2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Jordan Beck, Mill
3	Valley Recycling, LLC, 1006 South Barclay Street,
4	Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53204. This is a Mill
5	Valley Recycling, LLC junk dealer renewal
6	application for Mill Valley recycling, 1006 South
7	Barclay Street.
8	MR. GIMBEL: Mr. Chairman.
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Good afternoon.
10	MR. GIMBEL: My name is Franklyn
11	Gimbel. This is Joanne Beck, who is seated to my
12	left, and to her left is Attorney Michael
13	Maistelman, who is assisting me in connection
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Does your partner
15	know?
16	MR. GIMBEL: In connection with this
17	matter, he is assisting me. I have many partners
18	in the universe. Some I know. Some I don't
19	know. But for the sake of this case, yes, he is
20	my partner.
21	MR. MAISTELMAN: And it would be
22	Hanukkah, Mr. Bohl, not not Christmas for us.
23	MR. GIMBEL: In any event
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: So noted.
25	MR. GIMBEL: In any event, I I

00003 1 ALDERMAN BOHL: I'll remember that when 2 I consider my - -MR. GIMBEL: I would like to make a 3 4 predicate statement, Mr. Chairman. 5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Before we start, 6 do you - - do you admit to receiving the notice? 7 MR. GIMBEL: Yes, of course. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. 9 MR. GIMBEL: It has come to my 10 attention that Jordan Beck, who passed away very 11 untimely in November of 2005 is the registered 12 agent on the application. Joanne Beck, his 13 sister, is running the business and has run the 14 business for a substantial period of time, even 15 during the time that Jordan was there. I 16 believe, discussing with Ms. Barron the technical 17 requirements of this license, that it would be a 18 technical requirement for there to be a 19 substitution agent that would be a part of the 20 application process, which would require some 21 background check. 22 What I'm going to ask the committee 23 today to do is to consider this application with 2.4 the proviso that between the time of this 25 committee's recommendation and the time that this

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          matter would be submitted to the Common Council,

          that we would be able to accommodate the
          substitution of agents and have a background
          check done. I have no doubt, whatsoever, that

         Ms. Beck would pass the background with flying

          colors. She is a person who has lived in this

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00005 1 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Does that conclude 2 your opening statement? 3 MR. GIMBEL: It does. 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Can I see a 5 show of hands of - - of who is here from the 6 neighborhood to testify concerning Mill Valley 7 Recycling, 1006 South Barclay? Would you all 8 please, if you're going to testify, keep your 9 right hands - - right hands raised, please? 10 We're going to swear you all in at the same time. 11 Raise - - Raise your right hands if you're going 12 to testify on this matter. You don't have to 13 stand. But raise your right hands. Hold your 14 right hands up. Go ahead. 15 (Whereupon the witnesses were sworn.) 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: What we're going 17 to do is we're going to take testimony one person 18 at a time. We're going to ask you to stand at 19 the microphone over here. Please don't be 20 offended that we don't ask you to sit. If we have like one or two people to testify, we ask 21 22 them to sit. If we have more people to testify, 23 which we do in this case, we ask them to stand by 2.4 the microphone. So please don't be offended.

And I'd like the - - the opponents, the

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people that are opposed to the renewal of this license to come forward first to this microphone, and state your name and address, and then - - and then your testimony. Try to be specific, and - - and not redundant. Good afternoon.

THE WITNESS: Good afternoon. My name is Sherry Tussler. I live at 1103 South 4th Street, which is the corner of 4th and Washington.

And I oppose renewal of the license, because I have problems with the number of people who move through the front of my house on 4th Street on their way to Mill Valley Recycling. And the amount of things that they steal from my yard or off the side of my house. Shopping carts frequently leave the near south side and traverse down Washington Street. And I've lost my downspouts repeatedly, my Weber grill, my outdoor furniture.

Some people know that I once ran the Homeless Shelter on the Milwaukee south side, the Hope House. I have nothing against the homeless, absolutely nothing. But I view what happens with the theft of metal in the neighborhood more a problem of the people who are paying for the

00007 1 metal rather than a problem of the people who need the money. And I guess I would consider it tantamount to a pawn shop broker accepting stolen 4 goods. And it's a problem for us in Walker's 5 Point. 6 Yesterday I got my assessment and the 7 value of my house increased 30 percent. I'm 8 going to pay an extra thousand dollars next year 9 to live in Walker's Point. And living that close 10 to the recycling facility has become troublesome 11 for a lot of us, and I think that we have the 12 right to live free of the crime that is caused as 13 a result of the operation of Mill Valley. 14 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you, Ms. 15 Tussler. Just stay there. Questions? 16 MR. GIMBEL: Yes. 17 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. 18 MR. GIMBEL: Ms. Tussler, when did you 19 move into your home at 1103 South 4th Street? 20 THE WITNESS: 2000. 21 MR. GIMBEL: And you say in your 22 testimony to this committee that you observe 23 people stealing materials? 2.4 THE WITNESS: Yes. 25 MR. GIMBEL: When did you observe such

          my backyard. I had painted them to match my

6	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. And that's
7	your complaint about this license application?
8	THE WITNESS: I also think that the
9	operation is dirty, messy and a negative for our
10	neighborhood.
11	MR. GIMBEL: Now, you live several
12	blocks away from this particular location, do you
13	not?
14	THE WITNESS: Yes, I do.
15	MR. GIMBEL: Okay. And And do you
16	go over there Do you walk over there or
17	bicycle over there on a regular basis?
18	THE WITNESS: Go down there for coffee,
19	that sort of thing, yeah. 1st and 2nd Street
20	have really picked up.
21	MR. GIMBEL: All right.
22	THE WITNESS: It's really a changed
23	neighborhood.
24	MR. GIMBEL: And was this business in
25	its current location doing essentially what it's

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1	doing today at the time you acquired your
2	residence?
3	THE WITNESS: Yes.
4	MR. GIMBEL: Did you survey the
5	neighborhood before you bought or rented your
6	property?
7	THE WITNESS: Yes, I was aware that it
8	was there.
9	MR. GIMBEL: And were you aware of the
10	type of operation that they had there?
11	THE WITNESS: Yes.
12	MR. GIMBEL: And you made the decision,
13	nonetheless, to move in the neighborhood.
14	Correct?
15	THE WITNESS: Yes, I did.
16	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. Nothing else.
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Any
18	committee members have any questions of this
19	witness? Okay. Thank you.
20	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Next witness,
22	please.
23	THE WITNESS: My name is Suzanne
24	Pierce. I live at 910 South 3rd Street, and I've
25	lived there for 13 years.

