A summary of Milwaukee African Women's Association Milwaukee Bomet Milwaukee Sister City Activities for **2024** Annual Report:

### **1. Education and Cultural Exchange.**

In 2024 Milwaukee-Bomet Sister City made significant strides in promoting educational access and strengthening cultural ties between the two cities.

#### **Educational Support and Student Progress**

Education remained a core priority this year. Through generous contributions and community partnership we were able to provide full school fees support for seven students in Bomet, Kenya. The success of our educational initiatives would not be possible without the unwavering support of our community partners **including Kenyans in Milwaukee (KIM)** via the President Samuel Chakoyo, and the **Milwaukee African Women's Association (MILAWA)**, which have been instrumental in supporting our educational initiatives this year. Through the Leadership of the MILAWA president Reine-Marie Assana and the tireless advocacy of Monica Ashery, MILAWA members have championed the cause of education for underserved students in Bomet. Their commitment and generosity have enabled us to extend our reach and provide consistent, life-changing support to students in need. We are deeply grateful for their continued partnership and commitment to our mission.

- **University Advancement:** Two students successfully graduated from high school and are now enrolled in university programs
- **Current Cohort:**
  - **Four students** (two boys, two girls) are completing **12<sup>th</sup> grade**
  - **One student** is currently in **11<sup>th</sup> grade**
- **Ongoing Support:**
  - One student is repeating 12th grade this academic year due to performance challenges, and we continue to offer guidance and financial support to help him succeed.
- **Nursing Education Pathway-A request for City Support.**

We have high potential students ready to pursue nursing as their career and contribute to global healthcare:

  - **One college** student is completing nursing prerequisites and is preparing to transition into a nursing program with the hopes of studying and working in the United States as a nurse. We are actively exploring educational opportunities here in Milwaukee (University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, or Milwaukee Area Technical College (MATC) to support her aspirations.
  - We are seeking leads from the City of Milwaukee Committee, academic institutions, or healthcare systems to support:
    - Admissions guidance or program connection and mentorship from committee and City Partners.
    - Tuition assistance or scholarship opportunities
    - International student sponsorship or visa-related support.

- We believe these students have the potential to not only succeed academically but also return the investment by serving in healthcare communities across borders.

## 2. Cultural Engagement: Meet and Greet Event

Bomet was Proudly represented at the 2025 Meet and Greet event in Milwaukee. MILAWA members Led by Monica Ashery and her team as well as Kenyans in Milwaukee Bomet representatives graced the occasion, offered support and to showcased their vibrant culture of Bomet, contributing a day filled with food, fellowship, and celebration. This event was also graced by our very own Major Cavalier Johnson, further strengthening out ties with the city. Bomet representatives interacted with other members of Milwaukee-Sister Cities in Milwaukee.

### 3. Import Avocado and Agricultural Produce Building Economic Sustainability

- Our Avocado farming initiative continues to thrive farmers are motivated and productive, and the project has become a key community effort.
- Avocado Partnership: Explore insights from Professor Emily Sitienei regarding avocado partnership and its benefits for farmers. In the lush agricultural landscape of Bomet, Professor Emily Sitienei is our dedicated representative who has been diligently working and actively collaborating with avocado farmers to foster partnerships and share valuable insights. Through this collaborative effort, the avocado farmers of Bomet have gained access to essential resources and knowledge aimed at enhancing their avocado cultivation practices. The avocado partnership has proved to be transformative endeavor, empowering farmers with advance techniques and market connections.
- Avocado growing in Bomet is gaining fame after the newly introduced profitable crop that is quickly overtaking tea and corn (maize) farming proved to be profitable for farmers. In 2021 (between January and March), Kenya exported 26 tons worth 4.6 billion shillings (\$400 Million)
- Bomet farmers are ready to export avocados and other agricultural produce to Milwaukee. We now seek to establish market opportunities in Milwaukee to :
  - Generate sustainable income for local farmers
  - Create a global farm-to-market connection between Bomet and Milwaukee
  - We welcome connections to local markets, restaurants, cooperatives, or distributors who may be interested in supporting this initiative.



#### 4. Cultural Exchange and Tourism

##### Planned Visit to Bomet-August 2025

We are organizing a delegation trip to Bomet in August 2025 and invite interested committee members and supporters to consider joining us. While we recognize the timeline is short, this visit offers a powerful opportunity to witness the impact of our collective efforts and to deepen engagement with our partners on the ground.

#### 5. Clean Water-A pressing, Unfinished Mission.

##### Access to clean water remains one of the most urgent unmet needs in Bomet:

- A borehole was dug in 2018, but high fluoride levels have rendered the water unsafe for human consumption.
- The borehole has not been used since it was dug up, now going to 6 years as there ought to be structure in place.
- We are actively seeking:
  - Technical assistance for water treatment solutions.
  - Financial support to complete and activate the project safely.
  - Clean water is essential to health, education, and daily life, and this project remains a priority

