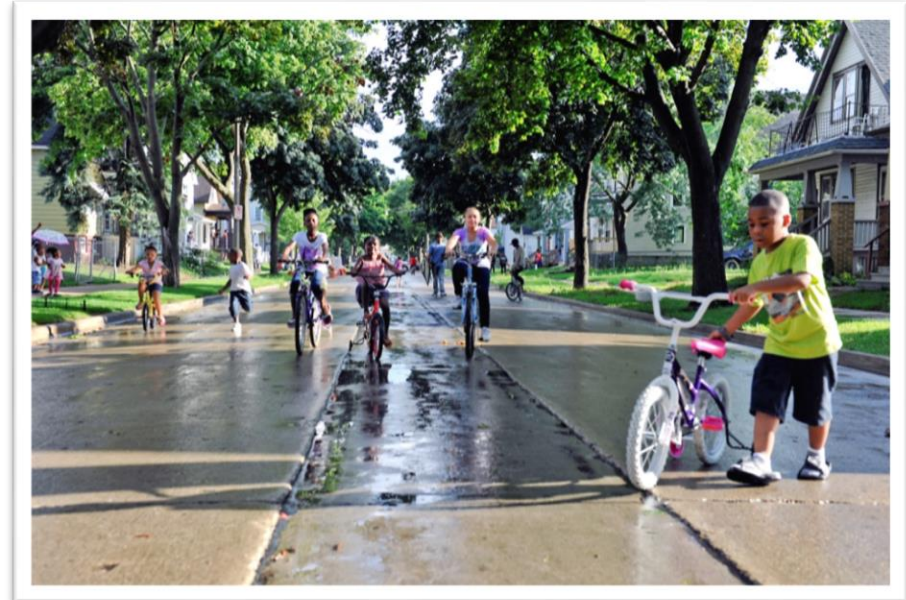
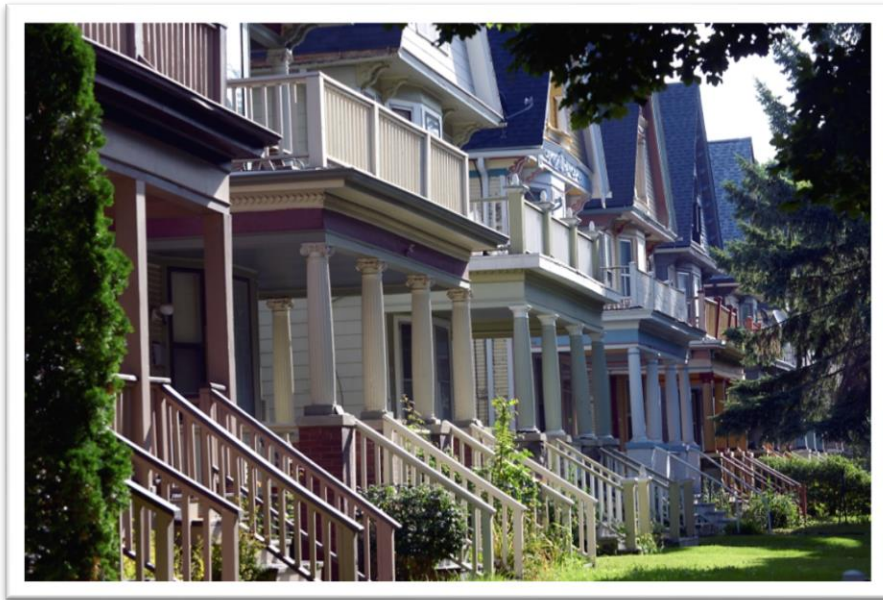

2013 Impact

- 4,400+ residents reached at their doors
 - 2,000+ residents attended 233 meetings
- 450 criminal activities referred to police
- 397 nuisance properties were abated by CPU
- 90,000+ pieces of literature distributed
- 4,000+ sq ft of graffiti removed
- 250 alley garages numbered with address
- 8,800 youth served at 19 Safe Places
- 4,225 youth participated in anti-gang/drug/violence programming

Neighborhood Teams

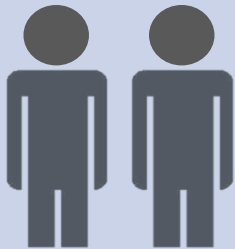
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Milwaukee Police District Team



Community Prosecution Unit Coordinator (District Wide)

- Assigned to a team with MPD, DA Office, City Attorney, DNS, DPW, Sojourner Family Peace Center, etc.
- Works to resolve nuisance property issues



Community Organizing Team (Two Priority Neighborhoods)

- One traditional organizer (adult-focus) to build neighborhood capacity, organize block clubs, build relationship with police
- One youth organizer to connect youth with leadership opportunities, develop connection with community, build relationships with adults and police
