3	agenda, we have Osbaldo Ibarra, Class "B" Tavern				
4	and Instrumental Music renewal applications and				
5	new request for a permanent extension of the				
6	premises to include a patio at the north side of				
7	the premises and expansion of the kitchen for				
8	"Pepe's Rockn' Taco Shack" at 2012 North Farwell				
9	Avenue.				
10	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Good afternoon.				
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Good afternoon, sir.				
12	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: I am Oscar Ibarra.				
13	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay.				
14	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: I am Ossi's brother.				
15	He happens to be out of the country. We received				
16	a notice a week and a half ago, and he already				
17	had plans to go out of the country. So				
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are you an attorney?				
19	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: No, I'm not. And we				
20	talked to Alderman Kovac.				
21	MS. GRILL: Mr. Chair.				
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Grill.				
23	MS. GRILL: This is an individual				
2.4	application, so there's not even a legal				
25	entity				

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1	CHAIRMAN BOHL: We can't No can do				
2	I.				
3	MS. GRILL: And I believe that I spoke				
4	with Alderman Kovac.				
5	ALDERMAN KOVAC: Yeah, and I I				
6	spoke to Ossi about this, and I				
7	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Yes, he had a				
8	conference call.				
9	ALDERMAN KOVAC: I said to him				
10	specifically that an attorney if he wasn't				
11	here because he's going to be out of the country,				
12	an attorney needed to be here. And he, I think				
13	he explicitly said could you just be our's, and I				
14	said and I asked him if he had an attorney.				
15	He said yes.				
16	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: We do, but it was -				
17	- it was not clear. You were on a conference				
18	call with me and				
19	ALDERMAN KOVAC: It was very clear, and				
20	I said it about five times to them, because I				
21	knew I was worried this would happen,				
22	frankly.				
23	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: So what do we do				
24	from this point? Again, like I previously said,				
25	we received the notice a week and a half ago,				

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1	when these plans for his out of the country was					
2	made about six months ago.					
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I And I					
4	understand, you know, there's there may be					
5	family or other situations which					
6	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Correct.					
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: bring individuals					
8	out. You either have to make account for an					
9	attorney, because sometimes you just don't know.					
10	I mean, if it's a vacation and this is your					
11	business and your means of of of a					
12	living, you never schedule a vacation around the					
13	renewal of your license. It's kind of the					
14	equivalent of making sure you're not out of town					
15	during your wedding anniversary					
16	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Correct.					
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: You know, unless your					
18	wife's with you.					
19	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Correct.					
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: So, are there any					
21	neighbors here to testify? Are you in favor or					
22	in opposition?					
23	THE WITNESSES: In opposition.					
24	CHAIRMAN BOHL: What What I'm going					
25	to do is I'm going to call it forward. We are					

00005 1 going to hear from these neighbors. I'm not going to make them wait. I'm not going to ask 3 them to come back on another day. We will now take up this matter. We will get your testimony 5 for the record. Again, Osbaldo Ibarra, Class "B" 6 Tavern and Instrumental renewal applications and 7 - - and a new request for a permanent extension 8 of the premises to include the patio at the north 9 side of the premises and expansion of the kitchen 10 for "Pepe's Rockn' Tac - - Taco Shack". 11 Individuals here to testify please come 12 forward. And I just will request that we have a 13 transcript of this at the next meeting. If 14 you'll raise your right hands, please, we'll 15 swear you all in. 16 (Whereupon the witnesses were sworn.) 17 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Mr. Ibarra, I 18 just want to ask you, does your brother currently 19 have a tavern license there at all? 20 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Yes. 21 CHAIRMAN BOHL: He does. So it's - -22 It's a renewal of the - -23 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: It's a renewal. 24 CHAIRMAN BOHL: - - tavern. 25 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: We're a full service

