- 2. These positions will not be funded as reflected in the Personnel Cost Adjustment.

# **OTHER INFORMATION**

Vacancies in the MPD proposed budget for 2004 are **estimated** at 246 officers in the sworn ranks. This vacancy estimation is based upon the 2003 average experience of 240-250 sworn vacancies relative to the number of authorized positions. These vacancies are accommodated in the Net Salary and Wages through the budget Personnel Cost Adjustment line.

At the end of 1998, there were 33 police officer vacancies in the Milwaukee Police Department, 70 in 1999, 152 in 2000, 184 in 2001 and 155 in 2002.

As of October 10, 2003, there are 151 police officer vacancies.

  - Eliminate 1 Police Sergeant, Central Records
  - Eliminate 1 Captain of Police, Training Bureau
  - Eliminate 1 Administrative Lieutenant of Police, Special Assignments
  - Eliminate 1 Deputy Chief of Police, Special Operations
  - The (1) Administrative Lieutenant position in the Medical Section is civilianized to the position of Health and Safety Coordinator, SG 07
  - Eliminate 1 Administrative Assistant II, Special Operations
- 2. This amendment will **restore** the following positions:
  - 1 Police Sergeant, Central Records
  - 1 Captain of Police, Training Bureau
  - 1 Administrative Lieutenant of Police, Special Assignments (Mayor's/City Hall security detail)
  - 1 Deputy Chief of Police
  - 1 Administrative Assistant II
- This amendment will further footnote the budget to specify that the position currently held by the Administrative Lieutenant position in the Medical Section be civilianized or otherwise changed through attrition only.
- 4. This amendment will further change the position title of Police Commander, SG 012, to the position of Inspector of Police, SG 012.
- 5. This amendment will increase the Personnel Cost Adjustment by \$160,000 with the intention that the Chief of Police will find additional savings to fund the full year salaries of the positions referenced in this amendment.

  - Printer, SG 260
  - Production Designer II, SG 535
- 2. This amendment deletes the funding included in the 2004 proposed budget, \$100,000, which was included in the MPD operating account for outsourcing printing needs.
- 3. This amendment will further be footnoted to indicate that an evaluation of the feasibility of combining the MPD Print Shop functions with Milwaukee Printing and Records shall be completed in year 2004 for year 2005 budget planning purposes. The footnote will require a companion resolution for legislative intent.

#### **IMPACT**

The budget impact of this amendment is \$+27,612.

The tax levy impact of this amendment is \$+27,612.

# OTHER INFORMATION

The MPD Print Shop produces approximately 650 different forms, brochures and reports for the various sections of the police department.

In addition to printing duties, MPD Print Shop staff has been cross-trained in other duties at MPD including operation of lighting systems for stage productions at the Safety Academy, installing video cameras and monitors at district stations and department

bureaus, assisting in video documentation of training material and repairing damaged department issued badges, capshields and name tags.

#### AMENDMENT INTENT

The intent of this amendment is to restore position authority, funding, FTEs and direct labor hours for boulevard maintenance, including watering, mulching, mowing and flower beds.

#### **OVERVIEW**

- 1. The 2004 Proposed Budget makes several significant changes to the operations of the Department of Public Works Forestry Section, namely:
  - a. Under the 2004 Proposed Budget, the Forestry Section would plant 40% fewer flower beds than it did in 2003. This reduction amounts to 378 beds or 32,663 square feet of bed space. It is anticipated that, once the regular planting season begins in 2004, that Forestry Section crews would visit each of the currently-planted beds scheduled for elimination, level them and then either sod or plant them.
  - b. The 2004 Proposed Budget reduces boulevard bed maintenance and provides less frequent bed watering, less edging, mulching and weed control, and less irrigation repair on City boulevards.
  - c. In 2003, under the mid-year budget adjustment, the Forestry Section began mowing boulevard turf once every other week beginning August 1 through the end of the turf growing season. Boulevard turf was mowed once a week (on a 5-day cycle to be more precise) from May through July. Under the 2004 Proposed Budget, boulevard turf would be mowed once every other week through the entire growing season.
  - d. At present, the Forestry Section budgets capital resources for the installation of irrigation systems in boulevard medians – both for new construction and reconstruction projects. These systems are designed to water both the flower beds installed on these medians as well as the surrounding turf. The 2004 Proposed Budget, both as a cost-saving measure and in response to the decreased frequency of boulevard mowing mentioned earlier, would instead install "bed-only" watering systems in boulevard medians.

#### **IMPACT**

1. This amendment restores all of the reductions enumerated above and allocates \$697,214 in levy dollars for this purpose. This reallocation is to be distributed as shown on the following page:

- 1. This amendment would restore funding for half of the Forestry Section personnel cut in the 2004 Proposed Budget, including position authority, FTEs and direct labor hours in order to maintain the tree pruning program's current "3/6" cycle.