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I have witnessed the shopping carts, the abandoned shopping carts that get lined up in the alley directly acro - - I'm sorry. It's one block south of Mill Valley, an alley that runs between Barclay and 1st Street. And at one count there were 16 abandoned shopping carts sitting there. And it's a very well-known fact that those shopping carts are used by recyclers who collect what they can on their way to Mill Valley to sell it for money. There's a line-up of carts there right now, because I came by there on my way over here.

Federal Manufacturing has a facility on 2nd Street. They start on the corner of Walker and 2nd, and their building runs to the south. And they have a storage yard of materials that they have used in their manufacturing that abuts on an abandoned alley that runs from 3rd Street across to - - used to go to 2nd Street, but when Federal, at one time, expanded their building, it became an abandoned alley, and they didn't - - they cut off the end of that alley. So this storage yard that they have abuts onto this abandoned alley, and it became a place for recyclers to stop and pick up whatever they could

find that they thought they might get money for. I own property on the edge of that abandoned alley. I own an income property there, and I live right next door to it. My tenants in that property were very fearful because - -

MR. GIMBEL: I have to object to her telling about what everybody else was, except what she has personal knowledge of.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We - - We can't - - We - - We really can't hear any hearsay. It has to be - - $\,$

THE WITNESS: Okay. Then I don't need to tell you about my tenants, other than - - than they telling me that they were very concerned. Because I actually did witness somebody stealing things from the - - They've cut a - - They've cut through the fence of this storage yard, and I want - I saw a truck go back there, and knowing it's not a through alley, I walked over myself to see what was going on. And they were hauling through the fence some large piece of metal from the storage yard. When I said to them, and they were putting it into a - - actually a very - - a ramshackle truck, and I said to them, "What are you doing?" And they said, "Oh, the owner

00013 1 has - -2 MR. GIMBEL: I'm going to object to this, as well, Mr. Chairman. I have no ability 3 4 to cross-examine whoever it is that this witness 5 says she had a conversation with. 6 THE WITNESS: When I questioned them 7 about what they were doing - -CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your objection's 8 9 noticed, but I - - I'd like to hear this. 10 MR. GIMBEL: Okay. 11 THE WITNESS: When they - - When I 12 questioned them about what they were doing, they 13 jumped into this truck and just absolutely sped 14 off. It was - - It was evident to me that this 15 was - - that they were stealing something from 16 that yard, and I know that the owner doesn't ask 17 people to move things like that. They have their 18 own employees that do that. And I know what a 19 lot of their employees, who they are. So it 20 wasn't an employee. 21 I called the police about that, but it 22 was - - The person was long gone. I gave them a 23 license number, and - - but they were long gone 24 by the time the police got there. 25 I pick up metal, scrap, in the street

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that is very sharp. Frequently it's broken off from something, whatever, and there's two ways that it gets there. One is off of a Mill Valley truck, which is very seldom have I seen one that had any kind of tie-down tarp to prevent anything from bouncing off the truck. Or it gets there by bouncing out of a shopping cart which is on its way to Mill Valley.

There is no doubt in any neighbor's mind when you see a stream of shopping carts heading from the west to the east on usually Monday morning to take their goods over to Mill Valley to sell. There's no question but what that's what - - what it is for. They're not going to the lake side for a spa visit or something. They are actually taking, because their shopping carts are full of abandoned metal pieces, and they're taking them over to the person who will buy them from them. And the sharp metal that I find in the street is very dangerous.

But to have Mr. Gimbel say you don't know that these people were going to Mill Valley. Yeah, we do know, Mr. Gimbel, indeed, we do know that's where they're going. Well, I'm speaking

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1	for you, too.
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Well, we're going
3	to we're going to keep this before we get
4	rolling any further. We're going to keep this
5	very civilized. I want everything factual.
6	THE WITNESS: Okay.
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I want facts,
8	unemotional, and I want and no hearsay.
9	THE WITNESS: Okay.
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I'm not staying
11	here until midnight. I'm not putting up with any
12	bull from anybody.
13	THE WITNESS: And that's all that I
14	have.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: There's going to
16	be no barbs, no arguments back and forth.
17	THE WITNESS: I'm sorry.
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Comprende'?
19	THE WITNESS: Oh, of course. Thank you
20	very much.
21	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. Mr. Chair.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Wait a minute.
23	Wait a minute. Now we have questions for you.
24	ALDERMAN WADE: Yeah, I do have a
25	question.

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1	THE WITNESS: Sure.
2	ALDERMAN WADE: You and the person that
3	spoke before you indicated that there are
4	are lines of shopping carts. Now, does the
5	Mill work people provide these shopping carts or
6	where do these shopping carts come from?
7	THE WITNESS: No. They're taken from
8	grocery stores.
9	ALDERMAN WADE: So one of the local
10	grocery stores around Oh, just
11	THE WITNESS: I don't know. I usually
12	look to see where they came from, and sometimes
13	they're from stores that are no longer in
14	business. They'll say, "Kroger's," which used to
15	be down on Chase. They'll I don't
16	Whatever. They come But they're They're
17	shopping carts that come from grocery stores in
18	the neighborhood.
19	ALDERMAN WADE: Just one
20	THE WITNESS: And they are taken.
21	ALDERMAN WADE: One more question. Are
22	the shopping carts plastic or metal?
23	THE WITNESS: Both.
24	ALDERMAN WADE: They're both. So after
25	they get finished with the shopping carts, that's

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1	how they end up, lined up?
2	THE WITNESS: No, I think that they
3	If they're damaged, they just abandon them there.
4	ALDERMAN WADE: And they line them up
5	somewhere near the
6	THE WITNESS: Well, I don't know who
7	lines them up in the alley.
8	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. All right.
9	Thank you.
10	THE WITNESS: That's where you see
11	them.
12	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay.
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We had an And,
14	Ms. Pierce, I don't know. Are you familiar with
15	We had a meeting actually with El Rey one
16	time, because we had noticed that a lot of the El
17	Rey
18	THE WITNESS: Yes.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: carts were
20	down there, and and actually were Ernesto
21	Villa Royale. And they vowed to keep better
22	track of their carts from from getting away.
23	And they would actually come down there and pick
24	them up if they were if they were called,
25	because they'd get filled up and they'd get

00018 1 abandoned down there. And El Rey would actually 2 send a van over there to pick them up. But 3 obviously they don't - - they don't encourage 4 people taking their shopping carts. They 5 just - -6 THE WITNESS: Um-hnh. 7 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair, if I 8 just - -9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead, Alderman 10 Wade. 11 ALDERMAN WADE: I know - - I don't want 12 to make this long, but I have a - - a recy - -13 cycling place in my district, and I have Lena's 14 Food Store carts going there, and they worked out 15 an arrangement. But, also, what they did was 16 they - - they wouldn't accept business from 17 people who came with a shopping cart. So now 18 when you look up and down Fond du Lac, you see 19 people going with old baby buggies with all this 20 - - They have old baby buggies with all this junk 21 on it. And that was because the people who do 22 the recycling refused to take it if it came in a 23 shopping cart. 2.4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Please stay there.

