## SYSTEMS REFORM

Objective: Transform the local workforce development system to a demand-driven & customer responsive system

- Established and convened the **new Board of Directors** and Committee structures
- Convened the Mayor's Transition Team to develop recommendations for the WIB
- Initiated the **Youth Programs Transformation** through planning with internal staff and listening / planning sessions with community based organizations
- Established two Career Opportunity Centers at YWCA & UMOS
- Integrated W2 & WIA Case Management systems through collaboration between WIB, YWCA, UMOS, and Maximus Inc.
- Created a Central Business Services Unit to conduct Job Development activity and serve as single point of contact for business in partnership with MATC, WI Job Service, DVR, TANF/FSET, & MAWIB
- Established strategic partnership with MATC to coordinate FSET/WIA training and to connect Adult Learning Centers to the Career Opportunity Centers
- Collaborating with CDGA to braid funding and program strategies
- Planning to convene **Donors Forum** in spring to engage philanthropic community to planning and investing in workforce development strategies
- Partnership with Regional Workforce Alliance and M7 to streamline local and regional workforce development strategy

## **NEW INITIATIVES**

Objective: Establish the Workforce Investment Board as the coordinating, planning, and development organization for workforce development in Milwaukee

- Announced \$4.8 million dollar grant from US Dept. of Labor in partnership with Milwaukee Public Schools to serve at 500 at-risk youth at Bradley Tech, Madison, North Multiplex, and South Division as a part of the **Future First Initiative**
- Developing a partnership and pilot initiative with DWD and DOC to serve exoffenders an RFP will be issued in January 2008
- Planning a comprehensive strategy to coordinate economic development and workforce development efforts in the 30<sup>th</sup> Street Industrial Corridor
- The HIRE Center is responding to a massive **lay-off at Delphi** impacting nearly 1,000 individuals. MAWIB is expecting a National Emergency Grant in the amount of \$1,000,000
- MAWIB will receive \$50,000 from the DWD to administer work experience & mentorship program with MPS and **Project Lead the Way**.

- Arandell Inc. recruitment for Bindery Workers, starting Wage \$11.26 \$12.16 hired 56 individuals through the WIB Business Services Unit.
- Created joint agreement and strategy to integrate City of Milwaukee and MAWIB Summer Youth Employment program.
- 54 Individuals received training and placement services through **WRTP / BigSTEP Construction & Manufacturing Initiatives** training programs average wage at placement \$14.03
- Roundy's Partnership for Youth: Partnered with Roundy's Food to recruited and place 26 youth from summer work experience to employment during the school year
- Creating a local coordination plan with MATC to meet the SuperSteel announcement of 100 Welders needed
- Successful implementation of the NEG BRAC 440<sup>th</sup> Airlift Wing project thus far, we have served 175 individuals
- Working with **Potawatomi Casino** to develop a workforce strategy to meet their demand for 500 new employees
- Customized Recruitment for McAllen Partnership, C & D Technologies, & FedEx

## **ON-GOING**

Objective: Ensure seamless and effective operation of current local WIA funding as well as other critical programs operated by the WIB during the transition period

\*\* State DWD performance data for the first quarter indicate the WIB has exceeded 4 performance measures, met 12 measures, and failed 1 measure.

- Completed second ReachBuild home with Howard Fuller Education Association; Broke ground on third ReachBuild home with Northcott Neighborhood House – 20 youth active on the project
- **Jobs for Americas Graduates** program currently has 75 student's enrolled students at Washington, Spectrum, and Hamilton. 15 students participated in the Prison Toy Project for the Salvation Army November.
- The career and education resource rooms at the **Milwaukee Career Center** has 2,375 visitors; 285 individuals received Job Readiness Training; and 265 students have participated ACT Prep programs have been completed
- WIA Adult Program currently has 377 individuals in active Case Management systems with 80 currently enrolled in training and 33 in intensive Services. 32 individuals have been placed in employment (7/1-9/30) at an average wage of \$12.75 per hour. Contracts with YWCA, UMOS, Maximus, WCS, and Interfaith
- The Milwaukee HIRE Consortium currently has 1560 individuals in Case Management. 75 individuals have been placed in employment (7/1 9/30) at an average wage of \$17.06 per hour. HIRE has conducted about (20) Rapid Response Worker Orientations, held (2) Employer Roundtables (45 employers attended the combined) and launched the first HIRE Center Job Fair.
- WIA Youth Program completed summer employment program for over 700 youth including partnerships with over 40 community organizations, the UW system, and the Milwaukee Conservation Leadership Corp.
