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00002 1 PROCEEDINGS (NOTE: All City Personnel Were Sworn Under Oath Prior to These Proceedings.) 4 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Also in the 3rd 5 District and the last item on our morning agenda is 6 for Michael Lee, agent for I-43 Incorporated, Class 7 "B" tavern renewal application for Judge's Irish Pub 8 at 1431 East North Avenue. Good morning, Mr. Lee. 9 And you are represented by? 10 MR. GERMANOTTA: Attorney John Germanotta. 11 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, 12 Mr. Germanotta. And Mr. Lee, we'll swear you in 13 (Whereupon Mr. Lee was sworn under oath.) 14 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Lee, I need to ask 15 you if you acknowledge receiving notice of today's 16 meeting with the possibility that your application 17 could be denied. There is an attached police report 18 as well as a neighborhood objection to loitering, 19 littering, parking and traffic problems, public 20 urination, damage to private property, loud music and 21 noise, and conduct which is detrimental to the health, 22 safety and welfare of the neighborhood. 23 MR. LEE: I do. 2.4 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Health Department? 25 MR. BOND: No objection.

00003 1 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Department of 2 Neighborhood Services? MS. BENDER: No objection. 4 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sergeant Hogan? 5 SERGEANT HOGAN: I'll begin with Item 13 as 6 incidents that have occurred in this past licensing 7 period. 8 On August the 7th of last year, an officer 9 was keeping an eye on the Judge's Irish Pub regarding 10 patrons leaving the tavern and creating a disturbance. 11 At about 10:35 p.m., the officer observed a patron 12 leave the tavern and walk across southbound on 13 Cambridge Avenue and urinate on the side of Judge's 14 tavern. At 11:40 p.m., he observed a patron leave 15 the tavern and walk south into the walkway next to 16 2211 North Cambridge where he began to urinate. Both 17 of these individuals were issued citations. 18 On September the 24th of last year at about 19 1:50 in the morning, an officer on patrol was flagged 20 down by a citizen who reported a person urinating on 21 the lawn at 2260 North Cambridge. The officer stopped 22 the subject. The subject told him he had just left 23 Judge's Irish Pub, and this individual was issued a

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citation.

On September the 24th at an unknown time,

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an officer observed a subject leaving Judge's Irish Pub who walked to the southeast corner, approximately 20 feet from the tavern entrance, and urinate into the street. He was also in possession of an open intoxicant he carried from the premises, and was issued a citation for disorderly conduct and removing an intoxicant from a Class "B" premise in the original container.

On September the 25th of last year, about 2:15 a.m., officers observed a patron exit the tavern. This individual is indicated in the report as having a staggered gait and a loss of balance, and he had to hold on to buildings and street signs to keep his balance. The individual stated that he was intoxicated and was served approximately 10 to 12 alcoholic drinks.

While investigating this incident, the officer observed another patron exit the tavern with a bottle of intoxicating beverages, a beer, and he was observed coming from the tavern.

And then another patron was observed leaving the premises -- it says the Dunbar exit; whatever that is, I don't know, -- and walk across the street to the southeast of North Avenue and urinate in front of a North Avenue address. This individual was cited for

00005 disorderly conduct, and the bartender was issued 1 citations for sale to intoxicated person and Class "A" liquor consumed off premises. As you recall, the 4 bartender was here just the other day on that matter. 5 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: The bartender was here 6 on what is listed as Item No. 2. I don't remember 7 there being public urination. I thought there was a 8 citation for --9 SERGEANT HOGAN: The bartender was here as 10 the responsible person for sale to intoxicated person 11 and permitting the person to walk off the premise. 12 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: To walk off the 13 premise. 14 SERGEANT HOGAN: Yes. 15 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And what's listed under 16 three here, Sergeant Hogan, correct me if I'm wrong, 17 you're indicating that that is another incident on 18 September 25th? 19 SERGEANT HOGAN: That's the way I read it, 20 yes. 21 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Before we 22 get to questions by committee, Mr. Germanotta, I'm 23 going to allow you or your client to respond to any of 2.4 these incidents that are mentioned in the police

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report.

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MR. GERMANOTTA: Fine. With respect to the August 7th incident, the first time the applicant was made aware of this incident was with this notice.

