## PROCEEDINGS 1 (NOTE: All City Personnel Were Sworn Under 2 Oath Prior to These Proceedings.) 3 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Also in the 2nd 4 5 District, Makbul Sajan, agent for Hasham, Incorporated, 24-hour Establishment application for 6 "Silver Spring Amoco" at 9040 West Silver Spring 7 Drive. Makbul Sajan, agent for Hasham, Incorporated. Let the record show no response to that call. 9 Alderman Davis, any comments? 1.0 ALDERMAN DAVIS: Yeah. I would hope 11 that the committee would move denial based on 12 13 nonappearance. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: In that case, this 14 matter's in committee. 15 16 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair? CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente. 17 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Did you send out a notice? 18 ALDERMAN DAVIS: Yes, we had. 19 20 ALDERMAN PUENTE: And is there anybody here? ALDERMAN DAVIS: Yeah. There are some 21 22 people from the public who are here. 23 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do you want to

entertain some testimony?

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Yes, sir.

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1 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Who's here to testify in this matter? Would you raise your hands? Okay. 2 Could you come forward here, please, and have a chair. 3 Is there anyone else here who wishes to 4 testify in this matter? Will the three of you please 5 raise your right hand. 6 7 (Whereupon all witnesses were sworn under oath.) 8 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Now one at a time. Name and address for the record, please. 10 MR. THOMAS: John Thomas, 5649 North 86th 11 Street, Milwaukee. 12 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Thomas, how close do you live to this establishment? 14 MR. THOMAS: Approximately three blocks 15 16 away. 17 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And your testimony? MR. THOMAS: I just wanted to comment on the 18 19 condition of the building and the crowds that they get 20 on occasion. I had an opportunity to drive by there 21 again this morning. The property is just littered 22 everywhere on the property. 23 There have been numerous times when I've 24 gone in there, the place is completely out of control with kids in there. They have shut-down pumps half 25

the time.

They do sell some drug paraphernalia in there. Not pipes or anything like that, but they do sell smoking papers, and they do sell a product that is blatantly listed as a blunt, and I'm sure everybody's aware a blunt is nothing more than a cigar that they take the tobacco out of and put drugs in. It's marketed as a Snoop Dog Blunt.

And I do not frequent the gas station anymore just because of its condition. I have been in there on an occasion when I have seen what appear to be underage children buying cigars. And like I said, the inside of the building is atrocious. The outside is not kept up. And I have seen occasions where there have been large crowds just hanging around the lot.

And I believe it was about a year ago there was an incident up on the parking lot where an elderly gentleman was held up at knife point, the gentleman and his wife. They were held up at knife point.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you for your testimony.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Schrimpf.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Sir, have you had an opportunity to view the operation of this premises at

1	any time between midnight and 5 a.m.?
2	MR. THOMAS: On occasion I have.
3	MR. SCHRIMPF: Could you describe what you
4	observed on those occasions?
5	MR. THOMAS: Well, supposedly, I was
6	always under the impression that they were not open 24
7	hours, but there have been people in there. The
8	lights have been dimmed outside, they maybe have half
9	the lights on. I have not been there for a long time,
10	like I said. I don't feel the need that I have to get
11	gas after midnight.
12	MR. SCHRIMPF: But have you observed the
13	conditions that you've described to the committee
14	between those hours?
15	MR. THOMAS: Yes, I have. Yes, I have.
16	MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have,
17	Mr. Chairman.
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Ma'am, your
19	name and address for the record, please?
20	MS. SIMON: My name is Barbara Simon. My
21	address is 8925 West Thurston Avenue.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: How close are you?
23	MS. SIMON: I live pretty much in the back.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And your testimony is?
25	MS. SIMON: That place is very is not

kept up at all. I work second shift, so on my way home, it's always a congregating of young teenagers there.

My son and his friend is able to go into the gas station and buy cigarettes for 40 cents apiece or three for a dollar. It's a very uncomfortable -- you know, I do not feel comfortable there, and I'm pretty much, you know, not afraid of anything, but that place is getting worse. It's not kept up. The kids go there, they come down to the playground.

I'm constantly picking up bags and bags of litter. I approached him about that, putting out garbage cans or even doing something to beautify the place. It's like no response. I do not recommend -- We have enough problems there in our neighborhood without having a 24-hour service open for more teenagers to be hanging out.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Schrimpf.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you. Ma'am, you said you work second shift?

MS. SIMON: That's correct.

MR. SCHRIMPF: And so on the route home, does that take you past this location after the hour

of midnight?

MS. SIMON: That's correct. I'm coming right past that way, turning on 91st coming through there.

MR. SCHRIMPF: And the conditions you've told to the committee, you've observed after midnight?

MS. SIMON: Absolutely. Sometimes I don't even get home until—Sometimes I'll work later in the evening, so sometimes I might not get home until quarter after one. It has always attracted a young group of people. They're going in, going out, loud music. It's not a healthy thing. It's not a good place for the neighborhood.

