tavern took the appropriate action in dealing with someone who was unruly.

In terms of the gambling place charge. My client accepted responsibility and paid a fine. That was at a time when the law was being changed, and there was a lot of confusion concerning the legality of these machines. And at that particular time distributors had begun to put these machines back into the taverns. I believe there is supposed to be some clarification with the city ordinance in conjunction with the state law, so that hopefully these matters will be cleared up. He does not have those machines on there - - in the premise anymore, and he accepted responsibility for that.

In terms of incident 14, Mr. Quinn has - - has accepted responsibility for that and paid a fine. What has happened here is he originally had a doorman who would check all of the IDs. For approximately the last seven or eight months he has not had that. He has hired somebody, so that that does not become a problem. I'd just like to point out that these are not tickets for sale to underage, but they were tickets for presence of underage. And he's mindful of that

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on the court records.

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MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. But you said that there were underage citations issued to the customers?

SERGEANT HOGAN: All four underage persons were cited for presence of underage.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Did they go to a guilty finding?

SERGEANT HOGAN: We don't know the status of what the underage individuals --

There has been some problems with the neighborhood, and in this particular incident there was a letter addressed to Alderman Bohl. To my understanding, then Alderman Bohl came out and met with my client, and they had a discussion, and Alderman Bohl had suggested that there were some concerns about the alleyway that's behind the premises, and that there was traffic going through there, and it - - it borders a residential neighborhood with children. Toward that end Alderman Bohl had suggested, perhaps, putting in a fence, which was something that was done at another business, I believe, on the other side of the block. And Mr. Quinn has done that. I have, and I showed to Alderman Bohl, the fence that blocks the alleyway. He posted 2,000 dollars, the total cost is 4,000 dollars, and the job would be done in about four to six weeks, weather permitting. And we have that contract, and I did show that to Alderman

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Bohl. Toward that end I would ask that there be a renewal despite the police objection, and I would also reserve the right depending upon what the neighborhood objection is to address that. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you, Mr. Bishop. I know that Judy Keller is here. We know Judy, because she's the Director of the Greater Mitchell Street Association. She's a neighbor. MR. BISHOP: Part of the problem, and I had dealt with Mr. Quinn, and I appreciate the question, is that the - - the distributors at the

tickets, as well?

THE APPLICANT: Yeah, they told me they were legal, who sold them to me, the guys that sold them to me.

ALDERMAN HERRON: Was that the same company that sold you the machines?

THE APPLICANT: No. No. That's different guys.

I mean, you know, you obviously had a situation which is a reccurring problem?

THE APPLICANT: That probably was my fault, not calling, but every - - every bar in my neighborhood's got - - got the machines. So I - - I figured it was okay. And a lot of them got picked up, too, before. You know. And they had them back in there.

MR. SCHRIMPF: Well, Mis - - Mr. Chairman, I think there's some confusion here,

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because the answer was in terms of machines, but I believe the question was in terms of tickets, lottery tickets.

CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, my question was for both, actually, because both are illegal and, you know - - you know, I - - you know, I always error on the side of caution in those situations, you know, you - - If you're not sure it's 65 miles an hour, you probably should do 55 just to be sure that you're not ten over is my point. Okay, any other questions of Mr. Quinn. If not, go ahead, Alderman Bohl.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I met with Mr. Quinn. I had some neighborhood concerns, even in the course of campaigning, about Mr. Quinn's establishment. Among the concerns were - - were noise in the past. Other situations involve the - - the open alleyway in which there were - - there were cars, oftentimes with individuals who may be inebriated, were driving through the alleyway at times at high rates of speed. I - - I went out to Mis - - to meet Mr. Quinn. I relayed some of the concerns that I had regarding that, and I made a request to him for a fence in the back of

And I have not been a thorn in his side over the years. I've been - - I feel, pretty accommodating.

I'm - - I'm very fond of my neighbors and my neighborhood, and I know some neighbors that I - - I like a lot with many little kids are moving, and part of their decision to do that was because of the establishment. It was my suggestion that he contain his clientele so they leave by way of Appleton Avenue rather than the alley, because I felt it was - - they felt they could filter out through the neighborhood easier after drinking than - - than going on the main thoroughfare. And even though I'm not a wimp myself, but after - - after work if I go change and I'm in shorts, weeding in the backyard or something, it's pretty unnerving to have some inebriated clientele go on a sightseeing tour down the alley and stop the car and gawk at you. I just don't like it.

The kids ride their bikes up and down the alley. They come and visit me so they can play in the backyard with my dog. I just don't think it's safe. So as long as he is going to

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the alleyway, and he has - - he has obliged that.

I do have a number of concerns with re - - with regards to the establishment. I feel that at times Mr. Quinn has been very arrogant in his relationship with the - - the neighborhood, at times has - - has been very standoffish with regards to neighbors' concerns. I - - I, as well, have had severe concerns with regards to - - to three incidents of - - of gambling in his establishment. Prior to - - to hearing from his attorney last week I was prepared to recommend a - - quite a severe suspension, but because Mr. Ouinn has moved forward with - - with the fence and has taken some measures to insure that - that there will not be individuals underage in his establishment in the future, I - - I would still continue as a warning to suggest and recommend to the committee a suspension of ten days along with the renewal.

We'll obviously see where this goes in a second, but I think that there's been some movement for progress, but not enough to satisfy me at this point. I personally just think 30 days is too severe. If we're going

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have some suggestions. I feel like that he has a record and we've seen it's over and over as repeating, and I feel like a ten day suspension is too - - is a too mild of a statement to give a warning to him. The last time it was up, it was the same thing. This time now his renewal is it's the same thing over - - So it's a repeater. And if we give him a ten day suspension, that is to me is too mild of a punishment to say he had learned his lesson. If this was occurring last time and it took him a whole year to get the fence up, to me is - - is the alderperson is saying he's kind of vague on certain issues, and I'm feeling as though if he was going to be cooperative and understanding and responsible to the community and the residents concerns, he should have a 30 day suspension.
