<u>AMENDMENT INTENT</u> – This amendment adds \$682,900 in appropriation authority for special assessment expenditures in the 2006 Proposed Budget for the Street Reconstruction-City Contribution to State and Federally Aided Projects capital paving program.

OVERVIEW

- 1. The 2006 Capital Improvements Budget provides funding for Street Reconstruction City Contribution to State and Federally Aided Projects. Funding includes \$6,467,072 for this program, an increase of \$5,028,265, 649.5%, from the \$1,438,807 provided in the 2005 Budget. The city funding of \$6,467,072 is in new borrowing, anticipating \$23,460,229 in Grant & Aid for state and federally aided projects, without any funding financed under TID borrowing authority for 2006.
- 2. This program is designed to improve the city's surface public ways, reflecting the city's portion to aided projects. Funding for this program is project driven and timing for projects are based on receipt of funding. The 2006 Proposed Budget provides \$6,467,072 for this program, an increase of \$5,028,265, 649.5%, from the \$1,438,807 provided in the 2005 Budget. The city funding of \$6,467,072 is in new borrowing, anticipating \$23,460,229 in Grant & Aid for state and federally aided projects, without any funding financed under TID borrowing authority for 2006.
- 3. This is a technical amendment. The department also requested \$682,900 in funding for assessable projects. The amount was omitted from the 2006 Requested and Proposed Budget. The 2006 assessable amount of \$682,900 will increase city's portion of aided projects to \$7,149,972.
- 4. There is a shortage of 2005 funds resulting in higher bids received by the State due to the added demand on labor and materials caused by the construction work on the Marquette Interchange. Some of the 2005 projects will have to be funded with 2006 funds. Projects will be prioritized to meet funding allocations.

IMPACT

- 1. This technical amendment adds \$682,900 in appropriation authority for special assessment expenditures in the 2006 Proposed Budget for the Street Reconstruction-City Contribution to State and Federally Aided Projects capital paving program.
- 2. The budget increases by \$682,900, and the tax levy is \$0. The tax rate is \$0.000 per \$1,000.

AMENDMENT INTENT

This amendment eliminates tax levy funding and special assessments for the following programs from the 2006 Capital Improvements budget (DPW-Infrastructure Services): Street Reconstruction or Resurfacing Regular City Program; Alley Reconstruction Program; Street Improvements-Sidewalk, Driveway and Gutter Replacement. This amendment also restores 2 weeks of funding for 47 Infrastructure Services Division seasonal positions associated with maintenance and repair of concrete pavement and sidewalks, as well as 3 weeks of funding for 30 Infrastructure Services Division seasonal positions associated with maintenance and repairs of asphalt streets and sidewalks. The tax levy and special assessment funding for the Capital Improvement programs would be replaced by revenues from a \$20 motor vehicle registration fee to be considered by the Common Council in File 050443. The additional weeks of Infrastructure Services Division field operations work would also be funded by revenues from the motor vehicle registration fee.

OVERVIEW

- 1. The 2006 Proposed Budget includes \$4,763,400 in Capital Improvements funding for the Street Reconstruction or Resurfacing Regular City Program, including \$2,300,000 in new borrowing, \$1,336,454 cash levy funding and \$1,126,946 in property owner assessments.
- 2. The 2006 Proposed Budget includes \$875,000 in Capital Improvements funding for the City's Alley Reconstruction Program, including \$292,547 in cash levy funding and \$582,453 in property owner assessments.
- 3. The Capital Improvements section of the 2006 Proposed Budget also includes \$337,500 in cash levy funding and \$412,500 in property owner assessments for sidewalk, driveway and gutter replacement associated with street improvement projects.
- 4. The 2006 Proposed Budget specifies that 47 seasonal positions within the Streets & Bridges decision unit of the Infrastructure Services Division will be called back to work for 26 weeks in 2006, 2 weeks fewer than 2005. These positions are responsible for maintenance and repair of concrete streets, alleys and sidewalks.
- 5. The 2006 Proposed Budget specifies that 30 other seasonal positions within the Streets & Bridges decision unit will be called back to work for 24 weeks in 2006, 3 weeks fewer than 2005. These positions perform maintenance and repair of asphalt streets and sidewalks.
- 6. State law authorizes any municipality to enact an ordinance creating a municipal motor vehicle registration fee for automobiles and light trucks (s. 341.35, Wis. Stats. and ch. Trans 126, Wis. Adm. Code).