With respect to the September incident, as I'll bring out later, he has a camera attached to the outside of the building to identify anybody who leaves and violates any rules, so that they can be banished, and they have been banished. And I have a picture of that camera and some of the internal cameras that are used that I would like to submit to the committee for their review.

 $\,\,$ VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: How many photographs do we have in the entirety?

MR. GERMANOTTA: There are three in connection with the camera, and there are numerous others -- you might as well take them now, -- in connection with signage that he uses to try and quell any neighborhood parking problems.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Before you proceed, Alderman Wade would move to make these photographs submitted as part of our record. Hearing no objection to that, so ordered. Please go on.

MR. GERMANOTTA: The September 24th incidents again relate to people doing things outside the tavern. As soon as we can identify them, -- We

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would try to identify them by looking at the tapes to see who these people are, and they will be banished, as people have been before and will in the future for this activity.

The September 25th incident has not come to court, and so I'm hopeful that that will not be used in any way here.

I would relate though in general that this operation has been at this location 17 years. By my count that's over 62 hundred days it's been in operation. Its record, I think, is an outstanding one. You'll see nothing for violence, you'll see no noise ordinance violations, you'll see no fights. I don't think you'll see any neighborhood objections today. He has a record of being there a long time and accommodating everyone. I'm confident we'll have support from the alderperson, and you already do have on file a letter from a neighborhood association, from Mr. Jim Plaisted, who was formerly Alderman D'Amato's aide and now works for the East Side BID and East Side Association. I have copies of his letter here. I thought maybe he would send it to Chairman Witkowiak since --

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: I didn't have it in my book. I don't know if other members have it.

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MR. GERMANOTTA: Okay. I would like to submit that also. So the association is aware of the long history here, and $-\!$

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Germanotta, just so you're aware, I will accept that, but I just want to imply that that is hearsay evidence as well, too, as long as Mr. Plaisted is not here to provide that. As much as I like Mr. Plaisted, and he's a virtual neighbor of mine, I trust that, but -- And Alderman Puente will move to make a copy of this letter part of our record.

MR. GERMANOTTA: Yes. We were hoping he was going to be here today, but he had other commitments.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm just going to say that it's taken for what it's worth, and it's a piece of paper with no signature on it. Again, not to distrust what you're stating here, but we'll just allow you to proceed forward at this point here.

MR. GERMANOTTA: All right. I'd like these things to be taken in the totality of the circumstances and the background here, because Mr. Lee has a reputation for being extremely attentive to the concerns of the neighbors. Last year, for example, in 2004, he met at a housing unit down the street with neighbors, with the alderperson, with police, to take

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care of their concerns. I think he's completed that. I don't see anybody here objecting.

In March he received a complaint. He has these tapes of everybody that enters and leaves on Cambridge. He took it to the police station. The alderman was there, the police were there. They found nothing.

In April he had another meeting at Judge's with the neighborhood group and the alderman to again review any issues. He's had really no complaints since about that time. So I think he has a history of being a long-term good neighbor.

He bought the house next door, he bought the house across the street, to provide a buffer. He has his camera system that identifies everybody who comes in, everybody who walks down the street. He has employees, after the premises closes every night, that walk down the street to pick up litter. He has employees that 45 minutes after before closing walk down the street to see if there's any problems, people urinating, doing anything else that's improper.

He has substantial signage that you'll be seeing all around the building, "Please don't park on Cambridge to bother neighbors. Park here." All sorts of signage that I don't think you've probably seen at

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any other place. So he has a reputation of being very sensitive to neighborhood concerns and will always continue that way.

I'd also like to circulate a little diagram, and I do this just to give you the whole picture and not just emphasize these recent citations, none of which were given to him, but I think you're concerned about.

I have a diagram here that I'm going to circulate showing that he's located on a corner that has recently had some changes. Across the street from Judge's there's a place called The Node. The Node is open 24 hours. Tons of activity, tons of traffic of all ages. We have witnesses here to establish that. That's new. That's adding to the congestion in the neighborhood.

