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Page 28 way out or on the way in to keep their music down while they're coming in and out of the establishment.

As far as the litter goes at night, I know on the holidays they probably do park across the street. It's usually on 4th of July, Labor Day. On those particular holidays, more people are coming into the city. They're looking for a place to go.

We send someone out at night. Our personnel go out at night to pick up the litter. The things we don't find at night, we have a cleaning person that goes out first thing in the morning to pick it up, so we try to keep the neighborhood as clean as possible.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And Mr. Reid, you indicated that, earlier with the previous testimony, that you had called the police department in response to some individuals that were congregating around your establishment to play music. You indicated you do have security. How many security do you employ?

MR. REID: It depends on the night. Usually we'll have three to four, maybe five, depending on a busy night.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And those would be three to four individuals solely devoted to security or --

MR. REID: Correct.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: All right. Any other

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questions? All right. Thank you, Miss Johnson. Sir, you want to provide your name and address?

MR. REEP: First I want to say thank you to the board for allowing us to speak. This is the only opportunity that our neighborhood has to get the facts out and voice the concerns that we have. And my name is Tom Reep, R-e-e-p. My address is 1436 West Lawn Avenue.

I'd like to just start by saying that our neighborhood has been involved in concerns and issues for the past eight years. I've volunteered my time, as well as many other neighbors in our neighborhood, at the Lincoln Park Community Center. We have tried diligently to work with all businesses and residents in the area to make sure that the safety and quality of life for all members is appreciated and is maintained.

We have come to these hearings three times now. This is my third visit, and I've been here each time to bring evidence to show that there are concerns that the neighborhoods have and that they are escalating.

I'm a little bit disappointed, if it's true, that there isn't actually any police reports present by the police, -- and I believe you're with the

Page 30

police, -- and also that Alderman Pratt doesn't seem to recall or understand that there have been neighborhood concerns. He has come to some meetings at Lincoln Park Community Center. I personally myself have expressed on multiple occasions the concerns that we have had.

As a matter of fact, last year we drafted a petition which we provided for the board with quite a few signatures which I also provided to Alderman Pratt, so these concerns that we have are not new. They have been there from the beginning, and they continue to escalate, and that's why we're here today to try to hopefully bring closure to this because it's affecting the quality of life of all the residents, and it is destroying our neighborhood. And that is something that is very sad. I've lived there for 38 years. We care about the people and we care about our residents.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Reep, and I appreciate those concerns. In the interest of brevity, because we've got a long morning agenda and this is the first item, if you could just get into the testimony from the last licensed year.

MR. REEP: I'd be very happy to do so. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you.

MR. REEP: I personally myself have made numerous phone calls to the police department in regards to noise, in regards to loitering, in regards to other concerns that have taken place.

I have personally observed the exchange of drug paraphernalia as far as -- I don't know what it is, if it's coke or whatnot, and you might ask how do I know that? The reason I know that is because there's a resident that lives on our block that does drugs. I grew up with the person. I'm not going to mention the individual's name. She's well-known by the police department as being a drug addict, and the very car and license plate that drops off drugs to her house is also the very car that I find in the parking lot of Junior's Tavern with -- meeting up with different people that are standing around.

I have personally observed loitering, loud music, screaming, all sorts of different activities which would be suspect to things not being right. I have worked with the residents. I have talked to individual residents to understand their concerns and to bring them to light at the meeting, so we are informed. I personally have video. If you say we don't know what's going on or don't think that there's a problem, we have videotape. The neighborhood has

resorted to documenting everything on tape because obviously the video doesn't lie.

There are sometimes probably, I would guesstimate, in the area of 50 to 100 people congregating at different times out in the parking lot in the different neighborhoods. Before it was asked by the chairman, how do we know that these are patrons of Devon's. Well, the videotape clearly shows that they park in the residents' — along their homes. This is, as a matter of fact, the lady that testified. The cars park along her home, and they walk right into Junior's Tavern, or they stop at his front door because they have no access.

