         lack of rear or side entrance delivery door

         access to the building. This creates an ongoing
19
         noise nuisance to the residents of College
20
         Heights Condos. Patrons rev car engines, squeal
21
         tires, and slam car doors, trunks upon entering
22
         and exiting the parking lot. Patrons loiter in
23
         front of the VIP Market shouting at levels so
         loud that their voices are heard by the residents
25
         of College Heights Condos, which is - - I'm a

          resident. I live right across the street.
                    CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Have you witnessed
          that yourself?

         patrons of the VIP parking lot are heard by

         myself. I filed several complaints against the

         VIP Market concerning noise nuisances and have

         been - - and they've been filed with the police

         department, the neighborhood services, and also

         with Alderman Terry Witkowski. And I haven't had

         any resolution.

                    I've seen patrons throw garbage on the

         parking lot grounds, such as beer, food and

          cigarette wrappers, plastic soda bottles,
          aluminum beer cans. They blow across the street

         before. Regarding these issues, you know, truck
23
         deliveries, we've talked to - - about truck
         deliveries with the owner of the building, and we
25
         decided that the deliveries has to come back from
00011
1
         the alley where there is a - - a back door. It
         has to be unloaded from the back, not from the
```

front. And that's how we currently run our other 4 business in all hours. And the deliveries are 5 only from 8:30 until five p.m. And we understand 6 that there was objections from the neighborhood. 7 We have went to the meeting, and some people in 8 the meeting were against us and after hearing 9 what our plans were to do, you know, I know that 10 the neighborhood have concerns about the old 11 owner selling pornography. His store was really 12 filthy. We're updating everything in the store. 13 The construction is going to cost us around 14 50,000 dollars just in remodeling. 15 Second thing is, you know, we're 16 planning - - We came to the neighborhood first. 17 We wanted to, you know, hear what the 18 neighborhood have the concerns. That's how we 19 work. And we have talked to Alderman Witkowski, 20 and he advised us and he told us there were 21 concerns from the neighborhood about old owner, 22 what he was doing in the store, and we, you know, 23 we hope that, you know, if we, you know, we want 24 the neighborhood to give us a chance, and to run 25 this new business, and see what, you know, what 00012 1 kind of business we run. 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I may have missed something here, but were you at the meeting that 3 4 this person testified - -5 MR. HUSSAIN: Yeah, the first one. 6 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You were. 7 MR. HUSSAIN: Yes, sir, we were. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: At the first one. 9 MR. HUSSAIN: Yes. 10 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Were you there 11 when they took this vote, supposedly? 12

MR. HUSSAIN: Yes, and there were some people that were against us. They signed against us, and then after the meeting I talked to Alderman Witkowski. And he told me if you want to withdraw or if you want to keep going. And I told him, you know, I wanted to see and test to see what the neighborhood, you know, houses in the area had to say.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Um-hnh.

MR. HUSSAIN: And I went, you know, I have some signatures, petitions from, you know, houses around the building. And I wanted to hear what the neighborhood had to say, and I think there's enough support to have enough customers

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- 1 to come to the store. And I would like anybody
- that was against it to be in our favor, too. You
- 3 know, we don't like going against anybody.
- 4 That's not how we work. We don't like going
- 5 against any aldermen. You know, we like to run a

         meetings. The last meeting I got a little

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21 disgusted with the way it was run, because of the 22 fact that there was only 20 people. And there's 23 350 houses, and my objection was how can you set 24 up a neighborhood association with six people 25 from condos, and 12 people from the houses, and 00024 1 say that that's going to represent 410 people, or 2 410 houses and condos. And that's what I got 3 objected to that I just couldn't see that that 4 being - - that people evidently didn't' care 5 about your neighborhood association. Otherwise, 6 they would have showed up, because there was this 7 time, notice, in advance of such a meeting. