2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: 12th District,
3	District, Rafael Cetina, Agent for "Zamana, LLC
4	Class "B" Tavern and Tavern Amusement
5	(Cabaret/Nite Club) application, a request for
6	the permanent extension of the premises to
7	include the mezzanine for Zamana, 1447 South
8	Muskego Avenue. Good morning.
9	MR. GIMBEL: Good morning.
10	THE APPLICANT: Good morning.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would you raise
12	your right hand. We'll swear you in, please?
13	(Whereupon those present were sworn.)
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Name and address
15	for the record, please?
16	THE APPLICANT: Name and address?
17	Rafael Cetina, 1813 South 28th Street, Milwaukee
18	Wisconsin 53215.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And state your
20	appearance, please?
21	MR. GIMBEL: Yes. Thank you, Mr.
22	Chairman. My name is Franklyn Gimbel, and I am
23	appearing for Mr. Cetina and the application the
24	is now being considered by the committee.

00003 1 to receiving notice in the mail that there's a possibility your application could be denied because of neighborhood objections to loitering, 4 littering, loud music, noise, traffic, parking 5 problems, fights, disorderly patrons, drug and 6 criminal activity, fitness of the location based 7 on the concentration of alcohol beverage outlets 8 in the area, and conduct which is detrimental for 9 the health, safety and welfare of the 10 neighborhood? 11 MR. GIMBEL: We did receive a notice, 12 Mr. Chairman. I - - I should indicate, however, 13 that the notice that you have just read was a 14 notice that was received sometime in early 2006. 15 This committee made a recommendation, and then 16 the Common Council returned the matter to this 17 committee at my request and at - - at your 18 indulgence. The most recent notice was a much 19 more abbreviated one. But we certainly 20 understand and have a background of the original

notice and the most recent abbreviated notice. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Mr. Schrimpf, are there any legal ramifications with

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2.4 that?

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MR. SCHRIMPF: I think probably not.

00004 1 But I think Ms. Barron has some questions. MS. BARRON: The notice that you just read is what I have in the - - in the file as 4 what we sent on August 1st. So - -5 MR. GIMBEL: I - - I never saw that 6 one. I got one that's a - - an abbreviated that 7 was sent out and - - and came to me indirectly 8 from the neighborhood. So we never got - - But I 9 - - I do recall having seen the notice that 10 preceded a March action of this committee. And 11 so - -12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: So, Ms. Barron, 13 you're testifying the notice, as I read it, was 14 mailed to the applicant? MS. BARRON: On August 1st, 2006. 15 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: On August 1st. 17 MR. SCHRIMPF: Perhaps, Mr. Chairman, 18 Mr. Cetina should indicate if he got - - what 19 notice he got. 20 MR. GIMBEL: Mr. Cetina did receive, 21 $\mbox{Mr.}\xspace$ Chairman, the notice that you alluded to in 22 your introductory remarks, and - - and we're not 23 raising as an objection to us sitting here today 24 in any event. 25 MR. SCHRIMPF: Then we're fine, Mr.

00005 1 Chairman. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you very much. Health Department? 4 HEALTH: Health Department needs an 5 inspection of the premises, and also, any plans 6 to be submitted for any construction or 7 remodeling. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Neighborhood 8 9 Services. 10 DDS: Hold for occupancy and orders. 11 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And if the Health 12 Department and Neighborhood Services are not 13 needed in those next three items, those 9:15 14 items, to the best of your knowledge, they - they may - - you may be excused, unless you care 15 16 to be entertained by this committee for the next 17 few hours. 18 Okay. Could I see a show of hands of 19 20

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Okay. Could I see a show of hands of the people in the room that are here to testify on this matter, which is 1447 South Muskego Avenue? Please raise your right hands. Okay. And could - - Could we swear you all in at the same time? If you're going to speak in front of this committee, we'd like to swear you all in at the same - - whether you're - - you're for it or

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1	against it, please raise your right hand so you
2	can give testimony.
3	(Whereupon the witnesses were sworn.)
4	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Let's
5	start with the the people that are opposed to
6	this license being granted. Could you come up to
7	the microphone here one at a time, state your
8	name and address for the record, and give us your
9	testimony?
10	Good morning.
11	THE WITNESS: Good morning.
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Name and address
13	for the record, please?
14	THE WITNESS: Gerald Funk. 1425 South
15	Union Street, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53204.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And And Mr.
17	Funk, how far away do you live from this proposed
18	
19	THE WITNESS: Well, I can throw a ball
20	and hit the building from my house.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay.
22	THE WITNESS: If I throw across the
23	street far enough.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And, Mr.
25	Funk, what is your testimony?

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2 THE WITNESS: The one thing I want to testify against, this is not an area that we need 4 another bar with more liquor license. We are 5 loaded with bars right in this neighborhood. We 6 got the Domino Club, and then you got the other 7 club right there, both on 17th and 18th and 8 Greenfield. You go over to where this place is 9 going to be, you got the Tijuana Club. That's 10 going to be almost across the street from them. 11 Go down another block, there's another bar. And 12 it's going to be just a congestion. And our 13 streets are so bad, the streets are going every 14 different direction. And when people are going 15 to be leaving, we know that it's going to be a 16 big problem, if they're going to put in this bar 17 that they're talking about, two - 300 people. 18 And it's going to be just a disturbance to the 19 neighborhood, and we're not going to get 20 anywhere. The people around our neighborhood, I 21 know all of them, are all against it. They don't 22 want this, because we're going to never get any 23 sleep or anything around there. 2.4

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Funk. Questions by members of the committee?

