2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Also in the 2nd
3	District, Ice J. Thomas and Cornell Stallworth, Class
4	E partnership application for Grown Folks Lounge at
5	7200 West Fond du Lac Avenue.
6	Name and address for the record, please.
7	MR. STALLWORTH: Cornell Stallworth, 7200
8	West Fond du Lac.
9	MR. THOMAS: Ice Thomas, 7200 West Fond du
10	Lac.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Neighborhood Services?
12	MS. BENDER: Hold for occupancy, and the
13	current occupancy as of 1990 was 150.
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Health Department?
15	MR. HULVERT: Health has no objection.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do you admit to
17	receiving a notice in the mail that there's a
18	possibility that your application could be denied
19	because of items contained in the police report and
20	neighborhood objections to loitering, littering, noisy
21	patrons, traffic, parking problems, devaluation of
22	property values in the area, mismanagement at the
23	previously licensed alcohol beverage establishment,
24	concentration of alcohol beverage outlets in the area,
25	and conduct which is detrimental to the health,

1	safety, and welfare of the neighborhood?
2	MR. SCHIRO: Yes, sir.
3	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Sgt. Hogan.
4	SGT. HOGAN: Item No. 1 on the attachment
5	was presented to this committee three weeks ago when
6	this matter was here last. The other two items are
7	regarding Mr. Stallworth, and the first item is a 1995
8	incident. The other incident was on October the 9th
9	of last year. Mr. Stallworth was issued a citation
10	for disorderly conduct, and he paid the fine on that.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. And could
12	you legal representatives please acknowledge.
13	MR. SCHIRO: John Schiro and attorney Ed
14	Cameron appearing on behalf of the applicant.
15	Mr. Chairman, with regard to Item No. 3, I
16	can advise the court that that matter was reopened.
17	My client was unaware that a citation had been issued,
18	and that is presently scheduled for a trial in front
19	of Branch 1 of the Milwaukee Municipal Court on March
20	30th.
21	MR. SCHRIMPF: Which item was that,
22	Counselor?
23	MR. SCHIRO: No. 3.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Are there any questions
25	on the police matters at this time? Who in the

1	audience is here to testify in this matter? Just
2	raise the hands. Could everyone who's going to
3	testify please raise your hands and be sworn in. If
4	you're going to testify, raise your right hand and be
5	sworn in right now, otherwise you can't testify.
6	(Whereupon all speakers were duly affirmed.)
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Who's here in
8	opposition? Could you come one at a time to this
9	microphone here. I just want the people in opposition
10	first, and then we'll take testimony from the people
11	in support after that. So could you come one at a
12	time to the microphone, identify yourself.
13	MS. RAUK: I'm Doris Rauk, I live 4938 North
14	74th Street Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53218, and I am the
15	Wellington Park Block Watch coordinator and I have
16	been for almost 15 years.
17	We have had a lot of neighborhood
18	disagreement with these two people getting this
19	license. Many of the neighbors in the neighborhood
20	have complained about the previous bar that was there,
21	and I think it closed about a year or two ago, and it
22	was a so-called biker bar. During the time that the
23	other bar was there, there was a lot of loitering in
24	the streets, also a lot of parking on Medford, which
25	is parallel with Fond du Lac. They come across Fond

00005 1 du Lac, and then they park on Medford because there is 2 not enough parking in this tavern's parking spaces, 3 therefore, the people will park on Medford and then 4 walk at 2:00 and 3:00 in the morning when the bar is 5 closed, they walk across their lawns, and the people 6 said that they found patrons lying on their grass in 7 the morning when they wake up drunk.

8 And that's been the biggest problem with the 9 bar that had been there because there's not enough 10 parking. And so we have had a couple of meetings, 11 block watch meetings in our neighborhood. We consist 12 of 22 blocks in a triangle bordered by Fond du Lac, 13 Hampton, 76th Street and 68th Street, and we're called 14 Wellington Park Block Watch, and we're 22 blocks. 15 Most of the people that this concerns are the people 16 that live on Medford but --

17 MR. SCHIRO: Mr. Chairman, I don't want to 18 cut her off, but I really don't think it's appropriate 19 that she testify for hundreds of other people. She 20 can tell us what she knows and what she believes, but 21 her opinion of what other people think are not 22 relevant and appropriate.

23 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes. In fact, we can 24 accept your personal testimony but not that of 25 hearsay.

00006 1 MR. RAUK It's not hearsay. We had a 2 meeting last night, and there were people that voted, 3 and there were of 36 people that attended --4 MR. SCHIRO: This is exactly --5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You can't testify for 6 those people. Are some of those people here, I would 7 assume? 8 MS. RAUK: Yes, yes. I'm just saying there 9 were objections and there were people that said that 10 they have no problems with it, but there were 11 objections, too, and the objections are the problems 12 with the parking, the problems with --13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: How far away do you 14 live? 15 MS. RAUK: About four blocks. 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: How long have you lived 17 there? 18 MS. RAUK: 35 years. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And your personal 20 observations. 21 MS. RAUK: My personal observations, I've 22 driven by that a lot of times, and I've seen the 23 problems that have occurred with the previous bar 24 there and with the parking, and Stargazers is right 25 next door, so when they're busy and this bar is busy,

1	there is no place to park, and that's the problem.
2	Sometimes we think there's parties going on on
3	Medford, which there aren't, it's all from the bars.
4	And the parking is just bad. And since that bar has
5	closed, there has not been a problem at all.
6	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Questions
7	by member of the committee?
8	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.
10	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Would it be safe to say
11	that you would be opposed to any bar going in there,
12	not just this bar but any bar?
13	MS. RAUK: Yes.
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Questions by any other
15	members of the committee? Thank you very much. Next
16	witness, please.
17	MS. HONEY: Ereta Honey, 7158 West Fond du
18	Lac Avenue, Milwaukee.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And your testimony?
20	MS. HONEY: I am here to I've been told
21	that the people in the neighborhood at the block watch
22	meetings were told that there was an agreement made
23	with me that these gentleman would be able to use the
24	parking at Stargazers, and that is not true. I have
25	no agreement with them. I did not agree to let the

