# History of PACA

- PACA was founded in 1998/1999 as a Pan-African Committee by a group of concerned Africans and Americans to address the service and system navigation gap African immigrants and refugees were facing in the Milwaukee metro area. As the number of African immigrants and refugees increased the Pan-African Committee was considered as viable entity to become a nonprofit agency.
- In 2002, the Committee started of becoming a nonprofit entity with new name: Pan-African Community Association (PACA).
- In 2004, PACA became a nonprofit agency with the status of 501 (c) (3). The current PACA board consists of diverse background and skill sets.

# History ...

- In 2006, PACA received funding from the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR): Ethnic Communities Self-Help Program and was able to open an office and hired staff to run the organization. ORR funding leveraged more public and private resources; enhancing existing programs and developing new ones. PACA outgrew its original office space within few months and continued expanding renting more space within the same building.
- In early 2011, PACA moved to its current office. Currently, PACA has 7 full time and 3 part time employees from seven different countries. It also has dozens of volunteers from the lager community and institutions for higher education helping with its various programs.