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1	Mr. Gimbel, do you have any questions of this
2	witness?
3	MR. GIMBEL: I do. Mr. Funk, you know
4	and you would indicate to the committee that this
5	location has not had an open bar, restaurant or
6	any other kind of business for the last five
7	years. Correct?
8	THE WITNESS: There was at one time a
9	bowling alley there.
10	MR. GIMBEL: Okay. But
11	THE WITNESS: That's many years ago.
12	MR. GIMBEL: the answer Yeah,
13	more than five years. Is that right?
14	THE WITNESS: Yeah, it's quite a few
15	years.
16	MR. GIMBEL: Do you know that Mr.
17	Cetina, who is the applicant for this particular
18	location, has entered into agreement with the
19	folks over at El Rey to have all of the cars for
20	the patrons at this place able to be valet'd,
21	that is, have somebody drive it from that
22	location to the parking lot of El Rey?
23	THE WITNESS: That's one of the biggest
24	complaints I got. If they're going to put them
25	in that lot, they're going to be driving around

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1	my house every day. Every day, going around in
2	circles to try to get in front of their place,
3	because El Rey is on the opposite way on the side
4	of the street. So that's going to be always
5	That's all we're going to do is have a rotation
6	of cars going around all the time, valet.
7	MR. GIMBEL: You are, of course, in
8	your testimony here, speculating on what the
9	effect of
10	THE WITNESS: That ain't speculating,
11	no.
12	MR. GIMBEL: No, no, no. Hold on, sir.
13	Let me finish the question, if you will, please.
14	Okay. I'll let you finish the answer. You let
15	me finish the question. Fair enough?
16	You have no experience with this
17	business having been in operation one day. Is
18	that correct?
19	THE WITNESS: There is no business.
20	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. That's all I
21	have.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Questions
23	by members of the committee of this witness?
24	Thank you very much, Mr. Funk. What Can I
25	ask Neighborhood Services or or do you

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1	What's the proposed capacity of this place?
2	THE APPLICANT: 300.
3	MR. GIMBEL: 300.
4	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: 300. Okay. Thank
5	you. Next Next witness in opposition,
6	please.
7	THE WITNESS: I have a seat right here.
8	My name is Robert Heotis. 1327 South 17th
9	Street. H-E-O-T-I-S.
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And, Mr. Heotis,
11	how far away do you live from the proposed
12	location?
13	THE WITNESS: A couple doors down from
14	Gerry. So not very far.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay.
16	THE WITNESS: Within 500 feet, I would
17	say.
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And what is
19	your testimony?
20	THE WITNESS: I'm strongly opposed to
21	another liquor license in the neighborhood, and I
22	think it's very, very There's way too many as
23	as it is right now. Also, you were saying
24	about the parking. I'd like to talk about that a
25	little bit. Is there a contract out with El Rey,

00011 1 and how long is that contract for, and is there an extension on that? CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would you answer 4 that, please? 5 MR. GIMBEL: The contract doesn't have 6 a specified term. The contract provides that - -7 The agreement provides that the - - the parking will be available from seven p.m. in the evening 8 9 until bar closing time, which coincides with the 10 closing of El Rey. So it would be an evening 11 parking permit. 12 THE WITNESS: What happens if that 13 contract falls through or doesn't have an 14 extension past five months? Then what do we do 15 for parking? 16 MR. GIMBEL: Well, I don't think that 17 I'm supposed to get into a dialog with you. 18 THE WITNESS: I'm sorry. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: That's okay. 20 THE WITNESS: Because of the traffic, 21 the traffic route that we were talking about 22 before, it's either U-turns in the middle of the 23 street or they're going to have to go through the 24 neighborhoods to get in front of the - - the

business. But that's one of the - - the things

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1	is the the parking. But the liquor license
2	is the is the main thing here. The main
3	thing is we do not feel we should have another
4	liquor license in this neighborhood. Thank you.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any
6	other questions by members of the committee?
7	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente?
9	ALDERMAN PUENTE: How long have you
10	lived here?
11	THE WITNESS: I've had the building for
12	approximately four and a half years.
13	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Besides the traffic
14	problem that you alluded to, potential problems
15	of anything else? Noise? Littering?
16	THE WITNESS: Absolutely. Noise,
17	littering. Right now at about, say, 10:30 until
18	three in the morning, all you hear is screeching
19	tires, screaming people, in the neighborhood as
20	it is right now, and we're trying to make the
21	neighborhood better and get rid of that. This is
22	only going to add to the problem that we're
23	trying to clean up.
24	ALDERMAN PUENTE: What about drug
25	activity or other

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1	THE WITNESS: There's a lot of drug
2	activity and there's a lot of
3	ALDERMAN PUENTE: activity?
4	THE WITNESS: There's a lot of
5	prostitution, drug activity going on right now
6	that we're trying to crack down on with the
7	police in the neighborhood, too. And I don't
8	feel that this is going to help.
9	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any questions by
11	members of the committee of this witness? Mr.
12	Gimbel, do you have any questions?
13	MR. GIMBEL: Mr. Heotis, do you know
14	that this establishment intends to be open as a
15	restaurant as well?
16	THE WITNESS: Yes, I do.
17	MR. GIMBEL: Okay.
18	THE WITNESS: Is there going to be a
19	kitchen in there for a restaurant?
20	MR. GIMBEL: And And did you know
21	It's going to be catered from a block away.
22	Did you know that this place will have its own
23	contract with security in and outside of the
24	building?
25	THE WITNESS: Yes, I do.

00014	MR. GIMBEL: Okay. Thank you.
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you for your
3	time.
4	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Next witness in
6	opposition, please. Good morning.
7	THE WITNESS: Good morning.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Name and address
9	for the record, please.
10	THE WITNESS: Mary Jane Gratz, 1421
11	South Union Street, Milwaukee 53204.
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And how close do
13	you live to the proposed location?
14	THE WITNESS: I'm across the parking
15	lot one block, so I My My front window
16	directly looks at their the back of the
17	building, which right now is in a very, very
18	terrible disarray.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Ms. Gratz, your
20	testimony, please?
21	THE WITNESS: Generally, I'm going to
22	repeat, I think, a lot of what has already gone
23	on. Our main concern My main concern is the
24	liquor license, obviously, and the trafficking.
25	As it is right now, our trafficking, we're having