- 7. State law requires that all revenues from a municipal motor vehicle registration fee be used "only for transportation related purposes".
- 8. Common Council File Number 050443, sponsored by Ald. Bauman, is an ordinance that would create a \$20 motor vehicle registration fee for light vehicles customarily kept in Milwaukee. This ordinance is currently in committee (Finance and Personnel). If passed by the Common Council, this ordinance would be effective 61 days after the city clerk notifies the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) that the City has enacted a motor vehicle registration fee ordinance. Therefore, if the ordinance is passed at the November 11 Common Council meeting, it would become effective sometime around February 1, 2006.
- 9. Since state law provides that DOT shall pay all vehicle registration fees collected during any month (minus \$0.10 per fee processed) to the municipality within 30 days of the end of the month (in this case, the end of February, 2006), the City would receive its first payment from DOT sometime in March, 2006. Thus, the City would receive 10 monthly payments from DOT in 2006. Assuming that there are approximately 342,000 automobiles and light trucks registered in Milwaukee, 2006 revenues would be an estimated \$5,671,500 (342,000 vehicles x \$19.90 per vehicle x 10/12 of the year).

IMPACT

- 1. This amendment is based on the assumption that the Common Council will pass File Number 050443. Revenues from the motor vehicle registration fee will be deposited in an enterprise fund known as the "Transportation Fund," which is to be used only to defray City costs for transportation-related purposes, including the portion of street and alley project costs which is assessable to property owners.
- 2. This amendment eliminates \$1,966,501 in cash levy funding from the 2006 Capital Improvements Budget as follows:

- 4. It is assumed that motor vehicle registration fee revenues will generate revenues sufficient for the Transportation Fund to cover the full amount -- \$4,088,400 of these 3 new line items.
- 5. This amendment also restores, through changes to the appropriate line items in the DPW-Infrastructure Services Division-Streets & Bridges Decision Unit budget:

Funding for 2 additional weeks of the 47 seasonal positions within the Street Maintenance unit of the Infrastructure Services Division that are responsible for maintenance and repair of concrete streets, alleys and sidewalks.

Funding for 3 additional weeks of the 30 seasonal positions within the Street Maintenance unit of the Infrastructure Services Division that perform maintenance and repair of asphalt streets and sidewalks.

- 6. The total cost of restoring these additional weeks of street maintenance labor is \$193,303. It is assumed that there will be sufficient motor vehicle registration fee revenue in the Transportation Fund (above and beyond the \$4,088,400 required for the first part of this amendment) to cover this cost. This assumption is reflected in the addition of a line item titled "Vehicle Registration Fee" with the amount \$193,303 to the miscellaneous revenues portion of the General City Purposes budget.
- 7. The net impact of this amendment is an increase in the 2006 Budget of \$193,303 (i.e., the cost of restoring the additional weeks of seasonal labor in the Infrastructure Services Division). However, because this cost will be borne by the Transportation Fund, not the tax levy, and because the tax levy-funded portions of the 3 above-described capital programs will also be funded by the Transportation Fund (for a levy reduction of \$1,966,501), the tax rate impact of this amendment is -\$0.081 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

OVERVIEW

Funding for Project Clean and Green is not included in the 2006 Proposed Budget. In 2005, the DPW-Operations Division implemented Project Clean and Green to provide a cleaner city, reduce program costs and increase revenue

For this initiative, DPW divided the City into seven clean up zones. Crews targeted one zone each week. Residents received door/cart hangers stating their designated cleanup week and were asked to place items at their collection point by 7AM on their collection day. The program began in the perimeter of the City and wrapped up in the central east side to coincide with student move outs around Marquette and UWM over the Memorial Day weekend.

The program involved 11 additional collection crews and four supplemental skid loader crews for large refuse piles. The program was funded through a \$200,000 CDBG grant supplemented by \$125,000 in existing neighborhood cleanup program dollars.

The 2005 initiative allowed residents to get rid of unwanted items that piled up in their garages, basements and attics over the winter months. Clean & Green crews collected:

- 1,680 tons of refuse (a 23% increase over targeted cleanups performed in 2004)
- 7.160 small brush piles
- 4,240 tires
- 4,980 skid loader piles of debris

The "green" part of the project included:

- 15 Arbor Day programs (one in each aldermanic district)
- The Mayor's Landscape Award Kick-Off Program on May 4th where citizens were awarded for beautifying their yards.
- Greening Milwaukee responded to nearly 200 requests for free trees.

IMPACT

- 1. Utilizing \$200,000 in CDBG reprogramming funds, the amendment restores funding for positions (\$150,000) and other operating costs (\$50,000) associated with the Clean and Green Program.
- 2. The other operating costs do not appear in the budget and cannot be reflected by line item changes.
- 3. The Grant and Aid Fund section of the 2006 Plan and Budget Summary will reflect the allocation of \$200,000 in CDBG reprogramming funds to the Clean and Green Program.
