. GIMBEL: Now, you also testified 3 here that there were people that were doing 4 things in - - behind the building of the station. 5 Is that right? 6 THE WITNESS: Yes. 7 MR. GIMBEL: What effect, if any, do 8 you believe the closing of this station from 9 midnight to five o'clock in the morning would 10 have on that activity continuing or 11 discontinuing? 12 THE WITNESS: I believe if there was no 13 - - no access to the public without, you know, if 14 the police would not - - would be able to watch that area a lot better. If it were closed, at 15 16 least we - - they could not say that they were 17 patrons of the station, then they could be - -18 they could be regulated on that basis. 19 MR. GIMBEL: I don't want to cut you 20 off. But you're saying potentially that you 21 think the police would work more effectively in 22 doing their work on this location if the station 23 were closed to the public as against being open 24 to the public? 25 THE WITNESS: During those overnight

00020 1 hours, yes, I do believe that. 2 MR. GIMBEL: And what's the basis of 3 that belief? 4 THE WITNESS: I believe that if they 5 had - - if they would have cars to go onto the 6 property because it was closed and there were not 7 - - you're not supposed to be on private 8 property. If there was a congregation of people 9 on that property in the overnight hours, then if 10 the station is closed, they have no business 11 being there and they could regulate it. 12 MR. GIMBEL: Well, this is a public - -13 public - - public invited place. You understand 14 that statement. 15 THE WITNESS: If it's open. 16 MR. GIMBEL: And so you're saying that 17 - - that the police would be able to go on the 18 premises and - - and - - and arrest people who 19 were there - -20 THE WITNESS: If after - -21 MR. GIMBEL: Let me finish the 22 question. 23 THE WITNESS: Okay. 24 MR. GIMBEL: - - who would arrest 25 people who were there because the station was

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1	closed rather than because of their behavior, of
2	the individuals' behavior?
3	THE WITNESS: If it were a posted
4	property, they would have they would have a
5	reason to question why those people were there.
6	If it was our property, and I have a posted
7	property, I have due cause, I have a reason to
8	call the police to come and to check what is
9	going on.
10	MR. GIMBEL: So it's your testimony, as
11	I understand it, to this committee and
12	justification of your opposition to the
13	application of my client for 24 hour permission,
14	that the police will enforce the trespass laws
15	and and be present and arrest people with the
16	station closed where they won't investigate and
17	arrest drug dealers if this station is open?
18	THE WITNESS: Well, if there are people
19	that are not supposed to be there on the
20	property, they have they have a reason to
21	question them. If there is a station that is
22	open and running there, they do not, and I have
23	been told this by the police. They may not go
24	They may not, unless there is a complaint
25	from a certain a person. They may not

00022 1	approach. They may not, unless they have
2	probable cause. And if you are on private
3	property if it's closed and it's posted, I would
4	just assume if it's like my property, I have
5	public I have I have private property.
6	If it's posted, you cannot go you can't go on
7	my property if you have no reason to be there.
8	If you have a posted property, I would I
9	would assume you're not supposed to be there.
10	You would have police checking it.
11	MR. GIMBEL: You haven't had any legal
12	friends, have you?
13	THE WITNESS: No.
14	MR. GIMBEL: You never worked for the
15	police, did you?
16	THE WITNESS: No, sir.
17	MR. GIMBEL: Okay.
18	THE WITNESS: But I work with them all
19	the time.
20	MR. GIMBEL: I understand. And And
21	we're happy for it. Now, is it true that you
22	have not been physically present at this location
23	from midnight to five a.m. in the morning since
24	1999 when you moved from the neighborhood?
25	THE WITNESS: I would not say not

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1	No, not Never say "never" to being present.
2	I have been there at times, but
3	MR. GIMBEL: I have nothing further.
4	Thank you.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Thank you,
6	Mrs. Tobolt.
7	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chairman.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Davis.
9	ALDERMAN DAVIS: I just have one
10	question, a couple of questions for Mrs. Tobolt.
11	Mrs. Tobolt, on the afternoon of April
12	10th, 2004 did you observe me walking in the
13	vicinity of that particular location?
14	THE WITNESS: Yes, Alderman Davis, I
15	was looking for you.
16	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And if you observed
17	me, did we make contact with each other and spoke
18	with each other?
19	THE WITNESS: Yes, we did.
20	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And, Mrs. Tobolt, do
21	you recognize this piece of paper that I'm
22	holding before you?
23	THE WITNESS: Yes, I do.
24	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And at that time did
25	you observe or did you observe and/or did you

00024 1 sign this piece of paper that I have before you? 2 MR. GIMBEL: I'm going to object to 3 this question. The line of question is A, it's 4 irrelevant, whether he circulated the 5 neighborhood and got - - got signatures. The 6 document is not enhanced in terms of its 7 admissibility by reason of someone having seen 8 Alderman Davis go door to door, see people sign 9 it. It's still hearsay. The people aren't here, 10 not subject to my cross-examination. They have 11 to take an oath. 12 CHAIRMAN BOHL: The only thing that - -13 The only thing that is functional does is it - -14 it provides credence that Alderman Davis was 15 there and that she signed it. It still doesn't 16 qualify the others who have not signed it. 17 MR. GIMBEL: My objection is to - - to 18 this request that Alderman Davis has a petition. 19 It has nothing to do with his quality as a public 20 servant. I know he's - -21 CHAIRMAN BOHL: And, Mr. Gimbel, we 22 know that as well, too, here. Alderman Davis - -23 ALDERMAN DAVIS: And I - - You know 24 exactly. 25 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Certainly.

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1	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And I just wanted to
2	make sure that this is not an Alderman Davis
3	request. This is a request from our community,
4	and, Mrs. Tobolt, on that Saturday, she was one
5	of many people that I I touched and discussed
6	this issue with. So for me, and I respect
7	Attorney Gimbel tremendously, if he if he
8	mentioned at the Common Council meeting, the last
9	Common Council meeting, he is the one who told me
10	that ethic pride is something that all of us
11	should be proud of. And I just want to make sure
12	that I'm putting my place I am generally
13	putting myself in a place where I've done due
14	diligence as a public official, and I I
15	wanted to ask Ms. Tobolt those questions so that
16	people understand that abuse of power is not an
17	issue here. It's one who a public official is
18	trying to make sure that they represent their
19	constituents at the best level that they can.
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And anyone who knows
21	you, Alderman Davis, knows that that's true.
22	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Mrs.
23	Tobolt, I appreciate it.
24	ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: Mr. Chairman, I
25	have a question.

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1	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Witkowski,
2	please proceed.
3	ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: As property
4	manager did you observe any drug dealing going
5	on, and if so, when and how many times?
6	THE WITNESS: As a property manager,
7	two years ago specifically, we had a tenant, now
8	removed, who turned out to be a wanted felon. He
9	lived at 7510, number one, on West Thurston. At
10	that time I had occasions to have the police
11	department, 4th District, do circum you know,
12	just do do the driveways, check the cars and
13	things, because they were they had approached
14	me about looking for someone I did not know. I
15	had not seen. During that time an officer and I
16	talked, and two cars that I recognized, and I
17	mean, these were well put together, older cars,
18	guys were working on, drove drove into the
19	circle and drove away. And then I I said to
20	the officer, I said, "Well, those There's two
21	of those guys. They're right there." And they
22	took off. By the time the police got around,
23	they had they circled one more time and they
24	went back. Now
25	ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: What's What's

1	your relationship to the station, the Express
2	Pantry, to them?
3	THE WITNESS: Directly to the back.
4	Directly. 7510 West Thurston and the fence for
5	the station adjoin.
6	ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: Thank you.
7	MR. GIMBEL: I move to strike the
8	answer as not relevant to the issues here that
9	happened two years ago daytime.
10	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, I It may lead
11	to something else. I I didn't necessarily
12	gather the correlation on that location, as well,
13	so. Alderman Witkowski, are you finished here?
14	ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: Yes.
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Thank you.
16	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ma'am, if we could get
18	your name and your address for the record, and
19	we'll move forward.
20	THE WITNESS: My name is Netta
21	Alexander.
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm sorry. Somebody
23	was coughing with the last name here.
24	THE WITNESS: Netta Alexander, and I
25	live at 6719 North 76th Street. Contrary to Ms.

00028	
1	Tobolt, I watch almost every night the activity
2	that goes on, because I am tired of this filling
3	station. You see drug deals every day, any time
4	of day, any time of night. Loud music. The
5	young people come through there with music any
6	particular night, any particular day. They sit
7	on the parking lot. She got young girls, young
8	males, standing on cars, continually walking the
9	alleys, especially after midnight going back and
10	forth to that filling station. My bedroom's
11	right off the alley, all the Everything goes
12	on from that corner. At times there's gunshots
13	there. The police get called. At one given
14	time, I think it was last year, two young men
15	were sitting on the curb in front of my home,
16	smoking weed, dealing drugs. I called the police
17	station. They asked me what did I want them to
18	do. Did I want them to call someone? No. I
19	just called because I didn't have anything else
20	to do. I called them like two in the afternoon.
21	Someone come to my home like five in the evening,
22	wanted to know was they still there. Of course
23	not. I called the alderman. I called his office
24	at this time. It has really gotten out of
25	control. My husband and I have to watch and

00029 1 observe young people, underage. I know they're 2 underage, because I've lived in the neighborhood 3 for excess of 16 years. Went to the station, 4 cigarettes were sold to them. All this kind of 5 stuff is going on and no one seems to care. Like 6 my husband said, they really want to know that 7 they had a video camera. They could check that 8 and see exactly what goes on. This is not my 9 first time down here about this. I'm losing 10 sleep.

