Cocroft graduated from North Division High School, Wood, Missouri, Cocroft passed the qualification tests during commissioned on June 13, 1967, and branched infantry and Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in 1965. August 1968, Cocroft received orders for the 101st Airborne Division in Vietnam. to branch military intelligence and decided to stay with the

En route to Vietnam, Cocroft attended Airborne School at Fort Benning, Georgia. The Army then gave him a choice between Ranger School and Warfare Training in Panama. He chose jungle school. After being struck down by illness in Panama's jungles, Cocroft returned to the United St several months. He applied for a one-year extension to make the rank of captain.

Cocroft became familiar with the personnel and human resources for an army headquarters. After serving in Korea and four years on active duty, he returned to Wisconsin and joined the 84th Division in the reserves. Cocroft completed his Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Business Management In 1969, his next duty station was S-1 for the special troops of 8th Army Headquarters at Yongsan Garrison, Seoul, Republic of Korea. While there, and then received his master's degree in Public Policy at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Cocroft focused on helping veterans. In particular, he observed that minority and less educated veterans received a disproportionate number of less honorable discharges meant veterans could not receive the housing, health care, or employment benefits of an honorable discharge. Cocroft spent than honorable discharges from the military, usually after accepting a summary judgment instead of a general court-martial. These other than much of his professional life trying to correct this issue for veterans. In the mid-1970s, then-Vietnam Coordinator for the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs (WDVA) Cocroft networked with the Wisconsin Vietnam president of the National Association for Black Veterans (NABVETS), originally called the Interested Veterans of the Central City (IVOCC), Milwaukee, Oshkosh to Milwaukee: IVOCC/NABVETS, WACVO, Vets for Vets, Vets House, VIS, WDVA, and WVU. Cocroft was a founding member and a later Veterans Coalition (WVVC) headquartered at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh. The WVVC included Wisconsin Veterans organizations from

Regiment, 4th Brigade, 84th Division, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Later, he attended Army Command and General Staff College, preparing Army field grade then took command of the 84th Basic Training Battalion, 84th Division, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Cocroft went on to take command of the 2nd Brigade, officers to take command and staff roles at the battalion level and above. Following Command and Staff College, Cocroft was executive officer and Simultaneously, Cocroft continued his Army career in the reserves, A Company Commander and then C Company Commander, 1st Battalion, 84th 84th Division, Beaver Dam, Wisconsin.



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Brigadier General Robert Andrew Cocroft

November 16, 1946 - September 12, 2018

Brigadier General (Ret.) Robert Andrew Cocroft, US. Army, was born to Willie Tilmon Cocroft and Louise Cocroft (Gee) on November 16, 1946, in Conway, Mississippi. He entered into eternal life on Wednesday, September 12,2018.

At an early age, Robert professed his belief in Christ and was baptized at Center Hill Missionary Baptist Church in Conway, MS. In 1947, during the Northern migration of African-Americans in search of opportunities, his family settled in Milwaukee, WI.

Robert joined Metropolitan Missionary Baptist Church under the leadership of the late Rev. E. M. Kelly. The Cocroft family became a driving force in the formative years of the church where several family members remain today.

Robert received his formal education in the Milwaukee Public Schools and graduated from North Division High School in 1965. In 1966, while attending the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh on a football scholarship, he was drafted into the US. Army.

Upon completion of US. Army Infantry School (OCS) and while training at Fort Ord, California he met his wife. On May 3, 1969 he married Jacqueline Hunter and to this union two children were born, Dianna Killins (Cocroft) and Robert H. Cocroft.

He was a Vietnam-era veteran who served overseas duty in the Republic of Korea. He returned to Wisconsin and joined the 84th Division of the Army Reserve while working and going to school full-time. He continued with his military education, including graduating from the US. Army War College and climbing the chain of command to Brigadier General. At the conclusion of his military career, Robert was the Assistant Division Commander of Operations for the 98th Division. Throughout

his entire career he commanded at the company, battalion and brigade levels. Robert had 40 years of active and reserve military service and officially retired in 2006.

Robert served as Deputy Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs from 1994 to 2002. He had the overall responsibility for the Department's day-to-day operations, which included administration and management of 900 full-time employees, five loan programs, eight grant programs, a 7S0-bed skilled nursing care facility, and departmental administrative services. As a member of the senior management team within

(deceased) the National Association for Black Veterans (NABVETS) was established in 1973, and currently has chapters in 80 cities throughout the United States. He was the previous National Commander. NABVETS continues its advocacy on behalf of its membership with Congress, the federal administration, state, county, and city legislators, and is certified by the US. Department of Veterans Affairs as a claims representative for veterans.

As demonstrated by his extensive commitment to veteran affairs as well as numerous community-based organizations, Robert was a genuine servant leader. During the time of his transition, he was President and Chief Executive Officer of the nonprofit Center for Veterans Issues, Ltd. (CVI). In addition to advocating for the needs of veterans, CVI services include housing for low-income, homeless, minority and women veterans including their families. CVI is distinguished as the largest private provider of transitional housing and permanent supportive housing for veterans in Wisconsin. Educational achievements include: Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Business Management, Master of Arts in Public Policy and Administration both from the University of Wisconsin-Madison; US. Army Infantry School (OCS), US. Army Paratrooper Airborne School, and the US. Army War College at Carlisle Barracks, PA.

Throughout his career he also served on numerous boards and committees both locally and nationally.

He was preceded in death by his parents Willie Tilmon and Louise Cocroft; brother, Mark A. Cocroft; father-in-law, Command Sergeant Major Grover D. Hunter, Sr., USA, Retired; brother-in-law, Grover D. Hunter, Jr.; niece, Natasha S. Hampton; and great-niece, Ana Moffett.
