RE: Legal Status of the Milwaukee Safety Commission Vis a Vis the Milwaukee Police Department

Dear Mr. Mueller:

This letter will respond to your request for the opinion of this office, dated January 11, 2000, concerning the relationship between the Milwaukee Safety Commission and the Chief of Police. In this respect, you have asked four specific questions, which will be answered in turn.

Prior to addressing your four specific questions, we wish to set forth the basic "enabling authority" of the Milwaukee Safety Commission. That authority is contained in sec. 320-27 of the Milwaukee Code of Ordinances, which states as follows:

320-27. Safety Commission. 1. There is created a safety commission for the city consisting of 18 members appointed by the mayor from the citizens of the city and confirmed by the common council. Six members shall be appointed or reappointed each year, for a term of 3 years to commence on June 1st. It shall be the duty of this commission to investigate, advise and report to the mayor, common council, police department and commissioner of public works and other city officials concerning the best methods of providing for the safety and convenience of the public in matters of safety and to give the greatest possible publicity as to safety precautions.

2. The safety commission shall select from among its members a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary. It shall be the duty of the secretary to call meetings of the commission, to keep minutes of its meetings and accounts and be ready at all times to advise with city officials as to the work and recommendations of the commission.

There appears to be no statute or provision of the Milwaukee City Charter that specifically envisions a Safety Commission or either directs or authorizes its creation. (While Chapter 16 of the Milwaukee City Charter does specifically create certain City boards and commissions, the Milwaukee Safety Commission is not among them). However, the requisite Common Council authority for the enactment of sec. 320-27, Milwaukee Code of Ordinances, (quoted above), the "enabling statute" for the Milwaukee Safety Commission, may be found in sec. 62.11(5), Wis. Stats., which sets forth the general overall powers of the Common Council and which reads as follows:

(5) POWERS. Except as elsewhere in the statutes specifically provided, the council shall have the management and control of the City property, finances, highways, navigable waters, and the public service, and shall have power to act for the government and good order of the City, for its commercial benefit, and for the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and may carry out its powers by license, regulation, suppression, borrowing of money, tax levy, appropriation, fine, imprisonment, confiscation, and other necessary or convenient means. The powers hereby conferred shall be in addition to all other grants and shall be limited only by express language.

(Emphasis added).

Given this background information, we may now turn to consideration of your four specific questions.

1. Is the eighteen-member citizen Milwaukee Safety Commission presently under the command of the Chief of Police?

Answer: The 18-ember citizen Milwaukee Safety Commission is not under the command of the Chief of Police. Section 320-27, Milwaukee Code of Ordinances, provides that the Milwaukee Safety Commission shall consist of 18 citizen-members appointed by the Mayor and confirm in their appointments by the Common Council, for fixed terms. The Chief of Police has no role in this process. Furthermore, in the exercise of its functions, the Milwaukee Safety Commission is directed to "investigate, advise, and report to the Mayor, Common Council, Police Department, and Commissioner of Public Works and

other City officials" – not solely to the Police Department. Thus, its duties, powers, and responsibilities must be exercised with respect to, and for the benefit of, all interested City officials, including (but not necessarily limited to) those specifically named in the ordinance. These functions include "the best methods of providing for the safety and convenience of the public in matters of safety and to give the greatest possible publicity as to safety precautions."

However, a different conclusion applies with respect to the Safety Director and associated support staff. While the Safety Director is a mayoral appointee, and a member of the Mayoral Cabinet (sec. 66.146(1), Stats.), both that position and the remaining support staff (a category which includes clerical staff, professional staff (i.e., Safety Specialists) and regular and auxiliary school crossing guards) were transferred to the jurisdiction of the Milwaukee Police Department in 1989, and continue to remain as members of the Milwaukee Police Department to this day. Attached as Exhibits 1 and 2 to this letter is a copy of Common Council File Nos. 891615 and 891238, pertaining to the transfer of City functions relating to child and community safety to the jurisdiction of the Milwaukee Police Department. (These enactments are currently codified as secs. 312-23 and 312-25 of the Milwaukee Code of Ordinances). Attached as Exhibit 3 to this letter is a copy of the final version ("Substitute 4") of Common Council File No. 891136. effective December 24, 1989, which among other things created sec. 312-23 of the Milwaukee Code of Ordinances, the provision that places community safety and school crossing guard functions under the auspices of the Milwaukee Police Department. (Exhibit 3, Part 21 at pp. 3-4).