00008 previous bar use the parking there, and I have no 1 2 intention of letting them use it either. 3 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any 4 questions by members of the committee? 5 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. Do you have any 6 feelings one way or the other regarding this bar 7 opening up next door to your business? 8 MS. HONEY: I prefer it not. There have 9 been -- They did open for several weeks already, and 10 during that time, people came from there over to 11 Stargazers and caused problems on two occasions. 12 ALDERMAN WADE: You say they've been open 13 four weeks already? 14 MS. HONEY: A month or so ago -- I can get 15 the exact date because I had to hire two extra 16 security, post them in the lot to keep people from 17 parking on the lot. They were opened several weeks. 18 Yeah, I thought they were already open because they 19 were open on a frequent basis. People would go in the 20 back door. 21 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I have a question for 22 License Division. Is there a previous or an existing 23 license in there? 24 MR. COPELAND: The last license for this 25 establishment was 2003. At this time, it was called

2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: So that was expired?
3	MR. COPELAND: Right.
4	MS. BENDER: And the last occupancy that was
5	in there was Big Mama's, and it was 05/05 of '04.
6	These gentlemen currently do not have an occupancy of
7	any kind.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I'm just curious, did
9	you actually see activity in their building?
10	MS. HONEY: Yes. I did, my security did. I
11	personally went in Sunday and asked them to move cars
12	off of my lot. They had a bar full of people, a lot
13	of young kids, maybe 15 young kids, and there were
14	older people in there at the same time, also. So they
15	were open Sunday, and before Sunday, they were open
16	probably for three weeks.
17	And the last incident that happened at my
18	establishment I talked to this gentleman about, he
19	told me that he had been out of town, his nephews had
20	been going in and out of the bar. He said that they
21	came over to Stargazers, caused a problem, and he
22	apologized for it.
23	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade.
25	ALDERMAN WADE: Can the owners comment to

00010 1 her accusations? 2 MR. SCHIRO: Sure. I'll give a general 3 answer, and then I'll let Mr. Stallworth and Mr. 4 Thomas answer more specifically. There have been two 5 occasions when the police were called, and we believe, 6 quite frankly, by her. 7 MS. HONEY: I did not call the police, I did 8 not do that. 9 MR. SCHIRO: Excuse me, ma'am. We believed 10 it was her calling, and I now believe that more 11 strongly claiming that there was a party going on. 12 The one was referenced in the police report where they 13 went and they found there was nothing going on. 14 The other was on Sunday when the police came 15 and because there had been an anonymous report of a 16 Super Bowl party and they found three or four children 17 with my client, Mr. Stallworth, having a little 18 birthday party with cake and ice cream playing some 19 video games. There had been a birthday party 20 upstairs, and they came down to let the kids play with 21 the video games. The officer came and said there was 22 nothing wrong -- he allowed them to look around -- and they left. 23 24 My clients haven't been open for business 25 one day. I've been in there. The place is not in a

1	position to be open.
2	MS. HONEY: Excuse me. I have a
3	lot of security
4	MR. SCHIRO: I'm talking.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We'll give you a
6	chance.
7	MR. SCHIRO: I'm not certain Other than
8	the fact that she doesn't want competition, I don't
9	know what her motive is. Because we also will provide
10	testimony that my client's brother, Reginald
11	Stallworth, did discuss with her parking, yes, and I'm
12	only really open for business on Wednesday and Sundays
13	and maybe we can work something out. Nothing in
14	writing, they agreed they would talk more about it.
15	They thought it would be something that they can work
16	out because she is not that busy. But did you two
17	have some parties?
18	MR. STALLWORTH: There's never been any
19	parties there, never. As a matter of fact, when the
20	police officers came on Sunday
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You just described a
22	birthday party there.
23	MR. STALLWORTH: I guess I should say
24	anything dealing with liquor. Sunday was my niece's
25	birthday. We were upstairs, there's an apartment

1	upstairs. For her birthday she wanted to play video
2	games. When they see lights on, they automatically
3	assume the place is open for business. If you heard
4	her earlier, she said somebody told her there were
5	kids in there. Yes, they were. We were playing video
6	games. When the police came and looked around, they
7	didn't find any wine, beer, liquor, or anything like
8	that. There was nothing like that there.
9	ALDERMAN WADE: Can I just continue?
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade, go
11	ahead.
12	ALDERMAN WADE: Is there beer, wine, and
13	liquor inside the establishment at this time?
14	MR. STALLWORTH: No, there's none.
15	ALDERMAN WADE: None on the premises?
16	MR. STALLWORTH: None at all.
17	MR. SCHIRO: For clarification, there are
18	two apartments upstairs where Mr. Stallworth lives.
19	ALDERMAN WADE: Right. I'm talking about in
20	the business, there is no alcohol inside the business
21	at this point?
22	MR. STALLWORTH: No, zero. There hasn't
23	been.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Question for
25	Neighborhood Services. Can that be used for a

00013 1 birthday party? 2 MS. BENDER: No, it cannot be. He cannot occupy the building. If you wanted to, you cannot 3 4 have birthday parties, you can't have anything at all 5 related to that occupancy other than making repairs on 6 the property, so if there was any activity that was 7 going on, it was an illegal activity. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. 9 MS. HONEY: They are absolutely wrong. I 10 talked to this gentleman Sunday, and I told him --11 MR. SCHRIMPF: The record should reflect 12 which gentleman? 13 MS. HONEY: I don't even know his name, 14 sitting in the striped shirt. 15 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would you care to 16 identify yourself. 17 MR. SCHIRO: That's Reginald Stallworth. 18 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your brother? 19 MR. STALLWORTH: Yes, sir. 20 MS. HONEY: I've only seen him and met him 21 one time, and that is when he came into my parking lot 22 one day, and I let him know the problem that had 23 happened. I talked to this gentleman Sunday, and he 24 told me, he said don't you remember me, because he 25 came in, he worked for the electric company, and I

00014 told him, I said I really feel bad about what I have 1 2 to do because it's you, and I told him I could not 3 start something that I could not finish, and that 4 means there's no sense in me letting them use my 5 parking sometimes if I can't let them do it all the 6 time, because that's just going to cause a problem, 7 sometimes you can, sometimes you can't. Customers 8 don't know when the time is they can and when the time 9 is they can't. 10 When I used to deal with the other bar, I 11 was called nigger more times than I care to remember 12 about that parking lot, and I'm not going to start 13 anything with them because it might not just be words.

14 I'm not going to deal with it. Badger Fence is going 15 to fence the whole place in in about a month. If I 16 had told him he could use parking, I wouldn't have an 17 estimate from Badger Fence right now.

