The above figures are inclusive of Forcible Rape only.


- Total crime dropped over 8% in 2013 from 2012 and is at its lowest in over 6 years.
- Property crime is down by over 11% while violent crime is up 1%.







2014 Calls for Service, Violent Crime, Proactive Activity, and Milwaukee Demographics

Calls for service and proactive activity data retrieve from the Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) data system. Calls for service includes all priority 1 through 4 and E calls where a police officer was dispatched to the scene. Proactive activity includes traffic stops, subject stops, bus checks, etc... Violent Crime data retrieved from the Records Management System (RMS) and selects violent crimes based on IBRS codes 09A, 13A, 11A, 11B, 11C, and 120. Demographics retrieved from the 2007-2011 US Census.

Prolific Traffic Offenders, Traffic Stops, and Crime Mapping for 2014



Prolific offender traffic data retrieved from the TRACS traffic citation database. Property crimes include burglary, auto theft, and theft. Violent Crimes include homicide, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Traffic stop data retrieved from CAD.

STRATEGIC COMMUNITY-BASED POLICING

- ▣ **Building Neighborhood Capacity**
 - ▣ Key White House Neighborhood Revitalization Initiative
 - ▣ 2014: Metcalfe Park & Amani
 - ▣ 2015: Clarke Square/Muskego Way
 - ▣ Helping communities secure resources for better results around education, employment, safety, housing, health, economic vitality

- ▣ **Byrne Criminal Justice Innovation**
 - ▣ DOJ initiative to enhance efficacy of law enforcement through relationship building and collaborative problem-solving
 - ▣ Activate community by encouraging neighborliness, promoting positive norms, and enhancing informal social control
 - ▣ 2014: Washington Park

- ▣ **Common Goals of BNCP and BCJI**
 - ▣ Community-based revitalization through collaboration with neighbors, non-profits, philanthropy and government
 - ▣ Federal technical assistance
 - ▣ Milwaukee is the only city to be awarded both grants and is the only city with the police department acting as the grant coordinator

STRATEGIC COMMUNITY-BASED POLICING, cont'd

▣ **Group Violence Reduction Initiative**

- ▣ Modeled after an innovative strategy used in several cities, MPD has reinvigorated its GVRI efforts in 2014
- ▣ Districts 2, 3 and 7 have had GVRI Call-In Sessions this year, connecting with 190 invited violent offenders
- ▣ Program is designed to specifically identify violent offenders and deliver them either robust social services or robust law enforcement attention

▣ **In the Presence of Children Initiative**

- ▣ Partnering with Strategies for Youth, the creators of “Policing the Teen Brain”
- ▣ Pilot project in D2, with plans to take the program to scale after evaluation
- ▣ Aim: reduce the long-lasting effects of a child witnessing the arrest of a parent

STRATEGIC COMMUNITY-BASED POLICING (cont'd)

▣ **Transitional Jobs**

- ▣ As part of Compete Milwaukee, MPD is excited to launch a Training and Mentorship Program
- ▣ Partnering with MAWIB, up to 20 individuals (18-21) will be connected to MPD through this career pathway
- ▣ Participants will receive training, mentorship and valuable work experience, perhaps leading to a career in policing

▣ **STOP – Students Talking it Over with Police**

- ▣ National award-winning curriculum and model being expanded through our strong partnerships with Milwaukee Public Schools

- ▣ Dozens of additional formal community-based partnerships, including Sojourner Family Peace Center, MCORP, JMCORP, Project Safe Neighborhoods, Family Functional Therapy (DCF), Community Prosecution Units
