PROCEEDINGS

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Karen D. Hubbard, agent for Hubbard and Associates NA, Inc. Class B Tavern,

Tavern Dance renewal application for Karen's Club at 7330 North 76th Street. Good morning. How are you today?

MS. HUBBARD: Good morning. How are you?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would you raise your hand and be sworn in, please?

(Whereupon Karen D. Hubbard was sworn under oath.)

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And state your name and address for the record, please.

MS. HUBBARD: Karen Hubbard, H-u-b-b-a-r-d, 7330A North 76th Street.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Miss Hubbard, do you admit to receiving a notice in the mail that there's a possibility that your application could be denied because of items contained in the police report and neighborhood objections to loitering, littering, and fights, shootings, and conduct which is detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the neighborhood?

MS. HUBBARD: Yes.

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CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Health Department? MR. BOND: No objection.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Neighborhood Services? No objection.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Sergeant Hogan?

MR. KAUFMAN:

SERGEANT HOGAN: Two incidents in the last licensing period. The first occurred on May the 8th of this year. Shortly before 2 a.m. officers were dispatched to the premises for a shooting.

The officers indicate in the report that the applicant was on the scene and stated that she called the police because of a fight in the tavern with about five females. She had initially denied calling in the shooting.

Police learned that there was a large fight involving many people in the tavern, and that two females left the tavern and came back into the tavern stating that they were shot in the parking lot.

The applicant, her son, a security person and the bartender denied hearing any gunfire and were indicated as reluctant to provide the police with what had occurred.

The victim stated that they were at a party on the premises, a fight broke out between 30 and 40 people, and when security pushed everybody out, shots

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were fired into the crowd. I have no further 1 information on that. 2

> The other incident is regarding a fatal shooting that occurred in the parking lot of the premises on August the 27th of this year shortly before 2 a.m. In that incident, as was conveyed to me by investigating officers, the suspect in that matter observed his girl friend or a female acquaintance of his with another man on the premises, and when they left, the suspect obtained a handgun from apparently outside of the premises, walked up to the victim while he was sitting in his car and fatally shot him.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you, Sergeant Do you have any questions of the sergeant on this police report?

> No. MS. HUBBARD:

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Questions by members of the committee?

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, I would simply ask the licensed applicant if she agrees with the nature of the testimony that the sergeant gave.

MS. HUBBARD: The only thing with the first incident, when -- I think he mentioned that I denied calling the police, and that was because we didn't know anybody had got shot. We called the police about

parking lot, and basically that was it. 2 That's all I have. MR. SCHRIMPF: 3 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman? CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 5 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. Miss Hubbard, 6 during the typical evening, do you have security staff for your club? 8 MS. HUBBARD: Yes. 9 ALDERMAN BOHL: And approximately how many 10 individuals would you have on a night -- Does anybody 11 have a calendar? The evening or early morning of 5/8, 12 do you know what day of the week it was? 13 ALDERMAN PUENTE: I believe Saturday night, 14 Sunday morning. 15 ALDERMAN BOHL: On Saturday night, how many 16 security staff would you have present? 17 MS. HUBBARD: It depends on the function 18 because we do all kinds, you know, wedding receptions, 19 parties, banquets. Sometimes there might be two at 20 one event, one at another event. So it just depends 21 on what type of a crowd I have. 22 ALDERMAN BOHL: Miss Hubbard, what is your 23 capacity at the club? 24 MS. HUBBARD: My back hall capacity holds up 25

the fight. We didn't know what was going on in the

to 300 people. My front bar is 100, and the lower hall has a capacity of 100 people.

ALDERMAN BOHL: So if we were actually going to look into the entirety, we're talking you could max out at about 550?

MS. HUBBARD: Exactly.

ALDERMAN BOHL: And two security -- If you were going to bring in a large crowd of, say, three, 400 individuals, you would have two security staff?

MS. HUBBARD: I wouldn't bring in a crowd that large.

ALDERMAN BOHL: On the night of -- or the event that occurred around May 8th, do you recall how large a crowd you had?

MS. HUBBARD: About a hundred people.

ALDERMAN BOHL: About a hundred people and two security staff. Are one of those security persons at the door, or how do you work the security staff?

MS. HUBBARD: Like I said, it depends on the event. That particular event it was maybe two at the door and two inside the bar.

ALDERMAN BOHL: If there is a fight occurring in the parking lot, what are your expectations, or what is the practice of your security staff? Are they to intervene, are they to call the police,

are they to go out and see what's going on? Or is what occurs in the parking lot just fair game? I'm curious as to the response if the security staff is aware of a fight.