11 I also have to watch on weekends for 12 traffic. That's when traffic is going all - -13 Traffic is going north on both sides of the street. I'm concerned about my property, my car 14 15 is sitting out there. They don't care. They 16 bump it. They don't care. Then Milwaukee's 17 finest come over there. They're a group of 18 whites, underage. They - - They actually told 19 them they should not be in the neighborhood 20 because it was dangerous for them. Did they 21 arrest them like they would some of our children? 22 No. They told them they better go home. They 23 sent them all somewhere. This is not something 24 someone told me. This is something I stood and 25 watched myself. Yes, I have concerns about this.

00030 1 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman. 2 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schrimpf, hold it 3 one second here. Mrs. Alexander, you've spoken 4 of loud music and the cruising, sitting on the 5 lot. Is this something that is happening during 6 the late night hours? 7 THE WITNESS: It's any time. Each night - - And I'm telling you what I've seen 8 9 because I can sit at my windows and watch it 10 going down. 11 CHAIRMAN BOHL: How - - How frequent is 12 this? And when - - when has this been occurring? 13 Is this something that's been a frequent 14 occurrence, something in the very recent past? THE WITNESS: This has been two or 15 16 three years. This is a regular thing. This is 17 regular activity. This is nothing new. Like I 18 say, I've been here before. 19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: And you - - You, 20 personally, have - - have contacted the police 21 department for this? 22 THE WITNESS: Oh, yeah. 23 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Mr. Schrimpf. 24 MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 25 When you say "two or three years," you're saying

1	for the last two or three years and continuing
2	right up to the present, or you only saw it two
3	or three years ago?
4	THE WITNESS: No, this is still today,
5	including this.
6	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay.
7	THE WITNESS: I've been there 16 years.
8	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. The cars that you
9	mentioned that went north on both sides of the
10	street, did those cars stop at this station or
11	did they leave from this station?
12	THE WITNESS: The parking station was
13	full, they left. And they find it all fun to go
14	out into traffic to just stop traffic.
15	MR. SCHRIMPF: And this is on 75th?
16	THE WITNESS: This is on 75th. The
17	alley is full. The street is full. They're on
18	the lawns. They just don't have anywhere else to
19	go.
20	MR. SCHRIMPF: And the two young men
21	that were sitting on your curb and smoking
22	THE WITNESS: There was about six of
23	them.
24	MR. SCHRIMPF: About six people sitting
25	on your curb and you could smell that they were

00032 smoking marijuana? 1 2 THE WITNESS: Yeah. MR. SCHRIMPF: Where had they come 3 4 from? 5 THE WITNESS: They come from the 6 station. 7 MR. SCHRIMPF: And you personally saw 8 that? 9 THE WITNESS: Yeah, I - -10 MR. SCHRIMPF: When was this? 11 THE WITNESS: I see these kids all the 12 time. 13 MR. SCHRIMPF: When - - Can you give me 14 an approximate date? 15 THE WITNESS: That was last year 16 sometime. I don't want to give an approximate 17 date, because - -18 MR. SCHRIMPF: Was it in the summer? 19 THE WITNESS: Yes. Yes, because it's 20 been winter. 21 MR. SCHRIMPF: And was it between 22 midnight and five a.m. or was it some other time? 23 THE WITNESS: No, this was like three 24 or four o'clock in the afternoon. 25 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Have you seen

1	people leave this premises between the hours of
2	midnight and five a.m. and cause disturbances?
3	THE WITNESS: Oh, yes. Like I said,
4	it's a nightly thing. This is not just a weekly
5	thing. It's a nightly thing. They go to the
6	filling station. I think there he's aware of it.
7	They get out of their cars. They leave their
8	music blasting while they are in the station, in
9	the station.
10	MR. SCHRIMPF: Has this ever disturbed
11	your sleep?
12	THE WITNESS: I'm watching them out the
13	window to 12 and one and two o'clock in the
14	morning. I have to say yes.
15	MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have, Mr.
16	Chairman.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are there questions by
18	committee for Mrs. Alexander?
19	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chairman.
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Davis, go
21	ahead.
22	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Publicly I just want
23	to thank Mrs. Alexander for coming down here.
24	She's been a jewel and I've stopped by her house
25	numerous times, and this is the reason why I do

1	my job.
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well- acknowledged.
3	Mr. Gimbel.
4	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. Mrs.
5	Alexander, you're not asking this committee to
6	believe that if this filling station closes from
7	midnight to five a.m. in the morning, that all
8	the problems that you've talked about here are
9	going to go away.
10	THE WITNESS: No. But I believe a lot
11	of it will go away.
12	MR. GIMBEL: For example, kids smoking
13	dope on your lawn in the after
14	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Gimbel. Oh, I'm
15	sorry. If there is anybody who has come in this
16	room who has a cell phone on at this point or
17	anything else that disturbs the committee, I will
18	insure that you will not come forward here to
19	speak on any matter. If you have a matter that
20	will be held here, you can get a good lawyer and
21	sue the city, because I will not hear you. If
22	that is not understood and somebody doesn't turn
23	off a cell phone or pager, at this point and they
24	have one, leave this this room and don't come
25	back. Because that That will be my

00035 1 commitment to you as the chairman of this 2 committee if we have another disturbance of that 3 sort, of any of you who are present here. I'm 4 sorry about that, Mr. Gimbel. Please proceed. 5 MR. GIMBEL: I understand. I agree 6 with you. I understand. 7 What I'm saying to you, Mrs. Alexander, 8 with all due respect to your observations, is 9 that whether this station is closed from midnight 10 to five or not, you're still going to have people 11 driving up and down 76th Street. Don't you agree 12 with me? 13 THE WITNESS: Um-hmh. 14 MR. GIMBEL: And they'll be driving up and down 76th Street, will they not? 15 16 THE WITNESS: Um-hmh. 17 MR. GIMBEL: And - - And kids who want 18 to get into mischief will get into mischief 19 whether this station's open between midnight and 20 five o'clock or not, won't they? 21 THE WITNESS: But I'm not talking about 22 driving up and down 76th Street 75th Street. I'm 23 talking about the activities at the station, 24 activities that I watch. 25 MR. GIMBEL: And have you gone and

00036	
1	talked to Mr. Amir or anybody else about your
2	concerns?
3	THE WITNESS: No.
4	MR. GIMBEL: Did you know that there
5	were signs posted on that station telling people
6	that if they come into that place with loud
7	music, if they loiter there, they will not be
8	served anything?
9	THE WITNESS: Fine.
10	MR. GIMBEL: Did you see the signs?
11	THE WITNESS: No, I didn't see any.
12	MR. GIMBEL: Now, are there other
13	businesses on on 76th Street that are also
14	open during the evening hours?
15	THE WITNESS: You have to mean the
16	liquor store across the street.
17	MR. GIMBEL: And when is that open?
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: She said that there was
19	a liquor store across the street.
20	MR. GIMBEL: And is that a business
21	that contributes to problems that you have
22	observed in your neighborhood?
23	THE WITNESS: No. When they aren't
24	congregating at the station, they go into that
25	business, that liquor store, they do what they

00037 1 have to do and leave. 2 MR. GIMBEL: So you're saying that 3 people go to the filling station, they hang out 4 there. Is that what you're saying, between 12 5 and five o'clock in the morning? 6 THE WITNESS: I think you heard me, but 7 yes, they do. They hang there. They sit there. They do whatever they do there. Yes, they do. 8 9 MR. GIMBEL: And you think that if - -10 if the station were closed, that they would not 11 continue to do that same thing? 12 THE WITNESS: I would cut down on a lot 13 of the traffic, yes. 14 MR. GIMBEL: And why do you say that? 15 What's your basis for saying it? 16 THE WITNESS: Because a lot of times 17 when they come there it is dark. They sit 18 there, they do and say anything they please. I 19 haven't noticed anyone who owns the station would 20 come out and say anything. The only time 21 something is done is when someone calls the 22 police or our alderman talks to them to get 23 something done. 24 MR. GIMBEL: So are you suggesting that 25 - - that the problem is a problem related to

00038 1 daylight or night time? 2 THE WITNESS: I'm not suggesting 3 anything. I'm just telling you what I've heard, 4 what I've seen, and I'm trying to relate that to 5 the committee. And they can take it for what 6 it's worth. I'm not suggesting anything. 7 MR. GIMBEL: What I'm asking you here 8 is - - is for you to give to this committee a 9 factual statement, as best you can, as to what 10 effect, if any, closing the station from midnight 11 to five o'clock will have on the problems you've 12 described. As I understand, your problems occur 13 24 hours a day. 14 THE WITNESS: I'm not - - They can - -15 I've given my statement. I said what I've 16 observed here. The committee, I think have 17 common sense. They can do what they think is 18 best. 19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I think she's 20 right, Mr. Gimbel, because if she was giving her 21 opinion on other matters contrary, I think you 22 would raise questions, indicate that's her 23 opinion. 24 MR. GIMBEL: I qualify - -25 CHAIRMAN BOHL: I think we've got an

