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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Back in the 4th
3	District, Jatinder Singh, Agent for "Pick N
4	Choose, Inc." Class "A" Malt renewal application
5	with a change of agent for "Pick N Choose" at
6	1904 West State Street. Good afternoon.
7	THE APPLICANT: Good afternoon.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Please raise your
9	right hand, we can swear you in.
10	(Whereupon the applicant was sworn.)
11	THE APPLICANT: Yes.
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your name and
13	address for the record, please.
14	THE APPLICANT: My name is Jatinder
15	Singh. I live on 6129 South 13th Street,
16	Apartment number eight, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Did you get
18	that address okay?
19	COURT REPORTER: I think so.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: 6129 South 13th
21	Street, right?
22	MR. AHMAD: Munjed Ahmad on behalf of
23	Jatinder Singh and Pick N Choose, Incorporated.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Singh, do you
25	admit to receiving a letter stating that there's

00003 1	a possibility your application could be denied
2	because of neighborhood objections to loitering,
3	littering, unruly behavior, drug and criminal
4	activity, conduct which is detrimental to the
5	health, safety and welfare of the neighborhood.
6	Furthermore, objections to the renewal of the
7	license due to the blighted condition of the
8	premises and the applicant's failure to remodel
9	the premises as promised in the last renewal
10	hearing in 2006. Do you remember receiving a
11	letter like that?
12	THE APPLICANT: Yes.
13	MR. AHMAD: We knowledge receipt.
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Health Department?
15	HEALTH: No objections.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Neighborhood
17	Services?
18	DNS: No objections.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And can I see a
20	show of hands? Is there anyone here in the
21	audience to testify relative to 1904 West State
22	Street, other than Okay. And, sir, are you
23	going to testify in support or objection?
24	THE WITNESS: In support.
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: In support.

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1	Alderman Bauman, you want to give us a little
2	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Yeah, thank you,
3	Mister
4	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: background?
5	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair. If you
6	recall we had this matter in front of you
7	approximately a year ago, and you have transcript
8	of the entire hearing. And in that tran And
9	in that hearing the issue was raised as to the
10	physical condition of the premises, and I believe
11	I showed you a photograph which the Linda has
12	copies of. The photograph showing a blue front
13	on this building is the condition as it existed
14	at the last hearing. Basically, it speaks for
15	itself. It had blue ply It had plywood
16	painted blue with screens covering what
17	essentially were plexiglass windows above the
18	blue, and then the building was painted white.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: A rather A
20	rather pretty blue, but go ahead. Nice blue.
21	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: The issue was joined
22	as to the condition of the building, and this
23	being a major concern of the neighborhood and a
24	major concern of mine. And the And Counsel
25	for the applicant, who is also present today, Mr.

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1	Ahmad, made several statements, and I think to
2	expedite things, starting on page seven of the
3	transcript at line four, Mr. Ahmad said, "I have
4	been It's funny she should mention the
5	windows," referring to a witness, "because we
6	just got an estimate of 17,500 dollars and some
7	change to actually put windows on the building.
8	We're actually trying to work with Milwaukee
9	Economic Development committee to ease, soften
10	some of the blow of the 17 plus thousand. That's
11	just for the windows. There are other
12	improvement issues that we have actually begun to
13	undertake in terms of remodeling the inside of
14	the building. But, no, we don't own
15	Specifically, we don't own the building. It is
16	in the family and it won't matter. The landlord,
17	again, is my cousin. So he's not being asked to
18	pay for any of the work. We're going to take
19	care of this on his own."
20	He goes on to say on page eight,
21	beginning at line four of the transcript. "The
22	siding is relatively new . We're actually going

beginning at line four of the transcript. "The siding is relatively new. We're actually going to cut into that siding and put some larger windows. The idea behind this is aesthetic, as well as so what's inside and outside is more

00006 1 2 3 4 5	visible to us and to others. And, God forbid, if we are robbed, we would hope that a neighbor would notice that and call the police. So we are actually considering everything that she's already brought up. We've already actually
6	thought of that ahead of today's meeting."
7	Now the second exhibit I submit to you
8	is a photograph dated June 28th, 2007, showing
9	the identical storefront with the blue painted
10	white and the screens taken off the windows. And
11	that is their renovations.
12	THE APPLICANT: That's incorrect.
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bau
14	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: And then they go on
15	to say – –
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bauman,
17	can I ask?
18	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Yes.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Who took these
20	pictures?
21	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: I did. Both cases.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Both cases. I
23	I have to compliment you in standing on the
24	exact, same spot a year later. If you look at
25	both of those pictures. I've taken before and