MR. SCHRIMPF: And the individual cigarettes that you've described, do you know whether or not any of these people were under the age of 18?

MS. SIMON: No, my son is 19, and the other one is 19, also.

MR. SCHRIMPF: But they're able to get individual cigarettes?

MS. SIMON: Individual cigarettes because I, as a mother, questioned it, and, you know, I waited outside while they went in, came back, 40 cents.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Do you know whether or not they have been asked for identification when they

2	MS. SIMON: They have never been asked for			
3	identification.			
4	MR. SCHRIMPF: Even though they're under the			
5	age of 27.			
6	MS. SIMON: That's correct.			
7	MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have,			
8	Mr. Chairman.			
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you.			
10	Ma'am, your name and address for the record?			
11	MS. SORENSON: Sandra Sorenson, 8713 West			
12	Custer Avenue in Milwaukee.			
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And how close do you			
14	live to that location?			
15	MS. SORENSON: About a half mile. I've had			
16	a home since 1967, so I've done a lot of business			
17	through the years up on that intersection.			
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And your			
19	testimony?			
20	MS. SORENSON: Okay. I have a different			
21	kind of a problem up there, as far as a couple of			
22	complaints that I had that I talked with the staff			
23	about at the station, and they seem just to want to			
24	fluff this off and not pay any attention to me. And			
25	it literally was a very small amount, and I'm talking			

pennies here.

But one of the times it was a pump running without any gas on, and it continued to flip, and I thought, geez, maybe I'm supposed to hang it up, so I hung it up, and it's still flipping. The pennies are still going, and I put my gas cap on, and it's still running. It finally shuts off. I go in and I say, "You got a problem with that pump there." "Nope." I said, yeah, you do, and I explained what was happening. He said, "You had to have gas running out." I said, no, I didn't. I didn't even have my hands on the pump.

This continued on, and we were the only people in there. I said, "Why don't you call someone in management or the owner and let them know that there is a problem with this pump." He said, "That's impossible." I said, "No, it's not impossible. I stood there, and it kept flipping." "No, that can't happen." I go, okay. I said, "If you won't call, please give me a number and I'll call." He said, no, there is no number. I said, "You have no emergency number, no number to call whatsoever?" "No." Okay. So I go, all right, fine. Go home and call your alderman.

So I called my alderman's office. I said,

"Give me the correct number to call when there's something wrong with pumps and people are being over-charged." Oh, and he did offer -- he asked me how much. I don't know, a dime, under a dime or whatever. He said, "I'll give you your dime." I said, "You're missing my point."

Okay. So I get home, and I call the alderman and asked for a number. They gave it to me. I called and talked to an agent, and I said, "Will you go check there, and will you call me back," which they did. It was not just that pump, but there was more than one pump that was overrunning. And that's one incident.

And another incident, -- which is humorous and sad at the same time, -- I went in and prepaid and came back in to get my change, and there was a confrontation going on with the man in front of me and the clerk, and I'm listening to this, and it seemed to be over pennies. And the man's digging in his pocket, and I thought, oh, I'll give him a dime or a nickel or whatever the problem is, and the clerk kept saying, "We don't accept pennies." So the man finally dug some other money out of his pocket and walked out.

And I said to the clerk, "You gave me two dollars, two quarters and two pennies back." And I

said, "I beg your pardon, but where did you get these
two pennies from? If you don't take pennies in, how
come you're giving pennies out." So now he knows he's
got a problem. He said, "I'll give you a nickel." I
go, well, I don't want the nickel, but I said, "How

can you not take pennies?"

So another man was stocking the shelves in the cooler, and he goes, "What's the problem?"

And I go, "I don't understand this policy. There's no signs up, there's no nothing that you're not taking pennies." He goes, "Well, you don't understand the area." I go, yeah, I do. I said, "I've lived here 35 years and I understand the area, and I'm sure the owner of this filling station understood the area when he purchased it and knows exactly what the problems are."

He said, "Well, people come in here with hundreds of pennies to buy things." I said, "Fine.

Put a sign up saying so many pennies, they need to be rolled, or if there's a lot of people in here, we're not going to stand here and count all these pennies."

I'd say this man had, I don't know, seven pennies or whatever, and I said, "You can't refuse to give pennies."

So anyhow, I don't do business there

1 anymore. And I just feel that these small little 2 trivial things aren't taken care of and aren't taken seriously. If you're going to ignore rules and 3 regulations on small things, you're going to do it 4 5 on big things. I'm sorry. That's just my attitude toward it, and I don't want to see a full night station there. 7 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. 8 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman. 9 10 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, I can attest 11 12 to that here as well, too. I represented this area 13 here up until April and certainly know all three of the individuals here, and I'd advise everyone here 14 15 that Mr. Thomas here goes by the name of Big John. 16 MR. THOMAS: Among others. 17 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Why is that? 18 MR. THOMAS: I'm six-foot-six, and I weigh 19 approximately 380 pounds. I've also gone by the name 20 Tiny, so --21 ALDERMAN BOHL: Give my regards to Lois as well. 22 23 I will. My wife apologizes she MR. THOMAS: 24 couldn't be here today.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Yeah, I appreciate that.