And please don't be offended by anything. This

12	which is a block and a half south of Mill Valley.
13	Correct?
14	THE WITNESS: It's I know it's over
15	there, yes.
16	MR. GIMBEL: And And Miller
17	Compressing. You know where that is?
18	THE WITNESS: Um-hnh. Yes, I do.
19	MR. GIMBEL: And you know that they do
20	essentially the same kind of activity that Mill
21	Valley does?
22	THE WITNESS: Yes. Yes.
23	MR. GIMBEL: And is it your testimony
24	here today that you have personal knowledge that
25	that those people who you believe are
	- -

1	stealing scrap metal that has some recycle value,
2	are are employees or have some relationship
3	with Mill Valley as against these other
4	enterprises?
5	THE WITNESS: I think a few of the
6	other enterprises do not buy scrap from people
7	who are pushing them in shopping carts.
8	MR. GIMBEL: Now, what information do
9	you have about that? Tell me, specifically.
10	THE WITNESS: I believe that that is
11	true. I don't have I can't quote you a
12	person who said that from anyone of Mill Valley.
13	MR. GIMBEL: So you have no personal
14	knowledge of that.
15	THE WITNESS: No, I don't.
16	MR. GIMBEL: Is that accurate?
17	THE WITNESS: That's accurate.
18	MR. GIMBEL: And do you know that
19	that El Rey has caused those people who take
20	shopping carts away from their premises to be
21	ticketed by the police?
22	THE WITNESS: Yes, I'm very aware of
23	that.
24	MR. GIMBEL: And do you think Never
25	mind. No more questions.

00021 1 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you. 2 Any - - Any committee members have any questions of this witness? Okay. Thank you very much. THE WITNESS: Thank you. 4 5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Next witness, 6 please? 7 THE WITNESS: Hello. My name is 8 Richard Kaul. I live at 1033 South 3rd Street. 9 I also own the property at 1023 and 1039 South 10 3rd Street. So the homes on either side of 1033 11 South 3rd Street. I've lived there - - Come May 12 1st I will have lived there for 26 years. 13 My property at 1023 South 3rd Street 14 has had gutters or downspouts taken no less than 15 four times from the property, because it's on the 16 alley, one of these offender alleys. Most people 17 who live in that neighborhood have seen the carts 18 come down. We also are subjected to people going 19 through our garbage and recycling bins, open - -20 opening them up. I went to the point of putting things in plastic, so that they wouldn't get 21 22 scattered all over the place. They just slit the 23 plastic to go through and look for - - for metal 2.4 objects in the garbage.

So they come into the yard. My

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1	downspouts People have entered my yard to
2	take downspouts. And And it's been, in
3	general, a problem. I've lost one tenant who was
4	a single female who In addition to She
5	was told that if she didn't put metal in in
6	her recycling bin, that that then she had to
7	pay them a panhandling fee. And she finally
8	left. These are homeless people, generally, I
9	speak of.
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Does that conclude
11	your testimony?
12	THE WITNESS: Yes.
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Gimbel, do you
14	have
15	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you, yes. Mr. Kaul,
16	do you have any personal knowledge that any
17	employee or anyone associated with Mill Valley
18	was involved in the behavior that you're talking
19	about?
20	THE WITNESS: I do not.
21	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. I have nothing
22	further.
23	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any questions by
24	members of the committee of this witness? Thank
25	you. Next Next witness, please? Go ahead.

00023 1 THE WITNESS: My name is Doug Quigley. 2 I - - I live at 1110 - -MR. GIMBEL: I missed the last name. 4 Could I - - Could I get that, please? 5 THE WITNESS: Quiq - - Quigley. 6 MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. 7 THE WITNESS: I live at 1110 South 1st. 8 I'm a block away. My kitchen window overlooks 9 Mill Valley. 10 We - - We've had problems with this 11 operation for a long time. Heavy trucks that are 12 - - and overloaded pick-ups that spill scrap 13 metal onto the street. And I do see this. And I 14 do see the trucks going to Mill Valley from my 15 home. Their clients still leave shopping carts 16 throughout the neighborhood. I do see the 17 clients pushing them. I know where they're 18 pushing them to. And I followed the cli - - one 19 of the clients to your operation with stolen 20 brass nozzles from my yard, and I've had to steal them back. Recyclable material is stolen from 21 22 neighboring properties, as well. 23 I think they've outgrown their 2.4 boundaries. The sidewalks on both east and west 25 sides of Barclay are blocked with heavy

2.4

equipment. Just on our way here today I - - I arrived with Suzanne Pierce, and we drove down Barclay, and there was a semitrailer blocking the sidewalk at 1106 Barclay. It was protruding into the street. So there's no way to even walk on the sidewalk.

I've lived here since 1990. In the early '90s the sidewalk had to be replaced. Since then the sidewalks become rubble because of the heavy equipment and has to be replaced again. Activity at this location, throughout the day heavy equipment continues to block sidewalks at night. If you're driving down Barclay during the day, it's as if you're intruding on a private operation, even though this is supposed to be a through street. There's been investment here from Busalacci and others. As the Greede Foundry is demolished it - - it will be more - - become even more important that Barclay is unobstructed. They've outgrown this - - this property and I ask that their renewal be denied.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.

MR. GIMBEL: Yes. Mr. Quigley, you say that you observed somebody steal some brass fittings. Is that what you said? From - - From

property that you own?
THE WITNESS: Yes.
MR. GIMBEL: And you followed it to
Mill Valley?
THE WITNESS: Yes.
MR. GIMBEL: Did you call the police?
THE WITNESS: No.
MR. GIMBEL: Why?
THE WITNESS: Because I was able to
take care of the situation myself.
MR. GIMBEL: I see.
THE WITNESS: I took I took his
entire load of scrap and I gave it to somebody
else waiting in line. So his entire collection
for that day was for naught.
MR. GIMBEL: "His," meaning who? Not
an employee of Mill Valley?
THE WITNESS: No, it's a long-haired
guy who has been walking the streets for a long
time. He goes past my property every day.
MR. GIMBEL: Now, you're telling this
committee, as I'm understanding what you're
saying, that you believe that there are
violations of Milwaukee Ordinances, County
Ordinances, and State laws?