I have pictures of people in the bar, I have pictures of people in that bar. What they also don't know is I have video cameras on the outside that will show people going in and out of his bar. So I don't have to call the police, I could just simply give them a tape.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Schrimpf, do we have any

00015 documentation from the police department? I guess I 1 2 should be asking Sqt. Hogan, but he cut out. 3 MR. SCHRIMPF: Sgt. Hogan has paperwork here. I don't know what he has in the PA-33. 4 5 ALDERMAN WADE: Do you have in our documents 6 that there was any evidence of the police having 7 contact with them regarding a party? 8 MR. SCHRIMPF: That is something Sgt. Hogan 9 would have to --10 SGT. HOGAN: Are we referring to the 11 incident on Sunday? Yes, there were people in there, 12 and I got the information pretty much third-hand, but 13 it pretty much agrees with what counsel had said. 14 There was 10-year-old in a birthday party. No alcohol 15 was present, minimal number of people. 16 ALDERMAN WADE: Thank you. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Ms. Honey, you're 17 18 referring to other occasions, though, is it that what 19 you have seen? 20 MS. HONEY: Yes. The birthday party Sunday 21 when I went in the second time, there was at least 20 22 people in there. That was about 3:00-something. When 23 the police came -- and I know because that's when I 24 opened -- it was about 6:00-something. Maybe the 25 birthday party was winding down. I didn't call them,

00016 1 so that's not an issue to me, but there are times in 2 the past for a period of two to three weeks that they 3 were open. 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You don't have any 5 record of that, do you? 6 MS. HONEY: You couldn't tell they were open 7 because they were using the back door. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you. 9 MR. STALLWORTH: The reason why we use the 10 back door is because the stairway to get to the 11 upstairs apartments in the back, we live upstairs, so 12 if we have friends come over, they have to come 13 through the back door, that's the only way to get to 14 the apartments upstairs. So she's seeing people going 15 through the back door, they come in and go upstairs. 16 MS. HONEY: They have a big picture window 17 in the front, and when you dive down the street, you 18 can see people sitting at the bar. I have a whole 19 security team that has been in there when they were 20 open to ask them to move cars off the lot. 21 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair, just one more 22 time I just want to ask the attorney, have you been 23 inside this establishment? 24 MR. SCHIRO: I have. ALDERMAN WADE: Did you see any liquor or 25

00017 1 anything inside the establishment? 2 MR. SCHIRO: No, nothing. It's a place that 3 obviously was once a bar. It's obviously not being 4 used now, the bar itself is not stocked, there's 5 nothing there. It needs to be fixed before it could 6 be open. It's not ready to be open. 7 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Next person 8 to testify, please. 9 MR. ZILLMER: Robert Zillmer, 4975 North 10 72nd Street, Milwaukee, 53218. 11 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you, Robert. 12 Your testimony? 13 MR. ZILLMER: I'm pretty much in agreement 14 with the rest that it's the noise, the traffic and the 15 parking and stuff, the littering and stuff like that. 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Can you tell us some 17 specific things that you've seen. 18 MR. ZILLMER: Well, I found -- I live right 19 on the corner of Medford and 72nd and stuff, and I 20 found hub caps on my front yard already, beer cans and 21 stuff like that and the noise about 1:32 in the 22 morning. 23 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Are you referring to 24 when the place was open previously? 25 MR. ZILLMER: Yes.

00018 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And now since it's been 1 2 closed, it's been what? 3 MR. ZILLMER: I can sleep through the whole 4 night. 5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: How far distance-wise 6 do you live? 7 MR. ZILLMER: I'm a block away. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Questions by committee? 9 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman. 10 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 11 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. Sir, you 12 describe the problems you've encountered with the 13 previous establishment at this location. I don't know 14 -- Ms. Honey, who operates the tavern next door, I 15 don't know how long she's been in existence, have you 16 experienced any issues with her tavern? 17 MR. ZILLMER: Not to date, no. 18 ALDERMAN BOHL: So your problems were more 19 with the current place in which these gentlemen --20 MR. ZILLMER: The last place, yes. 21 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. 22 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other members 23 questions? 24 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. So you'd be 25 against any tavern going in there, not just this

1	tavern, anyone?
2	MR. ZILLMER: Yes, I would.
3	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Did you witness when the
4	other tavern was open people causing littering,
5	loitering, noise?
6	MR. ZILLMER: No. I was usually in bed, but
7	I could hear it.
8	ALDERMAN PUENTE: You can't tell us, the
9	committee, that they came out of this previous tavern
10	or where they came from?
11	MR. ZILLMER: Sometime Stargazers wasn't
12	even open prior to that.
13	ALDERMAN PUENTE: It was a process of
14	elimination?
15	MR. ZILLMER: Yes.
16	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any questions of this
18	witness?
19	MR. SCHIRO: No, thank you.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you very much.
21	Next witness, please. I saw about five or six people
22	had their hands up to testify. Your name and address
23	for the record, please.
24	MS. MURPHY: Joan Murphy, 4723 North 40th
25	Street, 53209. I'm here to represent Wellington Park

1	Lutheran Church, I'm Chairman of the Council.
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We appreciate that, Ms.
3	Murphy. We can't accept hearsay testimony, but we can
4	accept your personal testimony. How do you know about
5	this place?
6	MS. MURPHY: I have been sitting in on the
7	meetings at the church and listening to all the
8	information that they were giving, and there were so
9	many inconsistencies for one thing. For another
10	thing, that's a beautiful neighborhood, and it's
11	mostly residential, and I think one bar is adequate to
12	serve the neighborhood. And the streets there are
13	angled, Fond du Lac is angled, Medford where the
14	church is is angled. People leave the bar, they get
15	confused, they're into the church property because it
16	had originally been a park, so there's quite a bit of
17	land around our church, and they're all over there,
18	and you go in the morning
19	I mean there's nothing more disgusting than
20	to go to your church for Sunday morning services and
21	finding all the leftovers scattered all over from the
22	parking the night before, and you have no idea how
23	many mornings I picked up.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Ms. Murphy, how close
25	is the church to this bar?