There's numerous times where there's so many people standing outside in front of Junior's Tavern, it's very difficult for people to even exit the establishment. And it's on video. You would think that that would be a fire hazard or health concern of the patrons going there. We obviously have evidence of that with what happened in Chicago and in Rhode Island with those fires and all those type of situations.

I personally have heard gunshots. I make rounds, and various other people make rounds up to that establishment to observe what's going on and to

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1 document what's going on. We are gravely concerned, 2 and we're hoping that the board would understand our 3 concerns and help us to return to a normal way of 4 life. We have to get up in the morning to go to work. 5 We don't have the leisure of staying up to 2:00 in the 6 morning and then go to work at 6:00 in the morning and 7 be attentive and alert.

This is truly affecting our lives. But I also have documentable evidence here which I think is very crucial to illustrate the point of the neighborhood and the testimony that the neighborhood has brought forth. These are police reports, and only a few of them that we pulled through Open Records.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Mr. Reep, hold on one moment here. Mr. Schrimpf, I just want to ask you, before we get to the point where he wants to offer this as evidence; this has not been cited for police reports. Is this admissible?

MR. SCHRIMPF: Well, if it's -- It's not been cited for police reports. If the documents go to establishing facts that are in the notice regarding noise, litter, that sort of thing, or if the documents go to establishing that in fact the police were called and the police responded, that's one thing. However, this witness is not the witness that can lay the

foundation for these documents. You've got to have a foundation laid.

MR. REEP: The foundation is that this -- I believe that these documents will prove the testimony that I personally have given to illustrate what's taking place in the parking lot, and also the testimony that the neighborhood has given that there is a serious problem, and it lines up with the draft that you have before you as far as what the neighborhood's concerns are.

MR. SCHRIMPF: But, sir, when I say a foundation laid; in other words, you have to be a qualified individual from the Milwaukee Police Department who can identify the documents as being documents of the Milwaukee Police Department.

MR. REEP: Okay. I'm not here to dispute the accuracy of the document. I'm here to read for you what the document says what's the complaint and what the issue is.

MR. SCHRIMPF: That, Mr. Chairman, would be hearsay.

MR. REEP: Hearsay! This is a legal, binding document.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sir, sir. I'm sorry. That's understandable, and Sergeant Hogan is -- has left us here, so if he does return, --

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1 2 MR. SCHRIMPF: Then we can try to deal with 3 it.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: If he does return, we can look at that particular piece of evidence. Short of that, right now --

ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman? CHAIRMAN BOHL: One second, Alderman Gordon.

9 Sir, is there anything additional at this point? And 10 we'll hold off pending Sergeant Hogan's return. Here 11 he is as we speak.

> MR. SCHRIMPF: I believe Sergeant Hogan has returned. Why don't you give us those --

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sir, do you want to proffer that? Just bring that around here and give it to the Sergeant.

ALDERMAN PRATT: Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yes, Alderman Pratt.

ALDERMAN PRATT: While you're waiting, let me ask Mr. Reep, have you contacted my office in the last year regarding operations at Junior's?

MR. REID: I personally have not contacted your office; however, I have had personal conversations with you in regards to this establishment, and your answer to me was that we were

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1 going to have get-togethers at Lincoln Park Community Center with Junior, and you encouraged him, and 2 3 including the board the last time when they issued his 4 license, encouraged Devon that he should show up at 5 these community hearings to hear the concerns, address

6 the concerns, and work with the neighborhood. 7

He showed up, I think, to two or three of them which we have documented, and the rest of the time he never showed up again. And when we asked him to provide the security that the board recommended that he put out in the parking lot, there has been no visible security in his parking lot since he has been reissued his license from last year. We have that on documentation.