00026 1 THE WITNESS: By Mill Valley or by the 2 clients of Mill Valley? 3 MR. GIMBEL: By anybody in your 4 neighborhood? 5 THE WITNESS: Yes. 6 MR. GIMBEL: And have you called the 7 police about those violations that you've 8 observed? 9 THE WITNESS: I haven't - - Yes, I 10 have. And I've - - I've written several letters 11 to the Alderman. 12 MR. GIMBEL: And - - And did the police 13 respond to your complaints about crimes being 14 committed in your presence? THE WITNESS: Somewhat, yes. They - -15 16 They've - - They've cracked down. They've - -17 They've given tickets to the homeless people that 18 - - that push the shopping carts, but how are 19 they going to pay it, you know? They - - They 20 don't care. They don't pay it. What's going to 21 happen to them? They're not going to end up in 22 jail. They're homeless, anyway. 23 MR. GIMBEL: Is - - Is it your intention here, Mr. Quigley, to - - to lay blame 2.4 25 on the proprietors of Mill Valley for the fact

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1	that there are homeless people
2	THE WITNESS: Yes. They're a magnet
3	for for They're a magnet for trouble,
4	yes.
5	MR. GIMBEL: So that's your That's
6	your objection to the committee, that that
7	but for Mill Valley, there wouldn't be homeless
8	people.
9	THE WITNESS: I didn't say that.
10	MR. GIMBEL: I have no further
11	questions.
12	ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair.
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Questions by
14	members of the committee? Alderman Wade.
15	ALDERMAN WADE: Sir, the the truck
16	that you stated was blocking the sidewalk, was
17	that truck unloading, or is it just parked
18	THE WITNESS: No, it was just It
19	was just parked.
20	ALDERMAN WADE: Just parked there.
21	THE WITNESS: It was just parked. It
22	was
23	ALDERMAN WADE: It wasn't unloading and
24	leaving.
25	THE WITNESS: No, it was just parked.

1	It was a trailer.
2	ALDERMAN WADE: And that's normal for
3	it to be parked there.
4	THE WITNESS: Yes. I mean, it
5	shouldn't be, but it is.
6	ALDERMAN WADE: Thank you.
7	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik?
9	Oh, Mr. Schrimpf.
10	MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you. Mr. Quigley,
11	these trucks, did they have any Mill Valley
12	parking or Mill Valley markings on them? How
13	did you know they were associated with Mill
14	Valley?
15	THE WITNESS: They're on their parking
16	lot. They're They're on their property, and
17	they protrude onto the street.
18	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Thank you.
19	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chairman.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik.
21	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: You got it that time.
22	Just a couple of real quick things, Mr. Quigley.
23	First of all, are you aware that the City does
24	grant permits to businesses to have semis back up
25	and thus block the street, or at the sidewalk?

1	THE WITNESS: Block block it 24
2	hours a day?
3	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Not necessarily 24
4	hours a day, but
5	THE WITNESS: You know, I I can
6	understand, yeah. If If you're unloading or
7	loading, that's fine. But to to block it,
8	you know, when when the operation is closed,
9	that's not legal.
10	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: That That
11	That's true. I just wanted to kind of narrow it
12	down, whether it's an all day operation or just
13	part of the day.
14	The other thing, you said that the
15	sidewalks had been repaired in the 14 years
16	you've been there?
17	THE WITNESS: Yes.
18	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: How long ago was
19	that?
20	THE WITNESS: Well, the sidewalks are
21	labeled. So I believe it was like '92.
22	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: '92? Because
23	THE WITNESS: You You worked for
24	the Department of Public Works, so you
25	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: That's where I'm

1	going.
2	THE WITNESS: Yeah.
3	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Thank you. I'll get
4	there. My The reason I mention that is if
5	they're 15 years or or newer, which is what
6	you just indicated, the City will replace them at
7	no cost to the property owner, because the
8	property owner paid for them in the first place.
9	THE WITNESS: Okay.
10	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: So if you see damaged
11	sidewalk, as you indicate you have, whether it's
12	your property or somebody else's, you can get in
13	touch with the City and they'll come out and
14	replace it at no charge. I just want to be
15	clear.
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other
17	questions by members of the committee?
18	MR. GIMBEL: I have one follow-up, if I
19	might, to Alderman Dudzik's question.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead. Go
21	ahead.
22	MR. GIMBEL: Mr. Quigley, what are the
23	operational hours of Mill Valley Recycling?
24	THE WITNESS: Early until about five.
25	I don't know.

1	MR. GIMBEL: Well, if I told you
2	that
3	THE WITNESS: Before I wake up until
4	about five.
5	MR. GIMBEL: From seven to 4:30, if I
6	told you those were the hours, you wouldn't be
7	able to contradict that, would you?
8	THE WITNESS: No.
9	MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. Nothing
10	further.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Could
12	we have our next witness, please? Name and
13	address for the record, please.
14	THE WITNESS: Hi. It's Jacquelyn
15	Jaggard, J-A-G-G-A-R-D, at 1113 South 3rd Street,
16	which is about three or four blocks from Joanne's
17	place.
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. And
19	your testimony, please.
20	THE WITNESS: It's really basically
21	very similar to what's been given before. I have
22	these I have lost raingutters off my garage.
23	One One raingutter of the downspout, of
24	which I followed the person. And I did call the
25	police. Followed the person to Mill Valley,

00032 where they turned it in. Now, I did - - I also 1 2 did go to Mill Valley, and I met with Joanne a number of times on this problem, and her 4 suggestion to me and to the rest of the neighbors 5 was, if I remember correctly, Jo, that we mark 6 the back of our raingutters with orange circles, 7 and that you would check the raingutters after 8 you bought them from the bums, and we could then 9 reclaim them before you did whatever you do to 10 them. 11 And I also talked to the police officer 12 who is on bum duty down at the recycling centers. 13 Don't know his name, remember his name, but he 14 was there, when I - -15 MR. MAISTELMAN: Bound? Bound duty. 16 What's bound duty? 17 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Bum. Bum. 18 MS. MAISTELMAN: Oh, is it? You're 19 referring to the people as bums. I'm sorry. 20 THE WITNESS: B-U-M. MR. MAISTELMAN: I thought you said 21 22 I wasn't sure. "bound." 23 THE WITNESS: And - - And my - - my 2.4 concern with Mill Valley, and I - - and I am 25 going to oppose your license. I think you've

2.4

outgrown your facilities. There's - - There's just so many of these shopping cart people that go through our neighbor's - - through our neighborhoods, through our alleys. One Monday, I counted 27, all within about a two hour period in the morning. And they were headed down to your place.