plenty of trouble with, because of - - I don't 1 2 know who initiated it, but we have two one-ways. 3 One going one-way and one going the opposite way 4 to, I guess, alleviate some of the heavy traffic 5 that's there now. Which is not being adhered to 6 by the general public, so I can't really see a 7 bunch of people coming out of a bar actually 8 following these rules, because they're - -9 they're coming out of the other bars and being 10 very unruly. Also, Mr. Funk does an awful lot of 11 cleaning in our area. He's one of our best 12 neighbors, I would have to say, as far - - Well, 13 and the establishment across the street. We all 14 try to keep our neighborhood clean by cleaning up 15 litter and - - and things like that. We do - - I 16 work late nights, because I'm a bartender myself, 17 so I know what this establishment would be - - be 18 bringing. And so far we - - we find a lot of 19 bottles and things around our neighborhood now, 20 which, you know, it's broken glass. We have some 21 children in the area. So that this has to be 22 kept up as far as cleaning. The noise capacity 23 as far as music, I would like to know how they're 2.4 going to subdue that. So that because there is 25 nothing between that building and almost anything

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around there. There's nothing to insulate that, so I'm worrying about traveling noise. Because within a block, sometimes it can be louder away from the actual activity than it is really at the activity. Because I can listen to my radio in the house and go outside sometimes, and it carries all the way across the street, because there's nothing there to bounce off of. So I'm concerned about the noise. Also, being a late - late and early shift, I - - I'm an early shift worker for MPS, also. So my mornings will be starting early soon once the school system gets back in.

The capacity, 300 people? Looking at the building as it is now, I understand they're going to be doing some renovations on it, and adding space, but that's a lot of people, 300. That's - That's - For - For a neighborhood place, I don't see that. So those are my main concerns is the parking, the traffic, the litter, the noise. I guess almost everything in general that comes with that, but liquor license, we just have enough in our area. And I - I know that they've only said four, but you can continually go block for block for block. And, I mean, I

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1	don't know how far you'd want us to check that
2	out, but there's just too many in the area. And
3	that are having that have not had good
4	reputations, so I don't see it following, because
5	your clientele is going to stay the same. That's
6	a neighborhood. That's it for me.
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any
8	questions by members of the committee of this
9	witness?
10	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.
12	ALDERMAN PUENTE: How long have you
13	lived there?
14	THE WITNESS: 34 years. Well, the home
15	I'm at now I'm there five years. But the one
16	right next door, I lived for 27, so I'm right
17	there, you know, I've been there for years.
18	ALDERMAN PUENTE: The bar that you
19	bartend at, how approximately how far is it
20	away from this
21	THE WITNESS: It's in St. Francis.
22	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. It's not a
23	competing bar.
24	THE WITNESS: No, it's not.
25	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

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1	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other
2	questions by members of the committee? Mr.
3	Gimbel, do you have any questions for this
4	witness?
5	MR. GIMBEL: Yes, briefly. Ms. Gratz,
6	you and I met before, did we not?
7	THE WITNESS: Yes, we did.
8	MR. GIMBEL: And you attended a meeting
9	that was scheduled by Alderman Witkowiak in the
10	neighborhood to ventilate your complaints, the
11	same things you said here today. Is that
12	correct?
13	THE WITNESS: Correct.
14	MR. GIMBEL: And at that time you
15	received a handout, did you not, which kind of
16	talked about the business plan?
17	THE WITNESS: Yes.
18	MR. GIMBEL: And it had drawings of the
19	outside and inside of the building. Did you
20	review that material?
21	THE WITNESS: Yes, I did.
22	MR. GIMBEL: And you would agree with
23	me, would you not, that the appearance of this
24	would not suggest that this is this
25	establishment is intended to be some kind of a

00019 1 rowdy place, wouldn't you? THE WITNESS: Intentions are one thing, and - - Just - - The amount of - - of liquor that 4 we have already phasing through the neighborhood 5 just doesn't need another one. A restaurant 6 would be wonderful. I'd love to see a nice 7 restaurant in our area. I'm just - - The bar thing is not what I want in my neighborhood. 8 9 MR. GIMBEL: But you have no personal 10 information that Mr. Cetina or the business plan 11 that you had an opportunity to review is a 12 business operation that - - that intends to cause 13 problems in the neighborhood. 14 THE WITNESS: Absolutely not, no. MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. 15 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other 17 questions? Thank you for your testimony. Next 18 witness, please, in opposition. Good morning. 19 THE WITNESS: Good morning. 20 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Name and address 21 for the record. 22 THE WITNESS: My name is Carol Tylock. 23 I live at 1447 South Union - -2.4 MR. GIMBEL: I'm sorry. I didn't get 25 the name.

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1	THE WITNESS: in Milwaukee 53204.
2	COURT REPORTER: Could you repeat your
3	name and address, please?
4	THE WITNESS: My name is Carol Tylock.
5	1447 South Union Street in Milwaukee 53204.
6	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And, Carol, just
7	for the committee how how close are you to
8	this proposed establishment?
9	THE WITNESS: Well, I'm kitty-corner
10	from the intersection on Union Street. I can see
11	the building from my porch and everything.
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And your
13	testimony?
14	THE WITNESS: Beg your pardon?
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Oh, your
16	testimony. What would you like to say?
17	THE WITNESS: Oh, I'm opposed to also
18	alcohol and the noise. And we don't need it. We
19	cope with a lot of it, and some of the
20	neighborhood's been improved since then. And the
21	parking at night, I can hear cars go back and
22	forth, loud, alcohol. We're always cleaning up
23	some people that go by. They use that one-way
24	like it was a freeway. A lot of times I see one
25	car come down from Muskego to Union, and they zip

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1	right through. And it was not too long ago they
2	converted it to a one-way. And then, you hear
3	arguments and everything else. There's a lot of
4	children in our neighborhood. Like I said, it
5	would be nice if we could see a restaurant or
6	something better than a tavern. We got so many
7	every other corner or right next door. Two on
8	one block, almost.
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any
10	questions by members of the committee?
11	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.
13	ALDERMAN PUENTE: How long have you
14	lived there?
15	THE WITNESS: I lived there longer than
16	26 years.
17	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you.
18	THE WITNESS: Um-hnh.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Gimbel, any
20	questions of this witness?
21	MR. GIMBEL: No.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: All right. Thank
23	you for your testimony.
24	THE WITNESS: Okay. Thank you.
	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Next witness in

