2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: In the 5th
3	District, Humphrey F. Nangah, Agent for
4	"Diamonds, Inc.", Class "B" Tavern and Tavern
5	Dance renewal application for "Diamonds Pub" at
6	7607 West Hampton Avenue.
7	Good morning.
8	THE APPLICANT: Good morning.
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Could you raise
10	your right hand, we'll swear you in, please?
11	(Whereupon those present were sworn.)
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Name and address
13	for the record, please.
14	THE APPLICANT: Humphrey Humphrey
15	Nangah. 5265 North 62nd Street, Milwaukee,
16	Wisconsin 53218.
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. State your
18	appearance, please.
19	MR. CONNORS: Attorney Scott Connors,
20	appearing on behalf of Humphrey Nangah and
21	Diamonds.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Mr.
23	Nangah, do you admit to receiving a notice in the
24	mail where there's a possibility your application
25	could be denied because of items contained on the

00003 1 police report and neighborhood objections to loitering, littering, parking, traffic problems, loud noise, late night disturbances, fights, 4 shootings, drug activity, presence of underage 5 persons, and conduct which is detrimental to the 6 health, safety and welfare of the neighborhood? 7 THE APPLICANT: I did. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Health 9 department? 10 HEALTH: It's a renewal. 11 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Oh, it's a 12 renewal. Okay. And, Neighborhood Services. 13 DNS: No objection. 14 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Sergeant 15 Ulickey, the police report, please. 16 SERGEANT ULICKEY: On 7/23 of '05 at 17 one a.m. officers conducted a premise check at 18 Diamonds Pub, 7607 West Hampton Avenue. They 19 observed a maximum capacity sign posted properly 20 over the main entrance, which had a limit of 100 21 people. Because of the large crowd it was 22 believed that the premise was over capacity. The 23 premises was closed and the patrons were counted 2.4 as they left the premises. A total of 177 25 patrons and 11 employees were counted, and the

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licensee was issued a citation for exceeding the posted capacity. The licensee is scheduled for a trial at 2/6 of '06.

And on 8/7 of '05 at 12:50 officers conducted a tavern check at Diamonds Pub, 7605 West Hampton Avenue. They observed 20 to 25 persons standing on the sidewalk waiting to get into Diamonds. The officers were going to check the premises for over capacity. They observed three females walking along the west side of the building. They appeared upset. They were very vocal. They then attempted to re-enter the premises and confront some of the patrons that were leaving. One of the three punched one of the persons in the face, and then was taken to the ground. She then punched another female twice to the head. This person was an off-duty police officer. The subject was arrested and conveyed to St. Joseph's ER for medical clearance. Witnesses told officers that the offduty officer was confronted - - Excuse me - - by a group of females inside the tavern, who then followed her to the bathroom. The off-duty officer was hit and punched in the bathroom by the same person who was arrested above.

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1	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do you have any					
2	questions of the police report?					
3	MR. CONNORS: Is this Excuse me.					
4	Is this police report an actual police report, or					
5	is this a incident report?					
6	SERGEANT ULICKEY: The synopsis I read					
7	was taken from a PA33, which is a licensed person					
8	report. It was also a offense report generated					
9	for battery to a peace officer.					
10	MR. CONNORS: Were there any					
11	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.					
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.					
13	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Which are both police					
14	reports.					
15	SERGEANT ULICKEY: That's correct.					
16	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you.					
17	MR. CONNORS: Were there any follow-					
18	ups? Do you know if anybody was charged with					
19	battery to a police officer?					
20	SERGEANT ULICKEY: That information I					
21	do not have.					
22	MR. CONNORS: Was the police report					
23	generated by the same off-duty police officer					
24	that was at the bar?					
25	SERGEANT ULICKEY: No.					

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1	MR. CONNORS: Okay. And do you have
2	the name of the person that generated the report?
3	SERGEANT ULICKEY: That information I
4	don't have.
5	MR. CONNORS: Okay.
6	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Questions by
7	members of the committee?
8	How long have you I have a
9	question. How long have you been operating that
10	premises? Could you turn the microphone towards
11	yourself there?
12	THE APPLICANT: Since '02, July of '02.
13	MR. SCHRIMPF: I didn't hear that, Mr.
14	Chairman. '02?
15	THE APPLICANT: July. Yeah, 2002.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: What are you doing
17	to control the capacity and the crowd there?
18	Have you done anything to improve the discipline
19	over there?
20	THE APPLICANT: Yes. I've been talking
21	to Alderman Bohl about my problems in the in
22	the establishment. Some of the things I've done
23	is cut out most of the the different type of
24	musics I will be having over there. That's one.
25	We have a older crowd, which is pretty much older

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- - an older crowd. We have security, and we've installed scanners and counters. One of the problems why the capacity is so small today is we have limitations in the bathrooms. I've had an architect work on it and look at ways of - - Technically I don't really want any increase the - - the numbers of people that into the establishment pretty satisfy what it is right now, 100.

