SPECIFIC ENTERTAINMENT/RECREATION LICENSES, ETC.)

PROPOSED PUBLIC ENTERTAINMENT PREMISES LICENSE (SINGLE LICENSE TYPE)**

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| <u>Amusement machine premises licenses:</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Amusement premises license (\$100) - Videogame center license (\$575) - Phonograph premises permit (\$100) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Public entertainment premises (“PEP”) license (license fee depends on Common Council-established maximum capacity, and ranges from \$150 to \$2,000 – see below) |
| <u>Amusement machine distributor licenses:</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Amusement machine distributor’s license (\$850) - Phonograph distributor license (\$850) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Amusement machine or jukebox distributor license (\$850) |
| <u>Temporary entertainment licenses:</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Carnival site permit (\$50) (max. of 7 days) - Public entertainment temporary permit (\$50) (not more than 72 consecutive hours) - Special party permit (\$50) (one day max.) - Tavern amusement special license (\$100 per day) (max. of 4 days) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Temporary public entertainment premises permit (\$50) (max. of 4 days, except a carnival, which shall not exceed 14 days) |

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| <p><u>Regular entertainment licenses:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Bowling alley license (\$25) - Instrumental music license (for class “B” estabs. only) (\$165) - Pool and billiard hall license (\$150) - Pool and billiard table license (\$40) - Public entertainment license (\$250) (note: these are non-alcohol establishments) - Pre-recorded music machine, record spins premises license (for class “B” estabs. only) (\$60) - Tavern amusement license (\$2,000) - Tavern dance license (\$300) - Theatre and motion picture license (2-year license; fee is \$0.30 per seat, rounded to the nearest \$50, with a min. fee of \$220 and a maximum fee of \$1,600) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Public entertainment premises (“PEP”) license, regardless of the type of entertainment or whether alcohol beverages are served. License fee depends on Common Council-established maximum capacity as follows: <p>25 or fewer persons, or a premises without a specified capacity: \$150.</p> <p>26-79 persons: \$250.</p> <p>80-99 persons: \$375.</p> <p>100-149 persons: \$500.</p> <p>150-179 persons: \$700.</p> <p>180-299 persons: \$1,000.</p> <p>300-499 persons: \$1,500.</p> <p>500 or more persons: \$2,000.</p> |
| <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Center for the visual and performing arts (\$300) (must hold a tavern amusement license for the same premises) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Center for the visual and performing arts (\$2,000) (must hold a PEP license for the same premises) |

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| <p>For a phonograph premises permit, a “phonograph machine permit tag” is required, but no additional information about the tag or its placement is specified in the code.</p> | <p>Each amusement machine or jukebox distributor licensee shall affix, to each amusement machine or jukebox placed on a premises by the licensee, an identification tag measuring at least 2 inches by 2 inches providing the name, telephone number of license number of the licensee. Each tag or sticker shall be placed in a location which is readily visible to the general public without requiring movement of the machine or jukebox.</p> |
| <p>For an alcohol beverage establishment or a public entertainment club (non-alcohol club), maximum capacity is the building-code-determined legal occupancy limit of the premises. This legal occupancy limit is included on the licensee’s plan of operation.</p> | <p>For a PEP, in addition to the legal occupancy limit specified on the plan of operation, the Common Council shall authorize a specific occupancy for the licensed premises (one of the occupancy ranges listed above in the fee schedule). In determining this occupancy, the Council shall consider the legal occupancy limit on the plan of operation, other information in the plan of operation, the character of the surrounding neighborhood, and traffic and parking patterns in the area.</p> |
| <p>(no current comparable provisions)</p> | <p>The floor plan submitted with an application for an alcohol beverage license or a PEP license shall include (in addition to currently-required items):</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A description of how patrons will enter the premises, the proposed location of the waiting line, estimated waiting time, and the location where security searches or ID verification will occur at the entrance to the premises. 2. The locations and dimensions of off-street loading areas for patrons, employes and entertainers. |

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| (no current comparable provisions) | <p>The plan of operation submitted with an application for an alcohol beverage license or a PEP license shall include:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A description of designated or likely outdoor smoking areas, the number and placement of exterior and interior trash receptacles, crowd control barriers and sanitation facilities, as well as a description of how applicable noise standards will be met for the subject premises. 2. A description of any proposed security provisions for off-street parking and loading areas. 3. The number of security personnel expected to be on the premises, their responsibilities, the equipment they will use in carrying out their duties and their licensing, certification or training credentials. 4. A description of any provisions made for clean-up of the premises, including identification of the solid waste contractor to be used by the applicant. |
| <p>Costume regulations for dancers, performers or entertainers are located in the alcohol beverage license regulations.</p> | <p>Costume regulations for dancers, performers or entertainers are located in the PEP license regulations, so that they apply to entertainment at both alcohol-serving and non-alcohol entertainment venues.</p> |
| <p>For a public entertainment club (non-alcohol club), the licensee shall be responsible for supervision of the premises by persons 21 years of age or older.</p> | <p>Supervision requirement applies only to a PEP with an authorized occupancy of 150 or more persons.</p> |

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| <p>End/start times for entertainment:</p> <p>Tavern amusement premises or phonograph – 2 a.m. except 2:30 Sa-Su, not before 9 a.m. on weekdays and 10:30 a.m. Su</p> <p>Tavern ballroom premises – 1:00 a.m.</p> <p>Instrumental music, tavern dance, etc. – 1:00 weekdays, 1:30 a.m. Su, not before 9 a.m. weekdays and 10:30 Su</p> | <p>End/start times for entertainment:</p> <p>Indoor public entertainment – shall be discontinued no later than the closing time for the alcohol beverage establishment (if an alcohol establishment) or no later than 1:00 a.m. Sunday through Thursday nights and 1:30 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights (if a non-alcohol establishment), unless an earlier time of discontinuation is established by the common council in its approval of the licensee’s plan of operation</p> <p>Outdoor public entertainment - shall be discontinued no later than 10:00 p.m. Sunday through Thursday nights and no later than 12:00 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights, unless a different time of discontinuation, either earlier or later, is established by the common council in its approval of the licensee’s plan of operation.</p> |
| <p>Chief of police may set later times for cessation of music and entertainment</p> | <p>The local Common Council member may set a later time for cessation of indoor public entertainment. A different time for cessation of outdoor public entertainment may be established by the Common Council in its approval of a PEP licensee’s plan of operation.</p> |
| <p>(no current comparable provision)</p> | <p>If a retail alcohol beverage license for a premises is suspended and there is also a PEP license for the premises, the PEP license shall be suspended for the same time period as the alcohol beverage license.</p> |