Commencing with the 1990 positions ordinance, the City has denoted the Safety Director and associated support staff as the Milwaukee Police Department's "Child and Community Safety Section." Attached for your information are the following documents confirming this designation: (a) page 166 of the 1999 City budget, in the "Police Department" section (Exhibit 4); (b) City of Milwaukee "Visual Organizational Inventory," April, 1999, pp. 44-45, pertaining to the Police Department, and listing on page 45 the "Child and Community Safety Section." (Exhibit 5); and (c) City of Milwaukee 2000 "Positions Ordinance," Common Council File No. 990704, page 85, listing the "Child and Community Safety Section" within the positions allotted to the Milwaukee Police Department. (Exhibit 6).

As members of the Milwaukee Police Department, the Safety Director and associated support staff are subject to the jurisdiction of the Fire and Police Commission, and the command authority of the Chief of Police, to the same extent as is applicable to other non-sworn civilian members of the Milwaukee Police Department. See sec. 62.50(23), Stats., Milwaukee City Charter, secs. 22-03-3 and 22-03-4; Milwaukee Code of Ordinances secs. 312-03, 312-23, and 312-25.

The current state of the law thus is uncertain concerning the status and substantive authority of the Milwaukee Safety Commission. The Commission itself is not under the command of the Chief of Police; indeed, it is explicitly constituted as an independent body responsible to numerous City officials. However, the Safety Director and associated support staff through which any recommendations made by the Milwaukee Safety Commission need be implemented are under the command of the Chief of Police. This state of affairs may, in the case of conflict between the Milwaukee Safety Commission and the Chief of Police, result in a situation where the Commission becomes unable to act effectively or to implement any of its recommendations without the concurrence of the Chief.

2. Does the Chief have the right to withhold resources that were established to support the Safety Commission's efforts?

Answer: We are uncertain as to what "resources" are addressed by this question. We find no support either in the ordinance or in any other applicable law for this proposition as it applies to resources specifically earmarked for the Safety Commission. However, the Chief is under no obligation to devote resources of the Milwaukee Police Department to the support of the Milwaukee Safety Commission.

3. Based on the ten years following the reorganization and support given to the Commission since the reorganization, is the Chief complying to the intent of the ordinance in this matter?

Answer. We would advise that the terms of the ordinance speak for themselves, and do not countenance interference by the Chief of Police with the Commission's ability to fully, properly, and effectively discharge those functions and responsibilities that the Common Council has seen fit to assign to the Commission. However, the converse is also true. Given that the 1989-1990 reorganization and associated ordinances adopted both at that time and subsequently have placed the positions of the Safety Director and associated support staff within the jurisdiction of the Milwaukee Police Department and thus under the command of the Chief of Police, the Chief's attempt to exercise that authority, notwithstanding any opposition from members of the Milwaukee Safety Commission, are consistent with those ordinances.

4. Is action needed legislatively to rectify the current situation?

Based on our previous answers, it would appear that some (but not all) of the issues raised by your letter may be resolved by simple application and implementation of current sec. 320-27, Milwaukee Code of Ordinances. However, the ambiguity surrounding the status of the Milwaukee Safety Commission itself, which has been addressed in our responses to your Question Nos. 1 and 3, is a matter of continuing concern, and one that can only be properly resolved by new legislation. We are not in a position to advise as to the nature or contents of any potential new legislation, as this constitutes a policy matter beyond the purview of this office.

An ordinance transferring community and child safety functions from the department of employe relations to the police department.