1	idea as to
2	MR. GIMBEL: I'm sorry. Then I'm
3	finished.
4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you.
5	Thank you, Mrs. Alexander. I appreciate that.
6	Mr. Givens, did you intend to testify on this
7	location here, as well, too, here? Well, if you
8	want to slide the microphone down, we'll swear
9	you in, because I don't know if you were in the
10	room on that matter. Do you want to raise your
11	right hand?
12	MS. ELMER: Do you solemnly swear to
13	tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but
14	the truth, so help you God?
15	MR. GIVENS: I do.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Do you just want to
17	provide your name and your address for the
18	record?
19	MR. GIVENS: Gary Givens, G-I-V-E-N-S.
20	3926 North 44th Street.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I I think you may
22	know the spiel, but we'll It would have to be
23	items that you personally have witnessed in terms
24	of relevance at this location.
25	THE WITNESS: Yes. Mr. Chairman, I

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1	On many occasions I've been out between the hours
2	of, say, 12 o'clock and four o'clock in the
3	morning, on the weekends, and also, on the
4	weekdays. And And I have personally observed
5	this particular station where there has been
6	numerous cars on the lot. There's no business
7	transactions going on. And by that, I mean,
8	purchasing gas or going into the convenience
9	store. There has been times where the lot is
10	full and people are out of their cars just as
11	somebody testimony you've heard before, and
12	it just – – it's a gathering place, and I just
13	wanted to kind of let the committee know that I
14	believe that this is one of the problem spots
15	that seems to attract crowds between the hours of
16	12 and and four o'clock in the morning. And
17	I would be be in opposition to this
18	establishment operating during those times.
19	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman.
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schrimpf.
21	MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you. Mr. Givens,
22	just so that I'm clear. When you observed the
23	people out of their cars, cars parked on the lot
24	at this location, are they doing anything?
25	THE WITNESS: They're just out just

00041 1 loitering. 2 MR. SCHRIMPF: Were they playing boom 3 boxes? Are they being noisy? 4 THE WITNESS: Yeah, they - -5 MR. SCHRIMPF: Just standing there having quiet conversation? 6 7 THE WITNESS: The cars are - - are on the lot and some of the owners or drivers of the 8 9 vehicles are outside of their cars just sitting 10 around talking, their radios are - - are 11 blasting. Is - - I even witnessed one evening 12 where there was a - - I would term it a strip 13 show going on. And it was right there right on 14 - - on the edge of this particular lot. 15 MR. SCHRIMPF: Was this female or male? THE WITNESS: A female. 16 17 MR. SCHRIMPF: And what was the female 18 doing? 19 THE WITNESS: Shaking - - Shaking her 20 body. And - -21 MR. SCHRIMPF: Did she remove any 22 articles of clothing? 23 THE WITNESS: She removed some - - some 24 items of clothing. She was not totally nude, but 25 it was close to it.

00042	
1	MR. SCHRIMPF: Was there a crowd around
2	her?
3	THE WITNESS: Yes, there was.
4	MR. SCHRIMPF: Were they cheering or
5	carrying on?
6	THE WITNESS: Yes, they were. They
7	were, I guess, egging her on. And also I'd like
8	to add at at the time that this was
9	happening, this station never did shut the lights
10	off or close down the pumps.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schrimpf, you just
12	let me come in with a follow-up. How long
13	this this one incident, how long a period of
14	time, Mr. Givens, were you were you in this
15	vicinity observing this?
16	THE WITNESS: I would I would say
17	probably 20 minutes, because at that particular
18	time all the traffic on 76th Street had stopped.
19	There is, you know, you could not move. And it
20	continued until the police came, until the police
21	were finally able to get to that particular site
22	to disperse the crowd. Because the police could
23	not even get get through the traffic. They
24	had to drive down the median strips.
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I know I've heard from

00043	
1	my own constituents that tell me that even
2	drivers, individuals who were driving private
3	vehicles have to drive down the median.
4	THE WITNESS: Oh, absolutely.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Nothing to do with this
6	location, but I know that that can be true.
7	MR. SCHRIMPF: Perhaps, Mr. Chairman,
8	the committee is going to have to come up with a
9	suggestion for a cabaret license for a gas
10	station.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: That comment is also
12	stricken. Any other questions by committee of
13	Mr. Givens?
14	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chairman, I have a
15	question of Mr. Givens.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Please, go ahead.
17	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Givens, are you
18	are you a member of the City of Milwaukee's
19	Anti-Cruising Task Force?
20	THE WITNESS: Yes, I am.
21	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And with that position
22	as a member of the City of Milwaukee Anti-
23	Cruising Task Force, can you spell out what
24	members are, to your recollection, who serves on
25	the on that task force?

00044 1 THE WITNESS: I'll try. You mean, 2 private individuals or? 3 ALDERMAN DAVIS: No, just - - The ones 4 who - - who have set - - I mean, if you can't, 5 off the top of your head - -6 THE WITNESS: I can name a few. 7 Assistant Chief Barber, Deputy Inspector Sukovic, 8 and I believe, I'm not certain of his title, but 9 Shonk, on the police department. 10 ALDERMAN DAVIS: And who is the current 11 chair of that Anti-Cruising Task Force as we 12 speak? 13 THE WITNESS: Chief Barber. 14 ALDERMAN DAVIS: Is Alderman Fred 15 Gordon a member of that Anti-Cruising Task Force? 16 THE WITNESS: Yes, he is. And I did 17 not mean to omit him. I just hadn't got to that 18 point yet. 19 ALDERMAN DAVIS: And one last question, 20 Mr. Chairman. Mr. Givens, are you familiar with 21 what cruising is? 22 THE WITNESS: Yes, I am. 23 ALDERMAN DAVIS: And can you tell me 24 what type of behavior comes along with cruising? 25 THE WITNESS: Well, there's many - -

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1	many things that that come from cruising, one
2	being traffic obstruction, loitering, littering,
3	drug activity, trespassing on private property,
4	loud loud noise, and I could probbly think of
5	a few others, but I'm kind of drawing a blank.
6	But I think those are sufficient enough.
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Alderman.
8	Thank you. Mr. Gimbel.
9	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. Mr. Givens, I
10	think that based on your address that you live
11	some three plus miles away from this location.
12	Is that correct?
13	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
14	MR. GIMBEL: And you have an
15	occupation, do you, sir?
16	THE WITNESS: I'm retired.
17	MR. GIMBEL: What did you do before you
18	retired?
19	THE WITNESS: I was a financial
20	analyst.
21	MR. GIMBEL: And now I assume that your
22	your role as a member of this task force that
23	has been identified in your answers to the
24	questions by Alderman Davis is the reason you go
25	driving around at night, to check on cruising?

00046 1 THE WITNESS: No, sir. 2 MR. GIMBEL: Why - - Why are you out 12 3 o'clock at night looking at this filling station 4 on 76th and Silver Spring? 5 THE WITNESS: Well, because - - Well, 6 here let me back up. Part of the reason is 7 because I'm on the Anti-Cruising Task Force, but the bigger part of it is that I'm a concerned 8 9 citizen. And this happened - - The cruising 10 happened - - The cruising has been going on for 11 six - seven years now, and we had a problem in my 12 immediate area, and ever since then I've taken it 13 upon myself to - - to try and do something about 14 it. MR. GIMBEL: Now, you're not suggesting 15 16 that the - - that cruising is limited to the 17 intersection of 76th and Silver Spring, are you? 18 THE WITNESS: Absolutely not. 19 MR. GIMBEL: There are several places 20 in the City of Milwaukee which have cruising 21 problems. 22 THE WITNESS: Correct. 23 MR. GIMBEL: Right. Because young 24 people in their cars late at night have - - They 25 get some kind of pleasure in driving around. Is

1	that right?
2	THE WITNESS: I can't answer for them,
3	but I would I'm surmising that that's one of
4	the reasons that they do it.
5	MR. GIMBEL: And And this station
6	on 76th Street that is owned by Mr. Amir, 5656
7	North 76th Street, is not the only filling
8	station that's open 24 hours a day in the area
9	that you have patrolled, is that accurate?
10	THE WITNESS: That's correct.
11	MR. GIMBEL: And would you say that
12	every filling station that is open 24 hours a day
13	that you patrolled has similar issues of
14	cruising, going by them, on major thoroughfares?
15	THE WITNESS: No, I wouldn't say that.
16	There's I would say that there are certain
17	stations that are what I considered
18	consider hot spots, that people are attracted to,
19	and this is this being one of them.
20	MR. GIMBEL: Have you ever taken notes
21	of observations that you made, reflecting the
22	dates upon which you made those observations?
23	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
24	MR. GIMBEL: Do you have, for example,
25	anything to tell the committee when it was that

00048	
1	you say that you observed this kind of dancing
2	show on the on the property of my client
3	in the neighborhood where my client's station is?
4	THE WITNESS: No, I don't have
5	that information with me. In fact, I wasn't even
6	aware that this these licenses were being
7	heard today. I just happened to see it on
8	Channel 25 and and I came down here, because
9	I do know that there are some some locations
10	that applied for the licenses that that are
11	major problems with the cruises.
12	MR. GIMBEL: What year was it that you
13	saw this
14	THE WITNESS: This is last year, last
15	summer.
16	MR. GIMBEL: 2003? Summer of 2003?
17	THE WITNESS: Yes.
18	MR. GIMBEL: What time of the day or
19	night was it?
20	THE WITNESS: It was approximately two
21	o'clock - 2:30 in the morning.
22	MR. GIMBEL: And did you communicate
23	with the police about that?
24	THE WITNESS: I I called the
25	police, yes. Any time I see that happening, I