1	opposition, please? Good morning. Name and
2	address for the record, please?
3	THE WITNESS: Carlo Ramos. 1423 South
4	Union.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And And for
6	the committee, how close do you live
7	THE WITNESS: The same. We don't want
8	no liquor license over there in the
9	neighborhood no more.
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You're within like
11	a block of the place.
12	THE WITNESS: Yeah. I live next to
13	Carol.
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And your
15	testimony?
16	THE WITNESS: Yeah, the traffic.
17	There's a lot of drugs right now, a lot of
18	prostitution, and we don't want no more activity
19	like that over there. We're trying to clean the
20	neighborhood. Maybe to me, they put in a new
21	club over there, I got to be more activity
22	more people, more drug, and more prostitution
23	over there.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Questions by
25	members of the committee?

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1	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.
3	ALDERMAN PUENTE: How long have you
4	lived there?
5	THE WITNESS: Fourteen years.
6	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Fourteen?
7	THE WITNESS: Yeah.
8	ALDERMAN PUENTE: And what about loud
9	music?
10	THE WITNESS: Too, loud music.
11	ALDERMAN PUENTE: What about littering?
12	THE WITNESS: Littering, yeah, that's,
13	too. It would be simply to say that I agree with
14	them.
15	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Parking?
16	THE WITNESS: Parking place, yeah.
17	Main concern, the parking place.
18	ALDERMAN PUENTE: So
19	THE WITNESS: Because right now they
20	say at the right turn they got parking They
21	already park their truck over there every night.
22	I don't see no place for 300 car in the right
23	parking lot, the one they say. The The
24	truck, they are they are every night. I
25	don't know how they're going to do it. With

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1	truck With four, six truck over there, and
2	they're coming to unload trucks over there every
3	night. I've been there for 14 year, I see every
4	night truck coming by two o'clock in the morning,
5	one o'clock. There's no There's no room for
6	300 car over there.
7	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other
9	questions by members of the committee? Mr.
10	Gimbel, any questions of this witness?
11	MR. GIMBEL: Mr. Ramos, you agree with
12	the first witness that there has not been an
13	active business at this location for the last
14	five years. Is that correct?
15	THE WITNESS: Um-hnh.
16	MR. GIMBEL: Is that yes?
17	THE WITNESS: Yeah.
18	MR. GIMBEL: And you When you talk
19	about drugs and prostitution, you have no
20	information that that these folks have
21	any
22	THE WITNESS: I don't have information,
23	but I don't want no more activity over there that
24	can bring some prostitution or drug in the area.
25	MR. GIMBEL: But you have no basis to

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1	believe
2	THE WITNESS: I don't have no basis,
3	but we don't want to
4	MR. GIMBEL: One minute.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: One person at a
6	time.
7	MR. GIMBEL: You have no basis to
8	believe that these people are going to permit or
9	encourage those kinds of activities at their
10	investment. Correct?
11	THE WITNESS: That's what we don't
12	know. I can't put a finger on nobody. We don't
13	know.
14	MR. GIMBEL: Okay.
15	THE WITNESS: We don't know what kind
16	of people they are. Maybe At the first
17	meeting, his father came out, he say you better
18	sit down. What kind of people they are. They
19	get mad at a meeting. I'm seeing him get pretty
20	upset ion the meeting, his father. You know.
21	What kind of people they are, like we do a
22	meeting, and he get all upset right away.
23	MR. GIMBEL: Are you talking about the
24	meeting that Alderman Witkowiak had?
25	THE WITNESS: The one we do in the

19	medical center is Greenfield Medical Center.
20	1717 West Greenfield Avenue. And I have been
21	there practicing medicine in the family medicine
22	for 34 years. And the clinic has been there
23	approximately 50 years. Dr. Levine was there
24	before me.
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And And for

00027 1 the members of the committee, how close is that to this proposed location? THE WITNESS: I would say probably 4 about 200 feet. My back - - My consult office 5 can see the back of their building. 6 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And your 7 testimony, Doctor? 8 THE WITNESS: I am opposed of another 9 bar. There are approximately 14 or 15 bars 10 between Miller Parkway and all the ways to I-94. 11 There are many bars on National Avenue. Also, in 12 the neighborhood there are one or two bars every 13 two blocks. Our main problem is we're having 14 problems with broken beer bottles, liquor 15 bottles, rum bottles all over the place. We have 16 our maintenance man cleaning up almost - - not 17 almost, but every day picking up papers and 18 liquor bottles. We have elderly patients coming 19 in, and they have to be careful as far as any 20 broken glass. We have children there. We have a 21 big pediatric practice, too. And some of them 22 even come without shoes, and walk barefooted and 23 could cut themselves. 2.4

Speaking of prostitution and so forth. How do we know? I see them in my practice. We

1	treat the people there. We've been there for 34
2	years. The problems with prostitution, problems
3	with drug abuse, I see them. We handle them. We
4	refer them, also.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.
6	Questions by members of the committee? Mr.
7	Gimbel, any questions?
8	MR. GIMBEL: Yes. Dr. Kostrzewski,
9	where do you live, sir?
10	THE WITNESS: I live in Brookfield.
11	MR. GIMBEL: And what are the hours of
12	your clinic?
13	THE WITNESS: Basically, we're there
14	every day, Monday through Friday. Mondays we
15	I start Well, the nurses start at 8:30 all
16	the ways until 5:30 on Monday. Tuesday, all day.
17	Wednesday, all day. Thursday, all day. And
18	Friday, from eight until one.
19	MR. GIMBEL: So So you're
20	THE WITNESS: We're there five days a
21	week.
22	MR. GIMBEL: You're a daytime
23	operation. Is that correct, Doctor?
24	THE WITNESS: Yes.
25	MR. GIMBEL: You're not open at night

for people to come in.
THE WITNESS: Negative.
MR. GIMBEL: All right. Now, would you
agree with me that the complaints that you are
concerned about, or the issues that you're
concerned about would be issues that should be
addressed by the proprietors of those businesses
that have given rise to the litter and other
things that you have talked about?
THE WITNESS: I don't agree with you.
We What are you going to do with
prostitution? What are you going to do with drug
abuse there?
MR. GIMBEL: Well, let's talk about
litter first.
THE WITNESS: Okay.
MR. GIMBEL: Then we can talk about
prostitution and drug abuse.
THE WITNESS: Okay.
MR. GIMBEL: Would you agree with me
that it is the principal responsibility of the
operator of a business to take care of inside and
outside maintenance of their premises?
THE WITNESS: No.
MR. GIMBEL: Well, who should do it