We've avoided - - Because one of the problems we had was - - had problems with security. I've gone through a number of - numerous security firms. And I think I had a problem with a security guard that collected money and let people inside, and then that was one of the problems. What I'm doing now is we've had change of security, we increased - - the amount of people that come inside the establishment. The age limit is - - We have a limitation of the age. The people - - The people come inside mostly are older - - older crowd, 30 and up. So that has brought the crowd numbers down. We've been closing a little bit earlier, 11 and 12 o'clock in the - - the night, instead of the two - - regular 2:30. And just that

controls a lot of the - - those things.

We've been having - - On New Year's Day we have - - we have more bands versus having a DJ and stuff. We had - - And so, we - - we working towards that. One of the things the architect look at, I see a problem here is the bathrooms. It's not the room, per se, the number of male stalls in the establishment. I'm looking at doing that, that that's a possibility. I would like to keep the numbers at 100. I don't feel like I want to do that and go up with some top of it. That - That's what we're doing, looking at doing.

And in terms of - I've been working with my alderman. I talk to him regularly, and tells when I have problems. Because any problems or upcoming problems we work with him in terms of that.

The other incident, if you don't mind, I can explain the other incident, the incident of 8/7/05, which is the battery to the police officer. What happened here is - - I'm still trying to contest this with the Captain. The story's not true. It's just not correct. This is inaccurate right here. What happened here,

00009 1 the police officer was actually a detective, and she was off-duty. She was - - walked outside. There was a Sergeant sitting on the sidewalk. So 4 he literally saw what happened. When the police 5 officer walked outside, she threw the first 6 punch. There was patrons that went outside were 7 kicked out of the club for misconduct. And when 8 the police officer walked outside, she was upset, 9 because nothing was done at a point at that time 10 she - - technically she was the one that started 11 the fight outside. I'm talking to the Captain, 12 trying to see if I can rectify this one here. 13 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. 14 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente. 15 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Didn't the incidents 16 happen inside your tavern? Was there a fight in 17 the bathroom as indicated in the report? 18 THE APPLICANT: No, there was - - No, 19 there wasn't any fight in the bathroom. There

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THE APPLICANT: No, there was - - No, there wasn't any fight in the bathroom. There was an altercation between the - - this verbal exchange between the officer's boyfriend and the young - - the young female. There was no fights in the bathroom. I know for a fact that if an officer is abused or - - or hit in the bathroom and there'll be more than one or two squad cars

outside, if she makes a call. We have - - all have cell phones, and I think that if she was being beaten in the bathroom, and I have security on the premises, we would have had more than two or three squad cars outside.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Was there any incident inside your tavern this night regarding the off-duty officer and any other of your patrons?

THE APPLICANT: Yes, there was a confrontation.

 $\label{eq:alderman} \mbox{ALDERMAN PUENTE: Can you -- Can you} \mbox{ explained that then.}$

THE APPLICANT: Yeah. The off-duty officer was accompanied into the tavern with her boyfriend, and he, at the time, was talking to another group of females. She got upset. And based on what stories that I got was she got upset with him having conversations with all the patrons in the - - in the establishment. And at that point security got there and separated whatever argument, stop the arguments. And the patrons were kicked out of the club. And the officer was still upset. And when she walked out of the door, she hit the patrons as they were

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1	walking on the sidewalk, because they were kicked
2	out. And that's why they were outside.
3	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Do you know of the
4	off-duty officer and her boyfriend?
5	THE APPLICANT: I know her, yeah. She
6	She frequent
7	ALDERMAN PUENTE: You know both
8	both of them?
9	THE APPLICANT: Yes, yes, yes. She
10	frequents the establishment. I know her by the
11	name I know her, and I personally went and
12	talked to her. I personally That night I
13	personally went and talked to her. I told her it
14	would be okay. And I knew that if she had any
15	problems, there will be more than two squad cars
16	outside. When she walked outside, there was a
17	Sergeant sitting right out front and saw what
18	happened. So this story is not what happened.
19	She was not hit in the bathroom.
20	ALDERMAN PUENTE: So you talked to her
21	prior to her going outside.
22	THE APPLICANT: Correct.
23	ALDERMAN PUENTE: And after the
24	incident.
25	THE APPLICANT: I talked to her.