This is not 4th of July occurrences, this is not any other big holiday occurrences. The police reports will show that there have been numerous calls in August, in December, in January, in February, dealing with these very concerns although they're exasperated in summertime truly, but these things exist on a continuous basis on the weekends, but we have worked with Devon and attempted to, and he has not shown up at these community hearings.

ALDERMAN PRATT: Okay. And what I'm saying, too, is the 4th District, I think it is, 4th District Police Station, I think, works well with Mr. Reid. And you know as well as I do, if there were police objections and/or reports that said this business is not operating as it should, I would say, yeah, I agree with that wholeheartedly.

The reason why I believe there were no police objections to Junior's is because there is cooperation between the owner and operator of Junior's and the people who work for him and the Milwaukee Police Department.

My last comment is this, for right now, is I am not there generally on Saturdays or Sunday nights, but I do know -- and I know a lot of the clientele, don't know them personally, -- but most, if not all of them, are upstanding young men and young women, and so I'll hold my further comments.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman?

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MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. I suppose, Mr. Chairman, there's a sufficient record at this point, if the committee wants to receive them. ALDERMAN GORDON: I would so move.

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CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon moves to make these documents part of our record. There being no objection, so ordered.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Now, Mr. Chairman, I want to caution the committee that these do not reflect anything with respect to arrests or violation -- in fact, convictions, of anything that has occurred at the tavern.

These can be received for the sole and limited purpose of substantiating the information that's contained in the notice regarding the neighborhood objections. In other words, the neighbors are saying, look, we called the police department in response to noise, litter, whatever, and these are the documents that substantiate that they were doing that. That's the limited purpose you can use those.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: So noted. Thank you. ALDERMAN PRATT: Mr. Chairman. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Pratt. ALDERMAN PRATT: Just one brief comment.

Given that we have several people that wish to

testify, this would give us an opportunity to cue up

Mr. Reep, how much time do you have on that video that you have here? MR. REEP: I think it's approximately six to seven minutes total. The committee's practice has tended to be about four, five minutes, and if we can sort of get a substantial flavor for what you've seen in that time, we can cue that up. MR. REEP: Sure. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Are there any other questions for Mr. Reep? MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, just before we see the videotape, who is the photographer of this videotape? Okay. That person has to identify this videotape, when it was taken and what it's purporting to show, and you have to come forward. Have you been sworn, ma'am? I don't know if they still do it. But I am open to working with the community and working with Mr. Reep and Miss Varnado regarding whatever the problems may be.

And this is just kind of a traffic -- not a jam, but -- And then the car alarms were set off by --That one in particular. There was -- in this little four- or six-minute segment, -- There it is. So, and then that's what the neighbor lady has to hear all the time.

And they're coming from the neighborhood down Lawn Avenue just to show that there's no parking available or not much. And there was some double parked -- And there was some kind of suspicious --

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MR. REEP: These are all illegal turns. There's the squad car. This is Green Bay Avenue. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Miss Knurr, because she is the one -- I mean if you want to substantiate and provide any --MR. REEP: All right.

MS. KNURR: Okay. This is some illegal parking. They're going northbound on Green Bay Avenue and Lawn.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: About how far, Miss Knurr, is this from the established location?

MS. KNURR: You'll see it as we make the turn. That parking lot is the church parking lot, and where that bright light in the northwest corner is, -- Well, now we're coming south, and there's parking on the street, and you're approaching Junior's at that bright light there. This is about a block away on the north side. That's the church building in the background, and Junior's is to your immediate right. There should be some other pictures that show it. There it is.

That's the congregation of people, and this is the parking lot that is shared with the church and Junior's. I believe there's a rough estimate of how many slots for parking.

And that's all I got to say about it.

And when we reach capacity, we tell them we can't let no one else until we let some more people out, and that's the reason for that on the video. I'm not sure about the picket fence.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Johnson, thank you for your testimony here. Okay. The remaining residents, if you just want to line up and provide your name and your address for the record.