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Dan, let me ask 9 you this. How - - How far away is your house 10 from the - -11 THE WITNESS: Block and a half. 12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Block and a half, 13 okay. 14 MR. F. HUSSAIN: I'd like to say 15 something, sir. Back in August, the - - the 16 license was reissued for the old owner to be 17 granted and the license again, even though there 18 was objections. And I just want to understand, 19 you know, we don't understand why was it granted 20 for them a couple months ago and now, when we, as new business owners, we can't, you know. 21 22 MR. S. HUSSAIN: We're having a problem 23 with our application with, you know, we're having 24 objections from the community itself. This 25 association was never there. It's only been 00025 1 there for just these last maybe month since we 2 applied for this place. There was never a 3 neighborhood association in this area. He stated 4 - - A comment from him, he stated that how could 5 14 people or 20 people operate on the behalf of 6 350 homes. Well, we went house to house in this 7 neighborhood, and we have hundreds of signatures 8 from people in this area, addresses varying from 9 across the street all the way to five blocks of 10 people that do want the store. 11 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Well, let me tell 12 you we - - we can't accept that either. 13 hearsay. 14 MR. F. HUSSAIN: We understand that. 15 MR. S. HUSSAIN: Yeah, we understand 16 that, sir. 17 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. 18 appreciate those efforts you made, though. 19 MR. S. HUSSAIN: Yes. 20 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. 21 ALDERMAN WADE: Yeah, Mr. Chair. 22 would just like to ask the gentleman at the 23 microphone. You went over, you checked out their

24 business. Did you have a chance to have a 25 conversation with these two gentlemen? 00026 1 THE WITNESS: Yes, I've had several 2 conversations with them. 3 ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. What was - -4 What was that like? 5 THE WITNESS: The day that I was there, 6 when I walked in, first thing that made me feel 7 comfortable was they have a - - a lady of my age 8 at the cashier. And the very first thing she did 9 was greeted me, "Good morning," and I'm sitting 10 there. Wait a minute. This is 51st and Villard. 11 ALDERMAN WADE: Hey, hey. Watch your 12 mouth. 13 THE WITNESS: I'm just saying, you 14 know, you don't - - you don't always expect 15 people to go out of their way to make you feel 16 welcome and comfortable. 17 ALDERMAN WADE: But they do on 51st and 18 Villard. 19 THE WITNESS: Yeah. Well, I used to 20 deliver mail up on 52nd, 58th and Villard. 21 ALDERMAN WADE: Gotcha'. 22 THE WITNESS: But anyways - - And the 23 conversations I had, I did voice my concerns to 24 them, and I said, "Look, my main concern is 25 pornography." That was my main concern, because 00027 1 they had the videos in there, the porno - - The 2 old owners had videos in there, and, you know, 3 you - - you could tell what kind of clientele 4 they were having. And so I - - I talked to them. 5 They showed me what their plans were. I looked 6 around their store, just to see the cleanliness 7 of the store, to see if there was any loitering 8 or anybody outside just hanging around drinking 9 on a 40 ounce or whatever. And there was none. 10 I saw their security cameras that they have up at 11 that store. They were very nice and showed me the whole layout so that I could come back and 12 13 talk to some of my neighbors and say, "Hey, look. 14 You all need to go up and look at it." 1.5 ALDERMAN WADE: So you - - You believe 16 by seeing the operation that they have - - have 17 on the north side, that them operating this 18 store, based on the previous owner, would be an 19 upgrade. 20 THE WITNESS: Not only an upgrade. It 21 would be a miracle upgrade. Because the old 22 owners, I mean, to me it was something of the 2.3 lowest - - lowest class of a store owner that 2.4 I've seen, and I've - - I've delivered mail all 25 over the City of Milwaukee to - - to include the

                    CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your testimony?
21
                    THE WITNESS: I'm opp - - I'm opposed
22
          to the liquor license for many of the reasons
23
          that have already been stated. But I'd like to
2.4
         point out that I work for Milwaukee County, the
25
          Department on Aging. I'm the Manager of the
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1
         Aging Resource Center. We are an eight million
 2
          dollar annual budgeted operation of Milwaukee
 3
         County. We run a 24 hour call center where we
 4
         approximately receive 3,000 calls per month. We
 5
         follow up with those calls with about 1,000
         monthly contacts with individuals. I'm also
 7
         responsible to run the Elder Abuse Unit within my
         division. We handle about 100 calls and
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investigations regarding elderly abuse every month. Also responsible for about 1,000 protectively placed county wards that we review annually.

The Department on Aging, every two to three years, conducts public hearings regarding the needs of the community, because as part of our State and County contract we are required to do advocacy for clients 60 and over in Milwaukee County. There are 150 - - over 150,000 people age 60 and over in Milwaukee County. We're in the third year of a Robert Wood Johnson Grant for connecting caring communities, where we're trying to establish pilot programs all around the - - the City and the County to bring communities together so that people can age within their communities and not leave.

When we conduct these focus groups, these surveys, the themes that we hear from seniors again and again and again, whether they live in a high crime area or a low crime area, is safety. Repeatedly they say they don't feel as safe in their homes as they'd like to be. When the Department on Aging hears that, it's particularly frustrating for us, because we have access to Title 3 money from the Federal Government Older Americans Act. I was instrumental in bringing the Family Care Program to Milwaukee County. That brings -