The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Milwaukee do ordain as follows:

- Part 1. Section 81-44.5-1 of the code is amended to read:
- 81-44.5. Driver Training Course. 1. The registration fee for a defensive driving course sponsored by the police department shall be \$7.
- Part 2. Section 312-23 of the code is created to read:
- 312-23. Community Safety. The police department shall:
- 1. Establish standards for the location of school crossing guards, conduct studies of locations for the placement of new crossing guard protection, the relocation of protection or discontinuation of service, review these findings with the safety commission and recommend to the common council the need for crossing guards based on the established standards and recommendations.
- 2. Administer the school crossing guard program.
- 3. Furnish school children, industrial workers, official and nonofficial groups with educational materials such as publications, films, radio and television spot announcements, and exhibits for the promotion of safety within the financial resources established by the common council.
- 4. Be responsible for seeing that the defensive driving course is conducted in accordance with the program guidelines adopted by common council resolution.
- Part 3. Section 340-1-2 of the code is amended to read:
- 340-1. Department Established.
- 2. Employe safety.
- Part 4. Section 340-23 of the code is repealed and recreated to read:
- 340-23. Employe Safety. The department of employe relations shall:
- 1. Develop a city-wide employe accident prevention and control program for all departments and agencies under control of the common council.
- 2. Submit to the mayor and common council not later than February 20, and each quarter thereafter, an analysis of the employe accident and severity rates for all city departments and agencies as of the quarter ending the first day of the preceding month. The department shall include in such report,

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and at any intervening interval, recommendations on appropriate action necessary or advisable to be taken by the various departments, boards, commissions or agencies or by the mayor and common council to reduce such rates and to keep expenditures from the worker's compensation fund to the minimum.

- 3. Recommend at appropriate times:
- a. Safety devices and practices to be used by departments and agencies under control of the common council.
- b. Employe safety education programs.
- c. Standards on which safety devices such as safety prescription glasses will be authorized.
- 4. Prepare the annual budget request for various commonly used safety devices as part of the department's total annual budget request.
- 5. Be the liaison between the safety commission and the various city departments obtaining such information from the departments as the safety commission requests through the secretary and transmitting it to the commission. The department shall receive and transmit to the mayor or to the proper department reports of the safety commission submitted under s. 320-27.
- Part 5. Section 340-25 of the code is renumbered 312-25.

Part 6. This ordinance shall take effect on December 24, 1989.

Further Resolved, That the procedures for handling and advancing funds in reimbursable revenue for this project shall be in accordance with those set forth in Common Council File Number 80-1513.

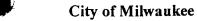

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This ordinance, effective December 24, 1989, implements various provisions in the 1990 city budget:

- 1. Transfers community and child safety functions from the department of employe relations to the police department.
- 2. Changes the designation of "bureaus" in the department of public works to "divisions".
- 3. Transfers special electrical services functions from the traffic engineering division to the bridges and buildings division of the department of public works.
- 4. Changes the title of the parking commission to transportation commission and expands its functions.
- 5. Replaces the art commission with an arts board and revises the duties of the board.
- 6. Changes the fee for out-of-city personnel to attend training courses sponsored by the fire and police departments as follows: A) Fire-from \$48 to \$55 per day, per person. B) Police-a new \$70 per day, per person fee is established.
- 7. Changes a number of references to "personnel director" and city service commission" to "director of employe relations" and "department of employe relations", reflecting the internal reorganization of the department.
- 8. Creates a permanent improvement fund for any purpose for which money may be borrowed or issued.

The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Milwaukee do ordain as follows:

At least one member each shall be selected from among the members of the common council; and representing the Milwaukee public school board. A majority of the members shall be city residents. No member shall participate in any decision that would directly assist any organization to which the member belongs, except as a dues-paying member, or from which the member receives any benefit, except as a dues-paying member.
- DUTIES AND POWERS. The board shall:
- a. Promote the development, support and enjoyment of the arts in this city.
- b. Promote cultural diversity in the artistic life of this city.
- c. Promote the formation and growth of artistic projects or programs that are administered by and responsive to the needs of this city's racial and ethnic minorities.