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1	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Inside your place.					
2	THE APPLICANT: I talked to her prior					
3	to her going outside. I didn't talk to her after					
4	the incident outside.					
5	ALDERMAN PUENTE: No, the incident					
6	inside.					
7	THE APPLICANT: Yes. Yes, sir.					
8	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you.					
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: This item is					
10	noticed for neighborhood objections. Is there					
11	anyone here to testify in objection to the					
12	renewal of the license at 7607 West Hampton					
13	Avenue? Anyone here to testify in objection to					
14	the renewal of this license at 7607 West Hampton					
15	Avenue? Please raise your hand. Let the record					
16	show that no one acknowledges.					
17	Any further questions by members of the					
18	committee?					
19	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chair.					
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl.					
21	ALDERMAN BOHL: This particular					
22	establishment is located in the 5th Aldermanic					
23	District. It is an establishment that I					
24	inherited with the reapportionment here in 2004,					
25	and part of that was in the 2nd Aldermanic					

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District. It - - It has been an establishment that I have had some real concerns regarding, and Mr. Nangah and myself have had a number of conversations here over the past year regarding some of the incidents that - - that have transpired. And, you know, one of my concerns is I just, you know, I've gotten back to District 7. I just don't believe that the police report on this particular item is a complete report of - of incidents that, at least, I've been made aware of in the past, including some items that Mr. Nangah has contacted me on.

He is correct in - - in saying, and I do appreciate the fact that - - that he and I have a - - a good stream of communication. Where there have been issues, he has been right on the - - right on the horn to relay items to me and to broach me for suggestions or thoughts about how he may be able to better operate his establishment. He was right away on the horn with me relating to the incident with this - - alleged incident with this police officer, among other items. I have had an opportunity to sit down with him two - - on two occasions here in late summer, early Fall. I just will submit for

1	the record subsequent letters that I that I
2	did provide or did send to Mr. Nangah expressing
3	my concern over the some of the items that I was
4	hearing from neighbors, regarding the the
5	operation at this location. And I would be happy
6	to move their admittance into the record at this
7	point.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: The motion by
9	Alderman Bohl is to make the letters provided
10	here part of the permanent record in this
11	hearing, and hearing no objections, so ordered.
12	And, Counsel, are you familiar with
13	these? Do you have
14	MR. CONNORS: I haven't seen them.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We'll We'll
16	get you a copy of this.
17	MR. CONNORS: Thank you.
18	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, if I
19	if I may continue.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl,
21	please.
22	ALDERMAN BOHL: Among the concerns in
23	and around this establishment has has been a
24	couple of shootings that have transpired over
25	over the past year. One of the the items was

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a homicide which took place at a - - at a - - a parking lot of an establishment across the street, a Sav-A-Lot Food Store. There was, also, in September, early September, another shooting of a patron of - - of Mr. Nangah's establishment. It is - - It is not on the police report. I did follow up with - - with Captain Galleoni at - at District 7. One of the reasons it - - It was also an off-duty officer who was in Mr. Nangah's establishment, who was parked, not on the street or in Mr. Nangah's establishment, but was parked across the street. There's a - - There's a strip mall across the street to the north. And when he was leaving the establishment that evening, he was subsequently robbed in his vehicle, and was shot during that altercation. The reason it is not included in the police report, according to the Captain, is that the police department did not deem that there was a direct correlation to the establishment.

Nevertheless, it was part of a larger concern that I had, and what it - - what it boiled down to is Mr. Nangah's establishment, prior to some real changes that took place here - - here late summer, early Fall, was an

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establishment that, as a nightclub, catered to a much younger crowd. Would - - And - - And it's no mistake that, you know, that this over capacity issue took place, because he was a - he had a very popular establishment. Among the complaints that I would hear from neighbors here in the past was that - - that Mr. Nangah's establishment would be very full and there would be overflow crowds on the street. I did have a neighborhood meeting here about a week - - week and a half before Christmas, about December 19th, and there were - - there were a fair number of residents who turned out, some - - some of whom were very supportive of Mr. Nangah, a few which did raise some - - some concerns about some of the past activities.