3	people that come from the bar or that even have
4	their own liquor bottles in their cars and throw
5	it around.

10	premises for what their patrons do, either from
11	inside the bar or outside the bar?
12	THE WITNESS: I do.

14	responsibility?

17	THE WITNESS: But they don't do it.

19	is that the proprietors of the businesses that
20	are currently in your neighborhood aren't taking

22	cleanliness in the neighborhood. Do you agree?

24	MR. GIMBEL: Do you agree with that?
25	THE WITNESS: No.

                   CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Excuse me. Before

          you start. Were you sworn in? Were you here - -
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00034 1 THE WITNESS: No. 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Oh, could you 3 raise your right hand? We'll swear you in, 4 please. 5 (Whereupon the witness was sworn.) 6 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your testimony, 7 please. I'm sorry. 8 THE WITNESS: I'm not here to, you 9 know, advocate for liquor or anything like that. 10 But I attended that meeting, and I got to hear 11 some of the testimony right now. What I am here 12 for is to advocate for what's right, what's just. 13 And a lot of times we preach to young people, and 14 we preach to ourselves and to each other that if 15 you do what's right, and you follow protocol and 16 you don't break any laws, you should have the 17 right to do what you believe is correct, as - -18 as well - - as far as starting a business. And 19 what I've heard is a lot of judgment on this 20 family and this business based on what other 21 people have done. And I think it's totally 22 unfair. Whether I agree with the business or 23 not, it's - - the stuff we're hearing is about 2.4 the people. That the people might cause this 25 because they look this way or their business is

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this type.

We haven't heard testimony in regards to the positive businesses in the area that serve liquor, the restaurants and other businesses that serve liquor. And I think we have an obligation to consider that. Someone did a great job organizing their friends and got them here, and you can clearly hear that in testimony. They don't know these people. They haven't met them. They haven't talked to them. I can tell you from experience, and I was out last night until one in the morning. I didn't see any of them out there, working with the prostitutes, dealing with the garbage, and it was a hot night last night. And there was a lot of action, and it was - - the action was more on Scott. 14th, 15th. So the bottom line for me is that I believe that we send a message when we start to judge people, based on what they heard from someone else. Based on what's currently existing, even though they're not there yet, we're still telling the people that it's their fault there's prostitution. It's their fault there's beer bottles broken, and their fault - - And I think that's unfair. And I ask the committee to definitely dig deep and

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stand up to what they believe is fair. Does someone have the right to start a business? Do I have the right to tell them you can start a business but take it over there. Do I have the right to say you're white or black or Latino and we know white, black and Latino establishments in our area don't work and they create prostitution. We don't have that right. I don't have that right.

So I'm here today to talk about what I believe is fair, and I attended the meetings, and I know Rafael a little bit. And I know which bars are in the area. I know which clubs are in the area, and I know which prostitutes are in the area. I know which drug dealers are. And we're working with them to make sure that doesn't happen. But I don't believe, again, not to repeat myself, I don't believe that you should judge me, because of what another person that have - - that's in the same field as me did. Imagine today, if you judged me as a nonprofit manager based on what other nonprofit managers have done. I'd have to go start a new career. I'd have to do something else. And that's what I - - That's my testimony. That's what I believe

to be fair. And that's why I'm here. So whether it was Rafael or someone else, I'm here because I believe the basis on what people are judging this comp - - or this business for is - - is unfair. So I thank you for your time, and - - and I'll answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any questions by members of the committee? Mr. Gimbel, do you have any questions?

MR. GIMBEL: Yes. Ramon, why don't you tell the members of this committee what it is that you do for a living?

THE WITNESS: Well, most of the members know. I work at Latino Community Center. And we run youth programs, and I've worked for five nonprofits. Milwaukee Christian Center, Social Development Commission, LCC, the first time juvenile offender program, and Kosciuszko Middle School. And I currently run programs at South Division and Kagel Elementary now. And I've been in - - I've lived on 13th and Washington. I've been in the neighborhood all the years of my life. So what we do most, though, and if - - if, you know, even the Mayor was out with us last Friday. We walk the streets from nine to one in

the morning. In the summer we've committed to two to three nights a week. We walk every Wednesday and every Friday night, and on Saturdays whenever possible. And that is to talk to - - to kind of attack what people were talking about today. And we're seeing it, firsthand, without getting into detail. I mean, last night alone I can say, and the police happened to pull up at the time, but, you know, we probably saved a life. There was some young people that are ready to go. And there was another lady that was on the corner, and people were looking for a way out. And, you know, that's who we are. That's what we're doing.

So when I hear people talk about this stuff, and I don't see them out there when we're out there, and we're out there, that kind of bothers me, as well. Because it's based on what your friend told you. It's based on what you heard on the news. And - - And, I mean, anybody can say what they want, but you have to be out there trying to help these people. You have to be out there trying to serve them, not trying to criticize them and put them down. Or not give people opportunities because someone else had to

2.4

struggle in their life. I think it's unfair to talk about prostitutes like if they're - - they're from another world. They're human beings like us, and they deserve the respect, and we shouldn't be down-playing them on TV or anywhere else and act like they're just horrible people. We're talking about them like they're horrible people. And that's unfair, too.

