Here are her concluding remarks (emphasis is mine):

"...And you did talk about some of the administrative proceedings that we can take against *our physicians* that are over prescribing and **not prescribing in a legitimate manner**, that puts oxycodone and hydrocodone on the street.

## And we do have a lot of those.

And I mean the other issue we have is, is having ahh — **prosecutions** — of <u>physicians that are pumping pills on the street without people having legitimate medical problems.</u>

And that's an issue we address <u>all the time</u> because *nobody* wants to put a doctor behind — in jail."

The DEA licenses "our physicians" to prescribe controlled substances.

Watch the video — she could barely get herself to say the word **prosecutions**.

She almost said 'because nobody wants to put a doctor *behind bars*', but caught herself and said — "*in jail*" — as if to soften the reality of what these pill pushers deserve.

The State does not have a problem putting the rest of us *behind bars* for violating the controlled substances act, but Doctors? — come on — nobody wants to do that!

The Task Force is choosing to ignore one of the root causes of the current opioid "crisis" i.e., **supply.**