Mr. Nangah has changed his format, and subsequently, has - - has changed his policies in terms of - - of creating a higher age requirement than - - than 21 years of age for the admittance to his establishment. I'm very supportive of those particular changes. What - - What I would just say is - - is that it - - I continue to - - to have concerns about the tavern dance license, particularly issues of the format. And I would

just make it known to Mr. Nangah that, for example, on his - - his - - his tavern alcohol supplement, that he has not checked hip-hop, or rap, or a number of other type of dance musics. And that that ultimately would prohibit him from - - from playing those type of music formats in the future. And so I just want to make you fully aware of that, that - - that by - - by this committee considering your request here, by you not checking those, it would prohibit you from playing those type of musics in - - in the future.

I'm - - I'm very leery. I know that - - that with some of the changes here the amount of concerns, at least, has - - has diminished, and residents have fully acknowledged that there are additional concerns in the neighborhood. I know that there is one neighbor who - - who is certainly a supporter of - - of Mr. Nangah's and has been to the establishment and has seen some of the changes.

Nevertheless, Mr. Chairman, I - - I have some - - I have some real concerns, because this - - this place has generated problems. I would at the very least believe that - - that

00018 1 there should be some sanction to the tavern dance license, and I would prefer to see that this item number five, which - - which has a trial date of 4 February 6, would not be included on - - on this 5 particular year. Because I think that that is a 6 serious outcome when we have establishments that 7 - - that are woefully in excess of their 8 capacity. 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any 10 further questions by members of the committee? 11 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. 12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente. 13 ALDERMAN PUENTE: When did these new plan of actions take place, and what impact, if 14

any, has it had?

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THE APPLICANT: As the alderman said, early summer, late - - late Fall. It's done us - - It has an impact into the neighborhood. We had a neighborhood meeting where some of the concerns where they - - the neighbors acknowledged they've seen some change. They've seen a lot of change. There's been some great - - a lot of change in the - - in the establishment. I - - I understand what the alderman is saying, and one of the problems here is not really - - As a matter of

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fact, Sunday there was a robbery across the street, for example. And it's - - it's not - - We have neighborhood problems, we addressed it in the meeting, and I'm trying the best I can - - I can. So far, it's been - - it's been - - You can literally see the changes, because the neighbors acknowledge, and they're supportive of - - of the - - the establishment. The establishment does have - - We do have cooking, and we have food. So we serve food. So those are some of the changes we made in the establishment, and people come inside. So by raising the age, and - - and - - and the limitations, we've done - - we've seen a lot of change in - - in the establishment.

Prior to that officer coming in there and having this problems, we've seen a lot of change. The officer, shooting across the street, he walked up to the door. And he walked inside. We - - We don't normally refuse officers coming into the establishment. Especially the off-duties. We know them, and they walk in and he walk right out. Whatever happened across the street, sad situation, we've done a lot of things to limit the crowd, a lot of people coming inside the establishment, and that hip-hop and rap, it's

00020 - - I think that is done by design, that this 1 type of music will not be heard in that establishment. That's why it's not on the 4 license. It's not that we didn't forget to put 5 it on there. But those are some of the changes. 6 ALDERMAN PUENTE: You have country and 7 polka. 8 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, it's on the 9 jukebox. If you come in and you want to play the 10 jukebox, it's on the jukebox. It's there. If 11 that's what your - - your taste is, it's on the 12 jukebox. 13 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you. Thank 14 you, Mr. Chair. 15 ALDERMAN BOHL: Alderman Puente was 16 inquiring because he's a big polka fan. 17 THE APPLICANT: That's fine, too. 18 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 20 ALDERMAN BOHL: I do - - I do have a 21 copy of a Journal/Sentinel article that relates 22 to this officer shooting across the street from 23 the establishment. I would like to make this 24 part of our permanent record, as well, too. 25 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl

00021 1 moves to make this copy of this article from the Journal/Sentinel of September 3rd part of the permanent record of this hearing. Hearing no 4 objections, so ordered. Would you please make 5 sure counsel gets a copy of this? 6 Okay. Anything further by members of 7 the committee? ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chairman. 8 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik. 10 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: I just want to be 11 real clear. Am I to understand through listening 12 to Alderman Bohl, you instituted some type of age 13 quidelines? THE APPLICANT: That's correct. 14 15 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: And I have to ask Mr. Schrimpf, if such age discrimination is legal 16 17 and/or enforceable by this committee? 18 MR. SCHRIMPF: No. Because there's an 19 ordinance that specifically says that - - The 20 only age that you can enforce, because it's a 21 State law, is the fact that no one under 21. But 22 if they're over 21, they have a right to enter 23 any premises. And you - - So you can not arbitrarily set a date - - or set an age like 25 24 25 or 30 or something like that.