1	MS. MURPHY: The church is on 70th, it's
2	7017 West Medford. You've got all these crazy angled
3	streets, so it's maybe about two blocks from the bar.
4	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any
5	questions of this witness?
6	ALDERMAN DAVIS: That's the reason why I
7	brought up the map here, and I do have other maps.
8	These are not concentration maps, these are zoning
9	maps so that we can specifically tell what is
10	residential and what is industrial. Would it be
11	proper for me to submit them at this time, or should I
12	submit them later so that as testimony occurs at least
13	you have something to reference?
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: If I could ask you a
15	question. Will you also be presenting a concentration
16	map?
17	ALDERMAN DAVIS: No, sir.
18	MR. SCHIRO: Mr. Chairman, I have a
19	concentration map. I thought the alderman said he was
20	bringing one, but you can use mine.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: That's okay. If you
22	want to submit these at this time, Alderman Davis.
23	Alderman Puente moves to make we'll call it the zoning
24	map part of the record in this matter, and hearing no
25	objections, so ordered.

1	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Part of the constituent's
2	testimony from Wellington Lutheran Church, if you take
3	a look at the large box, the large box is where the
4	proposed establishment is located at. Wellington
5	Church is located on the corner of 72nd and
6	Wellington, which is right around the corner located
7	in this triangle here.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: That's where the church
9	is?
10	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Yes.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl.
12	ALDERMAN BOHL: Ms. Murphy, has your
13	congregation undertaken this matter to a vote? Have
14	you voted upon whether or not
15	MS. MURPHY: We discussed it when the matter
16	first came up and voted on it, and it was all nay, but
17	that was before they formed the partnership, and right
18	now, we're in between ministers so
19	ALDERMAN BOHL: Is this like a board of
20	elders who's doing the vote or the entire
21	congregation?
22	MS. MURPHY: The entire congregation, the
23	entire congregation. That was done before our pastor
24	that retired last November, he was still there, and he
25	spoke before the congregation, we discussed it, and

1	the answer unanimously was no.
2	ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you.
3	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do you have any
4	questions of this witness?
5	MR. SCHIRO: Just very briefly. Ma'am, you
6	indicated that you thought that one tavern or one
7	liquor establishment in that neighborhood is enough?
8	MS. MURPHY: We've got a day care, there's a
9	day care half a block up.
10	MR. SCHIRO: Is that what you testified to?
11	MS. MURPHY: Yes.
12	MR. SCHIRO: You understand that the other
13	establishment is a strip club where ladies are naked?
14	MS. MURPHY: No, the ladies are not naked.
15	They do have erotic dancing, but they are not naked.
16	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Excuse me. I will not have
17	this counsel slandering a business in the area. No
18	one is here to object to his comments
19	MR. SCHIRO: That's not your job.
20	ALDERMAN DAVIS: and he shouldn't be doing
21	that.
22	MR. SCHIRO: Can I continue questioning?
23	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Wait a minute. To the
24	best of my knowledge, Stargazers does not have a
25	cabaret license, which includes exotic dancers, so if,

00024 1 in fact, she's doing that, that's illegal activity, 2 but to the best of my knowledge, they're not. 3 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, it should 4 also be noted that even if you have a cabaret license 5 and even if it provides for strippers, the ordinances 6 of the City of Milwaukee prohibit the dancers from 7 being completely nude in any event. 8 MR. SCHIRO: I wasn't suggesting exotic 9 dancing. 10 MS. MURPHY: You used the word nude. 11 MR. SCHIRO: Thank you. But they have 12 exotic dancers there? 13 MS. MURPHY: I do not know of my own 14 knowledge since I have not been there, but I have 15 spoken to people who have been and they have described 16 to me what they've seen, so anything I say further 17 than that would be hearsay. 18 MR. SCHIRO: You understand there might be 19 people that don't want to go to establishments like 20 that? 21 MS. MURPHY: Oh, yes. If it was up to me, 22 that establishment would not be there. All right? 23 MR. SCHIRO: Okay. Thank you. 24 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Anything further of 25 this witness?

00025 1 MR. SCHIRO: No, nothing. Thank you. 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Joan, thank you very 3 much for your testimony. Next person to testify, 4 please. Who else is here to testify in opposition? 5 Anyone else in opposition? Name and address for the 6 record? 7 MR. DAVIS: Howard Davis, address is 5140 8 North 69th Street, 53218, Milwaukee. 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And how close do you 10 live to this proposed establishment? 11 MR. DAVIS: About two-and-a-half blocks 12 away. 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And your testimony is? 14 MR. DAVIS: My testimony and concern is due 15 to the parking, the noise that would congregate in the 16 area at that time, and the inability and lack of 17 people to sleep or rest peacefully in that area during 18 times when their traffic is coming in and out. And 19 also, the one major part is the parking. There's not 20 enough room to park cars for 100, 150 people. That's 21 why they venture off into the neighborhood, and 22 there's where the problem starts and begins. 23 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any 24 questions of this witness by members of the committee? 25 No. Do you have any questions of this witness?

1	MR. SCHIRO: No, thank you.
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you very much.
3	Anyone else testifying in opposition? Is someone here
4	to testify in support? Would you please come forth.
5	Your name and address for the record, sir?
6	MR. MACICJEWSKI: My name is Thomas
7	Macicjewski, and I live at 4827 North 73rd, 53218, and
8	I've been there going on five years.
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thomas, how long have
10	you lived there?
11	MR. MACICJEWSKI: Going on five years, my
12	partner and I, five years.
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: How far away, roughly, do
14	you live from this location?
15	MR. MACICJEWSKI: Maybe about five blocks at
16	the most.
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And your testimony is?
18	MR. MACICJEWSKI: That I believe that I'm
19	getting a little bit of fear because of some
20	conversations I've had with Mr. Davis already that
21	he's very adamant against this establishment here
22	because when it first started out, it started out to
23	be an alternative bar or a gay bar, and I feel Mr.
24	Davis is, in my conversations on my lawn that I've had
25	with him, you know, in his tone of voice, because I