00049 1 call the police. 2 MR. GIMBEL: Do you have any other specific instances that you observed since the 3 4 summer of 2003 between 12 and five o'clock in the 5 morning at this particular location? 6 THE WITNESS: I - - I'm sorry. 7 MR. GIMBEL: Did you observe any other 8 instances that you thought were troublesome, 9 between the hours of midnight and five a.m. in 10 the morning, since that incident in the summer of 11 2003? 12 THE WITNESS: Yes, I've - - I've 13 observed it several times. Not - - Not the 14 dancing part of it, but again, the congregation 15 on the lot, the continuation of the licensee to 16 do business, and I - - I did not witness any 17 attempt for them to alleviate the problem with 18 the cars on their lots. 19 MR. GIMBEL: Did you ever talk to the 20 owner or anybody - -21 THE WITNESS: I - - I believe I talked to them once. That was - - That was last year. 22 23 MR. GIMBEL: And is it your testimony 24 before this committee that if - - if this license 25 application to permit the station to stay open 24

00050 1 hours a day is - - is denied, that the problems 2 that you've identified will go away? 3 THE WITNESS: Some of the problems. 4 Because, again, this is one of the major sites 5 that the cruisers are attracted to. So if you 6 eliminate - - If you eliminate this one, then 7 that's - - that's an area that - - that you don't have to put so much focus on. If there's 8 9 additional sites that need to be addressed, and 10 they will be addressed. 11 MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. 12 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Just - - This is a 13 little bit out of your neck of the woods. How 14 familiar are you with North 76th Street? 15 THE WITNESS: I'm pretty familiar with 16 it. 17 CHAIRMAN BOHL: You were asked by 18 counsel your knowledge as to gas stations in the 19 vicinity. Are you aware of any gas stations that are with - - immediately within the matter of 20 21 blocks in either direction of this location? 22 THE WITNESS: Yes, I am. There's - -23 There's a gas station on, I believe, 76th and 24 Mill that's a problem. There's one further north 25 of 76th Street, I'm trying to think where there's

2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Good Hope, possibly.
3	THE WITNESS: Good Hope or maybe Green
4	Tree.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: In terms of
6	THE WITNESS: And also there's
7	there's one on 64th and Silver Spring.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: In terms of the closest
9	proximity to other stations to this one, 76th and
10	Mill Road would be one. Would Are you
11	familiar with one that is on 76th Street, maybe a
12	short half block, couple houses from Grantosa.
13	It would be on the east side of the street.
14	THE WITNESS: 76th and Grantosa. Yes,
15	I am. Yes.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And in terms of of
17	blocks that would be on the other side of Fond du
18	Lac Avenue, and then you have a long bridge, and
19	you have to cross over Silver Spring. So that
20	would be blocks in every direction in terms of
21	other businesses.
22	THE WITNESS: Yes.
23	CHAIRMAN BOHL: To you knowledge.
24	Are there any questions of Mr. Givens
25	at this point? Thank you, Mr. Givens. At this

1	point, Mr. Gimbel, what we're going to do is
2	we'll If you could offer relinquish your
3	seat. Thank you very much for your testimony.
4	Mr. Gimbel, in terms of trying to proceed I
5	know you have a fair number of
6	of individuals here to provide testimony. I
7	would ask that if individuals are capable, if you
8	could, one by one filter to the microphone that's
9	on the stand. If you have a difficulty, if
10	you're elderly or have other concerns, please
11	feel free to take a seat. I don't I don't

16	whatever orderly procession you so desire.
17	MR. GIMBEL: That's fine.
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Like I said, if you
19	could grab the microphone, and if you're able, if
20	you could just sit in the front row and we'll
21	pick you up next.
22	MR. GIMBEL: Why don't you state your
23	name and tell us where you live?
24	THE WITNESS: My name is Clara Gray, G-
25	R-A-Y. I live at 5735 North 74th Street.

00053 1 MR. GIMBEL: And, Ms. Gray, where is 2 your home with respect to the location of the gas 3 station that the application is being considered by this committee, 5656 North 76th Street? 4 5 THE WITNESS: About a block over. 6 MR. GIMBEL: Are you a patron of this 7 place? 8 THE WITNESS: Yes. 9 MR. GIMBEL: Have you had opportunity 10 to observe the operation of this business 11 establishment on a daily basis from time to time 12 between midnight and five a.m. in the morning? 13 THE WITNESS: Yes, I've been in the 14 area for about two years now. I started going to the gas station back in '94 - '95. It's a great 15 16 gas station to go to. It's convenient throughout 17 all hours. Mohammed, he's not only just a gas 18 station owner, he gets to know you. It's safety. 19 There ain't too many gas stations you can go to 20 during the night and get the type of security you 21 get there. At times I work all types of shifts, 22 and he's there. He's outside cleaning, you know, 23 sometimes he get a disturbance and he'll get 24 right on it. He gets so much respect. People 25 know him to where that they won't even get

1	sometimes that type of disrespect because of what
2	he gives back to us during all types of hours.
3	There's times that I One time I was in high
4	school and I was late for school. He won't let
5	me in the gas station until I have a parent. So
6	he's been good to us, and it's really convenient
7	for us when we get off late or go to work early
8	for us to be there. He closes it down for an
9	hour to make fresh coffee and to put fresh food
10	in there. And you don't have to worry about
11	Mohammed not being there. You're always going to
12	see him sometime during the day. He's the one -
13	- one owner that we'll see at his station, and on
14	the station and taking care of his business. And
15	he makes it convenient for us. And he knows a
16	lot of children and the children know he knows
17	and they will give him respect and move on if -
18	- if they're creating a problem with So I
19	think the gas station should stay open 24 hours.
20	MR. GIMBEL: And you're saying that you
21	think that Mr. Amir, my client who is sitting
22	here with me, his first name is Mohammed?
23	THE WITNESS: Yes.
24	MR. GIMBEL: He reaches out to the
25	community to try to run

00055 1 THE WITNESS: Yes, he does. 2 MR. GIMBEL: - - a good business that 3 is harmonious with the neighborhood? 4 THE WITNESS: Yes. And I observed this 5 for about for the last past six - seven years - -6 seven, myself. 7 MR. GIMBEL: Now, have you personally 8 observed this station to be the source of excess 9 traffic, loitering, littering or disorderly 10 behavior on that corner? 11 THE WITNESS: I remember one time when 12 McDonald's had a car show, and I was going in the 13 gas station at the time. And he saw the traffic 14 coming. He turned off the lights, shut the pumps 15 down until they sped off because they saw that 16 there was no service, and he went back to 17 business. And I was there inside, myself. He 18 just told me to stand aside while he shut it down 19 for a moment and bring it back to. 20 MR. GIMBEL: When was that? 21 THE WITNESS: That was about last year. 22 They give a car show every Friday down at 23 McDonald's about three o'clock in the morning 24 myself coming from going out. I was in the gas 25 station at the time.

00056 1 MR. GIMBEL: So you're saying you have 2 observed that he turns off the - -3 THE WITNESS: Yes, I have. 4 MR. GIMBEL: - - and the lights in 5 order to reduce the traffic and - -6 THE WITNESS: That's all day long. You 7 only can have two students in the store at a time 8 during the morning hours. It's all day long, 9 he's trying to keep things from happening up 10 there, so. 11 MR. GIMBEL: Do you see large crowds 12 congregating on his lot and do drug deals? 13 THE WITNESS: No, you never know. 14 Because I'm there a lot, too, on the lot. Might 15 see a old friend, might be passing a number of 16 cigarettes. Who says it always has to be drugs? 17 MR. GIMBEL: You want the committee to 18 recommend to the Common Council - -19 THE WITNESS: Yes, because if you're 20 not standing next to them to see what they're 21 passing and what they're doing, you don't know if 22 it's drugs or not, because there's plenty times I 23 would stop and run into a friend while getting a 24 number or this and that. You're peeping out the 25 window. You just get your ass moving. You don't

00057 1 know what's really going on. 2 MR. GIMBEL: And my question I ask you 3 finally is do you want this committee to 4 recommend approval of this license for 24 hour 5 gas station? 6 THE WITNESS: Yes, I do. 7 MR. GIMBEL: And that's what you are 8 asking them to do? 9 THE WITNESS: Yes. 10 MR. GIMBEL: And how long have you 11 lived at this North 74th Street address? 12 THE WITNESS: Nine years, going on ten. 13 MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. How old are 14 you, by the way? 15 THE WITNESS: Twenty-seven. 16 MR. GIMBEL: Thank you very much. 17 THE WITNESS: My name is Nancy Davis. 18 I live at 5745 West - -19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm sorry. Mr. Gimbel, 20 if you could bring Mrs. Gray back or Ms. Gray 21 back. I just want to make certain, are there any 22 questions by committee of Ms. Gray at this time 23 here? 24 ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman. 25 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon.