MS. HUBBARD: Normally what we do is we clear the bar. In an effort to clear the bar, we do go outside and clear the parking lot.

ALDERMAN BOHL: This fight started in the bar; is that correct?

MS. HUBBARD: No. Which incident are you speaking of?

ALDERMAN BOHL: May 8th.

MS. HUBBARD: May 8th, yes. There were some girls fighting in the back of the bar, correct. And then security broke up the fight, and then we escorted everybody out of the bar.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Now, but you're saying security was not present outside, so they were not aware of the particular shooting?

MS. HUBBARD: No, security is not on the parking lot outside. At the end of the night we do have security go outside and clear the parking lot. They stand at the door. They're monitoring the parking lot. They're making sure there's no one outside loitering, but no one is patrolling outside

or anything like that. They are standing outside and making sure people are not leaving with liquor and standing around. If you can't get in, you have to leave.

ALDERMAN BOHL: So if there is a fight, the effort is just to push the combatants outside?

MS. HUBBARD: No. The effort is to clear the bar. If a fight occurs, what we do is we close the bar down. We stop the music, and we start, you know, just making sure everyone's out safely. That's what we do.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. I don't know, and I don't want to put words in your mouth or even question you, but if I have five people who are fighting; three on one side, two on another, is there an effort to detain two, send three out -- tell three to leave the premises, and then tell the other two now you may leave? Because otherwise I think what we're doing --

MS. HUBBARD: No. See, it's kind of hard for me to answer because I don't have a bar like that, you know what I mean? We don't usually have situations. I've been in this business since 1993, and we very, very seldom have this.

So, in this case here, they did detain the girls, and then they cleared the bar, and then we

called the police and let the police handle it because this is -- you know, like I said, I don't have a nightclub. It's more like a hall rental, so if there's a birthday party, it's no problem. If it's a wedding reception, it's no problem. So I'm not used to anything like that because we don't have a bar like that. It's more of a hall rental, so each situation is different.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, you know, that may be, but all I'm going to say is we have a police report dating back to June of 2001, shots fired in the parking lot; October of 2001, approximately 100 people in the parking lot engaging in disruptive behavior. Several subjects were observed fighting by the police department. And then we have two incidents this year, two shootings.

So, you know, it's not as though there was one instance -- this is the one lone isolated instance in your record. We have at least four incidents where there was either a substantial fight or a shooting. I mean you're telling me that this is the exception to the rule. I'm telling you four is four too many. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you, Alderman Bohl.

1	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair?					
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.					
3	ALDERMAN PUENTE: How long have you been at					
4	this establishment?					
5	MS. HUBBARD: I've been on 76th since 1999.					
6	ALDERMAN PUENTE: You had stated earlier you					
7	would not get to a large crowd. What is the maximum					
8	you allow for the rental of your hall?					
9	MS. HUBBARD: Probably up to 200.					
10	MR. KAUFMAN: With the occupancy, she's got					
11	a limit of 476 on her permit.					
12	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. But you say you					
13	don't max out?					
14	MS. HUBBARD: Right, exactly. I have three					
15	different places that I rent out, and each hall					
16	basically has a different capacity, and then that's					
17	the way we handle each event, depending on what					
18	capacity.					
19	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Getting back to the May					
20	8th incident, was your hall rented out for that?					
21	MS. HUBBARD: Yes.					
22	ALDERMAN PUENTE: And what was that about?					
23	Was it for a wedding or something else?					
24	MS. HUBBARD: On May 8th it was a birthday					
25	party.					

1	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Birthday party. Okay.					
2	And when the shooting occurred, was that also a rental					
3	of your hall?					
4	MS. HUBBARD: That was in the parking lot.					
5	ALDERMAN PUENTE: I understand, but they					
6	were in your establishment prior to the shooting; is					
7	that correct?					
8	MS. HUBBARD: Correct.					
9	ALDERMAN PUENTE: All three of them, as I					
10	understand.					
11	MS. HUBBARD: I think so.					
12	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Even though there was no					
13	incident per se in your parking lot. Okay. And what					
14	kind of party did you have that day?					
15	MS. HUBBARD: Birthday party.					
16	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Birthday party. Thank					
17	you. Getting back to the security guard, is your son					
18	one of the security guards?					
19	MS. HUBBARD: No, he works there, helps me					
20	out.					
21	ALDERMAN PUENTE: So he has nothing to do					
22	with the security?					
23	MS. HUBBARD: No.					
24	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Does security that you					
25	hire, are they trained, or is it just somebody you					

