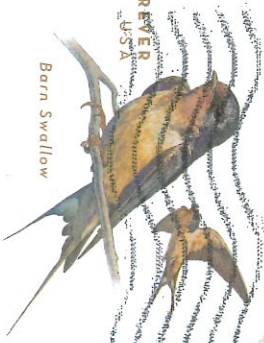

Re: Petition for Information & Data on the Deconstruction Project.

Dear Alderman Baumann:

Thank you in advance for receiving and considering my correspondence. Please be advised that I recently seen the news that you a piece on the deconstruction project and from what I was able to catch, my interest was piqued because I had drafted a similar program barely on paper that included the recycle residential property interests housing materials for restoration and reuse in property rehabilitation projects.

First, though, I am drawing a sentence pursuant to Section 9A2.11 (1g), Wisconsin's Statute of Wisconsin's Presumptive Mandatory Release ("PDR") law. I was sentenced on April 29, 1996, to a 15-year term of imprisonment that was stayed and 15 years probation was ordered. On March 17, 2009, some 13.9 years later, that term of probation was revoked and I was remanded to prison for fifteen years.

Second, at the time when I was sentenced, Wisconsin prisoners served two-thirds of his sentence but on April 21, 1994, then-Republican Governor G. Thompson passed legislation that created the PDR law where, opposed to mandatorily releasing prisoners after completing two-thirds of his sentence, the parole commission reviews the prisoner and

determined whether to permit the prisoner release on parole.

On two occasions now, March 26, 2018 and May 21, 2019, I was denied by the parole commission and received a one-year deferral based on the fact that I was assigned in maximum custody. At the last parole hearing, the parole commission erred and custody decreased to medium custody which I received on August 29, 2019, by the re-classification committee. However, because it takes eight to 12 months to be transferred - I remain in maximum custody.

Notwithstanding, in anticipating my release to parole in May of 2020, I am once again drafting correspondence to find myself employment, housing, transportation, clothing, food to sustain me once I have returned to society. Your piece on the decommissioning project is something that I would love to work and not only for the work but the invaluable knowledge on how to put my own own completed business together.

Please provide me with any information and data on meeting programs that you are aware of and on the decommissioning project.