MS. REEP: My name is Lisa Reep. I live at 1436 West Lawn Avenue, and I have been witness to most of the things that were shown here today. And I just beg with you all to please consider what we're saying. We do live there. We experience it. We get up in the middle of the night and make these rounds. This is not a 10-minute video that you've seen, this is weekend after weekend, that we're getting up on our

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patrol and try to keep control of it.

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And Alderman Pratt, I beg you, -- and I will personally invite you to come this spring and in summer, to come and spend a weekend with us on one of those nights. And I don't mean any disrespect, but I will personally -- in fact, I'm personally inviting you now, and I'll call you with a day, okay?

The church, thankfully, did put a fence across the back so you can't get into my neighborhood from the church parking lot, but that still doesn't stop it from circulating around.

I watched the video out in the hallway. They have a deck on the side of their building. I believe you have a permit to have parties outside. A couple times during the summer I might hear music or noise coming from there. Shots? Shots in my neighborhood all the time. I've picked up several guns, lots of casings. That has nothing to do with Junior's Bar.

Sitting in the parking lot waiting for my son, I have seen security out in the parking lot, the church parking lot. The thing I saw in the video with all them cars, I find that hard to believe. I've never seen that before. As far as them going down the

live approximately three houses west, directly behind Junior's Bar.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And for the record, your reason for supporting the license here?

MR. GOLEMBIEWSKI: Well, I just got up, and I was watching this on T.V. I've lived there almost all my life. I'm 48 years old. I was there when it was the Suburbanite. So I just was watching this on TV, and -I've seen that bar in a lot worse shape than it is
right now. I know I get flyers in my mailbox where he

There's no other place for people to go, and I think this is, when you compare it to most, a very good place to go. A lot of the people that are 25 to 35, they have baby-sitters now with some of the college kids home. They can get out and hang out a little more.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are you done, Alderwoman Johnson-Odom?

ALDERWOMAN JOHNSON-ODOM: Uh-hmm.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Reid, just one follow-up question. You indicated that you do not have any dancing by patrons in your establishment?

MR. REID: Not at all, sir, no.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. And in terms of the music, you do have live musicians, otherwise you play prerecorded music or --

licensed facilities, in the 1st Aldermanic District.

I seldom, if ever, even come to this committee because people don't even apply for licenses in my aldermanic district. That's a fact.

I do have one pending, which is really strange, because, you know, I'm real firm relative to, one, I think we have enough alcohol outlets in the City of Milwaukee let alone the 1st Aldermanic District. But I'm going to say that Junior's -- And there's another club in my aldermanic district called Mecca that's very well run; places that young people, you know, 21 to 40 go, that they can feel safe or positive, and where they can meet other positive people.

I said to Devon, I said, well, you know, if this comes up -- and hopefully those problems that have been addressed -- that have been defined by the neighbors can be addressed by the next -- by next year, because hopefully this license will be granted, and hopefully we won't be back here next year.

But if that's the case, if we are, if they aren't addressed, I said to him, why don't you bring some of the people who come to your place here to this committee, and I'm sure we could -- you know, he could have filled this committee room because there are a

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MR. REID: A jukebox.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: A juke box. Okay. All right. Any final questions here for Mr. Reid? All right. Alderman Pratt, and then Mr. Reid will make a last statement.

ALDERMAN PRATT: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. As I said, I frequent Junior's, or I go in once every couple of weeks, sometimes once a week, but generally once every couple of weeks. And I usually go in, I guess, early, and I don't generally go in -- some Saturdays, but very seldom if ever on Sundays, and not probably after 12:00.

I've never seen dancing there in all the years that it's been in operation. I've never seen anyone dance, so -- Devon has very nice music, usually nice quartets, and I've only been in there really a few times where I stayed where the music was playing.

It's very similar, I would say to you, to a Major Goolsby's, a lot of young people who are just into sports. And there are very few places, as you well know, for young people to go.