1	know?
2	MS. HUBBARD: It's a hired security company.
3	Yes, they are trained.
4	ALDERMAN PUENTE: What is the name of the
5	security company?
6	MS. HUBBARD: Grady Anderson Security
7	Company.
8	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Brady?
9	MS. HUBBARD: Grady.
10	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Are they armed?
11	MS. HUBBARD: No.
12	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Do they have batons or
13	anything, mace?
14	MS. HUBBARD: No.
15	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. Do you tell them to
16	cooperate with the police if they should come?
17	MS. HUBBARD: Oh, without a doubt.
18	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Do you know that at the
19	incident of the shooting that your security guards
20	left?
21	MS. HUBBARD: Because we close up early. We
22	close at 1:30.
23	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Don't you think they
24	should have stuck around?
25	MS. HUBBARD: I think they did stick around.

I think at the time -- I'm not for sure, because I read in the report that one of the security people talked to someone.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Yeah, in the beginning of it.

MS. HUBBARD: Okay.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: And then they wanted to do follow-up with your security people, and they had left the scene.

MS. HUBBARD: I heard that Grady Anderson did talk to the detective, so --

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Yeah, later.

MS. HUBBARD: Okay.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: That is correct, but that was later on. It's very important for the police department to gather information immediately, -- and that's why I was curious as to why they had left the scene, especially at a shooting, a homicide on top of it, -- so they can apprehend the suspect possibly, depending on what information the security guards had. It could have helped in -- You know, I understand this gentleman was apprehended, but it could have been that he wasn't, and they could have provided information to the police department but were nowhere to be found after the incident.

MS. HUBBARD: But when I talked to Grady
Anderson, he told me that his security did talk to the
police, and that's what I understood. And then I
asked him was there anything we needed to do, and he
said no. I guess they, you know, handled it. They
told him that they had all the information they
needed.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Right, I agree with you that they talked to them, but do you understand what I'm saying? The time had elapsed, they had left the scene, and they were not readily available to the police to talk to them regarding the incident.

MS. HUBBARD: Okay.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: That's what I'm saying.

If they talked to them a day or two later, that

doesn't do the police too much good when they're

looking for a suspect immediately.

MS. HUBBARD: I didn't know that, I didn't know that.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: That's all I have. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other questions by members of the committee? Is there anyone else in the audience here to testify in this matter? No one else in the audience here to testify? Okay.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair, one more. I'm 1 Do you live above this? 2 sorry. MS. HUBBARD: Yes. 3 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. Thank you. the police were pounding on your door that evening, --5 Were you there that evening? 6 MS. HUBBARD: No, I was not there that 7 evening. 8 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. Thank you. 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Did you recently move? 10 MS. HUBBARD: Yes. 11 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Oh, you did. Okay. 12 From? 13 14 MS. HUBBARD: I sold my home in Mequon. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mequon. Okay. 15 want to give us some closing statements on this before 16 we take this matter into committee? 17 18 MS. HUBBARD: Yes. What I did, you know, I reviewed everything, because like I said, normally we 19 do so many functions, and they turn out wonderful. 20 In situations like this, what I've decided 21 22 to do is to hire more security to patrol the parking lot, since all the incidents that happened was in the 23 parking lot. But normally it's never no problem. 24 I really tried to sit and think what could 25

I have done to prevent any of this, and there was 1 I have no control over what people do when they decide to leave my premise and behave that way. 3 So I just figured the best way to handle this probably was to hire more security for the parking lot at the 5 end of the night. 6 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Any other 7 questions by members of the committee? This matter's 8 in committee. 9 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. 10 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente. 11 ALDERMAN PUENTE: My recommendation would be 12 13 a 10-day suspension on her tavern license and a 30-day 14 on her dance hall permit based on the police report. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Motion by Alderman 15 Puente is to recommend renewal of this license with a 16 17 10-day suspension of the Class B tavern license and a 18 30-day suspension of the tavern dance license. discussion on the motion? Please call the roll on 19 that motion. 20 21 MS. ELMER: Alderman Bohl? 22 ALDERMAN BOHL: Aye. MS. ELMER: Alderman Puente? 23 24 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Aye. 25 MS. ELMER: Alderman Wade?

ALDERMAN WADE: Aye. 1 2 MS. ELMER: Alderman Dudzik? ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Aye. MS. ELMER: Mr. Chair? CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Aye. Motion approved 5 five to zero. 6 MR.