There is a tavern called RC's around the corner. It was closed for a couple years and now reopened. People drink there, drive, et cetera. The Open Pantry has recently become open 24 hours. There's a lot to look out for in this neighborhood, and no one is doing it like Mr. Lee is doing it.

So, a couple people may have come out with too much to drink and urinated. As soon as he finds out their names, as I say, he will, because he has in

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the past and will again in the future, banish those people.

So you have a person here who has not an absolutely perfect record, maybe none of us here do, but in light of 17 years, I think he's demonstrated tremendous effort to be a good citizen. So I ask you to take into consideration the entire background, what he's done, what he's invested, what he's accomplished, and not let these recent instances stand in the way of any continuation of this license.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Are there any questions? First, before we proceed with that, Alderman Dudzik would move to make this diagram map part of our record, and hearing no objection to that, so ordered. Questions by committee relating to items in the police report?

ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Puente.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: What did you do with your manager? I know he got cited for this and that. What if any discipline or instructions did you give your manager?

MR. LEE: As of this time nothing, because I reviewed the tape, and when the guy walked out the door, whoever this guy was, he did not -- no one was

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walking out with a beer bottle or anything like that. Now, when he got outside, you know, he pulled it out of somewhere, and the police were right on the corner there, so we're not disputing that this guy took the beer out of Judge's.

We have a doorman at the door checking people when they leave to make sure they're not taking any glass out of anything, you know, plastic or whatever. And nothing showed on my tape, so the guy somehow snuck it out.

As far as the intoxicated person goes, the police wouldn't give me the guy's name, so I can't tell when he came in. When I know that, when we go to court and we can get that discovery, I can look up on my video system and find out what time the guy came in, and then I can take measures.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: On the tape with the first incident you mentioned, does it show the individual bringing out any type of intoxicant?

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$ LEE: No, no. There was nothing. He hid it somewhere, and then he got outside and started drinking.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: But you can't see that on the tape, so then you don't know that.

MR. LEE: Well, the police arrested him for

00013 1 that. ALDERMAN PUENTE: Right. But you saw none of that. 4 MR. LEE: Correct. On my tape I saw none of 5 that, that's correct. 6 ALDERMAN PUENTE: That's what I'm asking. 7 Thank you. 8 MR. LEE: You bet. 9 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by 10 committee? I do have a question for Sergeant Hogan. 11 When we see Item No. 13, clearly a citation was issued 12 for disorderly conduct to someone who described 13 themselves as a patron leaving this establishment and 14 urinating somewhere in the immediate vicinity. 15 The counsel for Mr. Lee has indicated that 16 Mr. Lee was never aware of this situation. When a 17 citation is issued to an individual, if there is a 18 corresponding PA-33 that is made out, is it the normal 19 nature to then forward to the licensed applicant a 20 copy of that, or is that something that may not be 21 unusual here? 22 SERGEANT HOGAN: I think if I understand 23 your question, do they get a copy of the so-called tavern report? 24

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Correct.

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SERGEANT HOGAN: No. They get that through open records request. I don't send it to anybody.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: So what could happen is somebody could walk out of an establishment, be cited for activities right in the immediate vicinity, because it's in the area where they could be out in the back in the alley, they could urinate, be cited for it, and it could go on the tavern report because the officer could determine that it would be substantially related to the licensed premise and the location, but it's not a -- What you're saying is it may not be incorrect here as what's being stated that he had no knowledge of that.

SERGEANT HOGAN: That's true.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: That's a problem. You know, because if you have a busy place, how are you able to respond to a problem if you're not aware the problem occurs until you show up before the committee? Ouch.

SERGEANT HOGAN: Mr. Chair, if I may just add to that, I think the bigger question to ask is is it appropriate to take this into account. Now, the officer can file that report or whatever he thinks is appropriate. Whether this committee thinks it's appropriate is entirely up to this committee. So

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give it whatever weight you desire.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. I concur with that. I do want to clarify one measure here, Mr. Germanotta. This committee does have a legal right to take into consideration a pending charge. Now, however much weight it does provide to that is up to the discretion of the committee, but pending charges are something that this committee can take into consideration.

I do want to ask you one question because you provided some photos, and I see that no doubt there's -- I'm assuming that parking has been a concern, and that you probably have some neighbors, and you're trying your due diligence to try and direct some of your customers to park in an area where they're not overly burdening your neighbors.

