



Equity Impact Statement

1. Describe the proposed ordinance or resolution.

This is the annual grant renewal for the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Program under the Family and Community Health Division of the Milwaukee Health Department. This grant is through the United States Department of Agriculturethrough the State of Wisconsin Division of Health and Family Services. The grant cycle runs from January 1st through December 31st each year.

2. Identify the anticipated equity impacts, if any, of this proposal.

Identify which minority groups, if any, may be negatively or positively impacted by the proposal.

Minority groups are positively impacted by the extensive nutrition education, breastfeeding, and referral services WIC provides that target those at highest nutritionalrisk, those that are disenfranchised, are impacted by health disparities, and have higher infant mortality rates which statistically target our families of color. Our services are offered to all ethnicities, races, genders, sexual identities, legal statuses, ages, languages and disabilities. Our eligibility criteria are that they are pregnant, postpartum, breastfeeding, an infant, and/or child under the age of 5; at nutritional risk; reside in Wisconsin; and, meet income requirements. Our program provides services, such as language interpretation, as well as tailored services based on participantaccommodations, when needed.





4. Describe any engagement efforts with minority communities potentially impacted by the proposal.

WIC participatesin several outreach events throughout the year, targeting various populations demographics, and in a variety of zip codes annually. WIC provides and/or participatesin annual community events such as back to school health fairs, community health fairs and various community-drivenbaby shower events to also help in strengtheningour relationships with the families we serve. Lastly, WIC engages with the community via social media, and gardening activities with residents.

5. Describe how any anticipated equity impacts of the proposal will be documented or evaluated.

The WIC Program tracks demographicinformation of all enrolled families, services provided, as well as food benefits provided. Our support staff collects eligibilitydocuments according to policy, and our nutrition team documents assessment data and develops a plan of action with families which is then reviewed at subsequent visits. All of the aforementionedactivities are subject to regular auditing done internally, and every other year by the State WIC office, to ensure full equity and policy compliance.

6. Describe strategies that will be used, if any, to mitigate any anticipated equity impacts.

Our WIC Program undergoes constant evaluation by its program manager, the WIC Regional Consultant and the State WIC Office. Additionally, data is shared with the Milwaukee Health Department leadership and epidemiologyteam as a way for measuring outcomes as they relate to Maternal and Child Health within the City of Milwaukee. In addition to pen & paper surveys, the WIC Program utilizes innovative survey methods such as by surveying participantson quality measures related to service provision through the WIC mobile app. The WIC Program also seeks to maintain current partnerships, and form new partners with community partners to better engage various populationsacross the City. Lastly, staff trainings, in particular as they relate to equity, health disparity reduction, ethics, and civil rights are mandatory trainings required by MHD, WIC and/or