00007 after pictures before, and I - - I never seem to 1 2 remember the exact same spot. I always get a 3 little bit different angle. But I compliment you 4 in standing the exact same spot. 5 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Getting ahead to Mr. 6 Ahmad's promise to this committee, go to page 19 7 of the transcript, line eight. "So I would note that" - - This is Mr. Ahmad talking. "So I would 8 9 note that, with respect to Alderman Bauman, I 10 reject the notion that he - - that we're trying 11 to put a facade for - - for the committee. It's 12 - - This couldn't be further from the case. The 13 remodeling, it's - - it's something that we have 14 - - It's been near and dear to us. We've been in 15 constant conversation regarding that. Whether we 16 get an MADC approved loan or not, it's going to 17 happen. We won't be here next year. And if we 18 were here next year, I hope we're not going to be 19 here next year, but if - - if we are here next 20 year, you'll find that Alderman Bauman will be 21 able to tell you that the remodeling has been 22 done." Alderman Bauman: "If it's not, do you agree to surrender the license." Mr. Ahmad: "I 23 24 do." Alderman Bauman: "On the record?" Mr. 25 Ahmad: "I do. I have no problem with that.

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1	Alderman Bauman wants to make it look like I'm
2	lying, or wants to make – – look like I'm trying
3	to mislead this committee. And with due respect
4	to Alderman Bauman, that that's not the case.
5	I respect Alderman Bauman. I know what he's
6	trying to do with the community. And for that, I
7	appreciate that. I'm a resident in Milwaukee,
8	and I do appreciate what you're trying to do,
9	Alderman. But to paint me and my father as
10	people who are going to lie to this committee, I
11	take offense to that. I would respectfully
12	request that if we're here next year, that we do
13	address that issue." And then I think the
14	Mr. Chair, you had some outstanding comments in
15	which you were suggesting and I'll read your
16	comments. I think they should be part of the
17	record.
18	ALDERMAN WADE: What page?
1.0	

19ALDERMAN BAUMAN: That's page 21,20beginning at line 23. Chairman Witkowiak:21"Before we put this matter in committee, I just22have a couple of comments. When you - - I'm - -23I'm pleased to hear that you're going to do24something about the appearance of that building.25What I would suggest, before you actually do

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1	that, is make sure that you have an architect
2	design the windows. Because that's just why I
3	was asking if it was a I figured figured
4	where this was coming from. If it's a brick
5	building, it's usually predetermined where the
6	windows are supposed to go. But, oftentimes, I
7	see on these wood frame buildings, that somebody
8	says they're going to put in windows, but the
9	windows are out of scale. Usually they are too
10	small. So then they'll say, well, I said I was
11	going to put windows in, you know, and they put
12	three little windows in like this along the whole
13	side of the building. So make sure that you have
14	an architect look at it and say that these
15	windows are the correct scale for the building
16	this size. The point I'm trying to make is
17	is you're going to do improvements. You're going
18	to make spend some money on the place. Make
19	sure you do it absolutely right." Mr. Ahmad:
20	"Absolutely."
21	And, of course, Exhibit A and B show

$\angle \perp$	And, of Course, Exhibit A and B show
22	substantially no improvements, and I would argue,
23	a changing of the blue to white, actually cause
24	the building to look worse. So that that's
25	my case. This is almost a contract case. A

00010 1 promise was made, representations were made and 2 they weren't delivered. So I move that this be 3 nonrenewed. 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente 5 moves to make the - - the pictures presented of 6 the 2006 photograph and the 2007 photograph part 7 of the permanent record in this hearing. Hearing no objections, so ordered. Alderman Bauman, you 8 9 presented a very compelling case. Could you 10 respond to - - to that, please? 11 MR. AHMAD: Absolutely, I can. First, 12 Alderman Bauman - - Bauman is incorrect about the 13 windows being the exact same windows. Those 14 windows were, in fact, replaced. Those are brand new windows. Yes, and that whole wall there, 15 16 that whole blue wall is a brand new wall. That's 17 not the same wall. It's not just a painted wall. 18 It's a brand new wall. 19 So Alderman Bauman has ignored those 20 improvements. Alderman Bauman has ignored the 21 paint - - I don't know what Alderman Bauman wants. Because Alderman Bauman refuses to return 22 23 my phone calls. So it becomes a little bit 24 difficult for me to comply with what he wants, 25 when I can never get him to return my phone