You know, it occurs to me from seeing several items on the police report that there are some issues with public urination in and around the facility. Mr. Lee, what have you done to try to stem that? I know that there have been some issues in the past and it may not be directly related to that, but we did have a gentleman from some elderly housing on previous occasions here that appeared before the committee.

MR. LEE: Forty-five minutes before bar close on the busy nights, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, I have someone outside. If it's real busy, I call a couple people, and I put them right on Cambridge Avenue about -- I'm going to say 50 feet down from the tavern, and we keep trying to keep an eye on everything, and they do the best they can.

I mean there's an unbelievable amount of traffic around there now, so we do the best we can, and if we see somebody that's attempting to do that, we tell them, no, you can't do that, and you can't come back in the bar.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Not only because you have a fairly large-sized place, but there's also other establishments, as the map would indicate, in close proximity, so there's a lot of volume and traffic.

MR. LEE: Yes.

MR. GERMANOTTA: I would just add that the camera that's in the photo goes down Cambridge Street, it views Cambridge. So that's another way of trying to determine if there are problems down there. That camera produces a picture inside the tavern that they can watch to see if they can see anything develop.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: You ought to put a sign

00017 1 that says if you're going to use our neighbors' lawns to urinate, smile. MR. LEE: We don't want to encourage 4 anything. 5 ALDERMAN PUENTE: I think he was joking. 6 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: That was joking. I do 7 want to see if -- Are there any neighbors here who are 8 here to testify in objection to this license? 9 MR. GERMANOTTA: These people that are left 10 in the room are all supporters; the employees that do 11 the surveillance we talked about, do the cleaning up, 12 we talked about, other neighbors who know of the 13 establishment and its reputation and how it polices 14 itself. 15 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: All right. I don't 16 want to -- I do want to get to them, and we'll get 17 them to shortly, but I do want to hear from Alderman 18 D'Amato first before we consider residential 19 testimony. 20 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 21 Much of what you've heard is what I had intended to 22 say. Mr. Germanotta did correctly indicate the 23 meetings that we've had with Mr. Lee. I think we all 24 have taverns and situations like this in our district.

This is a very busy tavern on a busy commercial

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street, and it's directly adjacent to a residential area that has a number of single-family homes.

Mr. Lee has worked with us to add additional parking on the North Avenue Bridge to service his customers. He has worked with us to empty his tavern on the North Avenue side and not on the Cambridge side which is the residential side. He puts up sandwich boards telling people not to park on that street but instead to park on North Avenue. He's tried to acquire parking across the street in the gas station to service his customers.

Just this year, as Mr. Germanotta has indicated, we've had three meetings with the tavern to talk about issues. We've actually sat down at the police department with a crime prevention officer, Bruce Scott, and reviewed the tapes with the neighbors who had complaints on the nights that they've complained. We've run through the tapes and looked at how many people actually are going up and down the street, and given the popularity of the tavern and the other taverns in the area, there actually are very few people who go down Cambridge compared to before those actions were taken.

The neighbors continue to have complaints, but again, the complaints are more the situation with

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the busy street and the neighborhood, and those complaints are few and far between. When they are made, Mr. Lee has made himself available, made his tapes available, and has met with people to try to take care of those situations. I think that the bouncers going up and down the street have helped tremendously.

I can tell you that there is -- I probably have 110 licenses in my district. There isn't a tavern owner or bar owner or restaurant owner who's gone to greater lengths in taking their staff and putting them outside to try to police the area, and I think it has worked out pretty well.

As well, Mr. Lee has discontinued some specials on some certain nights that had caused problems in the past. And, again, although we have one letter in the file from a neighbor who has not appeared, I think that given the location and given the type of tavern this is, that we don't have an issue here. And if there are issues, as they come up, they'll be taken up by my office and by Mr. Lee as well.

25 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chair.