I'm also concerned for the safety of the neighborhood, the thefts out of the yard. My neighbor down the alley has completely concrete blocked-in his backyard, because he's lost about about 10,000 dollars worth of material over the last ten years, that most of which has wound up down on Barclay.

And I'm also concerned quite a bit with - - with the homeless people when they've returned from Mill Valley. They - - They get whatever they get at Mill Valley and then they head for the nearest place that sells 40 ouncers, and they generally wind up passing out, which I know Joanne, is not your fault. On the street. I can't tell you how many times I've called the police to move - - to please come and move bums with shopping carts from our alleys, from our sidewalks, from our grass, and also, from in

2.4

front of the Head Start School across the street from me. That - That I just don't really think the kids should have to walk over a passed out bum. So - And I think it - it really addresses - I want to address the health and safety issue with - with all the public urination and defecation by these people. And I know they're these people, because I've seen them down at your place, because I do go down that way. And that's - You know, just, it's - it's a con - It's a health and safety concern for the neighborhood. I don't think we would have as much of that if Mill Valley were to relocate their current operation down there to one of their other recycling locations.

There wouldn't be the need for these people to be coming through and - - and as Doug or someone said, ripping open our garbage. You know, we keep our - - We try and keep our streets clean. The neighborhood works together, at least my block does. We wash out our garbage pails after garbage collection. We use plastic bags, and everything the City has asked us to do to help them keep our neighborhood clean. And we can do this on Sunday, and by Monday afternoon it

1 looks just like it did on Sunday before I 2 started. Because of the stuff that falls out of the shopping carts, that maybe falls out of Mill 4 Valley trucks, and it's just - - It's a never 5 ending process. And I really don't think the neighborhood should have to be subject to this. 6 7 I think it - - It - - I think recycling centers in general should be located more than two blocks 8 9 away from a residential neighborhood. So that's 10 about all I have to say. I call the police. 11 go around regularly, and I corral the - - the 12 vacant shopping carts, because Joanne has told me 13 that - - that they no longer accept people with 14 shopping carts walking in, which is why they now 15 use baby carriages and strollers, and they leave 16 their shopping carts in our neighborhood several 17 blocks away. And I - - I corral them. I put 18 them in my yard. I call the stores to come and 19 pick them up. If the store doesn't come and pick 20 them up within 24 hours, then I call the police 21 to come and pick them up. And they send out one 22 of the mounted units with their truck and their 23 little trailer that runs behind the truck. And 2.4 they were doing this a couple Sundays ago, and I 25 don't know how many shopping carts that had been

00036 1 abandoned that were picked up. And I - - I think 2 it's just very detrimental to our neighborhood, especially the theft off of people's dwellings 4 and buildings, and I know this, Mr. Gimbel, 5 because I have seen them do it. And I have seen 6 the people that I've seen rip off raingutters 7 down at Mill Valley trading them in. So I - -You know, I just - - I don't know what else to 8 9 say. We - - I've been ragging on my Alderman for 10 what? 11 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Years. 12 THE WITNESS: For eight or ten years? 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Years. 14 THE WITNESS: I made him raise his hand 15 at the - - before the last election and say, "If 16 I'm elected, I promise faithfully to help you 17 with the garbage cart issue." But every time I 18 call him, that's one of the things I bring up. 19 And we just want a clean and safe neighborhood 20 for the children and for the seniors that live 21 there. I mean, it's - - It's a very small 22 neighborhood, and that's basically all we're 23 asking. So I think that's about all I have to 2.4 say.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Mr.

00037 1 Gimbel, do you have ny questions of this witness? 2 MR. GIMBEL: Just one question. Ms. 3 Jaggard, as - - as I'm understanding your 4 testimony, you're - - you're - - you're saying to 5 this committee that you believe that your 6 neighborhood is an inappropriate place for 7 recycling businesses to be located. Isn't that 8 correct? 9 THE WITNESS: I believe - -10 MR. GIMBEL: Whether it's Mill Valley, 11 Bandos or Miller Compressing. 12 THE WITNESS: I believe that not only 13 my neighborhood, my resident - - my residential 14 neighborhood, but I believe any residential 15 neighborhood is an inappropriate place for a 16 garbage area, a garbage collection place or a 17 recycling center to be located in view of the 18 number of people that do the - - the - - the stop 19 in the alleys and garbage bins and stuff. I 20 don't have any objection to them taking out the 21 cans out of my recycling bin. In fact, a lot of 22 times I'll just put them in a bag and hand them 23 to whoever comes down the alley first. 2.4 MR. GIMBEL: Thank you. You've

answered my question.

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1	THE WITNESS: So
2	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair.
3	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Puente.
4	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Ma'am, did you take
5	Jordan's suggestion and mark your property as she
6	suggested?
7	THE WITNESS: Joanne's suggestion?
8	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Or Joanne.
9	THE WITNESS: No. I put up plastic
10	raingutters instead, and I just don't have the
11	time or energy to take off all my raingutters and
12	put orange circles on the backside and put them
13	back up. So, no. I have not marked my property.
14	However, I am very careful when I take my storm
15	windows down to wash them in Spring and Fall,
16	because I am not sure I can safely go in and go
17	to the bathroom and come back out without them
18	having been stolen out of my yard.
19	And it's It's this way in a lot of
20	yards, at least on my alley. I have watched
21	these guys go into people's yards. And And
22	take stuff. And I know And I have followed
23	them down to Mill Valley. And very possibly,
24	they go to Bandos, too. I don't know.
25	ALDERMAN PUENTE: Okay. Thank you,

00039 1 ma'am. 2 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. 3 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. 4 ALDERMAN WADE: Ma'am, you - - you've 5 lived over there for quite a long time? 6 THE WITNESS: I've lived in the 7 neighborhood for - - since 1989. And I bought my house at 1113 in 1997. 8 9 ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. So you've lived 10 over there since '89. 11 THE WITNESS: Yes. 12 ALDERMAN WADE: Have you - - Have you 13 noticed it being pretty consistent over the years 14 as far as the traffic going over to the recycling 15 place or has it gotten worse lately, and do you have any idea of if it has gotten late - - worse 16 lately, what - - what would be the cause? 17 18 THE WITNESS: I didn't notice that it 19 was as bad. I bought my house in '97. And when 20 I bought the house, I had my yard fenced in. I had a little cut-out made to house my garbage 21 22 carts, which I can no longer use. I have to keep 23 them in my yard and then roll them out when the 2.4 garbagemen come. But I've noticed an increase in 25 this probably over the last seven or eight years,

