2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: In the 4th					
3	District, Jason Metke, Class "B" Tavern renewal					
4	application for Metke's on Milwaukee at 332 North					
5	Milwaukee Street.					
6	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Good afternoon.					
7	Would you raise your right hand and be					
8	sworn in, please?					
9	(Witness sowrn.)					
10	THE APPLICANT: Yes, I do.					
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your name and					
12	address for the record.					
13	THE APPLICANT: Jason Metke. 646 South					
14	66th Street in Milwaukee.					
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Please state your					
16	appearance, please.					
17	MR. MULARSKI: Attorney Brian Mularski					
18	on behalf of Jason Metke and Metke's on					
19	Milwaukee.					
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.					
21	MR. SCHRIMPF: Do you have a card, sir?					
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do you admit to					
23	receiving a notice that there's a possibility					
24	that your application your renewal					
25	application could be denied because of items					

00003 1 contained on the police report and neighborhood objections to operation of the premises in violation of Chapter 296-303 of the Milwaukee 4 Code of Ordinances which states, "It shall be 5 unlawful to occupy or use any building structure, 6 premises, unless a certificate of occupancy or 7 certificate of zoning has been issued by the 8 Commissioner of City Development. A separate 9 certificate shall be obtained for each occupancy 10 or use." In violation of Chapter 90-3-1 of the 11 Milwaukee Code of ordinances which states, "It 12 shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer 13 for sale, barter or give away in the city any 14 intoxicating liquors or fermented malt beverages 15 without having obtained a license as provided for 16 in this chapter or to be in violation of the 17 terms of such license." 18 THE APPLICANT: Yes. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. 20 Sergeant Hogan. 21 SERGEANT HOGAN: This matter was before 22 this committee on the 8th of February. One item 23 has been added to the police report, and that's

item number 17. That Mr. Metke, when his license

expired on February the 9th, remained open

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1	serving food and soft drinks. No alcohol was						
2	being served. On three occasions Alderman						
3	Bauman's office called the police requesting that						
4	they go over there, because he was operating						
5	after his license had expired. The officers, as						
6	well as their supervisors, were unaware that he						
7	could not remain open after expiration of his						
8	tavern license, because he was not a restaurant						
9	serving permitted to serve alcohol. He was a						
10	tavern permitted to serve food. That came to my						
11	attention on the afternoon of the 16th of						
12	February, and at that time I directed the						
13	officers to go back to the premises and order it						
14	be closed.						
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: So But there's						
16	nothing on the police report saying that he was						
17	serving alcohol during that period of time.						
18	SERGEANT HOGAN: The officers all						
19	indicated to me that no alcohol was ever present.						
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you.						
21	Before I forget. Health Department?						
22	HEALTH DEPARTMENT: No objections.						
23	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Neighborhood						
24	Services?						
25	NEIGHBORHOOD SERVICES: The Department						

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1	of Neighborhood Services has no objection as far						
2	as the original license. If Mr. Metke is the						
3	original occupancy is for a tavern, his occupancy						
4	is not for a restaurant. If Mr. Metke wishes to						
5	be considered a restaurant, then he would have to						
6	get an occupancy that says it's a restaurant. So						
7	we are he's still in violation.						
8	MR. MULARSKI: Mr. Chairman.						
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes.						
10	MR. MULARSKI: One additional comment.						
11	The last item on the police attachment Mr. Metke						
12	has taken care of.						
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes. Okay.						
14	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, I have one						
15	question of Sergeant Hogan.						
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes, please.						
17	MR. SCHRIMPF: Did the officers issue						
18	any citations?						
19	SERGEANT HOGAN: No.						
20	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay.						
21	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.						
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl.						
23	ALDERMAN BOHL: One other follow-up						
24	matter for Sergeant Hogan. Item 15 on the police						
25	report I be I believe that that was the issue						