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1	calls. For example, when I had the gentleman at
2	the store for the windows, I called Alderman
3	Bauman and left him a message saying, you know, I
4	have some issues with the windows. Would you
5	like to come and see them? Nobody returned my
6	call. I had a issue with the pay phone that you
7	can see on the side there, and I called Alderman
8	Bauman's office, left a message indicating, you
9	know, Alderman Bauman, I'd like to talk to you
10	about this pay phone issue. Alderman Bauman
11	never returned my call. Why? I don't know. I
12	don't know if he just doesn't want to have
13	personal contact with me or or if he just
14	wants to do his best to ensure that this license
15	is not renewed. I don't know. But I called him
16	at least two or three occasions, and Alderman
17	Bauman for some reason, again, refuses to return
18	my calls. That's fine. That's That's within
19	his right, I guess, not to return my calls. I
20	have no problem with that.
21	But for him to suggest that nothing was
22	renovated is absolutely false. I'm sure even the

<u> </u>	Due for nime co buggebe enac nothing wab
22	renovated is absolutely false. I'm sure even the
23	witness will tell you that those windows are all
24	brand new windows. It's not just a matter of
25	taking out the security gate. These are brand

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1	new windows. When I was here last year, it was
2	in my mind that I would do larger windows.
3	That's true. However, frankly, to be honest with
4	you, in speaking with the employees, they were
5	scared for for me to do that. They were
6	scared to have a large window, because there's a
7	large exchange of cash pretty often. We cash
8	checks there every once in a while, so they're
9	worried that, it being so visible, that there's
10	going to be problems there. However, again, I'll
11	note that the siding has always been nice. The -
12	- And I have some pictures. We added new lights.
13	We added security cameras to the exterior of the
14	building. If I have two photos. I'll show
15	one to Alderman Bauman.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay.
17	MR. AHMAD: We added security cameras
18	to the outside. We removed the pay phone.
19	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Is the crack in the
20	wall you want us to look at or what?
21	MR. AHMAD: It's the security camera.
22	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Ah.
23	MR. AHMAD: You're You're You
24	know, him being facetious shouldn't reflect on
25	the fact that this is a security camera, and it

00013 1 does - - it does do its job, and that's 2 surveillance. What essentially happens with this 3 security camera is there's a TV, if you will, 4 inside the store. So if there are any people 5 hanging out in the front or anything of that 6 nature, that the people inside know to tell 7 somebody from the outside, from the inside, to go 8 out and tell people to go - -9 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Do you agree this 10 photograph shows plywood, major plywood covering 11 an opening? 12 MR. AHMAD: I don't know. I don't have 13 the picture, so. 14 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Here. Take another 15 look. Do you agree that that one shows plywood 16 covering the window opening? 17 MR. AHMAD: There is plywood there, but 18 that's not the intent of the - - I mean, you 19 know, there's no - - there are no underage sales. 20 There are no underage cigarette sales. There are 21 no loose cigarette sales. There are no single 22 cigarettes being sold there. There are no single 23 beers being sold there. This store has been in 24 the - - in the family since 1992 or '93, okay. 25 Last year and this year were the first two - -

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1	first times in years that we've been here, and
2	you can check with the Sergeant. You can check
3	with Mr. Schrimpf, and they'll tell you that as
4	well. For some reason Alderman Bauman has
5	something against either the store itself, or the
6	store owners. I don't know what the problem is.
7	He's never responded to me to find out. He wants
8	me to make improvements. He wants the store to
9	become improved. But yet, won't do anything to
10	sit down and tell me what he exactly wants. He
11	wants to come here and tell this committee don't
12	don't give him the license. You don't renew
13	it. You don't do this. But at the same time, he
14	doesn't want to do anything to help the
15	situation. He just wants the store closed. It
16	seems to me Alderman Bauman just wants a closed
17	building in his neighborhood. That's what it
18	seems to me.
19	You know, the pay phones being removed.
20	I have more pictures of the store if if you
21	want to see. We added a a larger waste bin,
22	as you can see.
23	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: On the sidewalk.
24	MR. AHMAD: It's not on the sidewalk,
25	actually. Did you go to Have you ever been