00020 1 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Dudzik. ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Alderman D'Amato, what is The Node? 4 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: The Node is a 24-hour 5 cafe, coffee house. 6 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Okay. Thank you. 7 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any other questions? 8 Mr. Germanotta, I do want to afford you the 9 opportunity to bring your individuals forward here 10 and provide testimony. 11 What we will do is we will swear you all in. 12 We would ask you if you are able, -- and I see one 13 woman who has crutches, so if you're not able, please 14 take a seat. If you are able, if you could take this 15 microphone here. 16 I'm going to ask you to be very brief in 17 your testimony. This is not testimony that we're 18 going to use against you. If at some point we hear 19 redundant testimony, something's that already been 20 stated, we would just ask that you substantially 21 concur with that which has already been stated. I 22 just don't want to get to the point where we hear

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the best burgers.

So, if you could all move to the front row,

that Mr. Lee is the greatest guy in the world and has

00021 1 and when we get you all seated here, we'll have you all raise your right hands and swear you in. (Whereupon all witnesses were sworn under 4 oath.) 5 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sir, because you're 6 sitting here, we'll take you first. Your name and 7 address for the record, please? 8 MR. MEYER: My name is Charles Meyer, and I 9 live at 2069 North Cambridge. 10 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Meyer, because 11 there's multiple ways to spell it, is it M-a-y-e-r or 12 M-a-i-e-r, or --13 MR. MEYER: M-e-y-e-r. 14 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you. 15 Please proceed. 16 MR. MEYER: I've lived on Cambridge Avenue 17 now for about 13 years, and I've actually lived on the 18 east side of Milwaukee for the last 37 years, so I'm 19 very familiar with the trials and tribulations of 20 businesses and neighbors trying to get along with each 21 other on the east side of Milwaukee. 22 I worked for a period of time at the Open 23 Pantry, and I've dealt with Mr. Lee when I worked 24 there, and then I also have been an occasional patron

of Mr. Lee, so I've been at the tavern and observed

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what goes on. I've been on the street at various times of the night and observed what goes on, and I really believe that I have honestly never seen a business that has done more to try to meet the problems of trying to get along with the neighbors.

And this is one of those unique corners where a very strong business district abuts onto a very busy residential area, and Cambridge Avenue in and of itself is a very busy street just because of the fact that it's one of those back-street ways of getting across town. So the traffic that comes down that street is far beyond than just the businesses on that street.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Mr. Meyer. Questions by the committee? Thank you for your testimony, Mr. Meyer. Sir, we'll take you next. Again, your name and address for the record. And if you have a difficult name, would you spell it for the record.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ GERMANOTTA: Mr. Chairman, would you like me to do the questioning? Maybe I can get to more of the important points.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: I would prefer to hear testimony from the individuals themselves here. If at some point it becomes necessary, -- I mean we don't

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have anybody in objection. We don't want to prolong this any longer than we have to.

MR. SCHULTZ: My name is J.J. Schultz, S-c-h-u-l-t-z, and I'm head doorman at Judge's. And just as they said before, 45 minutes before the end of the night, we have somebody out on the corner, and we have somebody down the street to try and prevent people from doing things that are not necessary.

And as they said before, we also try and watch the videotape that is to our side throughout the night to make sure there aren't any problems. If there are, we try to identify those people as soon as possible, and we do not let them back in. I think that's just about it.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions by committee? ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Wade.

ALDERMAN WADE: So with your observation of the camera and with you being out on the street, how often -- how frequently do you actually have to deter people from doing things like that? I mean would you say that the general population gets the point, or --

 $\,$ MR. SCHULTZ: Yeah, for the most part they get the point throughout the night, and we also make an announcement at the end of the night to be

6	by Mr. Lee to do this then?
7	MR. WOLF: Yes, I am.
8	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Anything else you want
9	to add?
10	MR. WOLF: No.
11	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions by committee?
12	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.
13	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Wade.
14	ALDERMAN WADE: In your job do you find that
15	there's not a lot of people actually bringing bottles
16	or containers outside the bar? I mean do you
17	MR. WOLF: I very rarely see that kind of
18	stuff outside the bar. It's mostly fast food garbage
19	and stuff of that nature.
20	ALDERMAN WADE: So you're not picking up
21	beer bottles and beer cans and things like that?
22	MR. WOLF: Very rarely. Most of the stuff
23	is like from the homeless and stuff like that.
24	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: And that's not to say
25	that somebody couldn't drink and bring something from