00006 1 that's still outstanding the last time we met. 2 Has there been an adjudication on that? SERGEANT HOGAN: I believe that's still 4 pending in Municipal Court. That's one of the 5 items he took care. I don't know if - -6 ALDERMAN BOHL: The sale of the 7 underage. 8 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, that's taken care 9 of. 10 MR. MULARSKI: If I might address the 11 committee, I'm - - My assistance and assistance 12 of Mr. Metke, parents and other friends and 13 family, we are on a pretty quick track to 14 reassemble Mr. Metke's life and his 15 establishment. I sent Mr. Metke up to Fond du 16 Lac this morning to resolve one of the two issues 17 on the report. We made a stop at Municipal Court 18 before we arrived here today, at which point we 19 were told there were no outstanding warrants. So 20 that will be the remainder of our afternoon after 21 we will leave here will be to - - and insure that 22 is actually the case and provide whatever 23 documentation this committee would like to, in 2.4 fact, verify that information. But if there is a

pending or an outstanding citation, we are going

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to take care of all those, as well.

On item 17 I - - Everything is accurate and Mr. Metke doesn't object. Anything in item 17, the only addition would be that the day prior to Mr. Metke's license being suspended he had a member of or - - or someone from the Health Department at his establishment, and I'm going to butcher her name, I'm sure, Sonja Denitres, who Mr. Metke had some discussions with about the option of staying open and serving just food and soft drinks. And after a call that she made back to one of her supervisors, Mr. Metke was assured that he needed no additional licenses or nothing else needed to be done for him to simply operate to sell hamburgers and sandwiches over the noon hour for the local businesses. It was not until Sergeant Hogan had asked some police officer to shut him down, at which time Mr. Metke did with no objection, whatsoever.

He is still closed to this day. He has not opened for any business, has not sold any alcohol, food, beverage, anything since that point in time. He's doing everything he possibly can to comply with the - - the prior findings of fact which has the 20 day suspension on it. He'd

00008 1 like to get it opened up after that time period 2 has passed, which I believe, according to that February 11th letter, it would be midnight of 4 March 13th of 2005. 5 He's doing everything he can, like I 6 said, with - - with my assistance, the assistance 7 of some family and friends, I think we've pretty 8 much covered every item on the police report. 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bauman, 10 comments? 11 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Thank you, Mr. Chair. 12 With respect to item number 15, this item number 13 15, you say that that was paid. So that now 14 counts as one more conviction? 15 MR. MULARSKI: I'm not saying it's 16 paid, Alderman. What I'm saying is as - - as of 17 this morning when I spoke to a representative 18 from the Municipal Court, there were no 19 outstanding warrants. That item has still not 20 been resolved. That case - -21 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: So that's another 22 open case. So as I understand, in the last year 23 Mr. Metke has suffered one, two, three, four, 24 five - - four convictions of some sort, either

municipal code violations or misdemeanor state

00009 1 charges in connection with the Fond du Lac County matter. That was apparently a misdemeanor conviction for issuance of worthless checks back 4 in October of 2004. So we have one, two, three, 5 four convictions. There's one, two, three open 6 cites - - open cases, two of which are felony 7 charges issued in Milwaukee County Circuit Court. 8 One for felony issuance of a felony theft, which 9 is scheduled for a plea sentencing hearing on 10 April 11th, 2005, according to the police report. 11 And the other felony charge is felony theft, 12 business setting, special facts unfair trade, 13 general orders, et cetera, et cetera, also 14 pending. So three pending matters, two of which 15 are felony charges, one of which is a municipal 16 underage charge. And then we have - - Well, 17 actually, five matters pending. And we also have 18 the matter on January 8th of this year in which 19 there were people hiding in the back room and so 20 on and so forth. And that apparently is still 21 pending. So there is four matters pending. 22 Plus, we have an individual whose 23

Plus, we have an individual whose license was - - was expired and basically never stopped doing business. Now, there may or may not have been alcohol being served. I don't

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know. I didn't go inside the premise. I received complaints about this establishment from - - from neighbors in the area. They alerted me to it being opened. I observed it being opened myself. Again, I don't know what was going on in there. I know the liquor signs were lit, the beer signs were lit. I don't know if that is - indicates one thing or another. But I think with the record we have in front of us of Mr. Metke's contact with the legal system, just based on convictions alone in the last year, in the last cycle period, and I was not at the last hearing, unfortunately. My aide had to appear. I was out of town. I would have requested nonrenewal then. In light of the new facts that have come before this body, and I recommend nonrenewal now.