<u>AMENDMENT INTENT</u> – The intent of this amendment is to restore position authority, funding, FTE's, and direct labor hours for one Grinder Crew one Concrete Crews, one Mini-Concrete Crew, one Crack Fill crew, and one Router Crew.

# **OVERVIEW**

- 1. The 2004 Proposed Budget for Infrastructure Services Division, Field Operations Street and Bridges decision unit, is \$8,347,222, a decrease of \$568,054, -6.8%, from the 2003 Budget of \$8,915,276. The authorized positions will change to 229, a decrease of 36, -13.6%, from the 265 in 2003. Direct Labor Hours (DLH) will change to 219,762, a decrease of 38,250, -14.3%, from the DLH of 258,012 for 2003.
- 2. The decision unit plans to consolidate bridge maintenance and engineering, allowing for all bridge engineering design functions and maintenance activities in the same unit. Moving to the decision unit is the Structural Design section from Transportation. Information Records will transfer to Field Operations Construction. The consolidation will result in the elimination:
  - 1 of 3 Mini-Concrete Crews that repair small concrete projects.
  - 1 of 3 Crackfill Crews that fill cracks in pavement to prolong its useful life.
  - 1 of 1 Router Crew, does routing in advance of the Crackfill Crews. The remaining crackfill crews will have to do the routing.
  - 1 of 1 Concrete Grinder that grind uneven concrete joints. This was a more permanent repair as opposed to an asphalt shim which will now have to be done.
  - 1 of 4 Concrete Crews that repair larger concrete projects like water cut restorations, sewer cut restorations and citizen requests for sidewalk and curb replacements. Requested sidewalk replacement by property owners will no longer be done by city personnel. This service will be contracted out.

The section will eliminate a number of seasonal and auxiliary positions resulting in a reduction of 36 positions.

3. The elimination of crews may result in problem not being repaired for an estimated 2 years or longer, and some repairs will not take place.

#### **IMPACT**

- This amendment restores position authority, funding, FTE's and direct labor hours for one Grinder Crew, one Concrete Crew, one Mini-Concrete crew, one Crack Fill crew and one Router crew in the Field Operations – Street and Bridges decision unit.
- 2. The total cost associated with the restored positions and activities is \$563,765 in Operating Budget: \$453,765 for salaries and wages and \$110,000 for construction supplies. The tax levy increase is \$563,765 with a tax rate of \$0.028. The estimated increase to fringe benefits is \$167,893.

# **OVERVIEW**

- The 2004 Proposed Budget includes \$219,000 in capital improvements for recreational facilities. Improvements in the projects include maintenance and renovations in neighborhood recreational facilities, children's play areas and stand-alone recreation sites. In 2003, this account was allocated \$530,000.
- 2. The scheduled plans include:

3. According to the Draft 2004 – 2009 Capital Improvements Plan, the cash conversion policy on capital improvement projects for 2004 includes limiting debt financing only to those projects which occur at irregular intervals. The purpose of cash financing on recurring infrastructure projects is to decrease overall debt and ultimately reduce costs and resulting tax levies for what are, in effect annual recurring replacement projects.

Recurring infrastructure capital improvements include Street Reconstruction, Alley Reconstruction, Sidewalk Replacement, Street Lighting, Traffic Control Facilities, Underground Conduit and Manholes, Public Safety Communications and Recreational Facilities.

Infrastructure cash financed projects for 2004 is \$9,458,010, which is 95.52% of \$9,901,602.

4. The financial bond rating agencies looks favorably when municipalities use cash to finance recurring capital improvement projects.

#### **IMPACT**

- This amendment adds \$181,000 in capital improvements Recreational Facilities, for a total of \$400,000 in borrowing.
- 2. The total added for capital improvements project is \$190,000, thereby reducing the tax levy by \$210,000, reducing the tax rate by \$0.010. The city debt interest is \$9,000.

# **AMENDMENT INTENT**

This amendment restores position authority, funding, FTE's, and direct labor hours for one Water Meter Technician I, one Water Revenue Collector, one Inventory Assistant III, and one Engineering Drafting Technician IV positions in the DPW-Water Works enterprise fund.

#### **OVERVIEW**

The 2004 Proposed Budget reduces the total number of positions in the department from 382 in 2003 to 359, a decrease of 23 positions (6.02%). The overall breakdown includes eliminating 99 positions and creating 76 new positions. Among the list of new position, 8 are created for the purpose of reclassifying existing staff.