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ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Thank you. The -The only reason I asked the question is because,
you know, heaven forbid that you should try to
discriminate against me for coming into your club
because I'm too old or what have you, and -- and
I appreciate your effort to kind of weed out some
of the more rowdy individuals, but I -- I just
don't think it's enforceable and --

THE APPLICANT: There's also a - - I'm sorry - - There's also a dress code. There's also a dress code enforcement, too. There's certain attire that you can't use jeans and - - and stuff after certain times, after nine o'clock. So work - - It's the after work crowd. So there's a dress code. And one of the things we've done, too, is we've expanded the kitchen. Made the kitchen a little bit bigger, more of a restaurant-type environment. And that's what we're trying to do. We're going to health - - And we're working with the health department to increase our - - increase our food sales versus just being a liquor establishment. So we've done that, too.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I think on that subject, I mean, other - - other people in town have done this, you know, you have to be 25 years old to enter. I mean, that - - the sign, although it's not enforceable by law, it's kind of a suggestion. It's kind of like setting the tone, saying, listen, we don't - - we don't want any - - We don't want any young rowdy people here. But if somebody challenged and said I'm - - I'm 21 and you have to let me in here, you would have to let them in.

THE APPLICANT: Correct. But - - CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: But it sends a message to the people.

THE APPLICANT: It does. And - - And changing the music, Alderman, it has a direct implication on the age limit. And that is the right intention why the - - the hip-hop and the rap is off the thing. Because they - - Literally there's - - there's a direct correlation to changing the - - the music, and that affects the age limit, because most people that are younger - - younger than 25, or younger than 28, will not come in and listen to country and polka.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you.

00024 1 Counsel, anything in closing? MR. CONNORS: (Nods.) CHIARMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Any further 4 questions by members of the committee? This 5 matter is in committee. 6 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman. 7 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. ALDERMAN BOHL: Let me just say I - - I 8 9 appreciate the changes Mr. Nangah has come 10 forward here, and - - and I'm fully supportive of 11 his suggested sign that would - - would ask for a 12 greater age. And, hey, if some 21 year old wants 13 to hire the ACLU, let them. I'll be there to 14 testify. 15 You know, as I said, I - - I appreciate 16 the changes that have come forward here. I - - $\rm I$ 17 have had some concerns about some of the - - the 18 past complaints that - - that I have taken. I 19 think that our - - our neighborhood meeting was 20 very productive, at least brought some of these 21 issues forward and - - and certainly there are 22 other concerns in that neighborhood, some of the 23 apartments that are adjacent to that. 2.4 I would move at this point approval of 25 the Class B Tavern application. I would move for

00025 1 approval of - - of the Class B Dance application with a ten day suspension, based on matters contained in the police report. I would also ask 4 that item number five dated incident report for 5 7/23 of '05 would be omitted from - - from the 6 decision that would bear in - - in today. I 7 would also ask that the entire police report, Mr. 8 Chairman, with this motion would be included as 9 part of our permanent record in this matter. 10 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We'll take that 11 separate. First of all, Alderman Bohl moves to 12 make the entire police report part of the 13 permanent record in this hear - - in this matter, 14 and hearing no objections to that, so ordered. 15 I'll try and restate the motion here. 16 Alderman Bohl moves approval of the rec - -17 recommends approval of the renewal of the Class B 18 Tavern license, with a ten day suspension - -19 MR. SCHRIMPF: No. No. 20 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: - - of the Tavern 21 Dance. 22 MR. SCHRIMPF: Oh, oh. 23 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Approval of the 2.4 Class B Tavern license. Approval of the - - the 25 Tavern Dance renewal with a ten day suspension.

00026 1 MR. SCHRIMPF: Yes. 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: The Tavern renewal only. Excluding item number five from the police 4 report, anticipating eventual conclusion of that. 5 And so we could use it in the subsequent hearing. 6 Does everyone understand the motion?