- e. Determine the amounts to be expended from the Milwaukee arts fund in accordance with the quidelines established under sub. 3 and any additional written guidelines adopted by the board.
- f. Submit an annual budget request for the Milwaukee arts fund.
- g. Review the designs of municipal buildings, bridges, lighting, streets, approaches and other structures and projects in accordance with the guidelines established under sub. 4.
- h. Administer the municipal art fund established by s. 304-27.
- 3. GUIDELINES. a. Projects or programs funded from the Milwaukee arts fund shall be organized and operated by the city, a nonprofit organization, or an individual artist, and shall be accessible to the public.
- b. Funding for projects or programs organized and operated by nonprofit organizations shall be limited to a maximum of 5 years unless the board, pursuant to its

written guidelines, determines that additional funding is justified.

- c. The board shall ensure that projects or programs that are administered by or respond programatically to the needs of this city's racial and ethnic minorities receive at least 40% of available funds not allocated for Pabst Theater purposes.
- d. The board shall ensure that funding for the Pabst Theater is provided in a manner that helps to preserve this unique cultural asset but steadily transfers support of its operation and maintenance to the private sector.
- e. The board may accept contributions and donations that will augment the Milwaukee arts fund, or that will assist in the administration of the fund, to the extent permitted and in the manner prescribed by law.

- f. Revenue and expenditure formation shall be provided to the city con-recoller for an annual audit.
- 4. DESIGNS TO BE SUBMITTED TO BOARD. a. Before any municipal building, bridge, lighting (except for lighting that is the subject of the Landmark Lighting Plan), street, approach or other structure or project is constructed, installed or altered by the city, its design shall be submitted to the board for examination and report before final working drawings have been started or any contract has been let.
- b. If, within 60 days after a design has been submitted to the board under par. a, the board prepares a written report that objects to the design and transmits the report to the affected city department, the mayor and common council, the affected department may not proceed with the project until 30 days after the transmission of the report.
- 5. STAFF. The department of city development shall staff the arts board. Staff provided by the department shall have a basic knowledge of the arts and a demonstrated ability to function effectively in the arts community.
- Part 23. Section 320-28 of the code is created to read:
- 320-28. Transportation Commission. 1. CREATION. There is created a transportation commission consisting of 7 citizen members. Members shall serve for periods of 3 years beginning on July 1 in the year in which appointed and until their successors are appointed and duly qualified, except that interim appointments may be made as may be required by vacancies not resulting from expiration of term of office. Members shall be appointed by the mayor with the approval of the common council. All members shall be residents of this city. The commission shall choose one of its members as chair. The commissioner of public works shall keep minutes of the commission's meetings and accounts and, when directed, advise city officials as to the work and recommendations of the commission.
- 2. RESPONSIBILITIES. The commission shall:
- a. Recommend necessary studies and surveys of traffic

and parking conditions in this city.

- b. Determine impact and recommend a plan to meet transportation needs as they relate to economic development or changes in demand for types of transportation.
- c. Recommend the location of parking areas, the plans for city-wide parking area systems, which include construction of new parking areas, the sale of existing parking areas and the elimination of existing parking areas.
- d. Recommend the method of financing the acquisition, operation, improvement, demolition and sale of parking sites with the per unit cost of parking spaces and the amount be amortized each year for a proposed parking project and designate that portion which is to be paid from general city funds.
- e. Recommend the conditions under which parking areas shall be operated, the rules and regulations which shall apply to the operation of the areas and the fees which shall be charged in such areas.
- f. Make other recommendations concerning the city's transportation problem as the commission deems advisable.
- g. Integrate with the master plan in cooperation with the city plan commission any recommendations of the transportation commission.
- h. Consider and make recommendations concerning the establishment, designation, installation, financing, acquisition, maintenance, regulation and operation of parking meters, and make recommendations concerning the integration of the establishment, use and regulation of parking