Of those 99 positions eliminated, 36 are on account of 2003 budgeted reclassifications, 56 are vacant or will be reclassified during this budget process, and 7 will result in 2004 layoffs. The department does not anticipate changes in service delivery. Those positions scheduled for potential layoff are:

- Office Assistant, Pay Range 410
- Inventory Assistant III, Pay Range 347
- Water Meter Technician I, Pay Range 240, (only 1 of 3 eliminated)
- Engineering Drafting Technician IV, Pay Range 604, (only 1 of 2 eliminated)
- Aux. Water Revenue Collector, Pay Range 360, (only 1 of 2 eliminated)
- Aux. Electrical Mechanic Apprentice, Pay Range 978
- Aux. Accountant III (0.5 FTE), SG 6

This amendment restores position authority and funding for only 4 of the 7 filled positions including; 1 Water Meter Technician I, 1 Water Revenue Collector, 1 Inventory Assistant III, and 1 Engineering Drafting Technician IV.

#### **IMPACT**

This amendment increase personnel costs, imposing a \$+212,307 budget effect, which is drawn from the Milwaukee Water Works retained earnings. There is no effect on the tax levy or tax rate per \$1,000 assessed value.

The impact is due to increasing total direct labor hours by 7,200 hours, total salaries by \$154,969, and total employee fringe benefits by \$57,338.

## AMENDMENT INTENT

The intent of the amendment is to increase the 2004 transfer from the Parking Fund to the General Fund by \$1.1 million, from the proposed \$10.9 million to \$12 million. This amendment assumes recognition of revenue by the Comptroller.

## **OVERVIEW**

At the end of 2003 the Parking Fund's cash reserves totaled approximately \$12.3 million. One measure used to determine the adequacy of an entity's reserves is the ratio of current assets to current liabilities. This ratio is calculated by dividing current assets by current liabilities, and a ratio of 2 is considered to be acceptable. On December 31, 2002, the Parking Fund had a ratio of 2.48. The table below compares the Parking Fund's actual reserves at the end of 2002 with what they would have been had the Parking Fund's current ratio been 2.0.

As shown in the table above, if the Parking Fund's 2002 ratio had been 2.0, the Fund's cash or cash equivalents would have been \$10 million or approximately \$2.3 million less than the \$12.3 million in cash the Fund had available at the end of 2002.

The growth in cash and cash equivalents from 2001 to 2002 totaled \$4.8 million. This increase reflects higher than projected revenues (\$3 million) and lower than anticipated expenditures (\$1.6 million). Consequently this increase should be considered one-time.

The 2004 Proposed Budget includes a withdrawal from reserves totaling \$1.22 million. The withdrawal is approximately half of the \$2.3 million in "excess cash" generated in 2002. In total the 2004 payment from the Parking Fund to the General Fund totals \$10.9 million. In 2003 the payment totaled \$8.3 million.

According to DPW the intent of this level of withdrawal was to utilize the remaining "excess cash" of approximately \$1.1 million for 2005 budget purposes or thereafter. This level of withdrawal would help stabilize the payment from the Parking Fund to the General Fund in 2005 and subsequent years.

Due to more recent revenue and expenditure data, DPW anticipates higher than projected revenues and lower than anticipated expenditures in 2003, which will increase the cash balance in the Parking Fund reserves.

# **IMPACT**

If the \$1.1 million in "excess cash" is utilized to increase the 2004 transfer to the general fund from the proposed \$10.9 million to \$12 million, DPW estimates that the 2005 payment to the General Fund would be similar to the 2004 Proposed Budget of \$10.9 million (not including a payment from reserves). However, it is very unlikely that this withdrawal level could be sustained after 2005. This projection does not include any unforeseen revenue from property sales of lots or structures, however.

## OTHER INFORMATION

It is important for the Parking Fund to have adequate reserves, since unanticipated expenditures or revenue shortfall in any Parking Fund activity could result in a General Fund subsidy. Regular General Fund subsidy of the Parking Fund could, in turn, increase the levy and adversely affect State Aid associated with the expenditure restraint program.

### AMENDMENT INTENT

The intent of this amendment is to freeze the salaries of all management, non-represented employees in Salary Grade 11 and above. These employees would not be granted a cost of living adjustment (COLA) in 2004.

## **OVERVIEW**

- 1. For the past several years, the City has granted, by a revision of the salary ordinance, non-represented, management employees a percentage increase in their salaries roughly equivalent to a cost of living adjustment (COLA) after it settles its contracts with its represented employees. This COLA has typically reflected that granted to non-police and non-fire represented employees. This COLA has not yet been granted to management, non-represented employees for 2003. Further, the salaries of management, non-represented employees earning \$50,000 or more were frozen for the first 7 months of 2002 under the terms of the 2002 Adopted Budget.
- 2. The City allows for anticipated increases in wages and salaries resulting from contract settlements in its Wages Supplement Fund Special Purpose Account. The 2004 Proposed Budget allocates \$19,734,170 to this fund.