00026 their vehicle, or --1 MR. WOLF: Yeah. 3 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Because there's other 4 establishments in the general vicinity, and since 5 parking is at a premium, if you've got to park a block 6 away and you park in front of his establishment to go 7 across the street, it's not to say the customer is 8 going to his place necessarily or vice versa. 9 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. 10 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Puente. 11 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Real quick, what time of 12 day do you pick up? 13 MR. WOLF: Usually in the afternoon around 14 1:00. 15 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you. 16 MR. GERMANOTTA: Mr. Chairman. 17 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Germanotta. 18 MR. GERMANOTTA: To summarize then, Mr. Lee 19 pays you to clean the neighborhood for two blocks even 20 though almost none of the refuse there is as a result 21 of his tavern? 22 MR. LEE: That's correct. 23 MR. GERMANOTTA: Thank you. 2.4 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, sir. Ma'am, 25 we'll take you next.

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MS. OSBORNE: My name is Carol Osborne. I also live at 2206 North Cambridge. I lived next door for 15 years next to the bar, and now I live across the street, and I am raising my grandchildren. They're school age. Trust me, if there's any noise, I'm the first one to go to Mr. Lee and tell him, and I'm also a light sleeper. If there's any noise, I get up, it's a two and a half story building. I can see all over. I know when there's something going on at Judge's.

I can see across North Avenue to where the coffee shop is, and most of our problems are from there. And in the alleys, since they paved that, there's lots of skateboarders and lots of noise, and I have a lot of problem with street people urinating in my yard during the day in front of my grandchildren, and there has been nothing from the bar. Since they remodeled and added bathrooms, you hardly ever see anyone outside urinating, so that's really helped.

Also, if I see a bottle outside, I tell my son about it, and we know what Judge's sells, and a lot of times if there is a bottle, it's something that Judge's doesn't carry, so we know definitely it doesn't come from the bar, and that's all I have to say.

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1	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions by committee?
2	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
3	VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Puente.
4	ALDERMAN PUENTE: If you had issues, Have
5	you ever had issues with Mr. Lee?
6	MS. OSBORNE: Oh, yeah, if there's noise.
7	ALDERMAN PUENTE: And how did he address
8	your issues?
9	MS. OSBORNE: He also owns the building
10	right next to us, and these young people have a band.
11	If after 10:00 they're making noise, Mr. Lee takes
12	care of it immediately. The music is off.
13	ALDERMAN PUENTE: In a different location
14	than his tavern?
15	MS. OSBORNE: Pardon?
16	ALDERMAN PUENTE: In a different location
17	than his tavern?
18	MS. OSBORNE: Yes, mostly definitely. So
19	trust me, my kids have to get their sleep, you know,
20	and I do watch for Mr. Lee, and I do talk to the
21	neighbors, you know, and I want to hear their
22	complaints, too, so I can relay them to Mr. Lee.
23	And trust me, I do. And if there's noise or something
24	going on, you know, the next day I'm on the phone.
25	ALDERMAN PUENTE: And he takes care of your

00029 1 concerns immediately? MS. OSBORNE: Immediately. 3 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Thank you. 4 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Miss 5 Osborne. Anyone else? Sir. 6 MR. JENSON: Hello, I'm Marshall Jenson. 7 I can pretty much say the exact same things J.J. said. 8 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Jenson, your 9 address for the record? 10 MR. JENSON: Oh, I'm sorry. 2900 North 11 Newhall Avenue. 12 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: You look awfully 13 familiar here. 14 MR. JENSON: You know, like they stated 15 before, 45 minutes before closing we always have 16 doormen outside making sure that if -- not necessarily 17 they don't have to deal with people urinating outside, 18 but more or less the nature that they do more often 19 is, hey, could you please be quiet for our neighbors, 20 respect them, because that is our number one issue 21 because -- I mean we have to get along with the 22 neighbors, there's no doubt about that. We have the 23 surveillance that we have outside. I'm also, when 24 I'm behind the bar, checking occasionally to see if 25 there's anything going on.

