

Pothole Service Requests


Pothole Service Requests through September, 2006 - 2009





Pothole Response

Averaging 2.7 days faster response than 2008





2009 Street Lighting Response

(Thru 2nd Quarter)

- Area street light outages
 - 2009: 1,551 repairs (down 6.9% from 2008)
 - 2008: 1,661 repairs
- Single Unit Light Outages
 - 2009: 1,431 repairs (down 9.8% from 2008)
 - 2008: 1,586 repairs
- Emergency outages
 - about 6% less than 2008
 - 14% higher than 2007
- Backlog of underground repairs
 - 49% YTD 2008 to 21% YTD 2009
 - Increased staffing and reduced current year outages



LED Traffic Signals & Street Lighting

- Nearly 200 Signalized Intersections will be converted to LED's under a performance contract with Johnson Controls
- WeEnergies provided the City with a \$104,000 grant to help offset the costs of converting to LED's
- o \$340,000 in savings is expected in 2010
- Trial LED Streetlight installation on S. 97th
 St. and in the Third Ward



ARRA - Infrastructure



- Surface Transportation Improvement Program & Transportation Enhancements - \$26.8 million
- Milwaukee County STP & TE \$4.7 million
- CDBG \$1.1 million (crack filling)
- CDBG Energy Efficiency Block Grant \$500K


- 70 Traffic Calming Studies Conducted

Milwaukee By Bike

- 49% of Milwaukee residents ride bikes for recreation or exercise
- Number of people bicycling to work grew by almost 45% in the two years after we began striping bicycle lanes in 2005
- City recognized as a Bronze Level Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists
- State Mandate for Bike Facilities on State & Federally Funded Projects

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Let the Chicken Cross the Road!

The City of Milwaukee will hold the second annual Pedestrian Safety Week to raise awareness that motorists must yield to people attempting to cross the street in a crosswalk.

Motorists are required to slow or stop whenever they see a person step off the curb and into a crosswalk. Drivers must yield whether the crosswalk is painted or not. Even if they are not painted, an unmarked crosswalk is the lateral extension of sidewalks on opposite sides of the road at an intersection.

To help raise awareness about this important traffic safety issue, there will be crosswalk demonstraions and police enforcement at crosswalks around the City the entire week.