00040 1 an increase in - - in - -2 ALDERMAN WADE: The traffic. 3 THE WITNESS: In the traffic going - -4 ALDERMAN WADE: And for those seven or 5 eight years it's been pretty consistent for those 6 seven or eight years? 7 THE WITNESS: It's been pretty consistent. A couple - - I noticed an increase 8 9 again a couple of years ago. 10 ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. 11 THE WITNESS: And for a while there we 12 had - - For a while there we had the same group 13 of people that went through the neighborhood. 14 And I could just - - I would say, you know, 15 "Don't you dare rip open my trash?" And they 16 just took what they needed out of the recycling 17 bins. But the last couple of years we've had a 18 whole new group and a whole different group, and 19 we also have recycling people, not the shopping 20 cart people only, we have the guys in these beat 21 up old trucks that drive around who help 22 themselves to whatever is sitting close to the alley, like refrigerators and stove - - stoves 23 2.4 that the City doesn't pick up anymore. 25 ALDERMAN WADE: So that's been chronic

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1	in the last three years.				
2	THE WITNESS: Longer than the last				
3	three years. But I have noticed an increase in				
4	the last two to three years.				
5	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. Thank you.				
6	THE WITNESS: In the number of people				
7	going through.				
8	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chair.				
9	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik.				
10	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Ma'am, maybe not so				
11	much a question, as merely a comment. I think				
12	part of the reason you're seeing more of the beat				
13	up trucks and even, you know, the idea of people				
14	walking around recycling, is the City does such a				
15	poor job of picking up garbage.				
16	THE WITNESS: Oh, no, no, we have				
17	the The sanitation department				
18	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Ma'am				
19	THE WITNESS: is the best				
20	department in the City, I would swear by that.				
21	And I regularly tell Mr. Hagen				
22	ALDERMAN BOHL: I don't think you'll				
23	get any of the aldermen here on this side of the				
24	aisle to agree with you on that. Not one. Not				
25	one.				

00042 1 THE WITNESS: We have the most perfect 2 recycling and garbage crew in our district. ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Well, ma'am, don't -4 - don't misunderstand what I'm saying. The guys 5 behind the truck are unbelievable good at what 6 they do. I'm not - - I'm not lying to you there. 7 But we have cut back in so many quarters, 8 including - - You refer to the junk trucks. Junk 9 trucks come through my neighborhood. In fact, 10 when I was a little boy, I remember them coming 11 through my grandma's neighborhood, junk trucks. 12 We - - We don't pick up a lot of stuff that the 13 City used to pick up. Wash - - Wash machines - -14 refrig - -15 THE WITNESS: And that just changed, 16 what? Last year, two years ago? 17 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Right. Right. But 18 - - but even going back a few years, the whole 19 idea of recycling is done so poorly. And I can 20 show you a letter from the Commissioner of Public 21 Works who clearly states that there are 22 households in this City, areas of this City, 23 where 90 to 95 percent of the households don't do 2.4 any recycling. 25 THE WITNESS: We used to have - -

00043 1 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: So, ma'am - -2 THE WITNESS: We used to have the - -3 the blue recycling bins. 4 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Yes. 5 THE WITNESS: Which they got rid of 6 because a lot of my neighbors when their garbage 7 pails got full used to use the recycling tall 8 bins. And they discontinued that because they 9 need their truck to pick them up. So we have the 10 little square ones. 11 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: All right. And I 12 just want - - Again, not so much maybe a question 13 as - - as merely a comment, with regards to the 14 shopping carts. I can tell you that my office, 15 and I have the far southwest side of the City of 16 Milwaukee, gets, you know, several phone calls 17 every month about shopping carts. In fact, last 18 year I had the DPW department go out to a - - a 19 wooded area off of Loomis Road and they picked up 20 literally dozens of shopping carts that were 21 sitting there. I wish there was a - - a way, and

I don't think that we found it yet, to ensure

shopping areas, the businesses that they - - they belong to. That's - - That's just - - That's

that those shopping carts never leave the

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1	just my comment, and and I guess I'll make
2	one last statement, comment, about something that
3	you said. You seem to have no problem with
4	recycling as long as it's in somebody else's
5	backyard. Your actual comment was that you
6	didn't want a recycling facility like this set up
7	anywhere within two blocks of a residential
8	property. But yet, some of the people that are
9	here are four blocks away.
10	THE WITNESS: Well, I didn't say I
11	didn't make the two block comment. I said
12	anywhere near
13	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Ma'am Ma'am, I
14	could ask her to read it back. I won't. But I
15	could ask her to read it back. I actually wrote
16	it down when you said it.
17	THE WITNESS: Okay. Well, I didn't
18	mean just the two blocks. I meant within
19	within a resident close to any residential
20	area.
21	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Okay. Thank you.
22	THE WITNESS: It should be an
23	industrial area.
24	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: And And I'm
25	Again, I don't mean to dispute what you were

00045 1 saying. I happen to agree with you to an extent. 2 But isn't Allen-Bradley just a few blocks from 3 your house? 4 THE WITNESS: Yes. It's half a block 5 up. 6 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: When I think of an 7 industrial area, I think of the foundry that was 8 there, Allen-Bradley, any number of - - any 9 number of businesses that used to be over there, 10 including a concrete recycling plant that was 11 just located a little bit south of this 12 particular location. So thank you very much. 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other 14 questions of this witness? Next witness, please. 15 Thank you for your testimony. Name and address 16 for the record, please. 17 THE WITNESS: My name is Ernesto 18 Ramirez. I live at 121 West Mineral. I - - Oh, 19 no. I own 135 - - 131 West Mineral, and I live 20 in 125 West Mineral. And I also own another 21 property in 1615 South 3rd Street. 22 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And your 23 testimony, Mr. Ramirez? 2.4 THE WITNESS: Well, I've been living in

that area since 1990. 1991, I think I buy my

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first house there. And - - And one time, you know, was you used to got across the street from my house those - -

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Containers? THE WITNESS: Containers. Thank you to the Alderman. They was moved. You know. Some agreement that he made with you people. And but right now I never know that, you know, that you had to come to the - - to the - - here to get the license and stuff like that. But I see this time an opportunity to complain about what is going on a block away from you. Not two blocks, not three blocks. I'm a block away from you. And if you want me, I can take you right now to the back of my house at 131, and you see that it is like a hotel or motel for the homeless people. And a couple times, I - - You know, I'm a man that I'm not afraid of anything, thank God. And a couple times I confront some of those guys that was stealing the siding of a building, and they go to your place. And I think you know that you are buying some of the stuff from them, because you tell the people here to mark it, and that way she'll know they can get it back. From my houses I lose the raingutters and I lose aluminum doors.