So I think we need to watch what we say and how we say it, and definitely how we use that to judge somebody else. And - - And, you know, that's my experience. I can't say that that's the people behind me's experience or how they should feel about, but that's my experience. And I've been doing this for over 17 years.

MR. GIMBEL: Do you think - - Or do you know of any factual basis that would support the speculation that if this committee recommends to the Common Council the issuance of license as here requested, that such license the operation of this business would give rise to litter, prostitution, drug dealing, or traffic problems?

THE WITNESS: The only speculation that I - - Not against the business. The only feeling that I would have, based on my experience, is

1 that really has come from, like, the litter has come from the people that live in the neighborhood. The - - The struggles that a 4 family leaves behind which lead you to looking 5 for employment, and if that doesn't work, which 6 leads you to look for other ways to make money, 7 doesn't come from a nightclub. It doesn't come 8 from a liquor store. It doesn't come from a 9 church or a nonprofit. It comes from the family 10 that for some reason fell - - they fell in - -11 into that trap. So I would never blame a - - a 12 song, nightclub, a business, a church or whatever 13 for someone's deep struggles that lead them to 14 begin prostitution, or start doing drugs, or 15 start dealing drugs. I would never blame an 16 establishment for that. I would blame whatever 17 was in that person's life, and I wouldn't be able 18 to tell you until I met that person as an 19 individual what led them to that. So I have no 20 reason to believe that this establishment would 21 promote that or any other establishment for that 22 matter, as well as our organization. And that's 23 our job is to help those people get to our 2.4 center. And I think people have a hard time when 25 they wants - - when they do get to our center,

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1	because we promote, say, "Please come to our
2	center if you need help, if you're a gang member,
3	if you need you're on drugs." And when they
4	come, people are saying, "Hey, there's nothing
5	but gang members in there." You know what I
6	mean? So you're never going to win that battle,
7	but I don't believe that to make give you a
8	long answer, and I apologize for that.
9	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. I have no
10	further questions.
11	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.
13	ALDERMAN PUENTE: When you do your
14	outreach program, do you at any time go in and
15	around liquor stores or
16	THE WITNESS: Absolutely.
17	ALDERMAN PUENTE: around tavern
18	Let me finish.
19	THE WITNESS: Yeah, I'm sorry, Puente
20	Alderman.
21	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Or taverns, the
22	the people that you are trying to help. Did you
23	target or you don't even go near any of these
24	establishments?
25	THE WITNESS: Last night we were by
25	Ind wilheld. Base highe we were by

3	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Is that where you
4	almost saved a life?

6	from there, and they were young people.

10	blocks away, but I would never blame the tavern
11	for those young people. There was actually
12	ALDERMAN PUENTE: But you target
13	But you target that area to look for potential
14	people to help?
15	THE WITNESS: I didn't target the bar
16	area, no. I targeted the neighborhood.
17	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. In the
18	neighborhood there are taverns?
19	THE WITNESS: Oh, absolutely. There's
20	churches, as well.
21	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay.
22	THE WITNESS: One church was letting
23	out right there on 16th at that time.
24	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Did you talk to those
25	people

18	disrespect you. Have you ever had a drink?
19	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Yes. You're not
20	disrespecting me.
21	THE WITNESS: Did that make you cause a
22	problem in the neighborhood?
23	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Not one drink.
24	THE WITNESS: Okay. So I I
25	wouldn't say that If you're responsible

00044 1 ALDERMAN PUENTE: You didn't answer my 2 question, though. THE WITNESS: Yeah. 4 ALDERMAN PUENTE: And I've answered 5 yours now twice. 6 THE WITNESS: What do you want me 7 to - -8 ALDERMAN PUENTE: I asked you, do you 9 believe - - Or you're saying that alcohol and 10 drugs do not impact the neighborhood, the quality 11 of life of neighborhoods. 12 THE WITNESS: I think that - - That - -13 The way I believe, I believe that it's people 14 that do that. People that decide to drink so 15 much that cause them not to - - to feel that way. 16 But I don't believe that if - - It's not the gun 17 that shoots people, it's the people that pick up 18 the gun. It's not the alcohol, it's the people 19 that drink it and can't handle it. Is it my 20 responsibility to - - to monitor adults that way? 21 I could never do that. Is it my responsibility 22 to be out there and give them an opportunity and 23 alternative, absolutely. But I would never blame 24 any drug or alcohol on what people are going 25 through and the reasons why they picked that up.

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1	I wouldn't do that, because I've had a drink in
2	the past, and I've never had to go and prostitute
3	or or beat anybody up or feel like I had to
4	join a gang. So that's just me. I could live -
5	-
6	ALDERMAN PUENTE: We're not created
7	equal. We're not all like you. People are not
8	like me.
9	THE WITNESS: Absolutely.
10	ALDERMAN PUENTE: There are people who
11	do abuse drugs
12	THE WITNESS: Absolutely.
13	ALDERMAN PUENTE: do abuse alcohol.
14	Prostitution is a problem
15	THE WITNESS: Absolutely.
16	ALDERMAN PUENTE: because of the
17	quality of life that it enhances the neighborhood
18	and and disrespects the neighborhood.
19	THE WITNESS: I agree.
20	ALDERMAN PUENTE: But you go to Vegas,
21	prostitution is legal there. But not in this
22	City. And people, you know, I didn't hear
23	anybody dissing prostitution as a person, but as
24	the profession of what it brings in.
25	THE WITNESS: I agree.

1	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Like alcohol and
2	drugs.
3	THE WITNESS: I agree, but I don't
4	think it's their fault. And I don't believe we
5	should judge them based on that. And the the
6	facts here is them. It's not Whether it's
7	legal or good in your eyes or what kind of people
8	they are, I would never judge them based on their
9	profession.
0	ALDERMAN PUENTE: People wouldn't be at
1	fault for dealing drugs?
2	THE WITNESS: I know I know some
3	people that tried to find employment and
4	couldn't. And tried so hard and were on the
5	streets, and that was the only alternative. It
6	didn't mean they were horrible people. I didn't
7	respect the way they went about it.
8	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Is that all right?
9	Is that right, then?
0	THE WITNESS: Is that their right?
1	ALDERMAN PUENTE: They can't find a
2	job, they could go deal drugs. Is that Is
3	that right, in your eyes?
4	THE WITNESS: Is that their right or is
5	it right?