00027 1 never let him know my lifestyle personally, but in his 2 conversations, I feel that he is a homophobic person. 3 That's my opinion. 4 And I look at it this way. I tried talking 5 to him, saying look at the money that the Third Ward 6 has made with all the gay bars from back in the '70s, 7 and they're still there, and if you would have bought 8 property in the Third Ward 20 years ago, you'd be a 9 multi-millionaire today, or if you bought on Brady 10 Street where some of the gay bars were at one time, 11 originally when I came to the city back in the '60s, 12 because I've been in the city for 40 years, and Brady 13 Street proves there's not any harm when these bars 14 have happened. 15 I know a lot of gay bar owners who are in 16 the business for 25, 30 years, and they have 17 done nothing but to clean up their establishments. 18 One in particular is Bob Schmidt, who used to own the 19 M & M bar, and I think everybody in this conference 20 area maybe has even eaten a meal there. And I'm just 21 here to say that these young men should have a chance, 22 and I think it's becoming a homophobic situation and 23 it's become a racial situation because I can see if a 24 man were to walk in with a three-piece suit would have 25 a proper what you call quote/unquote haircut, there

00028	
1	would have never been a statement pro or con.
2	Sure, the strip bar is whatever it is. The
3	biker bar that was closed, I've never noticed it, and
4	I never paid attention to it because I don't even go
5	to bars, but I would like to go to a bar which they're
6	saying is going to be a small lounge, light jazz
7	music, no hard core, anything of this. So I say
8	please give these gentlemen a chance because they're
9	not going to want to be shut down, they want to make
10	money. And they've got good looking clothes. I wish
11	I could afford clothes that they buy because they've
12	got some pretty nice suits on today, so I think they
13	want to make money, so give them a chance.
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any
15	questions of this witness?
16	ALDERMAN DAVIS: I do have a question. Sir,
17	were you at a public meeting that we held last night?
18	MR. MACICJEWSKI: Yes, I was.
19	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Did you hear me make a
20	statement that I would not tolerate any type of
21	discrimination on this particular issue?
22	MR. MACICJEWSKI: At that time, you did, but
23	when you were talking to me on my lawn, like I said
24	earlier, you came across very homophobic to me, and I
25	was even afraid to continue the conversation with you.

00029 1 ALDERMAN DAVIS: And did you commend me for 2 taking that position on being inclusive? 3 MR. MACICJEWSKI: Yes, I did say that night 4 because it sounded very good at that time. 5 ALDERMAN DAVIS: And did you clap for me at 6 that particular time when I made that statement? 7 MR. MACICJEWSKI: And didn't you walk away 8 angry from me last night when I said you made a 9 mistake about our street? 10 ALDERMAN DAVIS: I'm specifically talking 11 about the issue that you talked about me being 12 homophobic, and I wanted to make sure that you 13 understand that I appreciate your support. Thank you. 14 MR. CAMERON: May I address the Council? 15 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Cameron, by all 16 means. 17 MR. CAMERON: I was there last night, also, 18 I was at the meeting, and I heard all of the witnesses 19 there give testimony, I heard everything go on. I did 20 hear Alderman Davis specifically say that there was no 21 way that he would be in any way against any type of 22 tavern or any other business for any reasons not 23 legitimate and that were in any way prejudicial, 24 there's no question about it, and the crowd did give 25 him a good round of applause, which he deserved for

00030	
1	saying that.
2	But I also heard a lot of people at that
3	meeting say that they felt that these gentlemen should
4	be given a chance because it wasn't their bar, the
5	biker bar that was there before that there was a
6	problem with. These fellows are willing to invest
7	money in that neighborhood. And the same thing was
8	brought up about values of property being increased in
9	various parts of the city where there is a saturation
10	of bars and that it has increased property values.
11	That was discussed at that meeting, as well. And
12	there were other gentlemen there that definitely stood
13	up and indicated to the group that these gentlemen
14	should be given an opportunity.
15	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chairman.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.
17	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Approximately how many
18	people attended that meeting yesterday?
19	MR. CAMERON: I would say at the most 50.
20	ALDERMAN PUENTE: And of those 50 people,
21	how many do you believe, approximately, were in support
22	of this?
23	MR. CAMERON: I would say that there were
24	probably 20, 25 maybe, 15, 20.
25	ALDERMAN PUENTE: 15, 20?

00031 1 MR. CAMERON: Yeah. They were scattered 2 throughout. There were a couple older, there was an 3 older black gentleman in the back of me in the back of 4 the church basement. He stood up twice and indicated 5 to the group that he felt that they were being unfair 6 in not going along with these gentlemen having at 7 least a chance to try their business. 8 And I did see the location, and there's 9 nothing other than a bar that could be there. 10 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you. Alderman 11 Davis, would you concur with that, that there was 12 approximately 50 people there yesterday, and what is 13 your estimation of the people who supported it? 14 ALDERMAN DAVIS: I would say somewhere 15 around five or six people supported it. ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you. And there was 16 17 approximately 50 people there, would you say that? 18 ALDERMAN DAVIS: Correct, correct. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I'm just going to poll 20 the member of the committee here. Does anybody wish 21 to hear a round two from any of the witnesses that 22 have already testified, because I see some people in 23 the audience raising their hands like they want to add 24 to the testimony. Does any one of the committee 25 members here have any further questions that they

00032	
1	might want to ask somebody that's previously
2	testified?
3	At this point, we will not entertain a round
4	two. Do you have anything to say in closing before I
5	take this matter into committee?
6	MR. SCHIRO: Sure, I do, a couple things.
7	I do have have a concentration map, but I don't know
8	that it's really different than that. I wish I could
9	see better than I do. It appears that in a square
10	mile there is two licensed liquor and Class A liquor
11	and malt and five taverns. It appears that there
12	would be really three taverns along that area with the
13	freeway kind of behind it.
14	I am very sympathetic to neighbors and
15	noise, and we always have to be a little careful in
16	Milwaukee because we're all appreciative that we have
17	Harley-Davidson and all that it does for our city, and
18	while I don't ride motorcycles, I have, and they're
19	fun, but they're unbelievably loud and they're
20	annoying when you're not on it racing down the street.
21	It's just a real loud noisy thing going by, and quite
22	frankly having a loud or having a biker bar across the
23	street from me would be really a disaster, I mean it
24	just would be.
25	And I am completely sympathetic to these

00033 1 neighbors, I really am, and I don't know how I could 2 sit up here in front of this committee representing 3 somebody who wanted to open another biker bar under 4 these circumstances, I'd say you're not going to get 5 that because these people have a right to not have 6 that. That just isn't, it's just really not what 7 they're intending to do. They're calling this place the Grown Folks Lounge. It is just that kind of a 8 9 place. It's for older people.