00047 And they go there. Well, probably I say I pay 1 taxes for my three properties. They are in that area. And, of course, he says that Allen-Bradley 4 is there. You know, Allen-Bradley is, you know, 5 streamed and beautiful. They are always working 6 on the buildings. 7 And now if they going to get the 8 license, probably, what are you going to do? Is 9 what I - - Is my question. What are they going 10 to do to stop some of the problem that we have in 11 that area. 12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. We'll 13 - - I don't want any of the committee members to 14 go downstairs or anything. We'll take a - - And 15 just have a chair over there.          And you've heard the testimony of neighbors who

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have complained about certain activities at Mill

00049 1 Valley Recycling. Have you not? 2 Α Yes, I have. Will you tell this committee of the City Council 4 what your experience has been with respect to the 5 operation of the Mill Valley business from the 6 perspective of your position as their neighbor? 7 Well, I'm here to say that I'm in favor of them 8 being granted their license. And I feel that 9 some of the testimony regarding against them 10 having their license is a little unfair, due to 11 the fact I don't blame Mill Valley for the 12 homeless problem, which we do have a homeless 13 problem in the neighborhood. But we also have a 14 homeless center that's only, what, four - - maybe 15 four or five blocks away. And a lot of these 16 people, when they can't get in the center, they 17 do turn around and they sleep in the alleyways 18 and stuff like that. But again, that is not Mill 19 Valley's fault. 20 And somebody earlier testified about 21

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And somebody earlier testified about junk falling off a truck and leaving it in the, you know, the roadway. I can tell you from living next door and from whether it's vandals or Mill Valley that any time I've seen junk fall off a truck, those people are pretty quick to go and

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1 pick it up and put it back on the truck, because 2 they want their money. I mean, they - - they spent all day running around neighborhoods 4 looking for junk, and they're not going to lose 5 it on the street someplace. And some of the 6 other things I've noticed Mill Valley has done, 7 especially in the last couple years, I've noticed 8 that they've tried very hard to keep the 9 alleyways clean across the street from me and 10 next door with some of these people that do come 11 around the neighborhood. They've - - I've 12 actually seen them turn people away. I was there 13 one day, and there was somebody that was turned 14 away, because they were told that they thought 15 that more than likely that was, shall we say, 16 "hot property." 17

And I've seen Mill Valley turn around and do a lot of good things in the neighborhood, like employing people that live in the neighborhood. I've seen them work to make Mill Valley look presentable. It's an industrial area. It's zoned industrial, not residential. And these people that are opposing it, I - - I think they're done so good-heartedly, but at the same time I think maybe they don't understand all

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1	the facts. The homeless people are going to be					
2	everywhere. People stealing are going to be					
3	everywhere. I don't care if you're at Brookfield					
4	Square. Look how many cars they steal out of					
5	Brookfield Square. So I just want to say I think					
6	they deserve to have their license and to work.

Now, why don't you just explain to the committee, if you will, please, what is the nature of the business of Mill Valley Recycling today, and what, if any, plans do you have should your license be renewed for modifications of the business?

We're scrap iron and metal dealers. I have a

We're scrap iron and metal dealers. I have a 8 retail business, as everyone knows, where people 9 bring in their scrap iron and metal. And I also 10 have an industrial trucking business, which we go 11 to companies that have a product that creates 12 metal. We spot containers and we buy the scrap. 13 In the future my plans are is that I am looking 14 to do some things different with the industrial 15 business. So the yard across the street is now 16 not going to be having piles. I am going to be 17 putting in containers for every commodity that's 18 in there. It will be cleaned up in terms of the 19 way it was with the piles. And the trucks will 20 be less, because I'm going to be selling some of 21 the trucks and downsizing that part of the 22 business.

Q Have you instructed your employees or do you have company policies to address any scrap metal falling off the trucks, either as a consequence

00060 1 of them falling off trucks that are owned and operated by Mill Valley or people who bring 3 recycling materials to sell? 4 Of course. I mean, we've - - We're - - We've 5 always been very big on the neighborhood and our 6 neighbors. And everyone's instructed, all of our 7 employees, to keep it clean. We sweep on a 8 continuous basis and keeping it aesthetically 9 clean and looking nice is important. And we - -10 we've always made that clear. 11 In the last 12 to 24 months have you made any 12 cosmetic modifications to the outside of the 13 building? 14 Yeah. We landscaped on Mineral Street and the 15 corner of Barclay. I can't remember what side 16 that's on. But we - - Yeah. I just stuck in a 17 lot of money landscaping that whole section, 18 putting in new bushes, trees, and - - and mulched 19 it all. And then, our building alone, I think we 20 were the first to really fix up the actual building, the outside of the building. We've 21 22 tuckpointed the whole building, put in glass 23 block windows, and put in awnings to make the 2.4 outside of the building look aesthetically nice. 25 How long has your family been associated with

23	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other					
24	questions by members of the committee? Closing					
25	statement, Mr. Gimbel.					

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MR. GIMBEL: Yes. Mr. Chairman, members of the committee. I have a certain degree of empathy for the people who have appeared here and have expressed their views about some of the activities that have occurred in and around Mill Valley. But I think it's very unfair of those people to ventilate their concerns as an objection to the continuation of this business. First and foremost, this business has been at this location doing essentially the same thing that it's doing now for more than a half a century. All of the activities that are occurring currently that have been complained about were occurring essentially in the same manner that they're now occurring at the time that the people who object to this license made decisions to locate their residences in that area.

There are other recycling businesses within a four block radius that do essentially the - - the same thing that Mill Valley Recycling does. In fact, Miller Compressing, as - - as most of the members of this committee know, is - - is a substantially larger enterprise and has substantially more noisy activities that are

2.4

ongoing in that area.

It may well be that there will come a time when this particular area of the City will no longer be as appropriate as an industrial area. And when and if that happens, the City can use its power of eminent domain the Supreme Court ruled last year for other private development. But I am urging you in your good judgment not to penalize Ms. Beck and her family for continuing on with a business that's been going on for decades, and they've made great attempts to be good neighbors, as you've heard from even some of the objectors, they've attempted to resolve some of the issues that they've testified about here today.