00015 to the store, Alderman? 1 2 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. Point of 3 order, Alderman. 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente. 5 ALDERMAN PUENTE: You know, last time I 6 remember we did this, and we've got - - one 7 person at a time. 8 MR. AHMAD: I'm try - - I let him 9 speak. 10 ALDERMAN PUENTE: I know. 11 MR. AHMAD: I let him speak. 12 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Both parties. 13 MR. AHMAD: Alderman Bauman has not 14 even set foot inside the store. We spent over 20,000 dollars inside the store. He has never 15 been inside the store. He hasn't - - He refuses 16 17 to do anything. I've dealt with many aldermen 18 before. I've dealt with many, many situations of 19 this sort before, you know, as an attorney. I 20 have never, except for Alderman Bauman, I have 21 never seen an alderman that refuses to talk to 22 the people in his neighborhood, to the businesses 23 in his neighborhood. I have - - This is the first alderman ever to do that. I don't know 24 25 why. I don't know if there is some hidden agenda

00016 1 here or what. I don't know. 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente. ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair. 3 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Hold it. Alderman 5 Puente moves to make the photographs submitted by 6 the Applicant's attorney part of the permanent 7 record in this hearing. And hearing no objections, so ordered. But we're not going to 8 9 get into tit for tat here. But - - But briefly, 10 you want to just - -11 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: I'll respond very 12 briefly. 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. 14 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Since the last 15 hearing, Mr. Ahmad or anyone on his behalf has 16 never contacted my office. Absolutely, 17 unequivocally not. That's a bald-faced lie. I 18 can bring my assistant down here, too. She can 19 testify at the appropriate time. It's 20 irrelevant. He made a promise, and the - - the 21 photographs are all the testimony that's needed. 22 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. 23 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: He made a promise, 24 and he figures the one way to weasel out of this 25 promise is somehow blame me that I'm not

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1	interested in the condition of of this
2	property or whatever the allegation is. It's a
3	bald-faced lie. There have been no attempts to
4	contact my office. There have been no attempts
5	to communicate with the Department of City
6	Development regarding facade grants, process to
7	help him get involved in, been no communication,
8	whatsoever.
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: There's one
10	witness here that wishes to testify. Sir, would
11	you come and give us your testimony, please.
12	THE WITNESS: Up here.
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yeah, go ahead.
14	Got to raise your right hand. We have to swear
15	you in.
16	(Whereupon the witness was sworn.)
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your name and
18	address for the record, please.
19	THE WITNESS: Kenneth Edwards. 845
20	North 26th Street, Apartment 311.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: How close do you
22	live to the store?
23	THE WITNESS: Approximately five
24	blocks.
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Are you employed

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1	by the store?
2	THE WITNESS: No, I'm not.
3	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Then your
4	testimony, sir.
5	THE WITNESS: Okay. For the record, I
6	would like to note that my permanent address is
7	2122 West Highland, which I was born and raised
8	in the house which is three blocks from the
9	store.
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay.
11	THE WITNESS: Okay. I can contest that
12	the store has made improvements. I can't say
13	that if they lived up to the requirements that
14	the Alderman has requested or not. But the store
15	is a landmark. I've been there when it was Vice
16	Lords and GD, graffiti all sprawled across the -
17	- the storefront, when the pay phone outside the
18	store was shot up by bullet holes. I was at the
19	basketball park. That's across the street from
20	the store working on my game, which got me
21	through college. And I've been there for over 20
22	years, so I would just like to say the store
23	serves in the community, and there are still
24	neighbors that can play, as almost a safe haven.
25	And the people that's been at the store has been

00019 1 good to us, and has been fair to us since the 2 beginning. And there are no windows at the 3 store, because I remember going in the store 4 myself last year looking out the window, and it 5 was scratched, and I could barely see my car 6 outside the window, to go in the store just 7 recently a few weeks ago and see clearly across 8 the whole field and across the houses across the 9 street. You could not do that last year. Are 10 they expensive windows? I don't know. Is the 11 outside panel the same or not, I don't pay that 12 much attention. We usually walk through the 13 door, we get what we need, and - - and we walk 14 out. But I can say they have made improvement 15 after improvement on trying to make the 16 storefront better, and I know they're working 17 with a limited amount of money. They don't make 18 as much as some corner stores make, but they have 19 served a good purpose in the community for 20 20 years and counting. That's before the alderman 21 was the alderman, and that they were store 22 owners. I knew the previous store owners before that. And taking that store away would do a very 23 24 dangerous and unfortunate harm to the community. 25 And since we all are intelligent people here, I

