This issue is one for landlord/tenant law, and the ordinance borders on interfering with their rights to make their own contracts and agreements. If the landlord allows its tenants to have more than three pets, the petowners should have every right to care for that many pets, provided they are following any other ordinances associated with pet ownership. Responsible petowners are able to give homes to animals that may not otherwise have homes. Taking their rights away is not only inherently wrong, but will also have a bad effect on the animals. As we have seen from some horrific events in the news about animals lately, we must realize that they too have rights and deserve to be treated with the utmost respect. Preventing them from being accepted into a loving home is not respect.

Thank you for your time in considering the opposition of these two ordinances.
