00002 1 PROCEEDINGS 2 (Whereupon, all City Personnel were previously duly sworn.) 4 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Next item also in the 4th 5 District is Nael M. Mohammad, agent for Brothers 6 Foods, Incorporated, Class A Malt application for 7 Brothers Foods at 966 North 27th Street. Welcome 8 back, Mr. Mohammad. MR. MOHAMMAD: Yes, sir. 9 10 (Whereupon, NAEL M. MOHAMMAD was duly 11 affirmed.) 12 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Mohammad, do you 13 acknowledge receiving notice of today's meeting with 14 the possibility that your license application could be 15 denied due to neighborhood objections, and the 16 following items are listed to littering, loitering, 17 concentration of alcohol beverage outlets, past health 18 violations at the former store, numerous code 19 violations for littering, unclear interior premises, 20 electrical cords, interior violations, and no 21 occupancy permit posted and conduct which was 22 detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of the 23 neighborhood? Do you so acknowledge? 2.4 MR. MOHAMMAD: Yes, I understand that. I 25 received the letter.

00003 1 CHAIRMAN BOHL: We'll go around the horn, and sir, we'll get to you in one moment. Health Department? 4 MR. BOND: No objection. 5 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Neighborhood Services? 6 MS. BENDER: Hold for occupancy and orders. 7 CHAIRMAN BOHL: There are no police reports. 8 Before we get to you, sir, we're going to go to 9 Alderman Henningsen. Alderman Henningsen. 10 ALDERMAN HENNINGSEN: Mr. Chair and members. 11 We handed out the concentration map, and I hope you 12 will take cognizance of it for the record. We have 13 many more licenses in the neighborhood, we certainly 14 don't need another one, but my main objection to this 15 applicant is that he operated for years 2626 West 16 Vliet Street, and he had almost monthly health code 17 violations, severe ones, and then the building was 18 taken for the non-payment of taxes, so we now have the 19 burden of trying to find a reuse for it. 20 But just let me briefly read some of the 21 orders. Containers of sour cream are dated a year 22 before, remove outdated dairy products for sale, many 23 items are moldy and spoiled in the produce cooler, 24 hand washing is not being done by employees, cases of

chicken are on the floor in the cooler, knives are not

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clean, floors unclean with food debris in the walk-in cooler, there is an apron over raw uncooked meat in the cooler, the toilets in both restrooms are unclean, there are dead mice and mice droppings in the candy/cigarette room, the candy is not protected from the rodents.

We worked with the Health Department. Every time there was more, more, more. Meat grinder stored dirty in cooler, raw chicken stacked on top of raw pork, three compartments are not set up properly, raw chicken stored on top of bags of ice in the freezer. Aprons mean aprons for working. You know, just hung them out on the food. Bags of raw meat on the floor, boxes of meat on the floor. Store all beverages and food at least six inches off the floor. Frozen foods on top of shelf of freezer frozen. Maintain all frozen foods at zero or below.

Insects found underneath cake mix. They love cake mix, by the way. Insects found inside cake mix. Remove all evidence of insects from the premises and provide effective da, da, da. Oh, eggs at 54 degrees, it should be 41 degrees. Guacamole, butter, packaged mozzarella, unlabeled Lunchables container to be removed for sale, guacamole spoiled, cheese gas build-up inside packaging, butter stick open, and

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Lunchable meat had no packaging.

Observed a German cockroach infestation by the meat despite cooler. Observed roaches and their egg casings on the inside panels of the glass door for the meat cooler. Noted spoiled ground beef that was going to be mixed with fresh ground beef to make it look redder so they can sell it more expensively. They mixed spoiled ground beef with fresh ground beef. They were ordered to discard this practice. When you mix the old dark spoiled stuff in with the normal ground beef, it makes it look leaner actually, because it's redder, but it's spoiled.

A large pile of damaged foods stored in the northeast corner of the warehouse waiting for credit. Food is considered unwholesome for sale and will be condemned and thrown out, if not removed immediately. There are boxes of infant formula that are outdated stored in the warehouse. On and on and on.

So I would say that the privilege is -- The license is a privilege, not a right, and the past history of this gentleman does not indicate that he will run a good place and certainly, I believe, doesn't deserve the privilege of a license.