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente. ALDERMAN PUENTE: Sir, do you have a

point about - -

THE WITNESS: Yes, I do. ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay.

THE WITNESS: My point is with all the efforts that my department does in bringing an extra 100 million dollars of Medicaid money annual to Milwaukee County, in spite of all this — the success we've had with grants and various programs that we have been able to effectuate in this community, we're still not able to do the

number one thing that concerns people age 60 and over in Milwaukee County. And that's safety and crime. The College Heights area has a very large -- or a heavy percentage of people aged 60 and over. The condos across the street from this address are 70 percent people age 60 and over. You'll also find that the average income in that area is -- is among the higher areas of the City. These people in this community can choose to live anywhere. They're choosing to live in the City. These gentlemen do not live in the

City. They've given you their addresses as outside the City. These folks can live wherever they want. They choose to live in the City. And you guys are looking at the same demographics and statistics that I do. People are leaving the City and the County. They're crossing 124th Street, and you know the number one reason for that is safety. Some of it's real, and some of it's just perceived. I think this is a no-brainer to vote no on this liquor license. You're inviting more crime because of the liquor license. That establishment can be anything. It can be an H&R Block. It can be a beauty salon. It can be any number of things

that is going to get robbed, not at all, or -or much less than a liquor store. We've got a
Pick 'N Save right around the corner. A liquor
store adds nothing to the community. A no vote
to this license is a no-brainer. It costs you
nothing. It saves money in terms of crime.
We're all looking for new revenue sources as
public servants. We're trying to increase our
revenue streams. We're trying to look for new
revenue. But sometimes the decisions that we can
make that have a huge impact on our community are
very, very simple public safety issues just like
this one. I encourage you to vote no and deny
this liquor license. I believe it is in the best
interest of this community. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Hold on. Do we have any questions - - questions of this witness? Not comments, questions.

ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade.

ALDERMAN WADE: You are aware that they have liquor being sold at that place for a number of years?

THE WITNESS: Yes, I am.

ALDERMAN WADE: And the - - And the

last owner of the place, who was probably the person that most of the people have the problems with in this room, because these guys weren't allowed to operate there yet, that person's liquor license was renewed, which means they could have continued to operate at that site. A lot of those people who moved into the condos, I don't know if they're new condos or not, but I'm quite sure maybe the liquor establishment was there before the condos. I think the question that this gentleman asked was a very important question. If you already know that the liquor establishment is there and you can live anywhere you want and you choose to move into that

neighborhood, then obviously you don't have a problem with the liquor establishment being there. I mean, that's - - that's what I see.

THE WITNESS: Well, I think - - I think the problems have gotten progressively worse over the years. The other thing is, you know it's a lot harder to remove a license than it is to stop a new one coming in.

ALDERMAN WADE: Well, let - - let me - - let me - - Let me just - - Let me just - -

can just ask my question to you. My question to you is this. You made the statement that the people can live anywhere they want. If these guys weren't here and the other owner was still here, we wouldn't even be here now. We already gave him a license. Those people still, under those circumstances, chose to live in that neighborhood. So, I mean, what - - Are you saying - - What are you saying? Are you saying that these people are not making good sound decisions, or - - I mean, they know what's going on. They understand it. They chose to live there. I mean, what are you saying about those people choosing that, under the - - the current circumstances? What are you saying about that?

Let me just keep - - Let me keep going here, so I

THE WITNESS: I'm saying that a continued liquor license in that area continues to erode the base of people that are in that area, and it will deter new people from coming into that area. So, you know, things — things are fluid. They change. And there's a change in ownership. It's an opportunity for the community to come together to say, look, we're taking an assessment of what's going on here. There's a new addition that's being applied for in terms of

our coming into our community. What do we want to do about that now? This gave this opp - this community a chance to take stock of what was going on, and to come together. And they did. And they spoke very loudly and clearly that the situation that existed was getting more and more intolerable, and it was time - - Maybe it wasn't time five years ago, ten years ago, when I wasn't around. But it's time now to take a stand on what's going on there, and to take back our community. And the establishment of the neighborhood association, I believe, does that, and it's an attempt to improve what's going on. It's brought the community together. It's empowered the community in a way that they did not feel empowered before. And so it was a catalyst for change. And I guess that's my