MR. MULARSKI: If I might add to that, Chairman. No disrespect to Alderman Bauman, every item that's been addressed on the police report with the exception of item number 17 has already been addressed, has already been included in the finding of facts by this particular committee. The only new information, the only thing actually noticed for today was the allegation that Mr. Metke was open without a

license. I think we've thoroughly addressed that 1 particular issue. He contacted someone from the Health Department who was on his premises. He 4 had three unannounced visits from the police 5 department. No alcohol was being served. He 6 believes that he was fully within his rights to 7 operate. He closed down voluntarily when the 8 police asked him to do so. There's - - Nothing wrong has been done here. This committee has 9 10 already addressed all the criminal matters in Mr. 11 Metke's past. We're not denying any of those 12 particular items. The felony theft charges, with 13 respect to those, all restitution has been paid. 14 It is set for plea and sentencing. That matter will be resolved. With respect to the Fond du 15 Lac County matter, like I said, I sent Mr. Metke 16 17 this morning to Fond du Lac. That case has been 18 reopened. I will appear with him, make some kind 19 of arrangements to get that paid, and get that 20 done. With respect to the outstanding citations 21 that might be in the Municipal Court here in 22 Milwaukee, we're going to go find out after we 23 leave here what's going on, what needs to be 24 taken care of, and we're going to take care of 25 that. We're doing everything we possibly can to

00012 1 get Mr. Metke's bar back open pursuant to the prior finding of facts. The only thing, like I said, noticed for today was the allegation that 4 he's been open after his license has been 5 suspended, which there is absolutely no evidence 6 to show Mr. Metke has served one drop of alcohol 7 after his license was suspended. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. 9 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair. 10 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bauman. 11 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Could I inquire of 12 counsel. So you - - The - - The two felony 13 charges pending in Milwaukee County you're 14 telling me that a plea agreement has been arrived 15 at? 16 MR. MULARSKI: Yes. 17 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Metke will be 18 pleading guilty to felonies? 19 MR. MULARSKI: The plea arrangement 20 will be that he will be pleading guilty. The 21 exact charges at this point have not been agreed 22 to with the assis - - assistant district 23 attorney, who I believe is Sandy Williams on that 24 particular case. But restitution has been paid 25 in full.

00013 1 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: But you - - You are not prepared to tell us whether he'll be pleading quilty to a felony or a misdemeanor in those two 4 cases. 5 MR. MULARSKI: He'll be pleading guilty 6 to a misdemeanor. The exact misdemeanor is not 7 known at this time. But it - -ALDERMAN BAUMAN: So your - - your 8 9 testimony is that both these felony charges will 10 be reduced to two misdemeanor charges. 11 MR. MULARSKI: Yes. 12 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: So then he will have 13 two additional convictions, misdemeanor 14 convictions. 15 MR. MULARSKI: All of which have been 16 addressed by this committee, yes. 17 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Members, any 18 questions? Anything to say in closing, before we 19 take this matter into committee? 20 MR. MULARSKI: I think we've addressed 21 all the particular issues. Mr. Metke is willing 22 to comply with whatever request this committee 23 has. He's learned his lessons very - - the hard 24 way with respect to opening up this bar. It is a