This building at 27th and State, he's used the word transfer the license. Well, we don't do

00006 1 that. You know, he comes in as a new applicant. But the building is placarded upstairs, you know, there's no useable residential, and there's outstanding orders 4 for building codes. 5 Now, let me just tell you the first time they came in, inoperable smoke detector, second time, 6 7 use of illegal extension cords, replace defective 8 self-closing device on fire door, replace -- You 9 know, there's various electrical things. Restore 10 property to a clean and sanitary condition. 11 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Henningsen, I'm 12 just --13 ALDERMAN HENNINGSEN: Just one more. 14 15

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CHAIRMAN BOHL: I think you've established very clearly the track record here at this establishment. Go ahead.

ALDERMAN HENNINGSEN: Here's garbage between the buildings. Remove mattresses, appliances, and cardboard from between buildings. I mean, ha? This is a grocery store. Also, I should stay on the north side of the street at 2626 when he was operating, I go by this premises, I go home on Vliet Street many, many times, and there was litter in the parking lot, there was loitering in the parking lot, and I just feel that we don't need another liquor license and certainly not 00007 1 one that would obviously have a history that this operator has. So I would support complete denial of this new application. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Alderman 5 Henningsen. Before we proceed, I will have Alderwoman Johnson-Odom make the concentration map part of our 7 record. Hearing no objection, so ordered. 8 This particular item is noticed for 9 neighborhood objections. Are there any neighbors here 10 present to testify? 11 ALDERMAN HENNINGSEN: Me, me. 12 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Outside of Alderman 13 Henningsen? Mr. Mohammad, there's quite a bit in the 14 record here. 15 MR. MOHAMMAD: That's not true. 16 CHAIRMAN BOHL: You're going to have the 17 opportunity to not only address these concerns that 18 Alderman Henningsen presents, including concentration, 19 but also explain to the committee why you deserve this 20 license here. Go ahead, sir. 21 MR. MOHAMMAD: I need to let the committee know that all the stuff, all the things that 22 23 Mr. Henningsen said have not been true. I did not own 24 the building on 26th and Vliet. I never owned the 25 building. I started operating that store in 1995, and

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I think the alderman have a grudge against me because I reported his drunken self to his wife.

ALDERMAN HENNINGSEN: I didn't say you own the building. Your brother owns the building, you own the store.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Mohammad, time and again, you are here applying -- Sir, sir, you are here applying for a license before this committee. We are not going to get into personalities and he says/she says. It is your -- You right now are to, one, try to address some of the concerns that have been presented as part of the record, and two, explain to the committee why you deserve a license. I'm not going to have you get into the point where we're going to start getting into personalities. So please proceed.

MR. MOHAMMAD: Ladies and gentlemen, number one, all these health violations that the alderman have spoke of -- I think we have a Health Department, and they always came in, and that's a routine thing everything that they put on there, expired sour cream, expired this, expired that. This is all routine for any grocery store. This is all routine. I have not seen any of my customer died or got sick or got sued for last 25 years I've been doing business. I have no

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problems, none of my customers have no problems with my food. When you have damaged food or returned food, you have somewhere to put it and that's where it goes, and sometimes the Health Department comes and finds that stuff, true enough, but nobody ever got sick, nobody ever got complaint, I never had a complaint. The Health Department is on this side, not on this side, and that's all I can say.

Number two, he's talking about mattresses and all that. I do not own a furniture store. I own a grocery store, I operate a grocery store. If there's any mattresses that come from anywhere, it's not my responsibility. I call him and complain so many times. Never, never heard anything in response from him. So many times.

My application been in process for a whole year. Question for the city alderman: Does it take a whole year for an application to get processed? I apply for this application March of 2002, and I just got response on it. And the building on 16th does not belong to me, I do not own the building. I rent, I have a lease. Alderman has a grudge against me for whatever reason. I have no -- And all I can say is it's not true, and the city attorney knows there is such a thing called transfer. The city records and

00010 1 city ordinance does apply transfer one location to another as long as it's within the same district. I read that ordinance myself, and the alderman lied like 4 always and I hear him say --5 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Mohammad, I just will 6 say one thing. The items that Alderman Henningsen 7 read are part of the record and they are 8 substantially --9 MR. MOHAMMAD: But --10 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Take that for what you will. 11 It is part of the record. It is not --12 MR. MOHAMMAD: I understand, but let me just 13 -- There was a corporation, and I was just an officer 14 of that corporation. He's trying to stick all that on 15 me because someone on the other side is being his 16 puppet, let's put it that way. I call the corruption 17 charges. Has nothing against me for that. That's what 18 I think. 19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Mr. Mohammed. 20 Are there questions of Mr. Mohammad, Alderman 21 Henningsen by committee at this point? 22 MR. MOHAMMAD: And as far as the neighborhood objection, I think I have plenty 23 2.4 neighbors in my neighborhood who sign a petition for 25

me.