I - - I3 would if I was asked to. And I guess that's my 4 response. 5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any 6 further questions of this witness? Thank you for 7 your testimony. 8 THE WITNESS: Thank you. 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Is there anyone 10 else here to testify relative to this 11 application? Okay. Did you want to say 12 something as representing the building owner? 13 MR. SAJDAK: If I could. 14 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes. 15 MR. SAJDAK: From the - - the 16 landlord's perspective or the owner of the 17 building's perspective, you have a property that - - that frankly, has been in use as a 18 19 convenience store for its entire history, which 20 goes back some 40 years or so, as I understand it. I would certainly agree with the - - with 21 22 the last person who testified, that there are 23 situations where there are, you know, continued 24 problems that create additional problems and it 25 builds upon itself. I don't think that that's 00044 1 the situation we have here. Certainly, I'm not 2 an unfamiliar face to many of the folks on the 3 committee here. We've represented others, and I 4 can honestly say that - - that these are the - -5 the most honest and trustworthy folks that I 6 think I've represented before the - - the board 7 or actually I'm not even representing them. But, 8 you know, just in terms of their plans, you know, 9 they're - - they're entering into a lease with my 10 client. They are committing to spend 50,000 11 dollars to update the property, to make it a - -12 a better property. Doing those types of things 13 certainly the committee would recognize is - - is 14 often going to lead to a change in the type of 15 folks who are going to be coming to the facility. 16 Certainly I would imagine many of the 17 problems existed because of the - - the prior 18 owners. Having pornography at the store is going 19 to attract a certain type of individual. I 20 understand that at some point there was some 21 concerns that they had some scales in the back 22 room of the facility. Certainly the

representatives of the police department would

23

tell you that that's probably an indication that there was some drug sales going on there. And

that also is going to attract a certain type of clientele. In this case you have - - have a tenant and a - - a business owner who is looking to improve over what the past was. The other point I guess that I could make is that my client informs me that in the period between where we evicted the prior tenant for a lot of the same issues that we've been talking about, and entering into the lease with these gentlemen, is that the only calls that he got for this property were for these types of uses. There were no There were no calls for, calls for an H&R Block. you know, putting a day care center in there. You know, this is what the use has historically been. Certainly the folks that have been in the neighborhood over time have grown accustomed to the use. The folks who are new to the neighborhood, entered into the neighborhood knowing that that was there.

And the last thing I would add is just that I find it interesting and - - and perhaps maybe even a little ironic that a couple months ago the prior occupant of this building sat before the board and there were no objections and it passed unanimously. That went to the Common

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Council. The Common Council gave him a license. And now here we sit with - - with new tenants who have, based on - - on all of the testimony that you've heard to this point, are committed to improving the location. Are spending money to - - to improve the looks of the location. Have another store within the City, another licensed premises that by all accounts is a well-run store with little to no problem. And - - And now we're - - we're debating this. It just - - It seems a little odd that this would even be an issue.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you. Do you have anything to say in closing before we take this matter into committee? The Applicant?

THE APPLICANT: Yeah, we - - we be living in the neighborhood and we try to open a new store and a clean store. And we would like support - support from our neighborhood.

Because we not going to be successful without no neighbor. And we went to our neighbor, and most

Because we not going to be successful without no neighbor. And we went to our neighbor, and most of them, they support us. That's why we coming over here, and we trying to clean the store, and because - - We've been in business since 1990. I've been living in - - in this area like 15

years. Every day when I pass - - When I see the

          why we started and think this the place, and we

          trying to remodeling and make it new and good for

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                    CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And I appreciate
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          that, Alderman.
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                    ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: I want everyone to