10 They're not going to have music -- I mean 11 they're not going to have hip hop, they're not going 12 to have live music, they're covering up the dance 13 floor. They're intending on making this a more quiet 14 place, something very different than really what is in 15 that neighborhood. They don't expect to be bringing 16 in patrons who are going to be creating problems. 17 They're not going to be riding motorcycles.

18 They have already received an estimate to 19 repave and reline their parking lot. They intend to 20 have security to not only make certain that there are 21 no problems for the neighbors but to actually watch, 22 because since we learned of the concerns of the neighbors about noise and parking, we've taken that to 23 24 heart, and my clients have tried to address that. 25 I have to say, Mr. Chairman, that my clients

00034 1 are not in this for the short term. My clients signed 2 a lease before I knew them and before they had a 3 license, and they did that because they had thought 4 and had every reason to believe that the Alderman was 5 supporting this tavern, and the reason they had done 6 that was because the Alderman had been sending people 7 to the previous owner, who's here today, as 8 prospective buyers or lessors of the place, and it 9 turned out that the owner ended up leasing the place 10 to my clients, but he did so with an option to 11 purchase. 12 My clients intend to paint the place, they 13 intend to repave it, they intend to have security. 14 They want to make this an adult lounge for adults, not 15 kids running around and creating problems and falling 16 asleep in church parking lots and leaving hub caps and 17 beer bottles. That's not going to be the kind of 18 place this is. 19 My clients found out about the meeting last

night really through somebody else. We were not notified of it, we hadn't been notified of two other meetings, but where we've known that there was a meeting, they have tried to go address the people. I would say that even those who oppose my clients don't think that they're not nice people who really mean 00035 1 well. My clients don't take this personally that 2 these people are worried about noise in their 3 neighborhood. 4 It was funny, one of the women who testified 5 last time, I see her and my client kind of shaking 6 hands, and they're practically hugging each other. I 7 said what's up? He said oh, she just wanted to say that she thought it went well last night. She still 8 9 opposes it, but it's not because they think there's 10 something wrong with my clients or the kind of place. 11 I think they want some peace from a biker bar, and I 12 think they're going to have that, I really do. 13 I think the objections, while I understand 14 them, I think history, if this committee grants them a 15 license, will show that it was unfounded. These 16 people are going to work with the community, they're 17 not going to have a kind of a noisy bar that's going 18 to create the problems. And quite frankly, given this 19 location, I don't know what else this can be. One of 20 the things my clients have already told me they intend 21 on doing, and I think they told some of the people at 22 the meeting last night, though I can't be sure of 23 this, is that they don't even intend to open until 24 after 6:00 because by 5:00 or 5:30 all those 25 businesses on Fond du Lac in the neighborhood are

1 closed so they can make certain that people aren't 2 parking over on Medford and parking in the residential 3 neighborhood. He wants to keep them in his parking 4 lot and right along Fond du Lac Avenue, which as I've 5 indicated, has freeway behind it, so it's not as if it's ever going to be a completely quiet neighborhood, 6 7 but they don't intend to increase the noise. I think 8 they will be really good neighbors.

9 I have Reginald Stallworth here, but I don't 10 want to get too sidetracked on this issue of parking. 11 He thought that the neighbor was going to agree 12 that they could talk about this and might work out 13 something, but if they don't want to, that's her 14 prerogative, that's her business. If she 15 doesn't want to do that, that's her prerogative, 16 that's fine. My clients are going to monitor this. 17 They're going to have security, and one of the things 18 that security is going to do is make certain that 19 people are not bothering other neighbors or bothering 20 the community.

And I think that this business really only can be this kind of a business, and this is going to work, I think it really will. I think the neighbors will be pleasantly surprised that the noise won't go up and that they will be really good neighbors to

2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Just refresh my memory,
3	I think you said this before. How many cars can they
4	put in their own parking lot?
5	MR. STALLWORTH: 35.
6	ALDERMAN DAVIS: That's debatable, Mr.
7	Chairman.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Davis.
9	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Counsel, may I ask your
10	client a question, please?
11	MR. SCHIRO: Yes, of course.
12	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Stallworth, have you
13	ever worked at any other establishments?.
14	MR. STALLWORTH: Yes, I have.
15	ALDERMAN DAVIS: What was the name of that
16	establishment?
17	MR. STALLWORTH: Just For Fun, and it
18	switched over to The Exports.
19	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And what was the location
20	of that establishment?
21	MR. STALLWORTH: Sherman and Good Hope
22	ALDERMAN DAVIS: 7155 North 43rd Street?
23	MR. STALLWORTH: Yes.
24	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Did you work at that
25	particular location as a bartender?

00038	
1	MR. STALLWORTH: Yes.
2	ALDERMAN DAVIS: And what year did you work?
3	MR. STALLWORTH: If I'm not mistaken 2001,
4	2002, something like that.
5	ALDERMAN DAVIS: When you worked at that
6	establishment, did they have any traffic problems at
7	that establishment?
8	MR. STALLWORTH: Yes, they did.
9	MR. SCHIRO: Because I meant to do this,
10	and I apologize. I just wanted to give you a little
11	bit more background on my two clients here. These are
12	both existing businessmen in the community. My
13	client, Mr. Stallworth, owns the the Curl Up and Dye
14	Hair Salon. How many chairs?
15	MR. STALLWORTH: 10.
16	MR. SCHIRO: How long have you been in
17	business?
18	MR. STALLWORTH: I've been in business about
19	seven years.
20	MR. SCHIRO: And Mr. Thomas owns a
21	community-based residential facility at 7554 North
22	87th Street. It's a group home for elderly and
23	mentally disabled. Prior to that, he was the manager
24	of five other group homes. These are serious business
25	people who want to seriously take care of this new

00039	
1	business and the neighbors around them because it
2	won't survive if there's a war there. These are good
3	people who intend to make a serious commitment to this
4	business and to their neighborhood.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Davis,
6	anything further?
7	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Yes. Please, Mr. Chairman,
8	if you can give me an opportunity to take my time
9	because I've been accused of a lot of things sitting
10	at this table, and I've tried to keep my composure and
11	be respectful of the committee and my colleagues and
12	also the constituents who are here that I represent.
13	I've been accused of being homophobic, and I've been
14	accused of supporting this particular license. And I
15	think that the people that I represent understand that
16	how we first got to this issue was because I called a
17	public hearing when the license came across my desk.
18	I thought it would be appropriate. I knew the history
19	of the past establishment, and I thought that they
20	deserved to actually at least have a voice and if, in
21	fact, there was any concerns.
22	Alderman Puente made a very good point last
23	meeting that we had, and he asked what are the
24	surrounding areas around this particular
25	establishment, and if you take a look in the yellow of