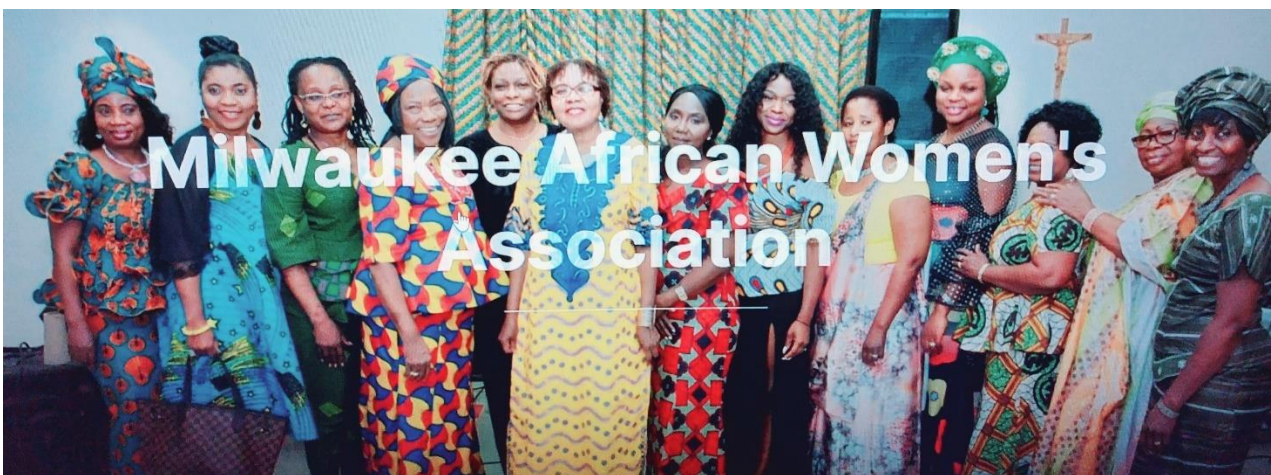

# HASS AVOCADO FARMING - BOMET EAST AND NAROK SOUTH

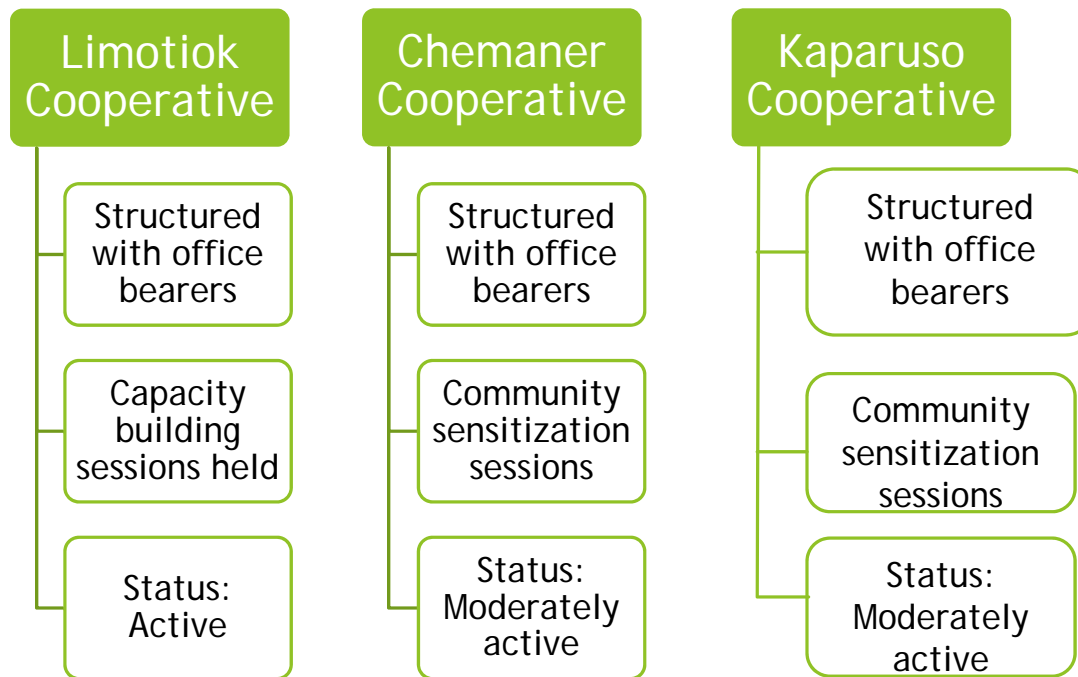
Avocado farming was started in 2016 with initial support of 40 seedlings, at Kshs.1000, to farmers by a white family

About 200 famers - men and women received seedlings. The women participants included widows and single mothers.

54 farmers are currently harvesting avocados. The number is expected to increase to 100 by 2025.

## Harvest & Export

### Harvesting

- Twice a year:
- **Peak**-Apr-Jun; 38 tons
- **Off season** - Dec - Feb; 20 tons

### Export

- MOU signed with exporters
- Some ask farmers to keep harvest for them.
- Google to know current rates
- Cost is KES 100 - KES 180 1Kg

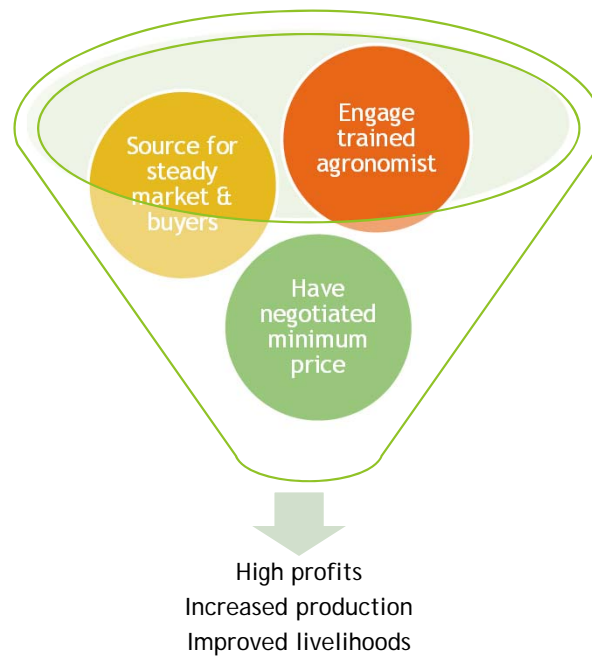


Effects of climate change, pests, & predators affect production
