



# SHAPING A COOPERATIVE VISION FOR BOYS AND MEN OF COLOR IN MILWAUKEE

## **SURVEY DATA**

- 51 organizations profiled
- 47% focused on family, community and/or social development
- 60% provide direct client services
- 92% focus on services for Black boys or Black men
- Most organizations identified needs in critical areas: Fundraising & Leadership

## SITE VISITS

- 1. Work of the Organization (scope of work)
- 2. Success of the Organization (data collection)
- 3. Visions for Boys and Men of Color (reflection)