I would add to that that in the time that I've been in office, there's been a 25 percent reduction in liquor licenses and license beverages, Page 68 lot of positive young people who go to Junior's. A

lot of young people who went to -- college graduates
 who went to schools with my son and with my daughter.

I'm not saying there aren't some problems as identified by some of the neighbors, and I will say, I'm not usually there in July and August on Saturdays when they close, and as the video shows, I guess I would say there are some problems, but none relative to the degree of what we saw in some other videos where you had people who were completely out of control that — like you had, maybe, I'm going to say at the Maze or, some other videos that I've seen.

But I'm saying any folks that are causing havoc and disrupting the neighborhood cannot and should not be tolerated, but that's not my experience with Junior's. As I said, Devon lives upstairs over his place of business. We do have problems along Island Drive that was mentioned, do have some problems in the area. There's a couple of other problems that were identified that I didn't know was happening there.

I consider myself in tune with my aldermanic district. I'm here to say that I believe this license should be renewed. I believe any of the problems that have been identified can be worked out.

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I would say that, Mr. Reid, that, you know, as soon as you can, you have to have a meeting with these neighbors, and during the summer months, you have to meet with the Johnsons. During the summer months, you have to have security outside, and you have to make sure the outside -- they're doing what they should be doing and what you're paying them to do. So thank you.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Mr. Reid, this is your opportunity to provide any closing statements to 10 the committee before we take this matter up.

MR. REID: Thank you. I'd just like to say to the committee, I've always tried try to take a proactive approach to running Junior's as a business. I've not only considered business, but also the neighbors.

I've spoken to a lot of my neighbors in the past. If they've had a concern, I've tried to address it. I cannot control everyone, but what I will try to do is address the issues that come to mind of that I see. If I see anything as far as their mentioning drugs, or any kind of activities like that, I'll call the police myself. I'm not that way. Public urination, I'll go out and approach the guy myself. You'll see me walking around that parking lot. If

MR. COPELAND: He would have to amend his renewal application and drop the tavern dance, and then apply for instrumental music, which permits the playing of instrumental music only, with the singing on the part of and only by persons actually engaged in the playing of such musical instruments, and dancing is not allowed.

ALDERMAN GORDON: I have a motion, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Go ahead.

ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you. First of all, I'd like to thank the neighbors and --

MS. VARNADO: I might go to jail here, but I hope everybody knows that although you were swayed by the gentleman who was nice enough to come down, 20th Street is not behind Junior's.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Miss Varnado, please.

ALDERMAN GORDON: All right. Thank you. Again, I want to thank the neighbors for coming forward to testify. And, you know, this is a real critical situation, obviously, and I think that taking the initiative early in the part of the year, before we get to the summer, is very important because I think we all know that we'll have situations throughout the summer months, maybe even throughout

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there's loud music, loud noise, I ask them to turn it down.

In the summer it got out of control, and we went to the district on 71st and Silver Spring, and they give us these forms for our security to fill out. We warn the patrons or people in the car. We write down their names and license plates or whatever that form was, and then we sent it back to the police department, and they issued a ticket.

We try to do everything we can to keep the quality of living better in the neighborhood. If my license is granted, I'll continue to work just as hard to keep that going.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Reid. We are now in committee. Is there a motion?

ALDERMAN GORDON: Yes. I have a question before the motion, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon.

ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Copeland, you indicated that the activities currently at the bar could be sustained -- I'm looking at the tavernrelated supplement, -- if the instrumental music component was exercised. Would that take the form of another change as far as the licensing would be concerned?

the spring and summer months, where there will be

2 overcrowded occurrences taking place at various

3 locales throughout the City of Milwaukee, and having

4 had the opportunity to talk to residents in the area, you know, I'm acutely aware of their concerns, and I 5

6 certainly thank Miss Varnado for inviting me as a

7 member of this committee to explain to the residents

8 about what the licensing procedures are for the City 9 of Milwaukee and how best they can deal with these

issues as they come forth.