00006 restaurant of the Class "B". 1 CHAIRMAN BOHL: But it's just the new 3 request for the permanent extension of the premise. 5 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Well, at the first 6 committee meeting all that was under 7 construction, and it was all pending, and had to get the go ahead from the inspectors. And all 8 that was done. That's why the wording on the - -9 10 on the renewal application was confusing to 11 myself, and it seemed like to our neighbors. 12 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. 13 MS. GRILL: Mr. Chair. 14 CHAIRMAN BOHL: I appreciate that. Ms. 15 Grill. 16 MS. GRILL: The original application 17 last year, I believe, just had out - - outdoor 18 seating on the front of the premises, which was 19 improved - - which was approved. So at the 20 renewal time, this north side patio and kitchen 21 expansion was applied for, and that's the 22 permanent extension. 23 CHAIRMAN BOHL: So it does - - It does 24 not apply to some of this. What - - As part of

the renewal and the protected property right is

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1	what they currently have. The extension applies
2	to only only the latter part that you reflect
3	here.
4	MS. GRILL: Right. The current
5	premises is the first floor, and then the front
6	patio, not the
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay.
8	MS. GRILL: not the north patio.
9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you. Sir,
10	we'll go from my left to right. Your name and
11	address for the record. If you have difficult -
12	- If you have a difficult spelling of your name,
13	if you could please spell it for the record.
14	THE WITNESS: Steven Merola. M, as in
15	Michael, E-R-O-L-A. I live at 1831 East
16	Lafayette, Apartment J. I have a question.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Um-hnh.
18	THE WITNESS: Does the permit include
19	allowing outdoor music?
20	MS. GRILL: Mr. Chair.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Grill.
22	MS. GRILL: Whenever someone has a
23	license for inside the tavern, when they have
24	outside premise, they have that extends out
25	into their outdoor area, but it cannot go past

the noise - - noise nuisance restrictions. So, if they have the front patio and they have, I believe, they have instrumental music, they could have instrumental music outside on that front patio, but it shouldn't be over the - - the restrictions that are part of the ordinances. And it should not be outside of the hours that are approved, and I believe, as far as the outdoor patio, the hours were until nine p.m. during the week and ten p.m. on weekends. So there should not have been anything outside, like there should not have been music after those hours. THE WITNESS: Okay. That's my - -

That's my concern is living right around the corner, is summertime a lot of people in my neighborhood don't, you know, don't have air conditioning. The windows are wide open all summer long. And, you know, not discriminating against any type of music or anything, but I'm concerned about the - - if there is music outside, the - - the volume, you know, I don't, you know, don't want to hear it in my apartment.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. And so you - - You aren't necessarily opposed to the current

2	extension above and beyond that or? I just want					
3	to clarify that.					
4	THE WITNESS: Um, no. It It's as					
5	long as Well, I guess, I I would be. If					
6	there's If there's going to be bands outside,

9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. All right.					
10	Thank you, sir. Questions by committee?					
11	ALDERMAN KOVAC: Mr. Chair?					
12	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman.					
13	ALDERMAN KOVAC: I have a question for					
14	Ms. Grill. They Are they allowed to have					
15	bands out there now?					
16	MS. GRILL: They have a instrumental					
17	music					
18	ALDERMAN KOVAC: Instrumental music.					
19	MS. GRILL: license, which includes					
20	bands.					
21	ALDERMAN KOVAC: So have they Have					
22	you noticed that they have been having bands out					
23	there?					
24	THE WITNESS: I have not noticed. I					
25	was just It's just a concern.					

00010 1 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by 2 committee? Thank you, sir. Sir. 3 THE WITNESS: Excuse me. Brian Buchs, B-U-C-H-S. We live at 1812 East Lafayette place, 5 unit number 307. That is the condominium that is 6 directly behind the patio at Pepe's. Our bedroom 7 window literally looks out over the top of the 8 patio. When the - - the patio was originally 9 built, we met with the owners. We had some 10 concerns about noise levels, hours of operation. 11 They agreed, and I believe it's in the minutes 12 from their - - their first hearing, that they 13 would close the patio at nine p.m. on weeknights, 14 ten p.m. on weekends. And while we haven't had a 15 abundance of nice nights since that time for 16 people to be outside, the ones that we've had 17 we've noticed that they have been going over that 18 nine p.m. At the core here that there's a 19 difference of opinion over what "close at nine 20 p.m." means. Our - - Our feeling is that at nine 21 o'clock people should be routed inside. Bar 22 service should be stopped outside, and that it 23 would be reasonable to expect that by ten o'clock 24 tables and chairs are cleared and - - and