- 3. ASSISTANCE REQUIRED. All city departments, boards and commissions shall assist the transportation commission in fulfilling its responsibilities when requested by the commission.
- 4. PARKING REVENUE. a. Purpose. The purpose of this subsection is to permit the city to provide for better regulation of parking and traffic and to undertake the creation of parking improvements out of revenue derived from parking operations so that the general taxpayers of the city will be relieved of any burden to do so under the general tax levy.
- b. Special Revenue Funds. All revenue derived by the city from parking operations shall be entered in the revenue accounts of a special revenue fund for parking. Expenditures, whether for operating or for capital purposes, shall be accounted for in this fund.
- c. Parking Revenue. Revenue to be entered in the parking fund shall be as follows:
- c-1. Revenue from parking meters, whether located on streets or in off-street parking facilities.
- c-2. Revenue from special privilege parking permits.
- c-3. Revenue from rental or leasing of parking facilities acquired or developed with parking fund monies.
- c-4. Revenue from the sale of parking facilities acquired or developed with parking fund monies.
- c-5. Other revenues attributable to parking.
- d. Parking Expenditures. Parking fund revenues shall be used to defray administrative, operational and enforcement costs related to parking meters, parking facilities, special privilege parking permits, and parking regulations, including a payment in lieu of taxes, payments to a debt service fund to amortize parking purpose loans, payments for installation of parking regulation signs and parking regulation law enforcement. In addition, revenues shall be used for the purchase of parking meters and costs associated with enforcement of judgments entered as a result of violation of parking regulations and for the acquisition, construction and equipping of off-street parking facilities, but for no other purposes.
- e. Ratification of Prior Acts. Any expenditures of monies made by the city prior to December 24, 1989, for the acquisition of land, facilities, property, improvements or any rights in connection with on or off- street program designed to relieve or solve transportation problems are declared valid and proper and any acts performed with respect thereto are ratified and confirmed and declared valid as the proper performance of duty by city officers or employes performing such acts as if this section had been in effect at the time such acts were performed. It is declared that the provisions of this section express the policy of the city of Milwaukee as it has existed since July 26, 1948.
- f. Saving Clause. It is the intent of the common council that the provisions of this subsection relating to various sources of the parking revenue and the application of such revenue to the parking fund expenditures are separable. If any provision or part of this subsection be held unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of any other provisions or part of the subsection which other provisions and parts shall remain in full force and effect.

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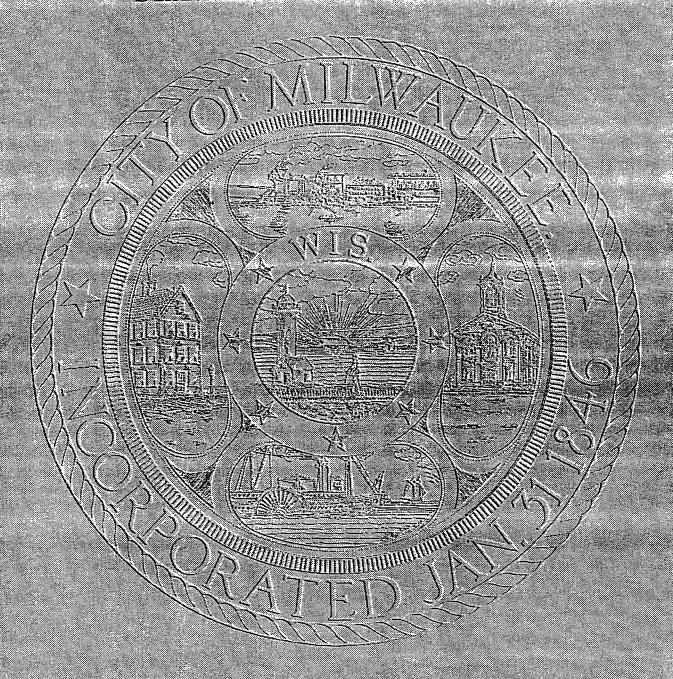

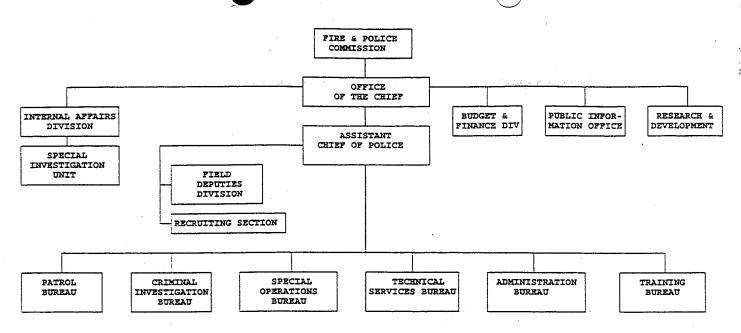