And one of the things that I did when I attended the meeting at Lincoln Park Community Center was to strongly urge the members that attended to meet with Mr. Reid and with Alderman Pratt, because I think that there has to be a discontinuance of the disconnection between what residents have to say about what goes on in their neighborhoods and what business people have to say about what goes on in their neighborhoods, and I think their testimony clearly shows that here. There's a disconnect that has to be connected. And last year, as I recall, we had similar discussions and concerns being raised about Junior's, and I concur with the sentiments of Alderman Pratt. This is an establishment that is very well run. You know, I've gone there several times, I've eaten there.

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I've watched sports activities there, I've listened to jazz music there, and I think it's certainly one of the bright spots in the City of Milwaukee.

However, bright spots do tend to draw a lot of people, and I think that that's what happening here. So to the extent that residents have come forward, those are the concerns that I think that this committee put a great deal of weight on, and I think that what we have here is a reluctance to some degree to be proactive. Mr. Reid spoke about being proactive. To be proactive, you know, you've got to reach out to people, and you certainly have to reach out to other people that in fact live close to your neighborhood, close to your establishment in a neighborhood. And these people apparently have not been reached out to, and I think that this is an opportunity now to do that.

So my motion is twofold. One, if Mr. Reid is willing, to amend his license application to include instrumental music only and not to renew the tavern dance application part of the application, and if he consents to that, that would be my motion.

And then secondly, because of the concerns that have been raised, because of the evidence that clearly shows that there needs to be real

Page 75 you would drop your renewal for the tavern dance and would like to have an instrumental music only.

MR. REID: Can I be allowed to think about that?

CHAIRMAN BOHL: We are going to have to make a decision here now at this point, and both your licenses are up before us. Ultimately the committee could decide a number of things, which may include a nonrenewal of your tavern and dance license.

MR. REID: I understand that.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: That's within the purview of this committee.

MR. REID: I understand that, Alderman Bohl. I would just like to see what's under tavern dance and what's under instrumental so I can make a clear decision. Right now I'm sort of being pushed in a direction without being able to see what's there, and I would just like the opportunity to review it.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Copeland, would you clarify that one more time for us?

MR. COPELAND: I'm sorry, I didn't hear the question.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Reid wanted to know what the differences were between a tavern dance, what he presently has now, and if he would be agreeable to a

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communication between Mr. Reid and the residents, that we impose a five-day suspension to allow this to take place.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon, we are statutorily allowed a minimum of 10, unless Mr. Schrimpf corrects me otherwise.

MR. SCHRIMPF: No, you're correct, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And the maximum is 90.

ALDERMAN GORDON: All right. So then my request for a suspension would be for 10 days.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. The motion before us -- And what he did is, Mr. Reid, he -- Alderman Gordon does not have the ability to ask you to amend 14 your license to an instrumental only. That would be something that you would have to willingly concur here, and we can amend that here before us, can we not, Mr. Copeland?

MR. COPELAND: He's under oath. If he would agree to it, it would be taken as an amendment to his application.

MR. REID: What are the circumstances of me amending the license? I don't have dancing anyways. 23 Is that the only thing that --

MR. COPELAND: You would have to agree that

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instrumental music only, what the difference would be between those two licenses.

MR. COPELAND: Presently your tavern dance allows dancing by the patrons to prerecorded music or a band. If you were to go -- and from your testimony, you might have to correct me, -- you're saying your patrons don't dance; that you only have bands and jazz groups and singers. You could do that under instrumental music.

The only part the instrumental music drops out is the dancing by patrons, so if a patron got up to dance, you have to tell them, no, you can't do that because I'm not licensed for that.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Reid, we have -- you have the ability, if you so choose right now, to make -- to amend your license here at the committee. Is that something that you'd like to consider?