00040 1 that map, you can see that it is surrounded by 2 residential community. Why is this significant? 3 Because Fond du Lac Avenue is an anti-cruising zone. 4 We did that at council as an ordinance, and I've been 5 having problems in the 2nd Aldermanic District all the 6 way from Capitol Drive to 76th Street as far as 7 cruising is concerned. It happens at the Phoenix Bar and Grill currently, it happens on 60th Street, and 8 9 the Milwaukee Police Department has done a wonderful 10 job of trying to curb that. 11 As far as my responsibility as an elected 12 official is to represent those who put me in office,

13 and traffic pattern does play a role in how we move 14 forward with this, and I would hope that if you take a 15 look at where the establishment is at and the 16 arterials that feed into the residential community 17 immediately to the left or to the west, that is a very 18 quiet area, it's been a very stable area over the 19 years, and the reason why is because these fine people 20 who sit behind me are part of the Wellington Park 21 Neighborhood Association who's done time and time 22 again -- Alderman Kalwitz used to stay in that area, 23 and that's the reason why they're organized, they care 24 about the community. 25 It's nothing about a discriminatory

1 practice. It's about what these residents are here 2 for. They are here to try to protect their 3 neighborhood. There's liquor licenses that's coming 4 before this committee that they were very supportive 5 of, and we held the same type of meeting, they said 6 give this guy a chance. But you know what, the reason 7 why there were willing to give this guy a chance is 8 because he came to all of the community meetings and 9 he never misrepresented or gave any misinformation to 10 the constituents. The reason why you see these people 11 so, so adamant and so upset is because they'd been 12 misinformed. Time and time again they had been told 13 publicly that these particular applicants would do one 14 thing, and now they sit before you and they tell you 15 that they're going to do something else. 16 It's not an issue of if I trust them or not,

17 it's an issue if this is good for the community in 18 which I represent. Think about The Maze Nightclub, 19 think about the Exports Bar and Grill where there was 20 a tremendous amount of traffic, and think about the 21 problems that the community had and the public 22 testimony that they received over the years. 23 The agreement with the parking is the lynch

23The agreement with the parking is the lynch24pin for me that is just -- it's an egregious assault25on these people who have sat here, because last night

00041

00042 1 publicly these clients indicated to the people who I 2 represent is that they had an agreement with the establishment owner of Stargazers contingent upon 3 4 granting this license, and that is far from the truth 5 because you heard public testimony from the owner 6 saying that is far from the truth. I don't want to go 7 to the extent to tell people that I can't trust them, 8 but I will go to the extent to say that right now, I'm 9 having a hard time believing that I'm able to work 10 with this particular establishment.

11 Are you asking me do I ever want a liquor 12 establishment at this location? No, because I 13 understand that there are probably some good providers 14 who are able to take this establishment and make it 15 into a good business, but I can't work and I will not 16 work on behalf of the constituents under which I 17 represent for those who give people misinformation and 18 come before this committee and give misinformation. 19 It is uncalled for, it should not be tolerated, and I 20 won't tolerate it.

In closing, you know I had a public meeting the day before Thanksgiving, and at that meeting it was very well turned out, and people of this community actually turned out, about 40 people turned out the day before Thanksgiving. Some of the mothers and 00043 grandmother's wanted to put the turkeys on and get 1 2 things done, but it was important for them to come to 3 this community meeting. And Mr. Stallworth was there, 4 Mr. Thomas was there, and at that time, Mr. Stallworth 5 said he wasn't going to be part of it, he was going to 6 help run it. Last night at the community meeting, 7 which I was invited to -- didn't call it, the community called it and invited me there -- Mr. Thomas 8 9 didn't show up, and Mr. Stallworth was there to 10 represent this partnership. A lot of misinformation 11 was given to my constituents. 12 That's all I'm here to do is to represent 13 the people who entrust me with their public trust, and

14 I would ask that -- Here in the police report, Mr. 15 Stallworth at the Exports Bar and Grill had -- he had 16 responsibilities at that location, he publicly 17 testified that there were parking problems, and now 18 he's applying for an establishment in the 2nd 19 Aldermanic District, which is in a cruising zone, 20 which has residential communities surrounding this 21 particular establishment, and ultimately the public 22 testimony that you hear not only from the block club 23 captain but also residents in the area and the owner 24 that is adjacent to the establishment. So I won't 25 belabor the fact. I would hope that my colleagues

would deny this application and give us the opportunity to protect our neighborhood and give us the opportunity to work with the current owner to find out if there's a provider who can provide the services who are going to work with the community in which I represent. Thank you.

7 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. Alderman 8 Davis, other than the meeting and that, did you get 9 any other input from the community through a postcard 10 survey or anything like that, and if so, what were the 11 results of that, or is there any other information you 12 can put before this committee as it pertains to the 13 community?

ALDERMAN DAVIS: I did have a postcard survey, and I was going to submit it before, Alderman Puente, and I thank you for giving me the opportunity to submit it. I did a postcard survey prior to the meeting on Thanksgiving. At that time, the residents -- and I have the postcard surveys here to submit if the Chair would like.

21CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Just the numbers.22ALDERMAN DAVIS: At that time, the people23with the addresses, four approved and 31 opposed, I24had also two letters in opposition that are included25here. With the ones with no addresses, one approved

00045 1 and seven opposed. And how many people attended the 2 meeting? On November 24th, 23 people, and on January 3 20th when we had another meeting, 17 people attended. 4 So we've had extensive discussion, and that's the 5 results that you have, and I would hope that you would 6 support not only the community but --7 ALDERMAN PUENTE: How many did you put out 8 there with the postcard survey? 9 ALDERMAN DAVIS: Postcard survey, I think I 10 did approximately maybe 200 or 300. 11 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. 12 Chair. 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other questions? 14 Do you have anything further to add for your clients? 15 MR. SCHIRO: No. 16 MR. CAMERON: There's only one thing I want 17 to say to the committee. We didn't know about the 18 meeting last night. The only way we knew, it was Mr. 19 Cornell's mother or a relative in the neighborhood 20 told us about the meeting that was going on. So we 21 talked to Mr. Stallworth and said we should go and 22 attend, and that was agreed, so that's why we were 23 there so that we had an opportunity to speak to the 24 group and let them know exactly what their intentions 25 were.