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1	can look at you and tell, I'll just cut right to
2	the results. If you take the store away, what
3	happens then? Where Where do the children
4	go? How far do the little girls have to walk,
5	considering the nature of Milwaukee inner city,
6	and considering the violence that this summer,
7	last summer has produced alone, multiplied the
8	previous summers. It wouldn't be a very safe
9	thing to do. There's no other area around there
10	that's close that would present a storefront for
11	that area.
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Tell me something.
13	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Besides
15	besides beer, what can you purchase in that
16	store?
17	THE WITNESS: Oh, you can purchase hot
18	Hoghead cheese, which is my grandmother's
19	favorite. Bread, rice. My mother loves Pepsi
20	and 7-Ups, which they get from there. You can
21	get my favorite, which is Gatoraid after I'm done
22	playing basketball. You get fruit, bananas. You
23	get potato chips. You can get cookies. There's
24	a frozen food aisle for the people that just
25	don't have food that night. That's a pretty good

1	price, too, 99 pieces, 2.99 pieces, and then some
2	expensive food that I don't purchase, the hot
3	wings. You can for a dollar You can get meat
4	measured by the dollar. A dollar worth, or two
5	dollar worth of ground beef, hot dogs, polishes,
6	cheese.
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: That's fresh?
8	There's a fresh meat counter?
9	THE WITNESS: There's fresh meat every
10	day. I never been sick. Never got sick from it.
11	I've been eating there for years. You can even
12	buy shoestrings, season salt. I can go on. I
13	mean, I've been a resident in that area forever.
14	I can almost name every item they have in that
15	store, including Pick 3 tickets.
16	MR. SCHRIMPF: The Health Department is
17	relieved to hear that. Thank you.
18	MR. AHMAD: I would also just note,
19	just quickly. He said that he's been going to
20	the store for 20 years. Before my dad had it in
21	'93, it was my uncle's store for ten years. So
22	this store's been in the family for over 30 some
23	vears.
24	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair, if I could
25	just wrap up.

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1	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes.
2	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: You know, the last
3	hearing we had testimony about owner occupants
4	moving out, because of the store, and the
5	loitering and the disorder this store creates,
6	the litter that this store creates, resident
7	being afraid to live kitty corner from this
8	establishment. Residents who had bought homes
9	and who have subsequently moved out of those
10	homes. But we're not going to get into all that,
11	because we This boils down to the simple
12	promise, simple representation made to this
13	committee, when a major issue at the last hearing
14	was the issue of the physical condition of this
15	property. It is the same facade. They repainted
16	the plywood boards. We can all go out there and
17	make a field trip if you want. You will see that
18	those are old plywood on there. And the windows
19	are plexiglass windows. If they spent 750
20	dollars, I'd be surprised, much less 17,000
21	dollars. They didn't have to say they were going
22	to spend 17,000 dollars last time. They didn't
23	have to say they were going to open up all these
24	windows. They came in here. Made grandiose
25	promises in order to convince this committee to

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1	get them another chance, despite neighborhood
2	objections at the time and my objections at the
3	time.
4	MR. AHMAD: If we're going
5	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: And they didn't
6	deliver. It's very simple. And they didn't have
7	to make those promises. They didn't have to
8	promise they'd surrender the license if they
9	didn't do the improvements and make all these
10	assurances, don't worry, you won't see us back
11	next year. This is going to be new and improved.
12	We're going to spend this money and we're - The
13	record speak for itself. This is not even a
14	close case.
15	MR. AHMAD: If I could respond to that.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead.
17	MR. AHMAD: We were going to be here
18	anyway. No matter what. Alderman Bauman does
19	not want this store in there. Okay. No matter
20	what happened. We're going to be here. He talks
21	about all the neighborhood objections. I haven't
22	heard one yet. Okay. He talks about litter. He
23	took this picture. I didn't. I don't see any
24	litter there. He talks about loitering. He took
25	this picture. I didn't. I don't see any

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1	loitering. I haven't seen one shred of evidence
2	of anything that he says here. He says that
3	there wasn't improvements. No, there weren't
4	improvements the way he expected or wanted them.
5	Okay. But that's his own fault. He could have
6	returned my calls. And I You know what,
7	Alderman can say I didn't call him. I'm an
8	officer of the court. I have no reason to lie
9	about that. I did call him, and I did speak to
10	his assistant. If he wants to bring her down, he
11	can. He can put her under oath, because I know I
12	spoke to her. I'm not stupid. I'll get my phone
13	records, Alderman. I'll show you.
14	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: So if she would say
15	no, you'd call her a liar.
16	MR. AHMAD: Yes, I would.
17	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Okay.
18	MR. AHMAD: Because I did speak to her.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We're not
20	We're not We're not going to go any further
21	with this argument. Okay. Do we have any
22	any more questions by members of the committee?
23	Alderman Puente?
24	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead. Do you