MR. REID: I'd like to have more time to think about it.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Well, Alderman Gordon, do you want to change your motion at this point here?

ALDERMAN GORDON: Well, Mr. Chairman, I understand Mr. Reid's concerns and, you know, it's not my -- it's not something that I want to do in terms of

impinging upon him at his business, so I withdraw my motion as to the instrumental music component, but I will still make the motion that we renew his license with a 10-day suspension.

MR. SCHRIMPF: And just so that we're clear,

MR. SCHRIMPF: And just so that we're clear, Mr. Chairman, when I ask Alderman Gordon, that would be a 10-day suspension as to the Class "B" tavern and tavern dance.

ALDERMAN GORDON: Correct.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: The motion before us is renewal of the Class "B" tavern and tavern dance with a 10-day suspension. On the motion, are there any comments?

ALDERWOMAN JOHNSON-ODOM: Well, I'm -CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderwoman Johnson-Odom.
ALDERWOMAN JOHNSON-ODOM: I'm opposed to the
tavern dance but not the Class "B" because he can get
10 party permits during the year and have an
opportunity to see if, in fact, that is what is
causing the real problem, and maybe over this year he
could see, you know, if we eliminate the tavern dance
and support the Class "B", whether or not that is a
problem or whether the problem is something else.

ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Gordon.

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ALDERMAN GORDON: On the motion, I don't think that the issue has to do with the licensing per se. You know, I think whether you have a Class "B" and a tavern dance or not is not really addressing the problem.

The problem is overcrowding. The problem is the fact that this establishment is very popular, and that during the spring and summer months, it's going to continue to attract more individuals going there.

Fortunately we've not seen or heard from the police department that there have been outbursts of violence or anything like that taking place. But it appears that the problem is substantial enough that the residents have come forward, and they've certainly worked very hard to document evidence to show what has happened in the past and what can be the potential for something like this happening in the future.

So to the extent that my motion deals with a suspension, you know, it's the minimum suspension that can be imposed. It will force residents and management of this establishment to meet to discuss ways of preventing this activity from happening in the future, because obviously it's going to continue to be a popular spot. It's going to continue to have the kind of drawing power that establishments of this

Page 79 nature have, and the same kinds of issues are going to come forward.

And, again, given that there were no police reports, regarding activity at this location, it may also call for police intervention to the extent that there can be documentation that can be shown to this committee or to the residents in the area that their calls who they say they have made have been substantiated by the police department.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. I'm just going to pass the gavel one moment and ask for recognition.

ALDERWOMAN JOHNSON-ODOM: Alderman Bohl. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Madam Chair. The motion we have before us, I feel, does not meet the concerns that have been relayed here today. I will not support that motion.

I will say that I believe that this does not come anywhere near the threshold of taking a license away. However, I think that there's been a huge communication gap, and I do not believe that Mr. Reid has adequately worked with either Alderman Pratt or the residents or community groups to address problems, whether they be related to the neighborhood or problems that are drawn in in part because of this establishment. And so with the motion that we have

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before us, I will not be supporting that. I do not
believe it goes far enough, but we will take a vote on
that here if we can.

Okay. The motion before us is for renewal of the Class "B" tavern and tavern dance with a 10-day suspension. Is there any other objection other than my own? Hearing none, so ordered. Okay, Mr. Schrimpf.

MR. SCHRIMPF: The committee is going to be doing Findings of Facts and Conclusions of Law recommending to the Common Council renewal of this license, Class "B" tavern and tavern dance, with a 10-day suspension.

You'll have an opportunity to submit written objections to that recommendation as well as to appear before the Common Council when this matters comes up on March 25th at approximately 9 a.m. in the Common Council Chambers of this building.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And Mr. Reid, clearly I think that it's fair to say that there's consensus here on this committee that you should be in contact with Alderman Pratt and work with the area residents and Miss Varnado on trying to positively deal with the problems so that we don't have further situations between now and summer where this will come back next