# **IMPACT**

- 1. This amendment effectively commits the City to not granting a COLA to management, non-represented employees in Salary Grades 11 and above in 2004 by reducing the allocation to the Wage Supplement Fund by \$281,000.
- 2. The City of Milwaukee offers its employees both COLAs and annual "step increases" within particular salary grades. A management salary grade has 12 steps. Long-term employees, however, have often reached their 12<sup>th</sup> step. The effect of this freeze, coupled with that enacted in the 2002 budget, on the desirability of City positions both to those already in these positions and those on the outside that the City might wish to recruit is difficult to evaluate, but should be considered.
- 3. Not all employees in Salary Grade 11 and above are paid from levy funding. Instead, these individuals are paid, in whole or in part, either through grants from other agencies, Community Development Block Grant being one significant example, or from special funds such as the water utility. These employees are not included in the savings calculation for this amendment, i.e., their salaries would not by this means be frozen. On the other hand, it is the intent of this amendment that these salaries, or that portion thereof derived from non-levy sources, be frozen by an appropriate amendment to the salary ordinance.

4. The pension plan offered to management, non-represented employees calculates retirement benefits based on a formula which uses the average of an employee's final 3 years of creditable service as a base. Freezing the salaries of employees contemplating retirement in the next few years impacts not only their short-term earnings, but also the amount they will receive throughout their retirement.

<u>AMENDMENT INTENT</u> – The intent of this amendment is to reduce the funds appropriated for salaries of the Mayor and the members of the Common Council in 2004 to reflect the freeze in salaries for these positions adopted by the Common Council in File 030516.

# **OVERVIEW**

- 1. On November 5, 2003, the Common Council adopted File 030516, an ordinance providing that the Mayor and the Common Council members during the first year, 2004-2005, of the 2004-2008 term, be paid the same salaries as the last year, 2003-2004, of the previous term.
- 2. As a result of the action taken in File 030516, funds for the salary for the Mayor for 2004-2005 will be reduced by \$2,873. The total salary for the members of the Common Council will be reduced by \$24,233.

# <u>IMPACT</u>

1. The total decrease in the operating budgets of the 2 departments is \$27,106, thereby reducing the tax levy by \$27,106 with a reduction in the tax rate by \$0.001. The estimated fringe benefit is reduced by \$10,029.

## **OVERVIEW**

- 1. This amendment will reduce the proposed withdrawal from the Tax Stabilization Fund by \$380,000. The 2004 proposed withdrawal was \$17,250,000.
- 2. This amendment will further reduce the amount budgeted in the 2004 Health Care Benefit SPA Claims sub-account by \$500,000. This SPA is budgeted for \$25,000,000 for 2004 and will be reduced to \$24.5 million. The Claims sub-account pays claims for the city's Basic Health Care plan.
- 3. The Tax Stabilization Fund, upon adoption of this amendment, will have a remaining balance, prior to 2003 regeneration, of \$16,872,500.

## **IMPACT**

The budget impact of this amendment is \$-500,000.

The tax levy impact of this amendment is \$-120,000.

# OTHER INFORMATION

- 1. The withdrawal from the TSF, \$16,872,500 will equal one-half of the balance available for 2004 and future years prior to 2003 regeneration.
- 2. Estimated 2003 regeneration of the TSF is \$13,370,000.
- 3. This change in the TSF withdrawal will require a separate motion and resolution by the Common Council.

## AMENDMENT INTENT

The intent of this amendment is to fully restore the boulevard concealed irrigation program.

#### **OVERVIEW**

- 1. At present, the Forestry Section budgets capital resources for the installation of irrigation systems in boulevard medians both for new construction and reconstruction projects. These systems are designed to water both the flower beds installed on these medians as well as the surrounding turf. The 2004 Proposed Budget, both as a cost-saving measure and in response to the decreased frequency of boulevard mowing budgeted elsewhere, would instead install "bed-only" watering systems in boulevard medians.
- 2. In July, 1998, the Common Council adopted Common Council File Number 970676, directing that full irrigation service be installed in boulevards where bed-only irrigation systems had been previously installed. It further required that boulevards reconstructed in 1998 and after receive full irrigation systems.
- 3. Forestry Section staff have said that, in particularly dry periods, "bed-only" watering systems would tend to leave the surrounding, un-watered boulevard grass dead and brown.

#### **IMPACT**

1. This amendment fully restores the City's concealed irrigation program for 2004 by authorizing \$294,500 in new borrowing. It also allocates \$6,626 in tax levy funding for interest payments on the debt amount.