1	ALDERMAN GORDON: Ms. Gray, in the time
2	that you lived near the gas station have you ever
3	been in the situation where you were caught in
4	traffic?
5	THE WITNESS: Probably during the car
6	show trying to get in and out, but I saw it being

8	already crowded you in so fast to where you got
9	to wait your turn, but not consistently, no. I
10	was I don't wait, really, for getting out.
11	ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you.
12	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other guestions? Thank
13	you. Oh, by the way Your name and address
14	then.
15	THE WITNESS: My name is Constant
16	Holman. I live at 5735 North 79th Street.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Holman, H-O-L-M-A-
18	N?
19	THE WITNESS: Yes.
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you.
21	THE WITNESS: I reside there with my
22	fiance. His name is Clyde Neal. He's been there
23	He's owned the house about 17 years. I've
24	been there about three, living. And as a matter
25	of fact, I'm I'm a business owner myself. I

1	own a beauty I mean, a nail and shoe shine
2	parlor at 6035 North Teutonia. And this actually
3	I've been in them all for 15 years. But it's the
4	Citgo like this around the corner on Teutonia -
5	Florist. But I won't even go there. I come all
6	the way, you know, back by the house and go
7	there, because they always treat me nice and I'm
8	interested in getting the the wash bay. I
9	want to rent the wash bay in the back, and
10	and I work at Miller's Brewery, too. And a lot
11	of times if I'm if I work second shift and I
12	still work full hours, I'm working from like
13	three three to three instead of three to 11.
14	And then I'm working If I work third shift a
15	lot of times, you know, I get off pretty early in
16	the morning, and like she said, there's always
17	fresh coffee. They treat you nice, and whenever,
18	you know, when they see me going back and forth
19	to my car, you know, they make sure when it's
20	like early in the morning or late at night, they
21	make sure that I get, you know, get back and
22	forth safe, and they They seem to be such
23	pleasant people, you know.
24	MR. GIMBEL: Have you had an
25	opportunity, Ms. Holman, to observe this location

00060 to be the source of excess traffic, loitering, 1 2 littering, and disorderly behavior? 3 THE WITNESS: I mean, there's traffic, 4 it's a gas station, you know, so - - But, you 5 know, like in the mornings a lot of times the 6 young people, they won't let them in, you know, 7 maybe like she said, two - - two people at a time. Usually if there's too much commotion, 8 9 either him - - I don't know the other gentleman 10 that works there, they had come out, you know, 11 and sort of kind of, you know, asked them to 12 leave or they shut the pumps down, you know. 13 But, I mean, you can only do so much, you know. 14 MR. GIMBEL: So you are a patron of 15 this gas station? 16 THE WITNESS: Every day I go there. 17 MR. GIMBEL: Every day? 18 THE WITNESS: Every day. 19 MR. GIMBEL: And - - And frequently you 20 stop there? 21 THE WITNESS: Sometimes two or three 22 times a day. My fiance, he go there so much, I told him he - - They own part of his checking 23 24 account. He plays the lottery there. 25 MR. GIMBEL: And are you frequently

00061 there, Ms. Holman, between the hours of midnight 1 2 and five a.m. in the morning? 3 THE WITNESS: Okay. Yes. Okay, if I 4 work at Miller's, if I get off at 11, I'm - - I 5 usually come there straight after work which 6 would be about 11:30, but sometimes I work until 7 three in the morning, so I usually get there 8 about 3:30. 9 MR. GIMBEL: Have you noticed people 10 congregating on the lot smoking dope, selling 11 dope or anything of that nature that you were 12 aware of? 13 THE WITNESS: No, I'm - - I'm in my car and I'm out, unless I have a conversation, you 14 15 know, with him. 16 MR. GIMBEL: And are you asking this 17 committee to recommend that this application for 18 24 hour service be granted? 19 THE WITNESS: Yes. Because I would 20 like to get the wash bay. 21 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Holman, just stay 22 here for one second. Are there questions by 23 committee of Ms. Holman? 24 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman? 25 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schrimpf, go ahead.

00062 1 MR. SCHRIMPF: You said that there are 2 occasions when he has shut down the pumps? 3 THE WITNESS: Yes. 4 MR. SCHRIMPF: And why did he do that, 5 to your knowledge? 6 THE WITNESS: If too many - - If they 7 just be sitting in front of the pumps, you know, 8 and not, you know, pumping gas, you know. 9 MR. SCHRIMPF: So you have seen cars 10 sitting in front of the pumps and not pumping 11 gas. 12 THE WITNESS: Yeah, and then what he 13 would do, and there might be some that - - that 14 are pumping gas. But what he would do, he'd just 15 turn them off completely, and the other guy that 16 works there, he would come out and ask them to 17 leave the lot. 18 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. And you have 19 observed these things between - -20 THE WITNESS: Yes. 21 MR. SCHRIMPF: - - midnight and five 22 a.m.? 23 THE WITNESS: More so, I could say 24 around between like 11:30 - - Like I said if I 25 get off work at 11, I'm usually at the station

2	MR. SCHRIMPF: How often are you there
3	between midnight and five?
4	THE WITNESS: Well, if Miller has me
5	working over about four hours every night, I
6	could be there until seven days a week.
7	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. That's all I
8	have, Mr. Chairman.
9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Davis.
10	ALDERMAN DAVIS: I just want to make
11	sure that I mention on the record that there has
12	been a lot of interest in that wash bay and folks
13	have contacted my office, and I'm kind of
14	disturbed that that a constituent of mine
15	would have a a vested interest on keeping
16	this open, not to, you know, to cast aspersions,
17	but I I would hope that we're here because we
18	want to make sure that we maintain the integrity
19	of the community.
20	THE WITNESS: Yes.
21	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And not Excuse me
22	I just want I just want to finish.
23	And And we maintain the integrity of the
24	community so that we can keep the property values
25	up, and and not to put that aside because of

1	our own personal business interests. That's
2	important to me as your elected official, because
3	whether it's you or anybody else, if someone gets
4	shot or someone gets killed up in that area, I'm
5	responsible for it. So I just wanted to make
6	sure on the record that there is a personal
7	interest in this particular testimony, and I
8	would hope that if you have an interest, I have
9	spoken with Mohammed about that, also, about my
10	concern about that wash bay because of the past
11	history of it.
12	THE WITNESS: Well, I had a interest
13	because they're so nice. And to me, I mean, it
14	seems to be a good location in in my
15	neighborhood, because I live at 5735 North 79th.
16	ALDERMAN DAVIS: I understand.
17	THE WITNESS: So
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Ms. Holman.
19	If you could provide your your first and last
20	name again.
21	THE WITNESS: Okay. Nancy Davis, D-A-
22	V-I-S. And I also reside at 5745 North 74th
23	Street, and I think the gas station should stay
24	open 24 hours because it is very convenient. I
25	have also been up there between 12 and five. And

1	it's not all what, you know, everybody's saying.
2	It is pretty, like, it gets busy a lot, but it's
3	not Well, I don't see none of that that's
4	going on, so I also think it should stay open 24
5	hours.
6	MR. GIMBEL: And And would you say
7	that this gas station does not act as the
8	resource for excess traffic, loitering, littering
9	and disorderly behavior?
10	THE WITNESS: Well, you know,
11	everybody's responsible for their own actions,
12	so, you know, I don't I won't say that.
13	MR. GIMBEL: You're a customer of the
14	station?
15	THE WITNESS: Yes.
16	MR. GIMBEL: And have you found that
17	they are responsible in terms of dealing with the
18	neighbors?
19	THE WITNESS: Yes.
20	MR. GIMBEL: And concerned about
21	concerns that are expressed by the neighbors?
22	THE WITNESS: Yes.
23	MR. GIMBEL: How long have you lived
24	there, Ms. Davis?
25	THE WITNESS: I lived there eight

1	years, almost nine, too.
2	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you.
3	THE WITNESS: You're welcome.
4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Davis. hold on one
5	second here. Questions by committee? Thank you.
6	MR. GIMBEL: Sammy Whitlow. Whitlow
7	here? Would you state your name and tell us
8	where you live, please, Ms. Whitlow?
9	THE WITNESS: Sammy Whitlow. I live on
10	74th and Florist Avenue.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Whitlow, could you
12	just spell your last name, please?
13	THE WITNESS: W-H-I-T-L-O-W.

22	to observe the management of that gas station,
23	particularly in the late hours of the evening or
24	early hours of the morning?
25	THE WITNESS: Yes, I have.

00067 1 MR. GIMBEL: And do you believe that 2 the management addresses the problem of loitering 3 and traffic and disorderly behavior? THE WITNESS: Yes, I do. 4 5 MR. GIMBEL: Have - - Have those 6 problems come visiting you in your home? 7 THE WITNESS: No. MR. GIMBEL: From the station? 8 9 THE WITNESS: No. 10 MR. GIMBEL: How long have you lived 11 there, Ms. Whitlow? 12 THE WITNESS: For 37 years. 13 MR. GIMBEL: And do you think if they 14 close this gas station from midnight to five 15 o'clock in the morning that it will have any 16 effect at all on traffic and/or other behaviors 17 that now exist in that area? 18 THE WITNESS: I don't see that 19 possible. In other words, I think it would be 20 worse. Because if there's no one around, they 21 have the freedom then to really hang out. 22 MR. GIMBEL: So you think that the fact 23 that this place is open where there's lights on 24 and that there's somebody present there close to 25 a phone has a beneficial effect to the

2	THE WITNESS: Yes, I do.
3	MR. GIMBEL: Particularly from midnight
4	to five a.m. in the morning?
5	THE WITNESS: Yes.
6	MR. GIMBEL: And that's your feeling?
7	THE WITNESS: That's my feeling.
8	MR. GIMBEL: Do you want this committee
9	to recommend to the Common Council that they
10	approve this application for 24 hour operation?
11	THE WITNESS: I hope they keep it open.
12	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you very much.
13	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Whitlow, one moment
14	here. Questions by committee of Mrs. Whitlow?
15	THE WITNESS: Yes.
16	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schrimpf.
18	MR. SCHRIMPF: Ms. Whitlow, have you
19	observed people hanging out at this station?
20	THE WITNESS: Not hanging out. I've
21	never seen hanging out. I've seen people coming
22	and go, getting gas, being served, and never
23	hanging out. I've never had a problem there in
24	all my years.
25	MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all. Thank you.

