






Trauma Response Team

- Expanded to Milwaukee Fire Department
 - All Fire Fighters and EMT's have received trauma response training
- o 2 new clinicians hired
- Focus on increasing community referrals from youth coaches, mentors, schools and youth serving agencies








- ❖ 89 Referrals for services received during this period
- ❖ 39 Referrals from MPD District 7 in August
- Priority to increase community referrals in 2019
- MFD completed training during this period
- ❖ Domestic violence remains highest incident for referral



COMMUNITY RESPONSE TO VIOLENCE















- After 14 straight homicides the first 14 days of August, OVP called community residents together to lead a 21 day response
- ❖ 139 community members came to first meeting and identified activities focused on outreach, conflict mediation, healing, and communications.
- Over 100 residents trained in conflict mediation
- 15 community events supported throughout north and south side
- Counseling services provided to 3 families
- Over \$300,000 in funding to 11 agencies serving over 2,000 youth for summer programming via ReCast Milwaukee (June-Sept.)
- 5 night walk/canvassing events
- Supported Guns Down Miltown Campaign



Coaching Boys to Men

- O Program developed by Futures Without Violence
- O Piloting with 25 coaches throughout Milwaukee
- O Currently reaching over 200 young men
- Focused on healthy masculinity, relationships, respect,
 and sexual assault and domestic violence prevention
- Supported by Commission on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault
- O Intend to expand city-wide in 2019 and statewide by 2020