The social issues of homeless people aren't going to be resolved by the City of Milwaukee by closing recycling plants. And - - And if, in fact, there was a requirement that recycling plants had to go out of the City of Milwaukee and into the rural areas, would these three men be able to get to that location? Would they be able to support their families at that location? Would they be able to reside in the area where that business is located? I don't

think that I need to put specific testimony on to make that the suggestion inferentially, that this is a hub of economic activity that supports a significant part of the community with people who have language issues, that may have a hard time gaining employment in a lot of different kinds of occupational activities. But this isn't one of them. And they're getting very good wages. They're getting family benefits. Their families are being supported in an area which has been doing this for years. I earnestly urge that you approve and recommend the renewal of this license. Thank you for your attention.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. I just want to add a couple things before we take this matter into committee, being the Alderman of the district.

The - - The scrap yard has been there for a half a Century. I - - I remember it being there when I - - I mean, when I was a child growing up in the neighborhood. And the - - One of the - - One of the problems is - - is that the - - the revitalization in the neighborhood, as - - as it has taken off, and the residential components are moving closer to the location of

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21 22

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the scrap yard.

In the big picture in - - And I've been talking to DCD about these thing - - this issue. One - - One of these issues for a long time. We would like to, you know, back, especially in - in our neighborhood in the 12th District, Walker's Point area, none of these were planned communities. It was, I mean, back in the day when they built those houses, you'd have a - you'd have a house next to a foundry, and then you'd have another house, and then you'd have another industrial use, and then you'd have another house. And that's just the way it was. There was no master plan when the neighborhood was laid out. Consequently, it creates problems in the future, which this is - - this is actually one of them. The revitalization in the neighborhood has - - has gone along so well. The residential component is moving closer and closer to these industrial uses.

In our - - our crystal ball with the City we're - - we're looking at, actively looking at ways to reposition some of these businesses without - - It is our goal not to displace any of these workers. Not to displace any of these

jobs. Perhaps a movement of a small distance. We're looking at all these things, because we're - - we're vitally interested in the continued improvement of the neighborhood. It's one of the fastest improving neighborhoods in the City, Walker's Point, and I thank - - I thank everyone in this room, but the - - the - - the opponents and the supporters for their investment and their work that they put into this neighborhood. It's all - - It's all working together and it's going well.

In the long run I believe that these scrap yards will actually be moved by the City, because - - because the redevelopment is sweeping through that area so much. I'm not - - I'm not sure that the - - that an immediate shutdown of this - - of this business is the answer. So I just - - I think some of the other members of the committee are - - are somewhat familiar with what has developed there over the years. And - - And I also find the - - I find the owners of Mill Valley, and I have to say, oftentimes as an Alderman, if you want to go talk to business about their - - about problems and situations created in the neighborhood. Sometimes it's hard

1 to get to the owner of the business, and it's 2 hard to get - - we - - we kind of get pushed off for excuses or something. I have to say in the 4 - - there's been a significant amount of 5 complaints about the - - the operation concerning Mill Valley. The ownership, previously Jordan, 6 7 and - - and now Joanne has been extremely 8 responsive. And I'm not just talking about at 9 license time or before they come up before the 10 Board of Zoning Appeals. Any time that I've ever 11 had a complaint and called upon them, they've 12 been extremely - - extremely responsive. So they 13 wish to cooperate. And I think if they - - I 14 think if they had their druthers, they would like 15 to move right now, if we could find them the - -16 the perfect place to move somewhere - - somewhere 17 close enough where it wouldn't affect these 18 people's jobs. But yet, far enough away from the 19 neighborhood where the - - where these - - where 20 they wouldn't have these complaints anymore. I 21 think they would go tomorrow, if I - - if we had 22 the opportunity. And we are looking to do that. 23 But again, I'm - - I'm not sure - - I'm not sure 2.4 this is the time to - - to push them off the 25 edge. So this matter is in committee.

00069 1 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chairman. 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik. 3 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Only in so much as I 4 want to respond to some - - to the comments you 5 just made. I have to be honest with you. I was 6 out about a year ago - - I will make a motion by the - - by the end of this. 7 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Take your time. 9 Everyone else has. 10 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Okay. I - - I did 11 happen to go out to the Waste Management site, 12 which is located out in one of the western 13 suburbs. And I was amazed at how much we don't recycle. And it's just shameful. All the 14 15 garbage goes out there from the City of 16 Milwaukee, and the people that live out, I 17 believe it's out in Muskego, they don't want the 18 - - the dump out there. So I can appreciate you 19 saying that, you know, we're looking to relocate 20 these things. The simple fact of the matter this 21 is - - this business has been here for decades by 22 your own admission, and - - and Mr. Gimbel's 23 comments. And relocating them may not be the 2.4 answer, may not even be possible, in my opinion. 25 I - - I don't know what aldermanic district, let

alone what municipality, would let them come in. But they are one of those things that our society has deemed a necessary evil, if you will.

I - I happen to, like I said, I went out to the Waste Management site, and - - and the same type of things were going on there that go on at this business, and as I drove back, I could see that the signs in objection to the - - to the dumps that were out, you know, 20 miles from the City of Milwaukee. I'm - I - I happen to agree with you, at least to the extent that, you know, we can't just push them off - - off the site, because this is, in my opinion, or my - my understanding this is the first opportunity that we've really had to get neighborhood input with regard to this license.

So I'm going to move for a ten day sus - - I'm going to move approval of the license, but with a ten day suspension. And I would hope that that would appease the neighbors and also put a shot over the bow of the owner so that they understand that the neighbors have a number of concerns, and not to just blow those concerns off. I'll be honest with you. I went out and looked at the landscaping and like, and - - and

00071 1 the awnings are nice, and perhaps your place is 2 the most beautiful recycling location I've ever seen in the City of Milwaukee. I'm not a 4 recycling expert, but I - - I just think that we 5 need to emphasize to not only this particular 6 location, but all the recycling locations in that 7 area, that business as usual, business as it was 8 back in the 1940s is not business as it is in the 9 year 2006. So my - - my - - my motion would be 10 to move approval with a ten day suspension. 11 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Motion by Alderman 12 Dudzik is to recommend approval of the renewal of 13 this license with a ten day suspension based on 14 neighborhood testimony. On the motion. Any 15 other committee members wish to speak on the 16 motion? Then we'll take a roll call on that 17 motion. 18 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. 20 ALDERMAN WADE: Before we do the roll call on the motion. There - - They expire April 21 22 30th. So in some regard they're going to be

23 2.4 25 closed for ten days. Correct me if I'm wrong, they expire May 30th. We don't do this at $\,$ Council until whatever day - -