1	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mrs. Whitlow, I just -
2	- I have one follow-up question here for you.
3	You said you resided on 74th and Florist Avenue.
4	THE WITNESS: Yes.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: 74th and Florist, would
6	it be fair for me to say that that's a good two
7	and a half blocks north and then maybe two blocks
8	east of this location?
9	THE WITNESS: Yes, it would.
10	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. That's all.
11	Thank you. Sir.
12	MR. GIMBEL: Would you state your name,
13	please?
14	THE WITNESS: Taron McMillian.
15	MR. GIMBEL: And where do you live, Mr.
16	McMillian?
17	THE WITNESS: I live at 7124 West
18	Thurston.
19	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. McMillian. Your
20	first name was?
21	THE WITNESS: Taron. T-A-R-O-N.
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And the spelling of
23	your last name, please, sir?
24	THE WITNESS: M-C-M-I-L-L-I-A-N.
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you very much.

00070 1 Please proceed. 2 MR. GIMBEL: And your address is 7124 3 West Thurston? 4 THE WITNESS: That's correct. 5 MR. GIMBEL: How long have you lived 6 there, Mr. McMillian? 7 THE WITNESS: I've lived there 15 8 years, but I've actually been in the area well 9 over 30. 10 MR. GIMBEL: So you've lived in the 11 vicinity of 76th and Silver Spring for 30 years? 12 THE WITNESS: I grew up out there. I 13 grew up there. I went to school in that area and 14 everything. I went to James Madison High School. 15 I went to John Burroughs. I've been out here 16 from 1966 until now. And at that particular gas 17 station before they even had it, it was a 18 Western. It's always been good to everybody in 19 that area. 20 MR. GIMBEL: And it continues to be 21 good through this owner? 22 THE WITNESS: It's still good now. I have to get up at night, in the middle of the 23 24 night. I'm a truck driver, and I get up, and I 25 always got to fuel up my car. I'm glad that he's

00071 1 open. So I go there. I take care of my mother-2 in-law. She has all kind of - - She's also 3 diabetic. Sometimes she needs sugar. I have to 4 get up in the middle of the night and go get 5 sugar. If he's not open, then I have to truck 6 way on the other side of town, way on Good Hope, 7 which is too far to be driving in the middle of 8 the night, taking a chance of getting pulled over 9 for something that may, you know, for just a 10 little illegal or whatever. 11 But it's very convenient for Mohammed's 12 station. And then I also agree with what the 13 other young ladies were saying. He is very nice 14 to us. We patronize his station. He is nice 15 with my wife and that, even my children. My 16 grandkids go in there. But in - - Besides the 17 other question that you're going to ask me, no, I 18 didn't see nobody standing around there, no drug 19 activity. I don't - - I never saw any of that. 20 People come and go there, and do what they got to 21 do. When the car wash was open, yeah, people 22 were standing around then, because they was

waiting on their cars to get hand-washed. But

put this station down, I never saw it.

00072 1 MR. GIMBEL: And did you have 2 opportunity to see it if it had occurred? 3 THE WITNESS: Yes, I would have. I'm a 4 very alert and aware person. I go there - -5 Actually, I go in that station every day. Every 6 day, during any time of day, every day. 7 MR. GIMBEL: Do you believe that this 8 station being open from midnight to five a.m. in 9 the morning on any given day is the source of 10 excess traffic, loitering, littering, and 11 disorderly behavior by the people around it? 12 THE WITNESS: No. I mean, the wind 13 blows - - It blows paper all across the street. 14 You know, they can - - People can throw trash out 15 their window as they driving by, and it can blow 16 on his property, you know. But I don't see 17 nobody coming out of that store. I don't see 18 taking paper, open up bags, dumping it as they 19 walk out. I don't see any of that. 20 MR. GIMBEL: Do you think the fact that 21 if this place were closed from midnight to five 22 a.m. in the morning, that it would reduce the 23 traffic in that - - that intersection? THE WITNESS: No. 24 MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. 25

2	You got 76th and Silver Spring is a major
3	intersection. You got traffic coming from all
4	around. I mean, and that's not the only place
5	where you're going to generate traffic. He close
6	up, it's down there, and wherever you go you got

8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions by committee
9	of Mr. McMillian.
10	ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon.

14	station every day.

People 5 cruise - - They come in there. They do what they 6 got to do. And then they - - Then they leave. 7 ALDERMAN GORDON: You testified that 8 you've never seen, you know, people doing dancing 9 or playing loud music within the confines of the 10 area of this gas station? THE WITNESS: No, I haven't saw that. 11 12 Now, I've - - I've seen people that - - that get 13 out of their vehicles, I mean, dressed in some 14 real peculiar ways, you know, I mean, like, what 15 - - I mean, come on. 16 ALDERMAN GORDON: But not in the 17 confines of the station. 18 THE WITNESS: Not - - Actually like 19 that one statement was made that the woman was 20 strip dancing. I've never ever seen nothing like 21 that. 22 ALDERMAN GORDON: Have you ever been at 23 the station when congregating on the street has 24 forced Mr. Amir to close the station? THE WITNESS: No. 25

1	ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you.
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any other questions by
3	committee? Thank you, Mr. McMillian.
4	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. Mr. Franklin?
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Franklin, you've
6	been sworn in?
7	THE WITNESS: Yes.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay.
9	THE WITNESS: My name is Anthony
10	Franklin. I reside at 7208 West Silver Spring
11	Drive. I've been living there all my life. I'm
12	44 years right now. I've been going to the
13	filling station for like every day. I went to
14	school with him. And I've never had no problems.
15	The man's always been great to us. He's always
16	out there picking up trash and everything and he
17	even offered me a job a couple times if I didn't
18	have nothing to do to help pick up some of the
19	trash when it started getting bad, which I have
20	done.
21	In the wintertime, too, I helped him
22	shovel snow and everything to keep the sidewalks
23	clear which a lot of places you won't find like
24	that.
25	MR. GIMBEL: Do you think he's a good

1	neighbor?
2	THE WITNESS: Oh, very good.
3	MR. GIMBEL: And have you had an
4	occasion to observe this location between
5	midnight and five a.m.?
6	THE WITNESS: Oh, yeah. Like if I want
7	to get cigarettes, he was open. My father, he's
8	a diabetic, if he needs candy, he open. And I
9	would go for him and get it, because he's got a
10	bad leg. He's got arthritis, you know. He's up
11	there in age. If he had known about this meeting
12	going on, he'd be here himself. But he bought
13	the house back in '58, and like I told you, we
14	lived there all my life.
15	MR. GIMBEL: Do you believe that this
16	location is the source of excess traffic,
17	loitering, littering and disorderly behavior?
18	THE WITNESS: No.
19	MR. GIMBEL: Do you think that if this
20	station would be closed by order of the Common
21	Council between midnight and five a.m. in the
22	morning that traffic would be reduced on 76th and
23	Silver Spring?
24	THE WITNESS: No. Because like I said,
25	you have McDonald's. There's a filling station

00077 1 up a ways. It would make no difference, 2 whatsoever. 3 MR. GIMBEL: And - - And is it your 4 purpose for being here today to urge this 5 committee to recommend that this application for 6 24 hour authority to stay open be granted? 7 THE WITNESS: Yes MR. GIMBEL: Thank you, sir. 8 9 ALDERMAN GORDON: Question, Mr. 10 Chairman. 11 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Franklin. Alderman 12 Gordon. 13 ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you. Just a 14 couple questions. How far do you live from the 15 station? 16 THE WITNESS: About three blocks. 17 ALDERMAN GORDON: And you frequent the 18 station on a regular basis? 19 THE WITNESS: I'm there almost every 20 day, sometimes twice a day. ALDERMAN GORDON: Do you go to the 21 22 station at night - -23 THE WITNESS: Yes. 24 ALDERMAN GORDON: - - early in the 25 morning?