00047 ALDERMAN PUENTE: No, in your - - in 1 your eyes. Do you feel that that's right? THE WITNESS: I don't think it's right 4 to deal drugs, no. But I don't think it's right 5 to blame me for them dealing drugs. 6 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Nobody is. 7 THE WITNESS: Oh, I know, but there are 8 - - We're talking about the reasons why they 9 shouldn't open, and that - - those reasons are 10 because other people have dealt drugs or drink or 11 throw litter on the floor or prostitute. And 12 that's what the case is about today. It's not 13 about what I believe, but it's cool, if you want 14 to talk about what I believe. What I believe it 15 isn't right. That's why I'm in the field of 16 serving people. But I don't believe you should 17 judge me or judge them based on their struggles 18 or this business based on what other people have 19 done. 20 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Do you think people 21 should be held accountable for their actions? 22 THE WITNESS: And that's the job of the 23 law, and the job of my God. Not my job. 2.4 ALDERMAN PUENTE: So the answer is yes? 25 THE WITNESS: The answer is the people

1	should be held accountable by the law, the law
2	enforcement officials, and they should be held
3	accountable by their spiritual God, which in my
4	opinion, those are the only two people that can
5	hold me accountable. I don't think I can hold
6	you accountable for what you've done. I can help
7	you. I can talk to you. I can guidance you. I
8	can give you alternative, but I can't I can't
9	judge you and I can't throw you in jail. And I
10	can't tell you you're going to hell.
11	ALDERMAN PUENTE: But other people can.
12	THE WITNESS: Well, they try. And I
13	don't think that's fair.

Name and 7 address for the record. 8 THE WITNESS: My name is Isan Addah. I 9 reside in Brookfield, and although I have 10 investment properties in the area on the south 11 side. 12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And your 13 testimony? 14 THE WITNESS: I'm here, actually, to 15 speak to the character of the Cetina family. The 16 fact that many of the people that are opposed to 17 their business don't know anything about them. 18 And I'm here to speak of what type of people they 19 are, that they're good people, they're honest 20 people, they're God fearing people. In their 21 business, in their existing businesses, they're 22 very professional in the manner in which they 23 conduct business. They don't cut corners in any 24 ways. I've had the opportunity to work with them 25 on a number of ventures, and I very much

00050 respected the way they - - they conduct business. 1 I did attend the, if you want to call it, the private hearing or the - - the hearing 4 outside - -5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Neighborhood. 6 THE WITNESS: The neighborhood hearing, 7 I'm sorry. And, you know, to kind of reiterate what Ramon was mentioning. A lot of the problems 8 9 and concerns that the individuals had appear to 10 be problems that currently exist, and not 11 necessarily problems that are going to come out 12 of having Zamana built at that location. In 13 fact, if you're trying to improve the 14 neighborhood, I was quite surprised that they 15 were going against it. I mean, the Cetina 16 family's investing quite a bit of money to 17 renovate the property, which I think will take an 18 eyesore and turn it into something nice. I think 19 it's an opportunity to provide jobs in the 20 neighborhood. And I think it's actually a - - a 21 venue which would help eliminate some of the 22 negativity in the neighborhood. I question 23 whether the individuals that are going against 2.4 them have actually appeared before you guys 25 against the renewal of the existing businesses

00051 1 that - - that obviously are lending to the 2 problems in the neighborhood. You know, the littering definitely doesn't come from a club. 4 Maybe from a bar that serves bottles and cans, 5 but a club setting doesn't serve bottles where people can walk out and then, you know, throw it 6 7 on the ground and break it. That usually comes 8 from like a smaller type bar. It comes from a 9 liquor store. It comes from a grocery store and 10 whatnot. You know, the prostitution, once again, 11 when you have a business of a higher caliber than 12 what you currently have, you're actually 13 protecting yourself from having that - - that 14 element of prostitution and drug dealing and 15 whatnot. With regards to the alcoholism, you 16 know, once again, I won't dive into like what 17 causes it or what not, but you know, it's true. 18 Maybe you have people, you have alcoholics, you 19 have people that drink too much, that can't 20 control themselves, that may throw and litter and 21 whatnot, but once again, in a setting like this, 22 it's controlled. I mean, there's a 23 responsibility on behalf of the - - the club 2.4 owners to make sure that they cut off someone.

For example, if - - if they've had too much. You

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can't cut someone off at home, you know. An individual drinking on their own makes their own decision, and I, you know, agree with - - with - - with the people in support that you can't blame someone for the problems that currently exist.

I think it's the responsibility of those individuals to take more action to spend more time maybe speaking with the existing establishments that - - that - - that are causing some of the problem. But if - - If they have the opportunity to meet with the Cetina family, and I know they were gracious enough to - - to have the neighborhood meeting, they're more than willing to work with the neighborhood. I know they have the - - the parking issue resolved. I know they were more than willing to meet with the neighborhood in terms of any other issues or questions they have. They did assure people that they would be out there on a - - a nightly basis and a daily basis cleaning around their own establishment, making sure things are fine. And I think it would be unfair to not give them the opportunity to pursue their - - their project.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any questions of this witness? No. Mr. Gimbel, any

And I 23 speak for him on - - for the reason that this man 24 needs an opportunity to show the Council or the 25 City of Milwaukee that he's going to do a great

And your 13 testimony? 14 THE WITNESS: I'd just like to say I've 15 been a resident of the Cetinas for approximately 16 five years, and I know that in his residences 17 that he - - he tries to keep people that are 18 orderly and people that, you know, aren't - -19 aren't dealing drugs out of his houses and 20 breaking the law. And he doesn't hesitate to get 21 them out of there if he's got a problem. I also 22 know the neighborhood that I live in, basically 23 all the neighborhoods around that area of the 24 bar, as far as the prostitution, the litter, the 25 drugs, a lot of that stuff I see is going on

during the day. Like I can go and sweep in front of my house on the street, and the same night I'll go out there, and - - and the litters not - - I mean, it's beer bottles, it's - - it's a lot of different stuff. But I mean most of it's McDonald's wrappers, newspapers, and, I mean, it's not stuff that's going to be coming out of a nightclub.

