<u>PROCEEDINGS</u>

CHAIRMAN BOHL: The first item on the agenda this morning will be in the 1st Aldermanic District,

Theresa A. Tucker, agent for L & T, Incorporated,

Class "B" tavern and tavern renewal application for

Leden's Villard Inn at 4923 West Villard Avenue.

For the committee's knowledge, this was the item where there was one neighbor who showed up, and -- oh, the neighbor is here. Okay.

We received a letter in our packet. The applicant was asked to get building code permits and to assure the neighbor that they have taken some soundproofing measures, and Miss -- is it McDade?

MS. McDADE: Yes.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mrs. McDade is here. Linda, could you swear her in?

(Whereupon Ms. McDade was Sworn Under Oath.)

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. And Mrs. McDade, do

you have anything that you'd like to tell the

committee?

According to the letter that came from Mrs. Tucker, she indicated that they did the sound-proofing. I know that we received an order that said that they had gone and had the building inspection permit pulled. She indicated in her letter that she

and her husband have met with your husband on two occasions due to soundproofing. I just want to see what your testimony is here.

MS. McDADE: He met with my husband a few days after the testimony two weeks ago. He said that -- He showed my husband that they put the speakers up in the ceiling. Then he came back probably Sunday, and my husband did inform him that there were still problems with the bass; that the noise was down just a tiny bit, but there's still problems with the bass. This past weekend I don't see any difference as far as the noise is concerned.

Last week Tuesday we did go to court, and they said -- pleaded guilty to the noise nuisance, and they were issued a ticket. They had to pay a fine of \$150.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are there any questions by committee members of Mrs. McDade?

ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon.

ALDERMAN GORDON: Mrs. McDade, when you and your husband talked with the applicant, did they show you any written documentation that they had had this work done?

MS. McDADE: Not to me, and I'm not sure

about my husband. I don't think that they did. My husband physically went to the establishment, and they had -- I guess they exchanged speakers, said that they put the speakers in the ceiling. I do not know if the speakers are in the same place, which doesn't solve the problem because if that is the case, the speakers are still up against the wall and facing my house.

ALDERMAN GORDON: Did your husband indicate to you that the speakers, even though elevated, were still in the same place that they were previously?

MS. McDADE: I'm not definite. They did turn the music up. This was like 2:00 or 3:00 in the afternoon on a weekday, and the noise level was --Because I'm right two houses south from 49th and Villard, so I'm right off of Villard. The noise -the traffic noise is totally different than it is at night, and I couldn't hear anything, until he came home and told me that they had turned the music up sky-high. I said, well, there's traffic going on, you can't hear anything. It's totally different at night. So I'm not sure if -- of what you said as far as the speakers are concerned, I don't know if they're in the exact place or they're up. I think that they are. I'm not sure if they moved them to the west wall.

ALDERMAN GORDON: But your testimony is that

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this past weekend when they had activities at the bar,

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that the sound -- there was no change in your estimation? 3 4 MS. McDADE: I was in my living room, and --It's the bass. Turn down the bass. And this problem 5 6 has been in existence since December of 2001, and this 7 is my fourth appearance in between you guys and in between court on this matter, and this is getting me a 8 9 little bit, you know, tired. 10 ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you. 11 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon, are you 12 finished? 13 ALDERMAN GORDON: Yes. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Pawlinski? 14 ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, Mrs. McDade, I 15 have a question. Do you think that there's any pull 16 17 for any kind of mediation between you and the bar owner and with the alderman's office being involved? 18 Is there any chance for this situation to get 19 resolved? Because that's -- Now, you know we have 20 21 to make a decision today --22 I understand that. MS. McDADE: 23 ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: -- either to ratify the 24 10 days or to give them another opportunity. Either way, I think there needs to be some communication 25

between the alderman's office. Are you at least hopeful that that can take place and that something can be resolved, or is it --

MRS. McDADE: It's funny, because my frustration is the fact that all the letters that I've sent to the alderman and to the city and to the council here is -- I've invited anybody to come to my house anytime between the hours of 10 and 2 on Fridays and Sunday. No one has appeared. No one has come.

My house is 900 square feet. It's a small house, so -- You know, I wouldn't be down here if it wasn't an issue.

ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: I know, I know.

MS. McDADE: And like the city attorney told me last week, you have to live behind it, so you have to, you know, --

ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: Right.

MS. McDADE: -- do things to satisfy me.

And I think after they had pled guilty, -- because at first they pled not guilty, -- then they pled guilty and had a reduced fine, because --

ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: But I mean if the committee, for example, -- and it's kind of hard to do this, -- but if we were to strongly encourage Alderman Pratt to get personally involved and -- I mean the

committee would say, Alderman, we really want you to 1 2 do this in order to help the committee, --3 MS. McDADE: No, that's fine. 4 ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. 5 MS. McDADE: I don't have a problem working 6 with you. 7 ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: Right, right. MS. McDADE: Like I said before, I work 8 9 different shifts. I have a 14-month-old son. 10 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Right. 11 MS. McDADE: You know, I don't have a 12 problem with them doing -- attending to their 13 business, but I don't need to hear it in my house. 14 ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: Right. I agree with you. 15 16 MS. McDADE: I need you to be sympathetic 17 to my husband and me. ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: I know, I know. 18 MS. McDADE: So I'm willing to work with 19 Councilman Pratt. 20 CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I will personally talk 21 with him on this, and I know that Alderman Pratt will 22 address the problem. 23 If they can turn the bass down, 24 MS. McDADE: 25 because that's the big problem is the bass.

Is there

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CHAIRMAN BOHL: But the volume is not the 1 2 problem, it's the feeling of the vibration? 3 MS. McDADE: The volume has gone down a It's the bass. 4 little bit. The bass vibrates through 5 my house. 6 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you for coming down today. Any other questions of Mrs. McDade? 7 a motion? 8 ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman, I'm going to 9 10 move approval of the original motion that -- It appears that there's been no substantive change, and 11 12 thirdly, if something could occur, then it should, and 13 I agree with your assertions that the alderperson should be involved in this, but there's been no 14 15 substantive change, so my motion is to approve with a 10-day suspension. 16 The motion before us is 17 CHAIRMAN BOHL: 18 approval of the license with the 10-day suspension 19 based on neighborhood objections, Alderman? 20 ALDERMAN GORDON: Correct. 21 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are there any objections to 22 that motion? 23 ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: I won't object, Aldermen, but I would just add the caveat that if 24

we can, either through the chairman or just this

committee, somehow encourage Alderman Pratt to
personally get himself involved, because I'm afraid
that even after the 10-day suspension is completed,
she'll still have the bass problem, and they'll get
the message, but I'm not sure that they'll change
anything. But I mean I'll support the motion as long
as Alderman Pratt is informed that this matter has not
been resolved.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Hearing no objections, so ordered. Thank you for coming down. Hopefully we'll continue to work -- Because I believe Alderman Pawlinski is saying he's in support at this point, and that they'll be shut down for 10 days. That doesn't mean for the other 355 that you're not going to be bothered with this problem. Thank you for coming down.

MRS. McDADE: Thank you.
