
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

Departmental Budget Appropriation Category







Net decrease in salary costs from the 2019 Adopted Budget resulting from eliminating 6 positions and adding 3.

Reduction in net salary costs from 2019 Adopted Budget including a \$649,333 decrease in estimated fringe benefit costs.







Staffing

Unfunded Inspectors

Fifteen (23%) of the department's 65 authorized residential code enforcement inspector positions for 2020 (including 3 auxiliaries) are unfunded.

6% Vacancy Rate

- 12 Inspectors
- 6 Assistants & Administration

Eliminated 6 positions - Added 3

Staffing

Downspout Disconnection

The first of 10 Residential Code Enforcement Inspectors authorized in the 2019 Adopted Budget was hired on July 1, and by September 30, a total of 5 had been hired. A staff of 10 inspectors, a district supervisor and one support assistant are proposed for 2020.



Number of permits requested online in 2018 and 2019 - 61% of the 57,759 permits requested.




Land Management System - LMS

The department continues to work on implementing the City's LMS activity management platform introduced in October, 2016. A major challenge has been to update property tax-keys when they change to ensure fee charges appear on the proper tax bill. The department must now enter these changes manually, and has contacted vendors in search of a more efficient automated solution.

Deconstruction & Demolition

Deconstruction:

- 12 parcels under contact. Contract set to begin in October or November.
- Pre-deconstruction asbestos inspection and removal completed on 50 parcels at a cost of \$410,000.

Mechanical Demolition:

- 47 private contracts in 2019, including 30 properties in a concentrated area of blight bounded roughly by 14th to 23rd Streets from the 2100 to 2600 block north, at a cost of \$737,000.
- DPW has completed 8-9 demolitions, and is expected to complete 16-20 parcels by yearend.

Code Compliance Loan Demographics

Of the 101 loans closed in 2018 and through September, 2019, for a total loaned of \$1,309,711:

- Average loan amount \$12,867
- Average income \$21,018
- Average assessment \$53,247
- 35% of borrowers have incomes below \$17,000, with an average income \$11,975, and borrow an average \$13,900
- 46% of borrowers are over 65, with an average income of \$21,128, and borrow an average of \$12,950

Illegal Dumping Tip Website

- Launched in late June, 2018.
- 160 illegal dumping tips to date in 2019.
- 9 citations issued.

\$2,500 in rewards paid for 3 tips, with 5 tips pending possible reward.

Democratic National Convention Prep

The Department must inspect all places of lodging other than hotels, including accommodations offered online, and requested 2 inspectors and an assistant to handle the increased volume expected during the Democratic National Convention, at a salary cost of \$166,433. These positions are not included in the Proposed 2020 Budget.