00078 THE WITNESS: Sure. A lot of times. 1 2 ALDERMAN GORDON: Have you ever gotten caught in traffic? 3 4 THE WITNESS: No. 5 ALDERMAN GORDON: Have you observed 6 congregating on the premises with loud music, 7 loitering and boisterous behavior? 8 THE WITNESS: No, because he has signs 9 posted and everything else and stuff. If you 10 hang around, they would come out and stuff and 11 they would say something. People will be going 12 up and down the street and they can't stop them. 13 ALDERMAN GORDON: Have you ever - -14 Have you ever observed the closing of the station 15 due to those kinds of situations? 16 THE WITNESS: No, not when I was there, 17 no. 18 ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you. 19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any other questions by 20 committee at this point? Mr. Gimbel, before we 21 proceed, thank you here, Mr. Franklin, we need to 22 switch court reporters. 23 THE WITNESS: Okay. CHAIRMAN BOHL: So we're going to just 24 - - What we'll do is we'll take a brief one 25

1	minute recess just to allow setting up the court
2	reporter.
3	MR. GIMBEL: Do I have time to make a
4	phone call?
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Be back here in one
6	minute. Because as you I'll just let you
7	know, we're probably a couple hours behind right

9	One minute recess.
10	(Off the record.)
11	(Whereupon a recess was taken.)
12	(Back on the record.)
13	MR. GIMBEL: Would you kindly state
14	your name and tell us where you live?
15	THE WITNESS: Daryl Loftin 5833 North
16	75th Street.
17	MR. GIMBEL: And how long have you
18	lived at that location, Mr. Loftin?
19	THE WITNESS: Going on three years.
20	MR. GIMBEL: And are you familiar with
21	the operation of Mr. Amir's filling station on
22	the intersection near the intersection of
23	76th and Silver Spring?
24	THE WITNESS: Yes.
25	MR. GIMBEL: How far is that from where

00080 1 you live? 2 THE WITNESS: Approximately a block and 3 a half. 4 MR. GIMBEL: Are you a patron of that 5 station? 6 THE WITNESS: Yes, it saved my 7 marriage. 8 MR. GIMBEL: Saved your marriage. 9 That's a new one. 10 CHAIRMAN BOHL: That one my - -11 THE WITNESS: You know, my wife was 12 seven months pregnant, and it was three a.m., and 13 she wanted sine Doritos and chocolate ice cream. 14 so. 15 MR. GIMBEL: Are you aware of the 16 operation of this station during the late night 17 hours, early morning hours, Mr. Lofton? 18 THE WITNESS: Yes. Yes. 19 MR. GIMBEL: Have you had occasion to 20 be able to observe this station between midnight 21 and five a.m. on any given day? 22 THE WITNESS: That's usually when I'm 23 there, during that time period. 24 MR. GIMBEL: And you work, do you? 25 THE WITNESS: Right. I have my own

1	business for about 13 years, so I'm leaving as
2	far as, you know, work any time between 12 and
3	four a.m. is when I'm getting there, and if the
4	wife needs milk, you know
5	MR. GIMBEL: So you're a night worker.
6	THE WITNESS: Yes.
7	MR. GIMBEL: Have you had an
8	opportunity to observe at any time between
9	midnight and five a.m. in the morning on weekdays
10	or weekends, this particular location being the
11	source of excessive traffic, loitering, littering
12	and disorderly behavior?
13	THE WITNESS: No.
14	MR. GIMBEL: What, if any, effect on
15	those troublesome kinds of behavior does this
16	station being open have, if you know?
17	THE WITNESS: In my opinion, none. You
18	know, it's it's there. To me it doesn't
19	sound like a 24 hour problem. It sounds like a
20	a police problem, you know, which were
21	brought up before. You know, the police aren't
22	doing this, doing this. If it's not there, it
23	will be somewhere else.
24	MR. GIMBEL: And as a person who
25	is

1	THE WITNESS: It's going to be
2	somewhere else.
3	MR. GIMBEL: who is a patron and a
4	neighbor of this station, do you believe that if
5	this station were required to close between the
6	midnight and five a.m. in the morning it would in
7	any way reduce the traffic in that area or reduce
8	whatever other behavior occurred that's negative
9	behavior?
10	THE WITNESS: Not at all.
11	MR. GIMBEL: Are you here today to urge
12	this committee to recommend to the Common Council
13	that the application of Mr. Amir for permission
14	to stay open 24 hours a day be granted?
15	THE WITNESS: Yes.
16	MR. GIMBEL: And you believe that's for
17	the benefit of the neighbors?
18	THE WITNESS: Oh, extremely. I mean,
19	everyone's talked about how nice they are and
20	everything. There's gas stations I mean, we
21	drive all over. You can go to any gas station,
22	my wife and I, that we want, and we go there. My
23	son – – My older son is eleven. He walks though
24	the walks to the gas station, not because
25	it's convenient, but because I mean, it's

1	convenient, but we feel safe to let him walk
2	there.
3	MR. GIMBEL: So you view Mr. Amir and
4	the people who work for him as good neighbors?
5	THE WITNESS: Yes.
6	MR. GIMBEL: And he reaches out to the
7	neighborhood to harmonize the operation with the
8	best interest of the neighborhood?
9	THE WITNESS: All the time.
10	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Gimbel, I just
12	I don't know how many neighbors we have left to
13	testify
14	MR. GIMBEL: We're towards the end.
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: But I just I just
16	want to say this. This committee will accept
17	that Mr. Amir is a nice guy. This committee will
18	accept already that he has good fresh coffee. I
19	want to keep the testimony relevant to the hours
20	and potential concerns in or around whether there
21	are concerns during those hours.
22	MR. GIMBEL: Okay.
23	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I I understand, but
24	we're getting into a lot of redundant testimony
25	about how nice of a guy that Mr. Amir is, and

1	just like sometimes we get to restaurants that
2	are associated with taverns, people will say they
3	have the best cheeseburgers or steaks in town.
4	We're going to go on the premise that he so
5	we can leave the testimony to other other
6	things related to the application.
7	MR. GIMBEL: I understand.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are there other
9	questions at this point of Mr. Lofton?
10	ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon.
12	MR. GIMBEL: Mr. Lofton, approximately
13	how far do you live from the station?
14	THE WITNESS: About a block and a half.
15	ALDERMAN GORDON: And you frequent the
16	station at all hours of the day and night?
17	THE WITNESS: Yes.
18	ALDERMAN GORDON: And have you ever
19	gotten caught in traffic?
20	THE WITNESS: Early in the morning,
21	like, I mean, before I go to school, because
22	everybody goes there. That's about the extent of
23	it.
24	ALDERMAN GORDON: Have you ever
25	observed boisterous behavior, dancing,

00085 1 transactions of a dubious nature? 2 THE WITNESS: No transactions. And you 3 hear loud music, but you hear loud music. I 4 mean, they're never sitting there, This is 5 during the daytime, summertime, whenever, people 6 listening to their radios. 7 ALDERMAN GORDON: Have you ever 8 experienced gridlock at three or four o'clock in 9 the morning? 10 THE WITNESS: No, sir. In the two 11 years, never. 12 ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you. 13 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by 14 committee? Thank you, Mr. Lofton. 15 MR. GIMBEL: Linda Gray? 16 THE WITNESS: Hi. My name is Linda 17 Gray. I live at 7335 West Thurston Avenue. 18 Right off 74th Street. I'm a block from the gas 19 station. Yes, it's very convenient to have that 20 gas station there, because I have a seven year 21 old granddaughter that goes there. You know, she 22 don't have to cross the traffic, you know, for 23 across the street, off of 76th Street. See, if 24 you all move that gas station, then you all would 25 have to make me go all the way to 74th Street to

00086 1 76th and Mill Road. 2 MR. GIMBEL: We are not talking about 3 moving it. Did you have an opportunity to 4 observe this station being open between midnight 5 and five a.m. in the morning on any given day? 6 THE WITNESS: Yes, I have. 7 MR. GIMBEL: Have you had an 8 opportunity to observe whether or not this 9 station opened between midnight and five a.m. in 10 the morning has contributed to or caused problems 11 of traffic and littering and - -12 THE WITNESS: No. 13 MR. GIMBEL: And you're here today to 14 urge the committee to recommend to the Common 15 Council that Mr. Amir's request for 24 hour 16 permission be granted. Is that correct? 17 THE WITNESS: Yes. 18 MR. GIMBEL: How long have you been 19 there, Ms. Gray? 20 THE WITNESS: I've been living in 21 Milwaukee for three years. 22 MR. GIMBEL: And in this neighborhood? THE WITNESS: Well, I have a brother-23 24 in-law that lives down the street at 5745. I 25 think it's - -

00087 MR. GIMBEL: And 73rd on Thurston. How 1 2 long have you been there? 3 THE WITNESS: I've been there - - Next 4 month it will be a year. 5 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any questions by 6 committee of Mrs. Gray? Thank you. 7 MR. GIMBEL: Michael Myles. THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 8 9 MR. GIMBEL: Do you want to state your 10 name, sir? 11 THE WITNESS: My name's Michael Myles, 12 last name M-Y-L-E-S. 13 MR. GIMBEL: Now, are you employed at the - -14 15 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Gimbel. Mr. Myles, 16 your - - your address? 17 THE WITNESS: 6490 North 106th. 18 MR. GIMBEL: He's not a neighbor. 19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: That's fine. 20 MR. GIMBEL: Are you employed at this 21 filling station that's owned by Mr. Amir? 22 THE WITNESS: Yes, I am. 23 MR. GIMBEL: What are your duties 24 there? 25 THE WITNESS: Cleaning inside, outside

00088 1 the yard, back and front. 2 MR. GIMBEL: How long have you been so 3 employed? 4 THE WITNESS: Going on five months now. 5 MR. GIMBEL: And how often do you go 6 there to perform your cleaning services? 7 THE WITNESS: Every morning and 8 evening. 9 MR. GIMBEL: And what can you tell the 10 committee about the concerns of Mr. Amir to keep 11 the inside and outside of this premises free of 12 litter and debris? 13 THE WITNESS: Well, I start my - - My 14 hours start anywhere from seven to ten, and ${\tt I'm}$ 15 constantly working from there, cleaning inside 16 and out. 17 MR. GIMBEL: And then you come back 18 again later? 19 THE WITNESS: Yeah, I come in the 20 evening hours from four to six. 21 MR. GIMBEL: And you have done this now 22 consistently for five months? 23 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 24 MR. GIMBEL: On a regular daily basis? 25 THE WITNESS: Regular daily basis.