00030 1 Cambridge is a really busy place, and 2 especially since Node opened, we've had a lot more traffic on Cambridge Avenue than we ever did before. 4 And I've been working for Mike for about five years 5 now, and you can obviously tell the difference since 6 they moved in. 7 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Just to clarify the 8 comments, you appeared before the committee just a few 9 days ago here. 10 MR. JENSON: That is correct, yes. 11 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions by committee 12 of Mr. Jenson? Mr. Germanotta? 13 MR. GERMANOTTA: No, none. VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. All right. 14 15 Mr. Germanotta, I'm going to allow you any last-minute 16 comments you have before we take it into committee. 17 MR. GERMANOTTA: I don't want to be 18 repetitive here. I think it's obvious he's had a long 19 run at this place. He's taken extraordinary steps. 20 He has the support of his alderperson, neighbors. He 21 wouldn't have that support, he wouldn't have this 22 record, unless he was doing a lot of things right, so 23 I would ask that you do renew this license without 24 conditions.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any last-minute

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00031 1 questions by the committee? This matter is in committee. Is there a motion? 3 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. 4 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Puente. 5 ALDERMAN PUENTE: I'm going to recommend 6 approval, not taking into consideration the cases that 7 are still pending as the cases before us. Again, we 8 have to find out what the disposition of those pending 9 cases are before ruling on them. However, I would 10 like to take those into consideration in the next 11 year. 12 Also, Item No. 13, seeing how the owner and 13 the police have acknowledged that there was a 14 likelihood that he didn't even -- wasn't even aware of this incident, so I see just No. 14 as something to be 15 16 considered at this time. Based on that, I would 17 recommend approval. 18 VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: The motion by Alderman 19

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VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: The motion by Alderman Puente is for approval of the licensed application, and Mr. Lee, Mr. Germanotta, just so you're aware, what he is indicating is that what is listed here on the last page as three, that his decision is -- or his motion for approval is not considering that item because it hasn't been adjudicated. It would potentially allow the committee to weigh any guilty

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findings during the next licensing period, so that is an acceptable motion. Are there any -- Is there any discussion by committee on that motion?

ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chairman.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: On the motion, Alderman

Dudzik.

ALDERMAN DUDZIK: I just want to point out to all those in the viewing audience that this is just another case, in my opinion, of what a reservoir of goodwill can do for a business owner. I don't mean to point out strictly liquor licenses, but I've seen this on more than one occasion where a company has done good work for an extended period of time, does run into a situation where they have bad employees or a streak of bad luck, and this committee sees fit to allow the license to go forward, and that's my only comment.

ALDERMAN WADE: Yeah. On the motion I want to congratulate Mr. Lee for doing such a good job for such a long time, unlike a lot of people who come in front of this committee. I've been to the bar several times throughout my life; younger, mid, and while I'm old, but it is a real nice establishment. It's a hot

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spot in Milwaukee, it's popular, and has been run very professional for a long time.

I just like when people come to the committee, and they do the things that's necessary to get along with the residents. I mean I would almost go as far as to say that you may even need to, if you have any spare time, to write a book on "how to" so we can advise people to purchase it. Well, congratulations.

MR. LEE: Thank you very much, sir.

VICE CHAIRMAN BOHL: Before we take the
motion up, Mr. Lee, I just want to say I am going to
support the motion, although I won't necessarily go as
far as Alderman Wade. I mean we still have five
instances.

I think clearly, you know, we can say that you are certainly doing some due diligence on your part with cameras and the signage, and that's all appreciated. At the same point, you do have a very large establishment, and that area tends to draw a younger crowd, and many people from the UWM area, a lot of students.

You know, I see a number of items with public urination. That's not even to guarantee that every person is coming from your establishment,

but as much as you do have the ability, I would
encourage you to continue to work on it. It's darn
shameful when people want to use the public street and
neighbors' lawns as a cesspool to relieve themselves.
And as much as you're doing, you know, I'd certainly
encourage you to continue to work at it, and so we
hopefully don't see any of those items come before us
in the future.

With that said, motion by Alderman Puente is for approval of the licensed application to exclude the last item that is still pending, and hearing no objections to that, so ordered. It is 12:00. This committee will be recessed until 1:30.