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1	have records on what you spent on the store, or
2	your clients has records, receipts of the windows
3	and what he's all done in the last year?
4	MR. AHMAD: Yeah, I'm sure I can get
5	you receipts. Absolutely.
6	ALDERMAN PUENTE: You don't have them
7	here, though.
8	MR. AHMAD: I don't have them here, no.
9	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Can you ask him
10	approximately what he has spent?
11	MR. AHMAD: Interior and exterior?
12	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Everything.
13	MR. AHMAD: I'm going to estimate
14	20,000 - 25,000 dollars, interior and
15	interior and exterior.
16	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Right. I understand.
17	Those are all improvements.
18	MR. AHMAD: Right.
19	ALDERMAN PUENTE: And you know that
20	because you've discussed it with him, or?
21	MR. AHMAD: Well, the store is owned by
22	my father.
23	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Oh, that way, okay.
24	MR. AHMAD: So I know, because I have
25	some firsthand knowledge.

00026 1 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. 2 MR. AHMAD: I know - - I know there are 3 receipts. ALDERMAN PUENTE: So your - - your 4 5 father did the improvements, and not this 6 gentleman. 7 MR. AHMAD: Right. 8 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. And your 9 father has the receipts. 10 MR. AHMAD: Right. 11 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. Thank you, Mr. 12 Chair. 13 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. 14 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Oh, yeah. One 15 second. Just out of curiosity, roughly what 16 percentage of your gross sales are beer related 17 to the other stuff? 18 MR. AHMAD: And - - And that was the 19 question that was asked to me last year, and I'll 20 - - and I'll respond the same. I think between 21 25 to 30 percent. I'm not sure, because I - - I 22 honestly have my own - - my own office. I don't 23 really go to the store that often, frankly. 24 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. 25 ALDERMAN WADE: Yeah. Just - - Just

00027 1 looking at - - You got pictures. You got the 2 pictures of the store. 3 MR. AHMAD: Yes. 4 ALDERMAN WADE: I got to - - I got to 5 be honest with you. I - - I expected something different, too, based on the amount of time we 6 7 spent on this, and testimony from last year. I 8 expected it to be a totally glass front, and 9 - - and like a lot of other stores in - - in my 10 district and other districts, people are getting 11 glass front back. I think if you would have 12 tinted the windows, maybe that would have 13 discouraged people from being able to see 14 transactions of money in certain areas of the 15 store, whatnot. I don't know. I mean, some 16 things that could be done, but I expected it to 17 look a lot different than what it looks. Just by 18 me looking at it, I - - I don't think it's what -19 - It's not what you promised, in my opinion. And I'm - - I'm - - I don't like - - It seems like 20 what - - what Alderman Bauman said you did, 21 22 that's what you did. Now, maybe you did, I mean, 23 it looked like you took the screens off and the 24 windows were behind there, and you got some 25 smaller windows. I thought it was going to be a

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1	lot different, and I I didn't I don't
2	know if anybody else did, asked you to make the
3	statements that if these are not done, we'll
4	surrender our license. We won't be here next
5	year.
6	MR. AHMAD: Alderman Alderman
7	Bauman asked me that question.
8	ALDERMAN WADE: So, I mean, but you did
9	go on record of saying that.
10	MR. AHMAD: Correct.
11	ALDERMAN WADE: Those were your words.
12	MR. AHMAD: Sure. I stand by those
13	words, Alderman.
14	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. And I just want,
15	just so you know, I'm personally not satisfied
16	with the aesthetics of of the improvement. $I$
17	mean, it may have been 100,000 dollars. I can't
18	see it. And I'm I You know, I cannot see
19	it.
20	MR. AHMAD: I understand. And I will
21	be honest with you. When I was here last year, I
22	did not expect the response from the employees
23	that I got, that we got. And frankly, I have to
24	weigh their safety concerns with with what's
25	going on here, as well. I mean, this is not