situation where, upon my advice and the advice of

00014 1 other, counsel and his family and friends, it's going to be him from now who is going to be running this bar. He's going to be the one that 4 does pretty much 24 hours a day, seven days a 5 week, once he gets back on his feet, to ensure 6 that there won't be any violations again. And 7 what I've told Mr. Metke is that that means that 8 the police are going to make a weekly stop at the 9 bar and make sure everyone there is of age, he's 10 going to do that. And if he doesn't do that, he 11 understands he's going to lose his license 12 permanently, no question about it. 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. This 14 matter is in committee. 15 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman. 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 17 ALDERMAN BOHL: Would move to go with a 18 20 day suspension and I will just say that that 19 was the exact recommendation that came out of 20 this committee last time. I think that counsel 21 is correct in pointing out that these matters 22 heretofore have come before this committee, in 23 short of the additional finding in item 17, that

we provided that recommendation with all of the

aforementioned evidence before us. The issue on

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item number 17 is one where I could easily understand that a bartender who is beyond his - - the expiration date on his license, or a bar owner would contact somebody at the Health Department and inquire whether or not they can serve sodas with lunch, and hear from somebody who they feel is an official capacity at City Hall would tell them yes. You're not serving alcohol.

I don't know that there was malice. The police department did go in there on a couple of occasions. Determined he was not serving alcohol. By our even sending this back to committee we added an additional three weeks of shutdown time on top of the fact that Mr. Metke was already negligent in his own part in filing on a timely basis, and therefore, took a - - a personal hit. I count 21 days on top of 20 days on top of his own, pardon my French, stupidity. And we've got probably about a 50 day suspension or shutdown of his establishment.

I'll just let him know. He's been open one year. He's on a darn short leash, as far as I'm concerned. If he does receive approval and continues to operate another year, he better have

00016 1 a squeaky clean record next year. I will just let you know that, without undue warning. MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, I need to 4 clarify something here. 5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Schrimpf. 6 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Is it the intent 7 of Alderman Bohl to impose a 20 day suspension 8 from the time that this matter will be taken up. 9 ALDERMAN BOHL: Correct. 10 MR. SCHRIMPF: By the Council? 11 ALDERMAN BOHL: Correct. 12 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. So - - All right. 13 Just so that he knows, that means that he cannot 14 operate. That means that when the Council takes 15 this matter, and if it approves this 16 recommendation, he will be shut down for 20 days 17 following the action of the Common Council, not 18 today's action, the action of the Common Council. 19 MR. MULARSKI: If I might address the 20 committee, obviously that is devastating to a 21 business the size of Mr. Metke's who has already 22 been shut down for some time. We're not really 23 in a position to ask for that much leniency, 24 obviously, you know. There's quite a lot out 25 there, and we're doing everything we can to get

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this establishment back - - back running, and obviously there's - - I don't disagree with Alderman Bohl at all, that there's going to be a very short leash, not just from this committee, but - - but by everyone else in Mr. Metke's life who has helped him put this back together. So from that perspective, I would certainly request something shorter if that is at all possible than - - than 50 days, because that will likely make it difficult, if not impossible, to start this establishment up again. But that is certainly up to this committee.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Motion by Alderman Bohl is to recommend that this renewal be approved with the issuance of the 20 day suspension.

 $\,$ ALDERMAN BOHL: And, Mr. Chairman, that is based on matters contained within the police report.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Based on matters contained in the police report. And Alderman Bohl moves to make the entire police report part of the record in this matter, and hearing no objections, so that's ordered.

The motion on the table is renewal with

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1	a 20 days suspension.
2	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
3	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: On the motion,
4	Alderman Puente.
5	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Keep consistent with
6	my vote from the last committee. I'll be against
7	that.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any more
9	discussion on the motion? Are there any other
10	objections to the motion besides Alderman
11	Puente?
12	Then the motion carries on a vote of
13	four to one.
14	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Counsel, I still
15	will need that card from you. The committee is
16	going to be doing findings of fact and
17	conclusions of law recommending approval of this
18	license with a 20 day suspension. You'll have an
19	opportunity to submit written objections to that
20	recommendation, as well as appear before the
21	Milwaukee Common Council when it meets on this
22	matter on March 16th, 2005 in the Common Council
23	Chambers of this building, which is the same
24	floor, but the opposite end, at approximately
25	nine a.m. Understand all that?