00089 1 MR. GIMBEL: That's all I have. 2 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions of - - of Mr. 3 Myles? Thank you, sir. 4 MR. GIMBEL: Is there anybody I haven't 5 called? 6 THE WITNESS: Me. 7 MR. GIMBEL: Would you please step forward, please? State your name and your 8 9 address. THE WITNESS: It's - - Is my mike on? 10 11 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yes. Do you want to 12 sit down, please? 13 THE WITNESS: It's Christof Martin, and 14 I live at 878 North Selena Street. I'm not in 15 the neighborhood, but on my way home. 16 MR. GIMBEL: Okay. And are you 17 familiar with the filling station of Mr. Amir's 18 on 76th and Silver Spring? 19 THE WITNESS: Yes. 20 MR. GIMBEL: And are you a patron of 21 that station? 22 THE WITNESS: Yes. MR. GIMBEL: How often do you go there? 23 24 THE WITNESS: Three or four times a 25 day.

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1	MR. GIMBEL: Three or four times a day?
2	THE WITNESS: Yes.
3	MR. GIMBEL: And are you ever there
4	during the period of time from midnight to five
5	a.m. in the morning?
6	THE WITNESS: Yes.
7	MR. GIMBEL: And how long have you been
8	a patron going there on multiple times a day?
9	THE WITNESS: Past six years.
10	MR. GIMBEL: In your capacity as a
11	
12	patron who frequently on a daily basis visits
12	this place, including early in the morning hours,
-	have you had occasion to observe whether or not
14	this filling station is the source of excess
15	traffic, loitering, littering or disorderly
16	behavior?
17	THE WITNESS: No, there was one time,
18	and that was summer, 2001, and it was crazy, all
19	down 76th Street. And there There was a car
20	show, and the car show let out, and the people
21	just flocked to different gas stations, but all
22	the gas stations, you know, turned their lights
23	off and shut the pumps down. And what it is is
24	there's a club that's for underage people, 76th
25	and Bradley. So starting from that gas station

00091	
1	all the way down, you know, they would, you know,
2	frequent the the gas stations there. And
3	when they were closed down, then they just go to
4	76th and Mill Road where the 24 hour Walgreen's
5	is. So it's really not going to matter even if
6	the station was closed down, you're still going
7	to have people there. You're more apt to have
8	people there with the station closed down,
9	because there's no one to call the police or tell
10	on them. And from my personal experience the
11	regular customers, whenever we see someone
12	standing outside and looking suspicious, you
13	know, we'll tell Mohammed. Or even if I'm
14	driving by, you know, I'll call his cell phone
15	and tell him. And I would stop there in the wee
16	hours of the morning coming back from the inner
17	city, because I don't want to get gas there,
18	because I might get jacked, so I I drive
19	there. And then I'm able to get back on the
20	highway.
21	MR. GIMBEL: And it's your testimony
<u> </u>	before this committee tedan is it. No Mentin

22 before this committee today, is it, Mr. Martin, 23 that were this filling station to be closed by 24 order of the Common Council between midnight and 25 five a.m. it would have no effect on the traffic

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1	and/or other behavior that might be viewed as
2	negative to the neighborhood.
3	THE WITNESS: No. Like I said, it
4	would it would be worse, and then I also want
5	to add that that liquor store across the street
6	closes at nine o'clock. So people congregate
7	there, too, you know, after after it closes.
8	So it's not going to make a difference. And
9	then, I was wondering, you know, how people could
10	say that they seen drug deals going on, you know,
11	like all times of the day and at night. I mean,
12	if you live a thousand feet away from the place.
13	How you going to adequately tell that?
14	MR. GIMBEL: I have no further
15	questions of this witness.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by
17	committee of Mr. Martin at this point? Thank
18	you.
19	MR. GIMBEL: I believe that's it.
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'll allow you I'll
21	allow you at this point a brief closing statement
22	here
23	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you very much.
24	CHAIRMAN BOHL: and then we'll go
25	to Alderman Davis and put this matter into

00093	
1	committee.
2	MR. GIMBEL: Mr. Chairman, members of
3	this committee, having attended many of these
4	hearings on license matters, this being the first
5	one, however, with respect to the new ordinance
6	which requires those people who seek to have
7	their business open for 24 hours a day, an
8	ordinance which I think would not pass the muster
9	of a legal challenge, because I believe it's an
10	"ex post facto" law. It takes away property from
11	people who got permission from the Board of
12	Zoning Appeals that business is open for 24
13	hours. That's not your issue.
14	What I think is your issue is you are
15	fact finders, and you are here today with respect
16	to this application with an allegation that the
17	location that's licensed as a 24 hour
18	establishment will be the source of excess
19	traffic, loitering, littering, disorderly
20	behavior and noise generated by such traffic. I
21	firmly believe that there is not a record here
22	today that would permit you to make a finding
23	that there are facts to demonstrate that this
24	operation is the source of excess traffic,
25	loitering, littering, disorderly behavior and

00094 1 noise generated by such traffic. It is in the 2 vicinity of that kind of behavior. But what 3 needs to happen in order for this application, it 4 seems to me, to be appropriately denied is for 5 you to find facts that support that this is the 6 source of an irritation. 7 You have heard a substantial amount of 8 testimony to the opposite effect of that, and I 9 suggest to you that the testimony of those people 10 who spoke in opposition to this application, when 11 measured against the testimony of the people who 12 spoke in favor of this application, pales to 13 support a negative action on this application, 14 and I urge you to do your duty, and your duty is 15 to be fair and impartial to this applicant, and 16 find that there is not a factual basis to blame 17 this business for those issues that might 18 otherwise exist in that neighborhood or other 19 neighborhoods in the City of Milwaukee, and I ask 20 you to put - - put this matter before the Common 21 Council with a recommendation for approval. 22 Thank you. 23 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Mr. Gimbel. 24 Alderman Davis.

ALDERMAN DAVIS: Thank you, Mr.

00095 1 Chairman. The reason why I object this - -2 object to this application is not because Mr. 3 Mohammed may not be a good person, because I've 4 talked to him numerous times before, and he's 5 readily admitted that some of his employees may 6 not have followed standard protocol as far as his 7 business was concerned to contact my office when this became an issue. No, I'm not saying that. 8 9 Personally, I don't think he's a bad 10 guy. I think he's caught up in something that is 11 - - has caused irreparable harm to those who live 12 in this neighborhood. The quality of life in 13 this neighborhood is an issue to me, and I would 14 assume it is an issue to everyone who lives 15 there, particularly if constituents call my home 16 for someone who is shot through their window, has 17 additional drug dealers in the house next to 18 them, or and last and not least, problems with 19 someone who may be a - - other ethnicity who may have racial disparity who are living next door to 20 21 them who want their elected official to respond 22 in a proper way. 23 What I present to you, Mr. Chairman and 24 this committee, is that these and this, what we 25 have before you, is a neighborhood issue. It is

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1 a neighborhood issue that is ingrained - - It is
2 ingrained upon what you have seen before
3 constituents of mine come before you and base it
4 upon one who is being nice, but also argument
5 that say that it is a substantial problem in this
6 particular neighborhood that is coming from this
7 location.

8 I don't profess to know everything, but 9 one thing I do know is this. I cannot let this 10 community in which I represent, whether folks 11 support me or not, I have an obligation to take a 12 position. Otherwise, I, you know, I'm soft or 13 I'm going to be hard. In this instance I'm going 14 to be hard. And I'll tell you the reason why I'm going to be hard. Because I am not going to let 15 16 a young man or a young woman go to this gas 17 station and get caught up in something that they 18 shouldn't have been caught up in. In fact, let's 19 rewind, back on Sherman and Hampton, where a 20 young baby got killed in crossfire because of 21 gunplay. Everybody knew what was going on, but 22 everybody denies it. I am not going to let this 23 happen in the district in which I represent. And 24 what I'm asking this community to do and what I'm 25 asking this committee to do is take that into

1	consideration, the public safety and the welfare				
2	of the community, the kids in this community and				
3	also the adults in the community.				
4	This has nothing to do with the hours				
5	of five a.m. to 12 o'clock a.m. It has something				
6	to do with 12 a.m. to five a.m. in the morning.				
7	We have loitering going on in the city. We have				
8	young kids that out there, 12 years old, up and				
9	down the streets when they should be at home. So				
10	when I hear that people are talking about my kids				
11	going to this store, God bless you. But they				
12	shouldn't be going to the store at 12 o'clock in				
13	the morning. They should be at home being taught				
14	what is right and what is wrong. Now, I want to				
15	support anyone who wants this gas station for the				
16	right reason, but I'm not going to support it for				
17	the wrong reason. For the right reason, I ask,				
18	Mr. Chairman and this committee, to deny this				
19	application based upon the public safety that is				
20	this cause in the community in which I represent.				
21	Thank you.				
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Alderman				
23	Gordon.				
24	ALDERMAN GORDON: Just one question.				
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Go ahead, Alderman

1	Gordon.				
2	ALDERMAN GORDON: To the applicant or				
3	to Mr. Gimbel. How long has this establishment				
4	had 24 hour license service?				
5	MR. GIMBEL: He's had it for eight				
6	years and it's been day one. And his predecessor				
7	had a 24 hour establishment for multi years				
8	before that.				
9	ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you.				
10	CHAIRMAN BOHL: This matter is now in				
11	committee. Is there a motion?				
12	ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: Mr. Chairman.				
13	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Witkowski.				
14	ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: I move to deny				
15	based on things I've heard here on excess				
16	traffic, loitering, littering, disorderly				
17	conduct, noise, and the adverse impact on the				
18	health and safety and welfare of the				
19	neighborhood.