Like I say, a lot of the problems that I see are - are in my own neighborhood, and - and there's not even a bar right there. A lot of stuff I see going on is during the daytime. And as far as parking and stuff in front of the establishment, the times they're going to be open and at night and stuff, I mean, that's all going to be taken up by - - by the residents in the area. So I mean, like - - like the proposed parking that they have arranged, I mean, that - - It's not going to be people looking for parking on the street in front of their place. It's going to be the designated area that they're arranging for. So I don't think that's going to be a problem.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any questions of this witness? No. Mr. Gimbel, any questions?

Mr. 13 Chairman, members of the committee, this - - this 14 is truly an extraordinarily unique application 15 and a - - and a unique set of circumstances. I 16 don't pretend to be the greatest lawyer in 17 America, but I'll tell you, if - - if Mr. Cetina 18 had come to see me any time after he purchased 19 this property and until this committee made a 20 recommendation to deny this liquor license 21 application, I don't think we'd be having this 22 meeting here today. 23 I also don't think that the opposition 2.4 to this property is opposition that like the

predominant number of cases that you consider,

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arising out of special letters, grows out of behavior of the applicant. It clearly doesn't. And, in fact, I - - I have a sense, and Mr. Schrimpf and I may have to talk about this at a point in time, I have a sense that - - that this license application is more like and - - and perhaps should be treated more like a renewal than like a new application, for the reason that, in a new application, and you look at the issue of concentration, you look at it from the point of view is do we need another tavern in an area that already has significant numbers of licenses.

This is an application for a location that was licensed, that had no license issues. So it should be viewed as a license that was viable. It was in operation until Mr. Cetina came in and said that he wanted to make a significant investment in this property that was licensed to enhance the neighborhood, and at the same time create a business opportunity for himself. I think it's clear that what he has done, essentially between the time that he acquired this property and today, is that he has unfortunately spun a lot of wheels, and he probably shouldn't have done so. And if properly

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advised by a lawyer, he wouldn't have done so, prior to the time that he came before this committee and came before the Common Council and got his Class "B" liquor license.

Having said all of that, what we see here is neighborhood objections that are totally grounded on speculation, based on the behavior, good and bad, mostly bad, of other people. Not on the basis of the operation of this location. Not on the basis of the operation of Mr. Cetina and the - - and the plan that he has. This is a - - a property that will be run as a restaurant, and incidentally, will have a dance floor, and will have nightclub opportunities. And it will be run much like as though it were located downtown with the availability of valet parking, with the availability of a substantial parking lot in the very near neighborhood where the property is located, and with a sense of the responsibility of the owners that must, at a minimum, grow out of the expression of concerns by the neighbors here today and at - - at prior instances called by the local Alderman.

I - - I am asking you to view it, then, as though it were an application for renewal

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1 without any specific underlying factual predicates that would speak to nonrenewal. And if you look at it that way and - - and then ${\tt I}$ - -4 then I think it becomes somewhat irrelevant of 5 what all the opposition has said about this 6 thing. And I think it becomes irrelevant about 7 the concentration issue, because this is a 8 license that preceded probably a number of the 9 licenses that were located in this area. And so 10 essentially because Mr. Cetina got himself in the 11 hands of people who didn't perform very well for 12 him in - - in terms of moving this project 13 forward, didn't perform very well with him with 14 respect to giving him advice on not changing the 15 applicant for this liquor license, he's here now 16 defending the right for the exercise of his 17 sought-after opportunity. And I ask you to let 18 this family exercise their right to the 19 opportunity. 20

I think — — I think Mr. Candelaria's comments are — — are almost like what a lawyer would do in closing argument. This family has done nothing that has given rise to support the objections to your affirmative action on this application. And I suggest that looking at it in

00079 1 those terms, that this project will enhance the value of that neighborhood. It will en - enhance the tax base of the City of Milwaukee, and it will provide a - - a quality forum for - -5 for entertainment and - - and eating in a section 6 of the City that would profit by it. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: This matter is in 7 8 committee. 9 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman. 10 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. ALDERMAN BOHL: I - - I just would say 11 12 that, Mr. Gimbel, you certainly are modest about 13 your - - your lawyering abilities, and that's 14 always much appreciated. But I think that there 15 are a few facts that - - that need to be brought 16 to bear here. And that is that Mr. Cetina has 17 had numerous opportunities to take advantage of 18 approved licenses by this elected body, and has 19 not taken advantage of them. In fact, I - -20 There is a two year period in which an individual

who has an approved license has the ability to -

- to pay for and to operate a club before it can

understanding that he didn't take advantage of

that. He came before us, again. It was again

be brought before this body, and it's my

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approved, and never took ownership. Never paid for those licenses. I - I have no doubt that perhaps this one - may be one that will be a test case here over the - the issue of whether or not an approved license versus one that is paid for and obtained and utilized has any bearing on - on a renewal and whether it has vested property rights.

I will just argue that Mr. Cetina has lived many lives. That, in essence, like the cat, he's gone through strike one, strike two, strike three, and it was very much, I think, a courtesy to Mr. Cetina for us to - - to have another do-over and to sit through the relevance of - - of hearing testimony again on this particular - - on this particular application. I just don't know that at this point anything is - - comes forward to me as different from the last time we took a swing at this here a number of months ago. And as a result, I would move for denial of the license application, based on neighborhood objections, to the fitness of the location, with the assortment of concerns from parking traffic problem, loud music, noise, as well as - - as well as the over concentration of

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1	alcohol outlets in the area.