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1	just, with respect to the entire committee, this
2	is not just a one-way street. I have to weigh
3	their concerns, as well. They're human beings
4	that have fears. So I have to weigh that, as
5	well. And that's what happened. Whether he
6	wants to believe it or not, that's what happened.
7	And And I didn't And honestly, excuse me,
8	I don't mean
9	ALDERMAN WADE: Um-hnh.
10	MR. AHMAD: I never even considered the
11	tinted windows route. It didn't even come into
12	my head until you mentioned that. I didn't even
13	know you can do that.
14	ALDERMAN WADE: Well, I know I have
15	some stores in my district, and I have
16	recommended that they do that. Some have. But
17	if I may continue, Mr. Chair, I – – I just – –
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead.
19	ALDERMAN WADE: You know, I don't I
20	don't know You can do better, is basically
21	what it comes down to. To me, I feel like I'm
22	getting misled. That's how I feel.
23	MR. AHMAD: And that wasn't the
24	intention at all. I'll be - I'll be clear about
25	that. That was never the intention. Alderman

00030 1 Wade, you and I have had many discussions. I've 2 never ever lied to you, misrepresented anything 3 to you. And I think you - - you know that. 4 ALDERMAN WADE: Well, I would - - I 5 would also like to have, I mean, I can't mandate 6 this or force this, but I would like to have - -7 have heard that you and Alderman had some dialog. 8 MR. AHMAD: I tried to. ALDERMAN WADE: That you guys talked 9 10 and worked through this. 11 MR. AHMAD: I tried. I'm sorry. 12 ALDERMAN WADE: But for a whole year to 13 go and no dialog, and - - and none of the things 14 were met. To me, that's - - that's irresponsible 15 on somebody's part. I don't know who. 16 MR. AHMAD: I - - I - -17 ALDERMAN WADE: These two grown adult 18 people, you know, both attorneys, very educated 19 guys, good speaking skills. I don't know why 20 that you two couldn't get together and come to a 21 - - agreement, so we wouldn't be here. 22 MR. AHMAD: I - - I - - Again, I'll 23 tell you as an officer of the court, I did call 24 him at least twice. Whether he wants to believe 25 it or deny it, that's his problem.

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1	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: There were no calls.
2	MR. AHMAD: That's your assessment, but
3	I swear to you, I swear to God, I swear to Allah,
4	I called him at least twice.
5	ALDERMAN WADE: That's just my
6	commentary on it.
7	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. We're going
9	to wrap this up soon. Mr. Schrimpf.
10	MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you. Just to DNS.
11	Were Do you have records? Would there have
12	been any permits taken out on this?
13	DNS: There were no permits for window
14	replacement. We had received a couple of
15	complaints on the property. The most recent one
16	was 3/8 of '07, that said it was a nuisance
17	property. Please inspect for exterior code
18	violations. Our inspector did go out and issue
19	two orders, and they were both complied with.
20	And one in March and one in April of this year?
21	MR. SCHRIMPF: Were those orders from -
22	- Or strike that. Were those complaints from the
23	Alderman's office or were they from another
24	source.
25	DNS: We do keep our complaints

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1	anonymous. Let me see what source is on that
2	one. It says it was from another City
3	department, is all it said.
4	MR. AHMAD: I have a guess.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do
6	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair.
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do you need a
8	permit to replace windows?
9	DNS: If you're changing the size.
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Oh, he put in
11	windows the same size, right? He would not.
12	DNS: If he was changing it and needs a
13	new header size or anything like that, yes, he
14	would need a permit.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: So he may have
16	replaced these windows legally.
17	DNS: Correct.
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente?
19	ALDERMAN PUENTE: What were the orders
20	for? What did they have to do?
21	DNS: There's two separate orders. One
22	was actually interior stuff. He had missing
23	coverplates on junction boxes. Clearance to
24	electrical panel. Obtain smoke detectors. And
25	something, it's called temperature actuator

00033 1 module. The other one was - -ALDERMAN PUENTE: What is that? What 2 3 "temperature modular" who? 4 DNS: It says, "switch controlling 5 exhaust fan in front basement near steps," is 6 what it says. The other order was paint all wood surfaces and paint masonry surfaces where needed. 7 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. And they 8 9 complied to all those. 10 DNS: Those were complied with, yes. 11 ALDERMAN PUENTE: All right. Thank 12 you. 13 VICE-CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are there any 14 other questions by committee at this time? Any additional comments here? Alderman Bauman? 15 16 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: No. I think that the 17 record's clear. 18 VICE-CHAIRMAN BOHL: We are in 19 committee. I'll pass the gavel. 20 ALDERMAN WADE: Alderman Bohl. 21 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. My motion 22 is actually going to be to hold this matter until 23 next week, Thursday. There's a meeting on the 26th. And I'm going to make a couple requests. 24 25 First off, I'm actually going to, between now and

