



Re: Petition for Information & Data on the Demolition Project.

Dear Alderman Baumann:

I thank you in advance for receiving and considering my correspondence. Please be advised that I recently read the news that ran a press on the demolition project and from what I was able to catch, my interest was piqued because I have drafted a similar program (only on paper) that involved the recycle residential property internal housing material for restoration and reuse in property rehabilitation projects.

First, though, I am serving a sentence pursuant to Section 939.11(1g), Wisconsin Statutes or Wisconsin's Presumptive Mandatory Release ("PDR") law. I was sentenced on April 1, 1994, to a 15-year term of imprisonment that was stayed and 15 years probation was ordered. On March 17, 2009, some 13.9 years later, that term of probation was revoked and I was remanded to prison for fifteen years.

Second, at the time when I was sentenced, Wisconsin prisoners served two-thirds of his sentence but on April 2, 1994, then-Bipartisan Tommy C. Thompson passed legislation that created the PDR law where, opposed to mandatory sentencing provisions after completing two-thirds of his sentence, the parole commission reviews the prisoner and

determined whether to permit the defendant release on parole.

On two occasions now, March 26, 2019 and May 21, 2019, it was heard by the parole commission and received a one-year deferral bailed on the fact that it was designed in maximum custody. At the last parole hearing, the parole commissioner ordered a custody decrease to medium custody which it received on August 21, 2019, by the reclassification committee. However, because it takes eight to 12 months to be transferred - it remain in maximum custody.

Notwithstanding, in anticipation of release in May of 2020; it am once again drafting correspondence to find financial employment, housing, transportation, clothing, food to sustain me once we have returned to society. Your place on the decommissioned project is something that it would love to work and not only for the work but the invaluable knowledge on how to put my own new implanted business together.

Please provide me with any information and status on pending programs that you are aware of and on the decommissioned project.