business is concluded outside. They apparently

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1	do not share that opinion. I made a couple of					
2	attempts We made two attempts to phone down					
3	and talk to somebody during business hours. Were					
4	not met with successfully. I stopped down					
5	personally one day, left my name, number,					
6	address, asked somebody to contact me. That was					
7	back in May, and didn't hear from anybody until					
8	this past Friday.					
9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you.					
10	Questions by committee?					
11	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman.					
12	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schrimpf.					
13	MR. SCHRIMPF: And when you heard from					
14	somebody, who were they representing themselves					
15	to be?					
16	THE WITNESS: I heard from Mr. Ibarra's					
17	brother.					
18	MR. SCHRIMPF: All right. That's all I					
19	have.					
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I will I'll just					
21	say that my general belief is, is that if you					
22	have the ability to operate by license until nine					
23	o'clock, that means nobody's out there after nine					
24	o'clock eating or drinking.					
25	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Well, the

         what Alderman D'Amato told you. If Alderman

         a.m., that's wrong. It's unlawful. And it will
18
         get you a license revoked. Okay. There is no
19
         gentleman's agreement. If - - If - - If Alderman
20
         D'Amato said you could play music out there later
21
         on a gentleman's agreement, no, you can't. You
22
          can't. So if - - What I'll tell you is, if Mike
23
         D'Amato tells you that - - or Alderman Kovac
24
         tells you can stay open past 2:30, gentleman's
25
         agreement, you tell him State law says I can't.
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00013 1 I can't. That's - - You hold no sway, whatsoever. When you got to appear before this committee, there is no gentleman's agreement. So just lettin' you know where the law stands. 5 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Oh, I understand 6 where the law stands. Okay. 7 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. MR. OSCAR IBARRA: But at nine o'clock 8 9 we stop seating. We shut the music off. People 10 that are out there will finish their meals and 11 then leave. Now, it would be unjust and it would 12 be detrimental to our business if at nine 13 o'clock, we routed everybody inside like a bunch 14 of cattle, telling them that - - We would lose 15 business left and right. Now we do - - We do not 16 seat anyone after nine o'clock outside. 17 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. What I'll - -18 What I'll tell - -19 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Now according to 20 Milwaukee, we have the right to do it until ten, 21 but we came to this agreement that we would do it 22 at nine o'clock. Now it seems to be a one-way 23 street with the condominium complex. They have 24 asked for everything. They have gotten

everything they've asked for. We have not asked

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1	for anything in return. The only thing we asked					
2	for is a little bit of leeway.					
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Your Your extension					
4	of premises goes until when?					
5	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: I'm sorry?					
6	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Your extension of					
7	premises extends until when?					
8	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Nine o'clock during					
9	the week, ten o'clock on the weekends.					
10	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay.					
11	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: So we're not					
12	breaking any laws.					
13	CHAIRMAN BOHL: If they're drinking					
14	liquor outside of those hours, yes, they are.					
15	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: So at ten o'clock					
16	every patio in the City is done serving alcohol?					
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: No.					
18	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Is that what you're					
19	telling me?					
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yours is. That's what					
21	I'm telling you. Yours is.					
22	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Well, I'm not					
23	serving anything after					
24	CHAIRMAN BOHL: No, it is consumption.					
25	MR. OSCAR IBARRA: So if they					

00015 1 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Consumption. You - -MR. OSCAR IBARRA: If they've ordered -2 - I have to pour out their drinks? CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yes, you do. 5 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: Okay. 6 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yup. Just the same way that, you know, your - - your argument here - -7 This is called - -8 9 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: I'm not arguing, 10 sir. 11 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Your - - Your 12 logic. Okay. You're using some form of logic 13 with me. Your logic with me is the equivalent of 14 saying - - of being a bar and saying this much. 15 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: We're not a bar. 16 We're a restaurant, for the record. 17 CHAIRMAN BOHL: For the record, could 18 you be quiet and not say a word for the next 19 minute? Your logic is the equivalent of saying 20 gee, I'm a place that has a Class "B" tavern and some patrons come in, even though we officially 21 22 close at 2:30 on a Saturday. And this gentleman 23 comes in and at 2:15 he buys a beer and it's 24 still three-quarters full. Would it really be 25 fair to shuffle him out at 2:30 if his drink