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1	then, make a personal visit here to look in on
2	the store. Additionally, I would like to see
3	whatever records may be had in terms of the
4	amount of investment that was that was
5	actually spent in the past year. I One of my
6	One of my concerns, and I will just reiterate
7	the comment made by Alderman Wade. That is, my
8	expectations would have certainly been higher in
9	terms of comments that were made last year. But
10	I But I do have I do have some concerns
11	about how much leeway this this committee,
12	this Council has with with with statutory
13	requirements over over liquor licenses. And
14	I just ultimately we we've had times where
15	we've had individuals that have come here over
16	and made complaints over beef that was raw. And
17	what relation that may have had with a liquor
18	license, I'm not certain. I do believe that it
19	is it is somewhat of a stretch to start
20	regulating with an existing property license,
21	other unrelated aspects to that license and
22	trying to tie it in with with the sale of
23	liquor. That may not be adverse secondary
24	effects to that liquor license. So I just I
25	personally would like to see that what the

00035 1 2 3	what type of investment has been made. I I think that that that has some bearing on on a decision that I would make. But I just
4	ultimately will say that that I I'm
5	disappointed in that I think that the level of -
6	- of improvement could have been better. I
7	really believe that this committee is somewhat
8	limited in terms of the sanction that it can
9	present.
10	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair. I don't
11	want to I know you're in committee, but I've
12	asked the City Attorney that question, and I
13	think the City Attorney can explain that this is
14	precisely within your purview, based on the
15	promise that was made before the committee.
16	ALDERMAN BOHL: To hold
17	ALDERMAN WADE: At this At this
18	time At this time, Alderman Bohl At this
19	time, Alderman Bohl, are you done with your
20	recommendation?
21	ALDERMAN BOHL: Yes. Yes.
22	ALDERMAN WADE: Are there any other
23	committee members that would like to comment on
24	the recommendation?
25	ALDERMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Chairman.

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1	ALDERMAN WADE: Alderman Witkowiak.
2	ALDERMAN WITKOWIAK: The problem is we
3	we don't have time for findings of fact if
4	there is if we hold this matter. Ms. Barron?
5	MR. SCHRIMPF: That would be a problem.
6	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would that be a
7	problem?
8	MR. SCHRIMPF: Yeah. Because
9	Because you would not have enough time to
10	Let's say the committee took some adverse action.
11	You would not have enough time to get the
12	findings out and received in order to This
13	license expires when?
14	MR. AHMAD: I believe in September,
15	sometime. I'm not sure exactly.
16	MS. BARRON: September 16th.

SCHRIMPF: Because - - Yeah, my 9 secretary went home, so she's not hearing me say 10 this. SCHRIMPF: Well, there's a - -8 There's a couple of Wisconsin cases that - - that 9 talk about the fact that even though something is 10 not particularly mentioned in a Statute or an 11 Ordinance, but if it's related to the health, 12 safety and welfare, the - - the Council can 13 consider it in a renewal decision. And I think 14 this sort of thing would go in that direction. 15 In other words, you're - - you're considering the 16 safety of the building, the condition of the 17 building. These things are related. 18 ALDERMAN BOHL: Well, and here's where 19 I'll kind of go on. Does - - Does - - Does 20 somebody's word that they're going to put 17,000 21 dollars worth of windows and the fact that, you 22 know, they put two grand worth of windows that 23 are brand new, actually hit on health, safety and 24 welfare? I think that's an extreme stretch. And 25 if I'm going to - - If I'm a judge, I'd throw you

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1	on your butt. I'll be perfectly candid.
2	MR. SCHRIMPF: You wouldn't be the
3	first one.
4	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade.

7	cited for, the last sentence says, and this is
8	for the City Attorney, Assistant City Attorney,
9	the last sentence it says, "Furthermore,
10	objections to the renewal of the license due to
11	the blighted condition of the premises, and the
12	applicant applicant's failure to remodel the
13	premises as promised at the last renewal hearing
14	in 2006."
15	MR. SCHRIMPF: They got the notice.
16	ALDERMAN WADE: Because Because
17	it's cited for that, can we use that as grounds
18	to to proceed in whatever
19	MR. SCHRIMPF: Sure.
20	ALDERMAN WADE: I mean, from from
21	the ten day all the way to nonrenewal, can
22	Because it's cited for that, can we use that?
23	MR. SCHRIMPF: Yeah.
24	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay.
25	ALDERMAN BOHL: I'm going to stand by

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1	my motion.
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl's
3	motion, which is appropriate, is to hold this
4	matter at the Call of the Chair.
5	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.
6	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade, on
7	the motion.