The area around here has a very active neighborhood 1 association, Bryant Heights, and, you know, it's an 2 integrated neighborhood. The residents there work 3 well together, and it's a big asset in those terms, and they're very concerned because there are some 5 issues in that particular neighborhood.

> I can't tell you how many times the director of Bryant Heights has contacted my office here in the last couple years, and his wife, Lois, among others, to complain about this property.

I sent letter after letter to the owner of the establishment, referred it to Neighborhood Services, made phone calls. Never heard back from I mean to hear the residents here provide testimony that this particular applicant just simply doesn't care is no overstatement.

This particular applicant frankly is not responsive even to the alderman, and that has been my practical experience here, and the problems that they speak of are problems that I've heard over and over, and functionally, requests for him to contact me to look for resolutions were just one letter after another that were not responded to, and then Neighborhood Services would have to go out.

> They are absolutely correct. There are

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bigger issues in that area as well as the small items, but there's no way that an applicant like this should receive a 24-hour application when, frankly, they are not responsible, and they are not responsive. And, frankly, if given the license, it's going to foster more problems in that area, so I will be happy to make a motion when we get to that point.

> CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you, Alderman Is this about the fourth time I heard that same Bohl. cell phone ring? I understand somebody maybe made a mistake, but whoever's got that is going to be at this table in a little while, so you better turn your phone off. Thank you. Okay. Any other questions, comments, by committee? This matter's in committee.

> > ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chairman? CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Davis.

ALDERMAN DAVIS: If I may, first of all, let me say that I thank the constituents for coming out and testifying on behalf of this. It could have been a little bit shorter, cancel and get out of here, but I do appreciate Alderman Puente giving them an opportunity to testify before the committee.

I also would like to submit these letters as part of any additional application that would come forth from Alderman Bohl in this area, as far as

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letters sent out and not responded to by this particular applicant.

One thing I can say that, you know, my colleague from the 7th, -- unfortunately we didn't get an opportunity to see what our district would look like in this area and then face the challenges, and when we reduced the size of the council from 17 to 15, we found ourselves with things that we weren't really privy of.

I've worked with Bryant Heights Neighborhood Association to try to address some of those problems, and the Northwest Triangle Association along 92nd and Silver Spring is starting to work and acquire property along there.

This particular gas station is owned by another Marathon which is directly across the street, which probably will be coming before this committee to apply for another 24-hour application.

I'm asking this committee to deny, and there are certain reasons why, and that is criminal activity in this area is up, and I think the community that has lived in that area is trying to make a concerted effort to try to turn this community around, and quite frankly, when you have a business that is not responsive, and I hear at community meetings that

their customer relations is not good, and there are certain things that are happening not only in the establishment but on the site itself, for any establishment that comes before this committee that is owned by this provider, I will let this committee know that I will be coming before it to object to any 24-hour application, and I think that 12:00 would be appropriate for this location to operate, so I would hope my colleagues would support that.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you, Alderman Davis.

ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade.

ALDERMAN WADE: I'd just like to say that I think the whole ordinance change was for these type of situations, and that was the reason why we put forth the effort to change the ordinance so we could have some type of control over situations like this, and that we could cater to the needs of our constituents and their concerns in the neighborhoods that they live in, opposed to people who are just there doing business. So I'm ready for Alderman Bohl's motion.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, could I just lay a quick foundation here?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead,

Mr. Schrimpf.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Alderman Davis, with respect to the two letters that you've submitted dated November 20th, 2003, one to Edward H. Wolf & Sons, Inc. and one to Makbul Sajan, laundromat owner, these are documents that you received when you assumed the aldermanship of this particular district; is that correct?

ALDERMAN DAVIS: That's not correct,

Mr. Schrimpf, and I need to paint a picture on how I received those letters.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Would you do so, please?

ALDERMAN DAVIS: Those letters were actually sent to a constituent. In turn, that constituent sent those letters to the newly elected alderman.

MR. SCHRIMPF: And that's how you found them.

ALDERMAN DAVIS: That's correct.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. And these were, therefore, documents that you received in the ordinary conduct of business of your office as alderman?

ALDERMAN DAVIS: That is correct.

MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have,

Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente moves to make these two letters part of the record. They're both dated November 20th of 2003 from the Office of Alderman James Bohl, and hearing no objection to that, so ordered. Any further comments by members of this committee? This matter's in committee.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl.

ALDERMAN BOHL: I would be more than happy to move denial of the application at this time citing both nonappearance of the applicant, as well as the substantial neighborhood testimony to issues such as loitering, littering, drug activity and conduct which is detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the neighborhood.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Motion by Alderman Bohl is to recommend denial of this license based on non-appearance and items contained in the notice. Are there any objections to that motion? Hearing none, so ordered. Thank you very much for coming down here to testify.