00016 isn't finished? That's your logic. And I'll 1 2 tell you, the law says at 2:30 he better be gone. 3 Not, well his beer's still, you know, his beer is still a little full. It's not fair, you know, he 5 ought to be able to drink it to a quarter to three. If he nurses a drink, hey, he's a good 6 7 customer. You have no - - Your - - Your logic that you're using doesn't comply with the law. 8 9 That's all I'm telling you. That's it. And what 10 I'm telling you is this much, comply with the 11 law. No gentleman's agreements. Comply with the 12 law. 13 And the other thing is, is don't argue 14 with the Chair. 15 MR. OSCAR IBARRA: I'm not arguing, 16 sir. I am not arguing. 17 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Don't be argumentative. 18 ALDERWOMAN COGGS: Mr. Chair. 19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderwoman Coggs. 20 ALDERWOMAN COGGS: This question is for 21 the City Attorney. Maybe I'm just a little bit 22 confused. Because he's not the agent or 23 licensee, how much of this conversation is really 24 official. 25 MR. SCHRIMPF: Well, everything is

00017 1 official. ALDERWOMAN COGGS: What I mean is, towards our consideration of this license at all, if he's not able to actually be even representing 5 6 MR. SCHRIMPF: Well, it's - - it's 7 going into the record, and I think the committee can certainly use it as fair game for - - for 8 9 evaluating the license. But we are here right 10 now for the purpose of preserving the testimony 11 of the objecting witnesses, as an accommodation 12 to them because the actual licensee has not 13 appeared. We are going to be getting a 14 transcript. The licensee will have a chance to 15 review that. 16 ALDERWOMAN COGGS: I guess my question 17 was less about the witnesses, because I 18 understand that. 19 MR. SCHRIMPF: Correct. 20 ALDERWOMAN COGGS: And it's more about 21 this person sitting before us who is not a legal 22 representative of the licensee. 23 MR. SCHRIMPF: Well, that is - - That 24 is correct. And, I mean, he can certainly make

the statements that he wants to make, but the

00018 point of the matter is, is that we don't really 1 have the licensee here. Correct about that. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Any other 2 3 questions of this witness? Ma'am. 5 THE WITNESS: My name is Judith 6 Bostetter. I reside at 1812 East Lafayette, 7 also. I'm married to Brian Buchs. We live in 8 unit 307. So - - I'm sorry. B-O-S-T-E-T-T-E-R. 9 So I'll limit my comments to things 10 that I've per - - personally witnessed that 11 perhaps Brian has not. Well, I guess I'll start 12 there. One thing I want to mention is that in 13 addition to playing music after their scheduled 14 hours, now that the weather has warmed up, 15 they've started playing music before their 16 scheduled hours. For example, this past Saturday 17 they started playing music on the patio at about 18 9:30 a.m., which is an hour and a half before 19 they're supposed to open. So we're dealing with 20 not only them, you know, playing music and having 21 people on the patio after they're supposed to, 22 but now, a new development is that there are 23 people there before, also. I'm sorry, not 24 people, but music playing, also. 25 I - - I do take issue with what Mr.

Ibarra said regarding the fact that they stopped seating at nine p.m. I've documented this in writing, which I've sent to the Alderman, as well as Ms. Grill. Just last week we took photographs of the patio simply for the purpose that after nine in the evening new customers were being seated and given menus. And Oscar Ibarra is the on-site manager. He is there, from what I can see, every day. So even though he's not the licensee, he's the person that we deal with. He personally sat out on the patio that evening with his customers until almost 10:30 at night. He does this routinely.

We met with Mr. Ibarra and his brother as a condominium association before their patio was completed last year, and their then manager, I don't believe he works there anymore, told us that they were very skilled in moving people off the patio when it was time to close. That this particular manager, who I think is no longer employed with the company, had worked at other establishments that had outdoor patios with closing times. And that he had those specific skills, and that he knew how to deal with people, that he would offer to buy them a drink inside or

00020 1 whatever he needed to do to make sure that when that closing time came, he moved them indoors. So to now say that that's an unreasonable request, I think, is - - is misleading. 5 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Questions 6 of this witness? Mr. Ibarra, any questions you want to pose? Right. I thank you for - - for 7 8 all coming down and providing your testimony. I 9 will make the specific request that the next time this matter is heard that a copy of the 10 11 transcript will be provided when the matter does 12 come before us. With that, we will have Alderman 13 Zielinski move to hold this matter at the Call of 14 the Chair. Are there any objections to that 15 motion? Hearing none, so ordered. Thank you for 16 coming down. 17 And, Mr. Ibarra, we'll - - we'll just 18 - - If you want to just contact the License 19 Division, and whenever either your brother, 20 and/or we can have an attorney, we'll try to work 21 you in at the next available meeting.