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          know that the place that these people want to
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          replace had a suspension. After I came in to
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          office there was word that got to me that they
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          were selling to minors. There was police action
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          to check it. There was, and I - - Rebecca's not
          in here, but it was either a ten or a 30 day
          suspension that shut the place down because of
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it. Did they receive a license? As everybody on this committee knows, if there's nothing in the police report when they come up for renewal, there is nothing that's going to appear before committee. It's one of those that receives approval without the owner coming in for a hearing. So what - - what I'm hearing from across the table is outrageous. Certainly not protocol. Certainly you're doing it on hearsay, because you weren't here for that hearing, because there wasn't any hearing that specifically heard that.

And I've got the same thing from the Applicants who originally came in and said we want to open up a grocery store, a convenience store, and we'd like a - - a liquor - - liquor license. Well, they didn't come in. They called in. When asked, well, grocery store, yes. Grocery store, convenience store. When asked how much liquor they would have or beer and liquor

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they would, they would say, well, it's mainly groceries. Well, give it a percentage. Well, 50 percent. Mainly at 50 percent don't - - don't match with my way of thinking.

At one of the meetings, the meeting at Victory School, they indicated that they would do, besides the liquor, they would do chips and snacks. That's pretty much the operation that was there, the very same type of operation that was there. At the meeting at Victory School the vote as predominantly against it. People, because of my schedule and the fact that I dropped off notices door to door, it was late notices, yet, still between 20 and 25 people showed up for that meeting. And frankly I don't recall - - Somebody said that there was a voice vote of 17 to four. From - - From what I remember it was hands up, and - - and that was basically it. There wasn't anyone who was responding in the - - the negative fashion. Or if so, it just didn't stick with me. I mean, in the positive fashion of let's give them a license. I heard the very same concerns that you did today about noise in the neighborhood, about squealing tires, the boom boxes, about the trash,

the area, the concern for safety. And I heard the fact that it has been peace - - peaceful and quiet during the time that there hasn't been a - - a store here.

The neighbors - - I did use the opportunity to ask if they wanted to form a neighborhood association, which I have done in other instances around my district when an issue

arose, just to give people a chance to - - to raise their concerns and have a voice. And so far, I've had - - On nine different issues I have eight different groups form, which has given them a voice about what goes on in their neighborhood. Has my office received complaints on this place in the past? Yes. And I - - Well, obviously we haven't had complaints while it's closed. The -- The layout of the neighborhood is that the this is south of College. The only thing on the west side of the street that's in the City of Milwaukee is the gas station on the corner and then the strip mall, running from College to Saveland, ver - - virtually. Across the street is the condo complex that you've been hearing about, which has been there for as long as I can remember. It's a good looking thing. It's a

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solid neighborhood immediately south of that, of single family homes. Everything out there is owner occupied homes for the most part. I can't think of a duplex in there.

I - - I have had people speak to me at that meeting, after that meeting. We did - - The Applicant mentioned a - - a meeting. There was three different meetings, and I have yet to hear a majority of people say that they would want this there. Have some people say yes it wasn't bad. Yes, some people said, yeah, we could go to their side on this one. But the majority hands down. I've been hearing from people that do not want a liquor license to reappear. Would they like a grocery store? Yes, they'd love a grocery store. The Applicant has also indicated that that's not profitable and he wouldn't do that. But, obviously, I'm sitting here saying that I will oppose this license. I have told the Applicant and the realtor, the owner of the strip mall, from the very beginning that there were problems here. I said the only way I would do anything would - - with regard to this license was if I held a neighborhood meeting and asked the neighbors what their concerns were. I did

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hold that meeting. The neighbors did express concern that they didn't want it, and, Mr. Chairman, I am asking that this committee keep this neighborhood sound and deny this license. And if we are in committee, I will make that my motion to deny this license

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. This matter is now in committee.

ALDERMAN WITKOWSKI: I'll move to deny