1	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Anything further?
2	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Mr. Chairman.
3	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Davis.
4	ALDERMAN DAVIS: Here's the issue as far as
5	misinformation. I have an e-mail that I prepared for
6	the committee. When Counsel says that he was not
7	contacted for this meeting, it was clearly Ms. Rock
8	sent me an e-mail inviting me to the meeting,
9	contacted my office for Mr. Thomas's number, and I'm
10	pretty sure her testimony will say that she called Mr.
11	Thomas to attend this meeting. I have an e-mail right
12	here for the committee members.
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Anything further? This
14	matter is in committee.
15	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl.
17	ALDERMAN BOHL: I can say that in two
18	occasions that I've seen nothing from either applicant
19	other than to say that they've always conducted
20	themselves here before this committee with dignity.
21	It was appreciative of Counsel here at the last
22	meeting to allow some residents to come forward and
23	testify. It seems to me that these gentlemen
24	certainly want to run a good place without issue of
25	concern.

00047 1 However, I do have some concerns about 2 whether or not there were some operations going on 3 here, the circumstances surrounding that. I don't 4 gather that necessarily all of this came to the 5 forefront. I think that at some point they have a 6 relationship not unlike a previous application in 7 Alderman Wade's district in which one gentleman would 8 have been the primary owner and kind of been long-time 9 friends and didn't see it necessarily as a 10 partnership, but it was a partnership, and they tried 11 to come forward to rectify that. 12 But the one thing that I can say is I've 13 been on this committee now for about five years, and 14 the one thing that I can tell you that speaks to 15 potential disaster is where you have a licensed

16 location where there's not sufficient parking in an 17 area. Alderman Davis is correct about The Maze. That 18 was a club where there were a lot of folks there, and 19 there was not sufficient parking, and what happened, 20 unfortunately when people have a few drinks, they 21 don't act like they would when they're going to 22 church. It tends to bring out the worst in people, 23 they act foolish. Same was true of Daddio's in the 24 13th Aldermanic District. It was an area that was 25 primarily surrounded by residential where there was

00048 1 very little if no parking, and the majority, the brunt 2 of problems of people that had too much to drink was 3 born out on the adjacent residential area. The same 4 was true with another club -- I'm forgetting the name 5 of it -- that was in the 1st District off of Teutonia, 6 I believe, it was a sports bar, and again, not 7 sufficient parking, corresponding littering, traffic, 8 parking problems, loud noise with people who are 9 obnoxious after they had their beverages and 10 oftentimes unfortunately in excess. 11 I gather that that may be a situation that 12 holds true of this location. Some of the locations in

13 the City of Milwaukee, it's just true that when we 14 look at south side neighborhoods where we see three 15 bars on a block, just because 20 years ago, 50 years 16 ago, and 80 years ago that that neighborhood sustained 17 the fact that there were a lot of factories around 18 there, and everybody went for one or two on the way 19 home from work, all the guys had a beer or two before 20 they stopped at home and the wife had dinner on the 21 table doesn't mean that those neighbors have to 22 sustain that same semblance of three bars on a block 23 50, 40 years after the fact. There are times when the 24 necessity of change brings upon a decision in which we 25 should look at the appropriateness of a location.

1	The unfortunate thing is I don't have all
2	the answers here, but I do have enough concerns to say
3	that there is potential with this location that there
4	would be the overflow that would contain a
5	neighborhood and that we could and would see problems
6	with that. And so due to the shear neighborhood
7	objections to loitering, noisy patrons, traffic and
8	parking problems, and potential conduct detrimental to
9	the health, safety, and welfare of the neighborhood, I
10	would move for denial of this application.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: The motion of Alderman
12	Bohl is to recommend denial of this application based
13	on items he stated as listed in the notice. Is there
14	any discussion on the motion?
15	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade.
17	ALDERMAN WADE: On the motion; these
18	gentlemen have already expressed that they have 35
19	parking spaces on their premises, may be debatable.
20	There are several businesses in that area. They have
21	expressed that they would not open their business
22	until after those businesses close so they can utilize
23	the parking space that's available on the streets in
24	this area.
25	All of the complaints that we've heard about

1	this establishment was about the previous ownership
2	and the previous establishment. We haven't heard
3	anything negative. We heard that they had a party
4	there, the police checked it out, we got documentation
5	from the police saying that Everybody heard what
6	the testimony was. These gentlemen here haven't done
7	anything wrong, they haven't had problems from their
8	establishment. Parking is a concern all throughout
9	the city. Parking is a concern downtown, parking is a
10	concern on the east side, parking is a concern on the
11	south side, parking is a concern in several
12	businesses, not only liquor establishments, regular
13	businesses, hair salons, corner grocery stores in my
14	district, in everybody else's district that's a Common
15	Council member.
16	To say that what happened at the biker bar
17	is going to go on at these gentlemen's bar is a
18	stretch. These are businessmen, they're
19	entrepreneurs. Not only do they bring a place where
20	people can go and enjoy themselves, they also give an
21	opportunity for people to have employment, to have a
22	job. If we give these gentlemen a license, that's not
23	in gold, that don't mean we can't take it back, that
24	don't mean we can't revoke it for a certain amount of

days; that means we giving them an opportunity to make

1	good on what their word is. If they don't do that, we
2	have the opportunity to go back and make some
3	adjustments.
4	I have a serious problems with trying to
5	deny these gentlemen an opportunity to be
6	entrepreneurs based on parking and some of the other
7	concerns. We have bars throughout our districts, we
8	have bars next door to churches, one gentleman lives
9	upstairs from the bar, and we had issues with the
10	business next door. We saw fit to give them their
11	license. Same type of concerns.
12	I think these gentlemen deserve be a
13	opportunity, and I think if they don't conduct
14	themselves in a fashion that we expect them to, then
15	they will be back in front of this committee and at
16	that time we can issue some type of disciplinary
17	measure, but to not give them an opportunity, in my
18	estimation, that's a travesty.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any further
20	discussion on the motion? The motion by Alderman Bohl
21	is to recommend denial based on neighborhood
22	objections and items contained in the notice. Please
23	call the roll.
24	THE CLERK: Alderman Bohl.
25	ALDERMAN BOHL: Aye.
